The University of Minnesota Men's Basketball Office announced today the changes in its coaching and administrative staff. Mike Petersen has been named Associate Head Coach, and Vic Couch has been added to the staff as Director of Basketball Operations.

Petersen has 20 years experience as a collegiate coach, and 12 of those years have been as a head coach. He was the women's head coach at Gonzaga (1985-89), New Mexico State (1992-96) and Texas Christian (1996-99). He posted a career record of 188-127 (.597) as a head coach at the three programs.

Couch joins Minnesota after serving as an assistant coach at Santa Clara University since 1997. A former standout player for the Bronco's, Couch was the defensive coordinator and a recruiter for Santa Clara as well as directing the Santa Clara basketball camps. Prior to working for the Bronco's, Couch spent five years as a successful high school coach in California. He will oversee all administrative areas in the men's basketball program as well as run the Dan Monson GopherBall Basketball Camps.

"I am very pleased with these changes to my staff," said Head Coach Dan Monson. "Mike's (Petersen) title change reflects my trust and reliance on him in all areas of our program and clarifies responsibilities. I feel very fortunate to add Vic (Couch) to our staff. He is overqualified for the position and will help us a great deal. Once again, a big factor in Vic being selected for the job was my familiarity with him. I coached against him in the West Coast Conference when I was at Gonzaga and have developed a very good relationship with him over the years."

"It's very exciting for me to join the Minnesota program," said Couch. "After having the chance to coach against Dan in the West Coast Conference and also getting to know him off the court, I feel very good about this career move. The thing that has impressed me most about Dan, has been his up front honest approach to the position at Minnesota and the fact that he cares about you as a person. I have great confidence in the direction he has Minnesota headed, and I look forward to contributing to that effort."

MINNESOTA TO FACE ILLINOIS IN BIG TEN CHAMPIONSHIP FINALS

For the first time since 1994-95, the University of Minnesota men's tennis team will advance to the Big Ten Championship finals after its 4-2 win over third-seeded Indiana Saturday at the Big Tens in Bloomington, Ind.

Minnesota's Harsh Mankad defeated Indiana's Milan Rakvica in number one singles 6-3, 6-1. At number two, Minnesota's Thomas Haug took care of Indiana's Ian Arons 6-3, 4-6, 6-4 and Golden Gopher Jon Svensson posted a win in the number six slot defeating Indiana's Rahman Smiley 7-5, 6-3.

In doubles, Minnesota's teams of Haug/Martin Michalowski defeated Indiana's Arons/Montilla 9-8 in number one and Jorge Duenas/Mankad took care of Indiana's McGill/Rakvica in number two.

In what has been No. 21 ranked Minnesota's best season since the '94-'95 year, the Golden Gophers will now square off against top-seeded and three-time defending tournament champion Illinois in the Big Ten finals. The impatiently awaited rematch with Illinois will be played Sunday, April 30 at 12 p.m., as Minnesota will seek its revenge after the Fighting Illini ruined the Gophers perfect run at the regular season title earlier this year.

Junior Tom Gerding finished second in the men's special 400m dash finals at 45.86 P and the 4x100m relay team of Matt Taylor, Steve Burkholder, Adam Freed, and Gerding garnered second place honors as well with a time of 40.20 P in the 4x100m relay finals.

Junior Marc Johannsen, who was unable to retain his Drake Relays high jump title, placed third in the high jump finals with a leap of 6-11 (2.11m). Also, placing third for the Golden Gophers was the team of Taylor, Burkholder, Bob Quade, and Toby Henkels who rounded out the top three in the sprint medley relay finals with a time of 3:19.05.

ILLINOIS NIPS MINNESOTA CLINCHING FOURTH STRAIGHT BIG TEN TOURNAMENT CHAMPIONSHIP

Top-seeded and No. 7 ranked Illinois won three matches in singles and two in doubles to post a 4-1 win over No. 21 ranked Minnesota in the Big Ten Tournament finals Sunday at the Big Tens in Bloomington, Ind.

The win enabled Illinois to claim its fourth straight Big Ten Championship title as it marked the Illini's second consecutive over the Golden Gophers this season.

In number one singles, Illinois' Cary Franklin defeated Minnesota's Harsh Mankad 6-2, 6-4. At number three, Illinois' Graydon Oliver defeated Minnesota's Jorge Duenas 7-6, 6-2 and in number five, Illinois' Mike Kostra took care of Minnesota's Tyson Parry 6-, 6-3. Minnesota's Thomas Haug won the Golden Gophers only singles match in the number two slot defeating Illinois' Jeff Laski 6-2, 6-2.

