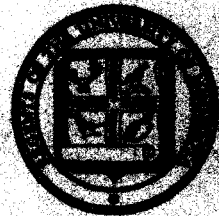

Distinguished Teaching Awards

Paulus van den Broek, Assistant Professor, Educational Psychology

Professor van den Broek came to the College of Education in Fall, 1987, after two years at the University of Kentucky, where he received the Psi Chi award for teaching during the 1985-86 school year. In his brief tenure at the College he has impressed students and faculty alike with his innovation and leadership in teaching and advising. The faculty and students of the College of Education are pleased to present him with this award in recognition of his commitment to excellence in teaching.

James E. Ysseldyke, Professor, Educational Psychology

Professor Ysseldyke joined the faculty of the College of Education in 1975 as an associate professor of School Psychology and was promoted to full professor in 1979. His outstanding contributions as a teacher and in the area of educational leadership and development are recognized through this award for distinguished teaching presented by the faculty and students of the College of Education.

Senior Fellow in Education, Rodney S. Wallace, President and Chief Executive Officer, The Thunderbird Hotel and Convention Center

The Senior Fellow in Education award is the highest status conferred by the College of Education to professional people outside the University environment who make meaningful contributions to the academic activities and scholarship of the institution. As one of the College's most active benefactors, Mr. Wallace has personally made a difference in the quality of the College. His commitment to education is demonstrated by the Wallace Chair, the Wallace Endowment in Teaching and Learning, the Wallace Scholarship Fund for Native Americans and the restoration of the historic Wallace Atrium. These are exemplary contributions and serve to set an inspiring example to others. Rod Wallace's deep concern for the improvement of educational opportunities for people at all levels of society is a model for the community.

Alumni Society, College Faculty Award, Robert L. Jackson, Professor, Curriculum and Instruction

Professor Jackson began his career in the College of Education as an Instructor at University High School. He became an assistant professor of Elementary Education in 1965, gaining promotion to full professor in 1977. His service and inspiration to students is being recognized today by the students whom he has advised and taught.
