The University of Minnesota, ranked among the nation's top public universities, reflects the state of Minnesota's strong and enduring commitment to education. It is nearly unique among universities in the United States in its three defining characteristics:

- It is an esteemed international research university.
- It is a public land-grant institution with a strong tradition of education and public service.
- Its largest campus—the Twin Cities campus—is located in a vibrant metropolitan area with not one, but two, great cities at its center: Minneapolis and St. Paul.

The University is the primary center in Minnesota (and much of the Upper Midwest) for education and research in the liberal arts and sciences, health sciences, law, education, engineering, agriculture, and natural resources. The Twin Cities campus comprises 19 colleges and offers a full range of academic and professional degrees. A comprehensive campus in Duluth offers undergraduate and graduate programs. The Morris campus offers a four-year liberal arts program. Crookston offers associate and baccalaureate degrees in technical, career-oriented programs. Through the Minnesota Extension Service, the University is present in each of Minnesota's 87 counties.

When the University was founded as a preparatory school in 1851, Minnesota had been a territory for just two years, and statehood was still seven years away. The school was built on little more than the pioneers' faith in



education. In its early years, the University struggled financially; during the Civil War, it was forced to close. It reopened in 1867, thanks to the energetic leadership of Governor John S. Pillsbury, who came to be known as the "Father of the University." Mathematics Profes-

sor William Watts Folwell became the University's first president in 1869. Robert Bruininks is the University's fifteenth president.

Two students received bachelor of arts degrees at the first commencement in June 1873. Since then, the University has granted more than 550,000 degrees.

University alumni include five Nobel Prize winners, a former chief justice of the United States Supreme Court, two former U.S. vice presidents, the heads of Fortune 500 companies, pioneers in medicine, civil rights leaders, top journalists, distinguished teachers and scholars, performing artists, and countless other men and women who have achieved distinction in every field.

Alumni and their families and friends are always welcome at the University. We invite you to visit campus regularly to enjoy the many educational, cultural, and entertainment opportunities that are open to the public—including performances by students in CLA's vibrant arts programs. We also invite you to continue your relationship with the University through the University of Minnesota Alumni Association and the CLA Alumni Society.

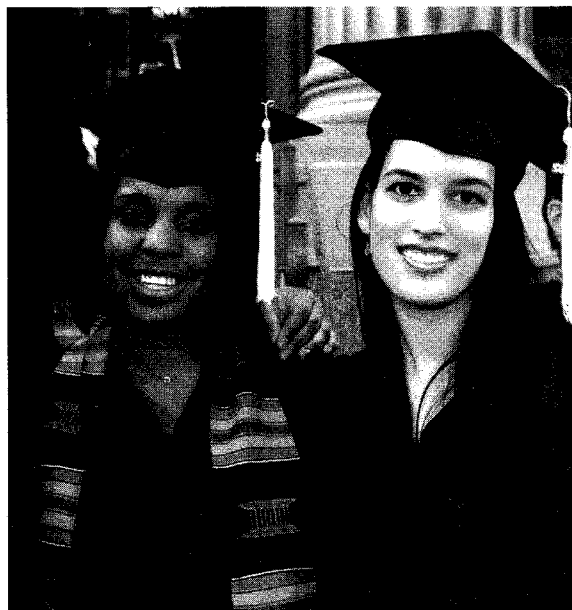

The College of Liberal Arts (CLA)—then the College of Science, Literature and Arts (SLA)—offered its first classes at the University of Minnesota in 1869, 18 years after the founding of the University. Since then, it has become an international center for education in the arts and sciences, humanities, and social sciences.

The liberal arts span all areas of human knowledge, enterprise, and aspirations. The college offers more than 60 majors, with study and research opportunities in fields ranging from art to anthropology, from world languages and cultures to world history, from global economic systems to neuroscience. Students whose interests cross disciplines may design individualized major programs—an option that has grown in popularity in recent years as knowledge sets and career preparation requirements become increasingly fluid.