The Hoosiers then took two of three matches in doubles as Franklin/Oliver defeated Minnesota's Haug/Martin Michalowski in number one 8-6 and Laski/Jamal Parker defeated Duenas/Mankad in number two 8-4.

"Every person on Illinois came to play every singles day," said Minnesota head coach David Gaetz. "They won some matches that I thought we would win and they ended up winning all the close matches. I was happy with our overall performance, it was certainly good enough to win, and the match boiled down to one or two points."

Minnesota, now 22-5 on the year, will wait to see if it gets a bid to the NCAA Tournament. Announcements of pairings and sites will be determined at the selection show Thursday, May 4 at 4:30 p.m. eastern time.

MINNESOTA HEADS TO NCAA REGIONALS

It was announced Thursday afternoon that the University of Minnesota men's tennis team will continue its season after the Golden Gophers earned their seventh consecutive NCAA Regional bid under Head Coach David Gaetz.

This year's appearance will mark No. 18 ranked Minnesota's 13th of all-time and eighth overall with Gaetz at the helm as the Golden Gophers will travel to Terre Haute, Ind., to square off against Ivy League foe Columbia in the first round of the team championships. The time and date as to when Minnesota will compete is yet to be determined.

Minnesota, who is having its best year since 1995 with an overall record of 22-6 and a second place Big Ten finish at 9-1, enters the field of 64 seeded anywhere from 13 to 16 while Columbia is seeded anywhere from 49 to 64. MEN'S GOLFERS FINISH FIFTH AT BIG TEN CHAMPIONSHIPS

The University of Minnesota men's golf team carded a final round team score of 13-over par 301 and finished in fifth place at the 2000 Big Ten Men's Golf Championships at Kampen Course in West Lafayette, Ind.

The Golden Gophers were led by freshman Wilhelm Schauman of Djursholm, Sweden, who fired a final round score of one-under par 71 for a 72-hole total of eight over-par 288 and a 10th-place finish individually. Senior Martin LeMesurier of South Hampton, England, who was honored as a member of the all-Big Ten team for the third time, finished in 16th place individually at 11-over par 299.

Minnesota was forced to play with just four players for the final two rounds of the tournament after 1998 NCAA Champion and returning All-American James McLean was forced to withdraw from the tournament due to injury. Each team normally plays five players, with the best four scores counting toward the team total.

Northwestern, who claimed three of the top four golfers individually, successfully defended their team title with a 33-shot runaway win over second place Purdue. The Wildcats posted a team score of eight-over par 1152, with the host Boilermakers checking in at 25-over par 1193. There were three teams grouped within four strokes of each other between third and fifth place, as the Golden Gophers trailed Penn State for third place by four strokes and Ohio State for fourth place by just one shot.

Defending NCAA Champion Luke Donald of Northwestern claimed medalist honors with a four-round total of one-under par 287. Teammate Jess Daley was just one stroke behind at 288, with Lee Williamson of Purdue and Josh Habig of the Wildcats at four-over par 292.

The fifth-place showing marks the eighth time in John Means' 10-year tenure as the Golden Gopher head coach that the program has finished in the upper division of the conference tournament.

The Golden Gophers will be off until participating in the NCAA Central Regional from May 18-20. The teams for all three NCAA regional locations will be announced Monday afternoon.

MCKESSOCK SETS OUTDOOR BEST, QUALIFIES FOR NCAAs

MINNESOTA'S JARED LAWRENCE TAGGED AS TOP FRESHMAN, BECKER NAMED TO ALL-ROOKIE TEAM

University of Minnesota freshman Jared Lawrence was selected Freshman of the Year while freshman teammate Luke Becker was named to the All-Rookie Team chosen last Friday by *Amateur Wrestling News*.

Both Lawrence (149) and Becker (157), who are also roommates and members of the same highly-ranked recruiting class, had seemingly identical seasons a year ago as each took first place in their weight classes at the Bison Open, both finished second at the Big Ten Championships with 2-1 records, each placed sixth at the NCAA national tournament with 3-3 marks, and both registered 30 or more wins. In addition, Lawrence capped off his successful rookie season with All-America honors as well.