The majority of students who enter CLA as first-year students complete their undergraduate education in CLA. Others complete their basic liberal arts coursework in the college and then transfer to other units of the University. The college offers strong preprofessional programs with close ties to the health sciences and other professional schools at the University.

There are more than 16,700 undergraduate and graduate students enrolled in CLA programs. Approxi-



mately 540 permanent faculty members—teachers and scholars of international stature—share with students their vast knowledge, their provocative insights, and the most current research in their fields.

CLA students acquire both breadth of knowledge and particular depth and proficiency in a specialized field of knowledge. Whatever their majors, students complete an education based broadly in the liberal arts.

Courses necessary to meet general education requirements introduce students to modes of inquiry and subject matter across the major branches of knowledge.

This education is the very best preparation for lives and careers in a rapidly changing world. CLA graduates develop a solid grounding in ideas and knowledge across disciplines, across centuries, across cultures, and across geographic boundaries, as well as proficiency in critical analysis, communication, and research methodologies.

Equipped with this education, graduates of the College of Liberal Arts bring into the world the communication skills, critical and innovative thinking, creativity, and intellectual versatility needed for a lifetime of learning, leadership, and success.

DR. WILLIAM MCGUIRE

CHAIRMAN OF THE BOARD AND CEO, UNITEDHEALTH GROUP

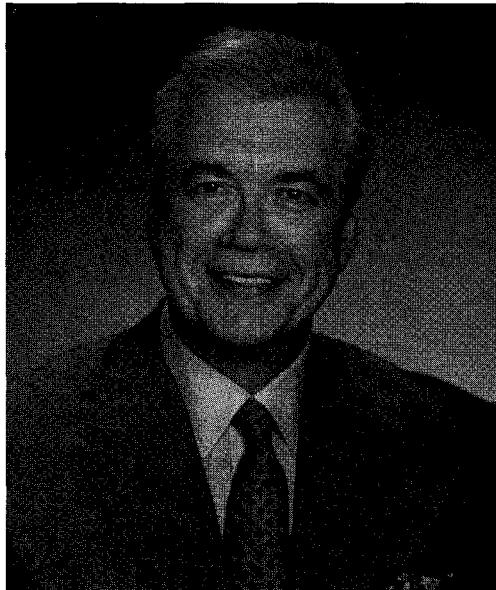
Keynote Speaker

Dr. William W. McGuire is chairman of the board and chief executive officer of UnitedHealth Group, a Fortune 40 company dedicated to making the health care system work better. As the CEO of America's leading health and well being company, McGuire has successfully combined his compassion and business skills to promote key principles aimed at improving health care access, affordability, and quality, including the delivery of health care based on science and proven clinical evidence.

Advocating the importance of the physician-patient relationship, McGuire has focused UnitedHealth Group on strengthening the central role that physicians play in making our health care system work better. He has promoted greater use of data and information in health care decision making by all participants; and the application of technology to lower costs, enhance productivity, and simplify administrative and consumer services. McGuire also has championed the concept of mandating a basic and essential set of health benefits that would be available for all citizens.

McGuire joined UnitedHealth Group (previously known as United HealthCare Corporation) in 1988, and was appointed president and chief operating officer in 1989, chief executive officer in February 1991, and chairman of the board in May 1991. Prior to 1988, he had served as president and chief operating officer of Peak Health Plan in the state of Colorado.

From 1980 through 1986, McGuire was a practicing physician in Colorado Springs, Colorado, specializing in cardiopulmonary and critical care medicine. During that period, he served as chairman of the Colorado Foundation for Medical Care, Region III



and its Professional Review Committee. Prior to his years of clinical practice, McGuire conducted basic research in inflammatory processes and cellular response to injury in the lung at Scripps Clinic and Research Foundation in La Jolla, California, from 1978 to 1980.

This year, the William W. and Nadine M. McGuire Family Foundation pledged up to \$10 million in grants to create higher

education opportunities for economically disadvantaged young Minnesotans. The grants—to be made to Admission Possible, LearningWorks at Blake, and the University of Minnesota—create an innovative collaborative model for student access and success that will help fund up to 90 percent of the cost of attendance for students with the greatest financial need. They also enable development of CLA-led programs to facilitate students' successful transition to the University and to ensure their academic success.

McGuire received an M.D. with highest honors from the University of Texas Medical Branch in 1974. He holds board certifications in both internal medicine and pulmonary medicine. In 2004, he received the Ashbel Smith Distinguished Alumnus Award from the University of Texas Medical Branch and in 2006 was inducted into the University of Texas Medical Branch Legends in Medicine.

McGuire has served as an advisor to the American Board of Internal Medicine and a member of the National Cancer Policy Board. He is an elected member of the Institute of Medicine of the National Academy of Sciences, as well as a member of the National Cancer Policy Forum.

FREDERICK ASHER

HORACE T. MORSE—UNIVERSITY OF MINNESOTA ALUMNI AWARD FOR OUTSTANDING

CONTRIBUTIONS TO UNDERGRADUATE EDUCATION

Department of Art History

For many students, the phrase “art history” brings to mind superhuman feats of memorization, and too many art slides to count. But Frederick Asher’s art history classes are different.

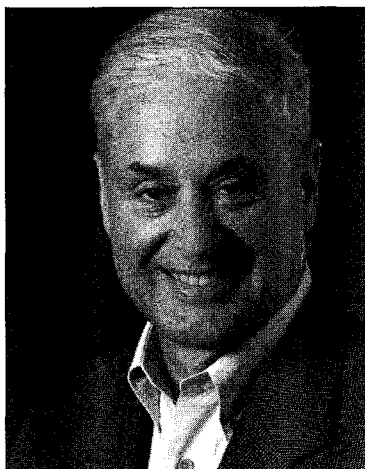
A professor in the Department of Art History for over 35 years, Asher has inspired passion, critical thinking, and hard work in his students since the beginning. His students consistently rave about his classes, and while they’re extremely challenging (six or more papers is typical), they sell out faster than concert tickets.

One example is Asher’s new undergraduate course, “Why Art Matters,” an innovative twist on “Intro to Art History.” With a grant from the Infotech Fees Committee, Asher worked with a small group of graduate students to design a class that would get at “what art historians actually write and think about.”

The end result was an enormous success. “Why Art Matters” explores the impact of art on human thought—from issues of “art and ownership” (such as Nazi-looted art) to “art as propaganda,” (statues of rulers, buildings with corporate names) and “art in the Borderlands.”

Despite his proven effectiveness as a teacher (it’s pretty much unanimous), Asher has continued to hone his pedagogical skills—working with the Center for Teaching and Learning Services to identify ways to improve his classroom technique.

Asher also makes a lasting impression outside of the classroom; he makes a point of being easily accessible to his students, and he is known for the personal attention he provides—from meeting with students on weekends to taking phone calls at home. In fact, he customarily lists his home phone number on his



syllabus—no matter how large the class. One of his students says, “His concern for students is phenomenal He is the first to call when a student is sick, missing classes, or is simply visibly distressed, and actively seeks to resolve situations so that the student can achieve his/her highest potential.”

In addition to his genuine concern for students, Asher is passionately committed to his area of scholarship: art in India.

To expand his knowledge and renew his curiosity, he frequently travels to and around India. In fact, a colleague of his remarked, “Many acknowledge that no art historian, even Indian citizens teaching at Indian institutions, has seen more of the Indian sub-continent than Asher.”

Asher’s talented leadership has also been a continuous thread throughout his career. Among many other honorable posts, he has served as chair of the Department of Art History, associate dean for faculty affairs, chair of the University’s Fulbright Selection Committee, and editor-in-chief of *caa.reviews*, the online publication of the College Art Association.

He’s served terms on the CLA Honors Advisory Committee and the CLA Course Review Committee, and year after year, he participates in the CLA high ability recruitment effort, an example of his extraordinary commitment to the development of a strong student body.

Finally, Asher’s expertise on art in India has been recognized worldwide. He served as president of the American Institute of Indian Studies and was even recognized by the government of India with an Outstanding Leadership Award.