The tandem, which made up the only two freshmen in the Golden Gophers starting lineup last season, are no strangers to the AWN as each have received kudos from the Amateur Wrestling News before. Haug also paired up with Martin Michalowski in number one doubles to compile a record of 19-13. For Haug, this year marks his second straight garnering Big Ten accolades as he was named the league's Freshman of the Year in 1998-99.

Up Next: No. 18th ranked and 13th seeded Minnesota will face No. 74 Columbia in the first round of the NCAA Regionals at Terre Haute, Ind., Saturday, May 13 at 2 p.m. The winner will then face the winner of the Indiana State and Purdue matchup on Sunday, May 14 at noon.

MINNESOTA TO FACE TOP-RANKED STANFORD THIS WEEKEND

The University of Minnesota men's tennis team will go head-to-head with No. 1 and top-seeded Stanford University this weekend at the sweet 16 of the NCAA Men's Tennis Championships Saturday, May 20 in Athens, Ga. Match time is scheduled for 2 p.m., E.T.

For Minnesota, this year marks both its second meeting with Stanford and second trip to Athens, Ga., in three years as the Cardinal eliminated the Golden Gophers (4-0) from the round of 16 in 1998.

Both teams enter the dual sporting nationally-ranked doubles teams. Stanford, however, poses a threat in No. 1 doubles with its tandem of junior Alex Kim and senior Geoff Abrams who rank atop the nation with a 19-3 record in dual matches this season. Minnesota, on the other hand, is highlighted by Thomas Haug and Martin Michalowski who compiled an overall record of 21-13 in the No. 1 slot for the Golden Gophers this year. Ranked 27th in the nation (as of May 3), the duo was also chosen as one of two atlarge doubles teams to represent Region IV at the NCAA Individual Championships to be held May 24-28.

In singles, Minnesota will look for its No. 1 singles product of Harsh Mankad and No. 2 weapon of Thomas Haug to stand firm against Stanford's top three nationally-ranked singles players. Mankad, who ranks 90th in the nation (as of May 3), was voted Big Ten Freshman of the Year and Haug was named All-Big Ten. On the flipside, Stanford's No. 1 singles gun of Kim (7th) and No. 2 force of Abrams (5th) have combined for a 41-6 record in dual matches this season. In addition, K.J. Hippensteel (11th) also ranks among national singles leaders for the Cardinal competing in the No. 3 position.

No. 1 Stanford (24-1) has won 20 of its last 21 NCAA duals dating back to 1995 with 13 of the wins coming by scores of 4-0. No. 18 Minnesota (24-6) has won a sizzling 14 of its last 16 matches and currently stands at 4-1 in the postseason.

MINNESOTA MEN'S TRACK AND FIELD SETS SIGHTS ON THREE-PEAT

The University of Minnesota men's track and field team will seek its third consecutive Big Ten Championship Title at the Big Tens Friday-Sunday, May 19-21 in Iowa City, Iowa.

The Golden Gophers' win of the Big Ten Title last year in West Lafayette, Ind., not only marked their second straight, but it marked the first time in school history that Minnesota won back-to-back titles.

Heading into this year's event, Minnesota will be highlighted by senior Eric Pierce and junior Tom Gerding who return to the Big Ten Championships to defend their individual titles won a year ago. At the Big Tens last year, Pierce took the crown in the 3,000m steeplechase with a time of 8:55.74 while Gerding won the 400m dash with a mark of 46.61. In addition, both have provisionally qualified for the NCAA Outdoor Championships this season with Gerding posting a time of 45.86 (400m) and Pierce establishing a mark of 8:44.33 (3,000m steeplechase).

Also paving the way for the Golden Gophers into the Big Tens are sophomore Andrew McKessock, and juniors Mark Fahey, Ben Meyer, and Marc Johannsen. Each of the four has set outdoor bests for Minnesota this year. McKessock stands as the only Golden Gopher to automatically qualify for the NCAAs with a time of 3:41.39 in the 1,500m run and Fahey threw a provisional mark of 185-8 in the discus while Meyer threw a second best of 188-4 in the hammer this season and Johannsen set a personal best of 6-11 3/4 in the high jump.

If the Golden Gophers win this year's Big Ten Championships, they will become the fourth league school to capture three or more consecutive crowns. Michigan (1980-83) and Illinois (1951-54) each won four straight titles while Wisconsin (1995-97) won three. In addition, the Badgers were this years champions of the Indoor Big Tens.