BARBARA WELKE
HORACE T. MORSE—UNIVERSITY OF MINNESOTA ALUMNI AWARD FOR OUTSTANDING
CONTRIBUTIONS TO UNDERGRADUATE EDUCATION
Department of History

Being a student in one of Barbara Welke's U.S. history classes is hard work. But it's even harder work to be Professor Welke.

That's because Welke has even higher standards for herself than she does for her students—which is hard to believe if you've ever made it through the gauntlet of discussions, papers, and exams that she's designed to make you think critically about the history of the Untied States. One of her students recalls, "Never before, and never since, have I had a professor that expected so much of me yet gave so much back in return."

Welke decided early on in her teaching career—back in 1995, when she was starting out at the University of Oregon—that her goal was to give every last student everything she had to offer. Of course, that's easy enough to say, but how in the world could you follow through with such a lofty promise?

Miraculously—or perhaps just through passionate and dogged determination—Welke continues to pull it off. Semester after semester, she memorizes all her students' names, provides invigorating lectures, facilitates provocative discussions, and fosters an environment in which students feel comfortable—inspired, even—to contribute.

And that's just inside the classroom. Welke's contribution outside the classroom is arguably even greater.

As a mentor, Welke is remembered by countless students with gratitude and awe. Taking cues from her career, many of her students have gone on to pursue careers in public service and social justice, often attributing their decisions to discoveries they made under



her careful guidance. Department chair Mary Jo (M.J.) Maynes remarks, "Professor Welke is inspiring a generation of Minnesota undergraduates to pursue lives and careers devoted to serving the public good." One of her students says she's "at the top of a short list of female role models I hope to emulate in my professional and academic career."

On top of her dedication to her students, Welke takes her responsibility to serve the community seriously as well. She frequently participates in outreach projects such as the "Not Your Grandparents' History" course she designed for the Osher Lifelong Learning Institute; and she's worked with "Bridge for America's History," a federal program focused on revitalizing the teaching of history in Saint Paul and Minneapolis.

Welke takes great pleasure in synchronizing the needs of the community with those of the university—as when she participated in a project that brought fifth-graders from a low-income community to campus. In charge of the history portion of their visit, she wrote a play on the struggles of African American students in the 1950s, which her undergraduate students performed.

Beneath all of Barbara Welke's innovative, and often entertaining, teaching techniques, is something she takes very seriously: We have a responsibility, she believes, to know our history. "We would question any architect who proposed building a skyscraper without a foundation. But that is what we are doing as a nation, as a global community, without history."

BEN MUNSON

ARTHUR “RED” AND HELENE B. MOTLEY OUTSTANDING TEACHING AWARD

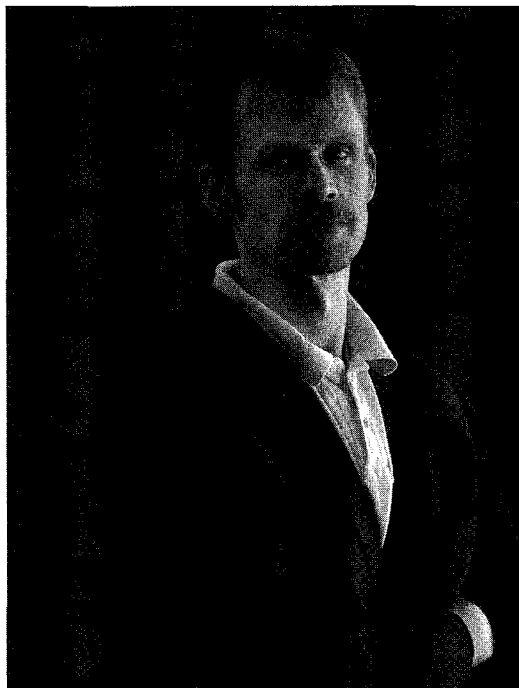
Department of Speech-Language-Hearing Sciences

Maybe it's the fact that he has a *blog*. Or that he's experimenting with the use of multi-media teaching tools in his field (speech-language-hearing sciences). Whatever Ben Munson's secret for winning the heart and minds of his young students, it's definitely working.

Relatively early in his career, Munson already has been honored for his superb teaching abilities; in 2003, he won the Students Choice Award of the CLA Student Board—an accolade reserved for the most creative, responsive, effective, and knowledgeable professors in the College of Liberal Arts.

Over the last few years, Munson has continued to demonstrate his commitment to a quality, multi-dimensional education for his students. Recently, he has collaborated with students on three graduate research partnerships and three undergraduate research grants. He has also assumed a heavy load of advising at the graduate level, serving as a mentor for both M.A. and doctoral students.

Of course, it's not just in the arena of teaching that Munson has garnered high marks. He has also attained rare honors within his field of research. He has published 22 papers in prestigious refereed journals, and for the majority, he is the first author.



In 2004, Munson received the Editor's Award from the American Speech-Language-Hearing Association for research that appeared in the *Journal of Speech, Language, and Hearing Research*. Since then, he has been appointed as associate editor of the journal, an unusual honor for a junior scientist.

Munson's primary research interest is the developmental aspect of speech acquisition and speech production in children and adults. His work in this area has generated new views about the relationship between different

types of knowledge of sounds. Munson also conducts research on the origin and consequences of socially conditioned variation in speech.

Among his colleagues, Munson is known for his rigorous and systematic approach to research, as well as his great potential as a scholar. He's been called "one of the top scholars of his generation" and "full of tremendous potential, promise, and energy." One colleague ranks him as "among the brightest and most prolific young scientists in our field."

Professor Munson received his B.A. in Linguistics from SUNY at Buffalo, and his M.A. in Speech-Language Pathology and Ph.D. in Speech and Hearing Sciences from The Ohio State University.

BRIAN SOUTHWELL

ARTHUR “RED” AND HELENE B. MOTLEY OUTSTANDING TEACHING AWARD

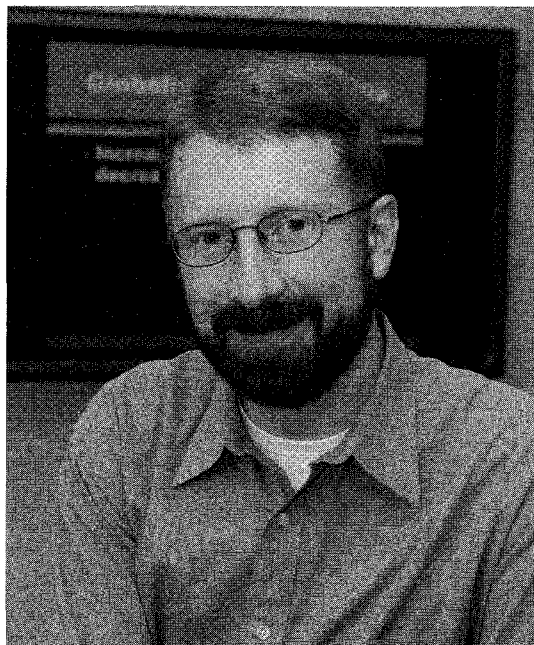

With his amazing ability to make every student feel welcome, even in a large Introduction to Journalism lecture course, Brian Southwell is not just a favorite professor in the Department of Journalism. He’s one of the most popular professors in the College of Liberal Arts.

An overwhelming number of student nominations combined with his consistently positive teaching evaluations earned Southwell this year’s Arthur “Red” and Helene B. Motley Outstanding Teaching Award.

Many of his students praise him as highly encouraging and very approachable. “Professor Southwell not only makes his courses interesting and relevant for students, but he goes out of his way to meet his students, know them by name, learn their interests, and connect them with opportunities,” says a former student.

Southwell understands well how to help his students learn. “At least three factors appear to facilitate learning: existing knowledge, confidence, and motivation. Almost everything I do as a teacher is intended to increase one of those,” he says. Journalism students enjoy his classes and his teaching style so much they



often continue to take several classes with him, from his 1001 Introduction to Journalism lecture course to his 5000-level graduate courses.