LOWNEY TO COMPETE IN PAN AMERICAN CHAMPIONSHIPS

University of Minnesota redshirt freshman Garrett Lowney will represent the Minnesota Storm at the 2000 Pan American Championships in Cali, Colombia May 21-27.

Lowney (Appleton, Wis.), 1999 Junior World Champion and this year's U.S. Nationals runner-up will wrestle Greco-Roman in the 213.75-pound weight class. Also making the Greco-Roman lineup for the Storm are Quincey Clark (New Brighton, Minn.) and Brandon Paulson (Golden Valley, Minn.). Clark was one of two U.S. Nationals champions this year while Paulson won a silver medal at the 1996 Olympic Games in Atlanta,Ga. Coaching the Storm will be former Golden Gopher wrestler Dan Chandler (1972-74).

Held three of every four years during the non-Pan American Games years, the Pan American Championships features the best wrestlers in North, Central, and South America. The Greco-Roman tournament will be held on May 22-24 while the freestyle tournament will take place May 25-27.

LINDQVIST HAS HUGE DAY AS MINNESOTA MOVES INTO FIRST PLACE OF BIG TENS

Senior Glenn Lindqvist won the decathlon with 7,148 points to help pace the University of Minnesota men's track and field team as it moved into first place Saturday at the Big Ten Championships in Iowa City, Iowa.

Lindqvist finished first in both the javelin (54.42m) and the discus (156-7) while placing second in the 110m hurdles (15.48) and the pole vault (15-1) as he garnered the first individual Big Ten Championships title of his career. Also winning individual titles for the Golden Gophers were juniors Mark Fahey and Steve Burkholder. Fahey, a NCAA provisional qualifier, took the discus with a heave of 185-8 while Burkholder won the 100m dash with a time of 10.53. Both Big Ten titles marked firsts in both Fahey and Burkholder's careers as well.

After standing in fourth place with six points heading into the second day of competition, the Golden Gophers now rank atop the heap in a two-way tie with Purdue as each team compiled 47 points. Wisconsin stands in a close third with 46 points followed by Iowa who has 44.

MINNESOTA FALLS TO TOP-RANKED STANFORD

The University of Minnesota men's tennis team fell victim to top-ranked Stanford University by a score of 4-0 Saturday marking the second time in three years that the Cardinal has eliminated the Golden Gophers from the sweet 16 of the NCAA Tennis Championships in Athens, Ga.

The shutout marked Minnesota's first of the season as the Golden Gophers drop to 0-6 all-time in NCAA Championships play.

Stanford's fifth-ranked product of Geoff Abrams defeated Minnesota's Thomas Haug 6-1, 6-2 in the No. 2 position to pace the Cardinal to a 3-0 finish in singles play. Stanford's David Martin then took care of Minnesota's Martin Michalowski 6-3, 6-3 in the No. 4 slot while Ali Ansari defeated Minnesota's Eric Robertson 6-2, 6-4 at No. 6 to round out the trio of wins.

In doubles, Stanford's No. 1-ranked pair of Abrams and Alex Kim prevailed over Minnesota's No. 27-ranked Haug and Michalowski 8-4 in the top spot while the Cardinal duo of Ansari and Scotty Scott took care of Minnesota's Robertson and Tyson Parry 8-5 in the No. 3 position.

With the loss, Minnesota's season ends at 24-7 overall while Stanford advances face TCU. Additionally, the win marks Stanford's 25th of its last 26th in NCAA Tournament matches including an impressive 21 of 22 at the Championships site.

FAHEY SETS PROVISIONAL MARK IN DISCUS WHILE RODGERS AND GERDING SET PERSONAL BESTS

[May 13, 2000]

Junior Mark Fahey threw a provisional mark of 185-8 in the discus while juniors Fred Rodgers and Tom Gerding established personal bests Saturday in the Minnesota Qualifier at Bierman Field Track.

Fahey's mark now ranks fourth on the Golden Gophers' all-time chart as it passed Adam Reed's toss of 185-0 set just a year ago. In addition, his heave surpassed his previous season best of 182-10 which was set at the Drake Relays two weeks ago. Fahey now holds each of the top three personal outdoor bests for the Golden Gophers in the discus this season.

Rodgers' time of 10.57 set an outdoor best in the 100m dash as he passed Matt Taylor's mark of 10.69 while Gerding posted a mark of 21.43 which bettered his own time of 21.58, both of which were set previously this season as well.

In doubles, Minnesota's Martin Michalowski and Haug defeated Columbia's Seshardri and Zaman 8-5 in No. 1, while Mankad and Duenas defeated Holik and Kaplan 8-4 in the No. 2 position.

The win, which marked the Golden Gophers second consecutive shutout of the tournament, was paced by Minnesota's Harsh Mankad, Thomas Haug, and Jorge Duenas who won the Golden Gophers top three singles matches. Mankad defeated Indiana State's Jonas Piibor in No. 1 (6-4, 6-2), Haug took care of Indiana State's Henry Choi at the No. 2 spot (7-6, 6-2), and Duenas won in No. 3 over Indiana State's Adam Baranowski (6-4, 6-4).

Minnesota then took two of three doubles matches with Martin Michalowski/Haug defeating Indiana State's Piibor/Gareth Keating in No. 1 (8-6) and Tyson Parry/Jon Svensson defeating Indiana State's Baranowski/Stefan Hirn at No. 2 (8-4).

Other tennis notes: The No. 1 doubles team of Thomas Haug and Martin Michalowski was chosen as one of two at-large doubles teams to represent Region IV at the NCAA Individual Tennis Championships Wednesday-Sunday, May 24-28. The pair is the first doubles team to reach the NCAA individual field since 1993-1994. University of Minnesota men's tennis coach David Geatz and freshman Harsh Mankad were honored last Wednesday as the

Intercollegiate Tennis Association's Region IV Coach of the Year and Rookie Player of the Year.

Up Next: No. 18 Minnesota will travel to Athens, Ga., to face No. 1 Stanford in the sweet sixteen of the NCAA Men's Tennis Championships Saturday, May 20. Time is to be announced.

The last time the Golden Gophers made a visit to the sweet sixteen was in 1998. That year, Minnesota defeated Notre Dame (4-3), Northwestern (4-3), and Duke (4-3) to win the Region IV championship, but was eliminated by Stanford (4-0) in the round of 16.

NCAA INVESTIGATION MOVES FORWARD

MINNEAPOLIS / ST. PAUL--The University of Minnesota today received from the National Collegiate Athletics Association (NCAA) a letter of official inquiry regarding violations of NCAA rules in the men's intercollegiate athletic program. The 42-page official inquiry letter is substantially consistent with matters independently investigated and reported by the university to the NCAA in November 1999.

"There are no surprises in the NCAA's letter of inquiry and we are pleased their process is moving forward," said University General Counsel Mark Rotenberg. 

The Golden Gophers, who won the 1996-97 and 1998-99 titles, were paced by runner-up finishes by the swimming and diving, tennis, outdoor track and field, and wrestling teams during the 1999-2000 season. Minnesota finished second to Michigan during the 1997-98 sports season.

The unofficial championship is calculated by awarding a graduated scale of points (11 for first, 10 for second, nine for third, etc.) based on a team's finish in the regular season or conference championships for those sports without regular-season standings.

A total of nine of the 11 men's sports at the U of M this season posted upper-division finishes.

Ohio State finished in second place, with Michigan a distant third place and Wisconsin in fourth place.

ALL-AMERICAN SANDY STEPHENS DIES AT AGE 59

Sanford "Sandy" Stephens, a former All-American quarterback for the University of Minnesota, died this morning of a heart attack. A four-sport athlete from Uniontown, Pa., Stephens turned down professional baseball to play football at Minnesota, and become the first African-American quarterback for the Golden Gophers. He was the driving force behind their national title in 1960, leading the maroon and gold to an 8-2 record. Stephens is also responsible for Minnesota's only Rose Bowl victory, which came in 1962. In that game, he scored two touchdowns, completed 7 of 11 passes for 75 yards, and rushed for 46 more. He was voted player of the game for his performance and on May 22, 1997, earned a place in the Rose Bowl Hall of Fame. Stephens garnered numerous awards for his efforts during the 1961 season, including the Big Ten MVP award and College Back of the Year Award. He finished fourth in balloting for the Heisman Trophy.

UNIVERSITY OF MINNESOTA SIGNS GOLDEN GOPHER FOOTBALL COACH

MINNEAPOLIS / ST. PAUL--The University of Minnesota and Golden Gopher Football Coach Glen Mason today announced a long-term contract agreement, effective today through Dec. 31, 2006.