Part of Southwell’s ability to intrigue students is that he also manages to juggle fascinating, timely research on top of his teaching and advising schedule. He uses this research and his past experiences—like working for the Centers for Disease Control—to contribute to the discussion about science and health communication.

His good intentions overflow from the classroom. Since 2003, he has supervised over 30 undergraduate students as they have worked on directed studies projects, internships, and honors theses.

“I was inspired by Professor Southwell to do a research project. When he noticed I was very interested in a subject from his class, he suggested I look at doing a directed studies project. Now, because of that project and his guidance, I’m considering applying to graduate schools,” says an admiring student.

Southwell came to the College of Liberal Arts in 2002 from the East Coast, where he received his B.A. from the University of Virginia and his M.A. and Ph.D. from the University of Pennsylvania’s Annenberg School for Communication.

JOHN WATKINS
ARTHUR "RED" AND HELENE B. MOTLEY OUTSTANDING TEACHING AWARD
Department of English

Milton, Shakespeare, and their ilk have been staples of the English department curriculum for years. But no one brings them to life like English professor John Watkins, recipient of the 2006 Arthur "Red" and Helen B. Motley Outstanding Teaching Award. His teaching of these canonical works transforms his students' understanding and appreciation of English literature.

Students call Watkins' classes "the hardest and most interesting [they] have taken," saying that his vast knowledge, idiosyncratic perspectives, and "unbelievable concern for students" makes learning about Medieval, Renaissance, and Reformation literature among their best college experiences.

Watkins consistently receives high praise from students and colleagues alike.

"He does not try to clone his students," says former student and colleague Eric Daigre. "Rather, he supports undergraduate and graduate students in our own endeavors, striving to bring out our best ideas, on our own terms, so that we become wedded to our own passions and interests, not his."

Watkins' care and concern also earned him the Morse-Alumni Award for outstanding contributions to undergraduate education in 2004. That same year, he was named a CLA Scholar of the College, a designation that recognizes his outstanding scholarly achievements. In 1996, he received the English department's Ruth Christie Award, an honor based solely on student nominations, recognizing his excellence in teaching.

Watkins' commitment to his students also drives his involvement outside the classroom. He has served as the English department's Director of Graduate Stud-

ies (1996-1997) and Director of Curriculum and Undergraduate Studies (2000-2001). He also devoted two years to serving the University community as Academic Director of the Steven J. Schochet Center for Gay, Lesbian, Bisexual, and Transgender Studies. In these roles, Professor Watkins has demonstrated that his empathy for students extends far beyond the classroom walls.

Acting on his dedication to nurturing student achievement, Watkins has chaired the college's selection committee for the Rhodes, Marshall, and Mitchell Scholarships. A Marshall scholar himself, he is committed to helping students realize their academic dreams. The committee does more than select applicants; it recruits promising undergraduate candidates, endorses them, and coaches them for the arduous process that leads to the scholarships. In his time on this committee, Watkins brought the process to a new level of success—helping to send one student to Great Britain on a Marshall Scholarship, one to Ireland on a Mitchell Scholarship, and two to Oxford on Rhodes Scholarships.

Watkins is a popular teacher who makes his classes both challenging and enriching; a compassionate advisor, always willing to go beyond his assigned duties to help his students succeed; and a leader who recognizes the importance of broad cooperative efforts in creating a positive student experience. He is, in the words of one admirer, "a teacher whose star will shine bright for years to come."

LIBERAL ARTS DEGREES

The College of Liberal Arts offers five bachelor's degrees—bachelor of arts (B.A.), bachelor of individualized studies (B.I.S.), bachelor of fine arts (B.F.A.), bachelor of music (B.M.), and bachelor of science (B.S.). The bachelor's degrees have many requirements in common.

DEGREE CANDIDATES

Subject to successful completion, degrees will be conferred on those students listed below and on others meeting all curriculum requirements for graduation. Honors citations are provisional and do not become final until all requirements are met for the level indicated. Degrees and degree candidates are listed alphabetically in this program.