"We are enormously pleased with this agreement that reflects Coach Mason's contributions both on and off the field," said university President Mark Yudof. "This contract is a mutual agreement between the University of Minnesota and Glen Mason that underscores our commitment to building a championship team that will make Minnesotans proud. While being fair and consistent with the market for top Division I coaches, the contract also contains key provisions regarding termination and payment of deferred compensation that are in the public interest. The result is good for the university, the state, Coach Mason and our student-athletes."

In 1999, Mason took the Golden Gophers to their first bowl game in 13 years with an overall record of 8-4, the program's best since 1967. Minnesota ranked as high as No. 12 in the Associated Press (AP) poll last season, its highest since ranking No. 10 in 1962. The Golden Gophers finished the season ranked No. 17 in the ESPN/USA Today poll and No. 18 in the AP poll.

The seven-year contract outlines coaching duties and includes a \$635,000 annual salary and an annual media guarantee for providing broadcast services starting at \$325,000 in year one. Consistent with the standard for Division I-A football coaches, the contract contains annual incentive compensation for studentathletes' academic and team success. During Mason's tenure at the university, 90 percent of Golden Gopher football players completing their eligibility have graduated. The contract provides incentives for achieving graduation rates within the football program that exceed the average undergraduate graduation rate on the Twin Cities campus.

"The job of head coach has many layers of responsibility," Mason said. "First and foremost there is the team--the student-athletes here at the university. There is also a wider responsibility to the University of Minnesota because the team I coach is just part of what it takes to make a great educational institution. I also believe that as a coach, I serve the community as a whole. Like my student-athletes, I represent our

state and that is why I am involved with groups and organizations that are equally committed to making Minnesota a better place to live, work and raise a family."

The contract's deferred compensation package includes incentives for fulfilling the duration of the contract and does not fully vest until 2006. To safeguard the university, the contract also specifies conditions under which deferred compensation will not be paid or will be paid at a reduced amount. It also defines criteria constituting termination for just cause and termination without just cause by both parties.

GOLDEN GOPHERS FINISH 19TH IN FINAL SEARS DIRECTORS' CUP STANDINGS

The University of Minnesota Golden Gophers finished in 19th place with 627 points in the final standings of the 1999-2000 Sears Directors' Cup Competition. Stanford University won its sixth straight Sears Director's Cup amassing a total of 1359.5 points. Since the award's inception, Minnesota has finished in the top 25 the last five years straight and six of the last seven years.

The all-sports award, presented by Sears and the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA), honors Division I schools with points based on their finish in NCAA championships.

Minnesota earned Sears Cups points in baseball, men's golf and women's and men's tennis during the spring season.

The previous best finish for the Gophers was 14th which occurred in the final 1993-94 standings. The Gophers achieved their highest ranking ever in the Sears Directors' Cup standings during the 1996-97 sports season when they were in fifth-place after the winter sports standings were tabulated.

The Golden Gophers finished fifth among Big Ten schools in 1999-2000, trailing third-place Michigan, fourth-place Penn State, 14th-place Ohio State and 17th-place Wisconsin. Every Big Ten school finished in the top 50 in the final standings with six of the schools finishing in the top 25.

Although scoring two quick technical falls in his pool, Hahn did not advance. Danko also defeated Hahn at the 1999 Junior World Championships as Hahn posted a fourth place finish.

LAWRENCE TAKES BRONZE WHILE HAHN PLACES EIGHTH AT JUNIOR WORLD FREESTYLE CHAMPIONSHIPS

University of Minnesota redshirt freshman Jared Lawrence won a bronze medal while freshman teammate Damion Hahn placed eighth to round out competition at the FILA Junior World Freestyle Championships in Nantes, France.

Lawrence, a native of Sandpoint, Idaho wrestling for the Minnesota Storm, captured his third place finish at 152 pounds. After opening the day with a 7-3 loss to Murat Umarov of Russia in the semifinals, Lawrence recovered strongly with a 6-4 win over Georgia's Shalva Kharebava in the bronze-medal match. Lawrence improved upon his fifth-place finish at the Junior World Championships a year ago.

Hahn, who represented the New York AC, posted an eighth place finish at 187.25. Although unable to advance to the semifinals after falling to Taras Danko of Ukraine (6-0) in his first match of pool competition, Hahn scored two quick technical falls over Abrik Mukhammadiyev of Uzbekistan (10-0, 0:21) and Oscar Fernandez of Spain (10-0, 0:58) to cap off a solid showing.