HONORS DESIGNATIONS—Honors graduates complete college and departmental honors requirements, including completing honors projects in their majors, with a minimum G.P.A. of 3.5 for the last 60 credits of their undergraduate career. Students meeting these minimum requirements may graduate *cum laude*. Students graduating *magna cum laude* have a minimum G.P.A. of 3.66. Students graduating *summa cum laude* have a minimum G.P.A. of 3.75 and have completed a summa thesis that has been approved by three readers, one of whom is outside the discipline of the major.

DEGREES WITH DISTINCTION—Students graduating “with distinction” must have a cumulative grade point average of 3.75 or higher in University of Minnesota coursework at the time of graduation; students graduating “with high distinction” must have a cumulative grade point average of 3.90 or higher. At least 60 of the total number of semester credits must have been completed at the University of Minnesota. * indicates “with distinction”; ** indicates “with high distinction.”

Students graduating with the **Community Engagement Scholars** distinction have completed at least 9 credits of service-learning course work, at least 400 hours of community service, and a series of reflective pieces. They also have completed an integrative community project that results in the creation of a sustainable project for a community organization. ♦ indicates Community Engagement Scholar.

THE DEGREE OF BACHELOR OF ARTS

The bachelor of arts (B.A.) degree can be earned through majors in most CLA departments and programs. Its academic breadth and diversity make it valuable as a base for many kinds of careers or for advanced study. ACADEMIC COSTUME

Academic gowns date back to the 14th century, when they served two functions of nearly equal importance: to indicate the academic rank of the wearer and to keep the scholar warm in the drafty stone halls of academia.

The markings, cut, and color of modern-day academic-costume—cap, gown, and sometimes hood—indicate the academic degree, the field of study, and the institution that granted the degree.

Bachelor's degree gowns are black and untrimmed. A tassel hanging from the mortar board worn on the head is color-coded by college at the University of Minnesota. The College of Liberal Arts tassel is white. Honors graduates wear a medallion adorned with a maroon and gold ribbon.

Master's degree gowns, black and untrimmed, have pointed sleeves. Doctoral gowns in the United States traditionally have been black with velvet front facings and crossbars on the sleeves, but in recent years a number of universities have adopted gowns of distinctive school colors.

A new University of Minnesota Ph.D. gown and matching tam made their appearance in 1988 to celebrate the centenary of the first Minnesota doctor of philosophy degree. The new Minnesota gown is maroon-trimmed with black velvet chevrons and gold metallic braid. The traditional gown may still be worn.

The Minnesota hood, which may be worn by anyone with a doctoral degree from the University of Minnesota, is black with maroon chevron on gold. Each institution has its own pattern of colors on the hood, worn around the neck and down the back of the gown. The length and shape of the hood identify the most advanced degree the wearer has earned, and the velvet edging shows the field: blue for doctor of philosophy, light blue for doctor of education, and pink for doctor of musical arts.

At commencement ceremonies those who already have the doctoral degree wear hoods. Degree candidates wear the gowns appropriate for the degrees they are about to receive, and new doctorates are hooded on stage.

THE MACE

The University of Minnesota mace was carried for the first time in 1961 by Regents' Professor of Physics Alfred O.C. Nier at the inauguration of President O. Meredith Wilson. Art professor Philip Morton designed the mace: a crystal sphere four inches in diameter surmounted by the North Star, symbol of the state of Minnesota, on a solid aluminum handle set with the University regents' seal.

THE NORTHROP ORGAN

Comprising 108 ranks of pipes, the Northrop Memorial Auditorium organ is not only one of the largest organs in the Upper Midwest but also one of the finest examples in the United States of a late-Romantic concert-hall organ. Built in 1932, the organ is located in the ceiling of the auditorium, above the stage and behind the proscenium, and is played from a console on an elevator platform in the orchestra pit. Unlike many large organs from its era, the Northrop organ is completely unaltered and entirely in its original condition.
