## DID KNOW?

Minnesota is shooting a red-hot 43 percent from three-point range as a team (34-79). Mitch Ohnstad leads the team and is clicking at 50 percent (7-14). Kevin Clark is at 43 percent (8-19), followed by Lewis at 42 percent (8-19). Last year, the Golden Gophers shot 34 percent for the season from three-point range. In Minnesota's last 14 games of 1997-98, they shot 40 percent as a team from three-point range (97-230). During that span the Golden Gophers posted an 11-3 record.



#### **CLARK EXPRESS**

Senior Kevin Clark, one half of the Lewis and Clark Trail, had an unbelievable week. Clark exploded for a career-high 31 points, 25 in the second half vs. Oregon (11/30) to lead Minnesota back from a 14-point halftime deficit. Clark was 5-5 from three-point range in the second stanza and 4-4 from the line. Against Fresno State (12/4), Clark had 29 points on 5-11 shooting from three-point range and 8-18 shooting from the field. In three career games vs. Fresno State, Clark has averaged 26.7 points and has shot 56 percent (23-41) overall, 44 percent (8-18) from three-point range and 90 percent (26-31) from the stripē. Clark was named Big Ten Player of the Week for his efforts. Clark is second in the Big Ten in scoring at 21.5 per game and 24th in the nation.

Clark Named Big Ten Player of the Week: Kevin Clark (Sr., Savannah, Ga.) was named Big Ten Player of the Week following his efforts in a pair of victories over Oregon and Fresno State. Clark averaged 30 points in the two games, hitting 53 percent (10-19) of his three-point attempts, 56 percent (19-34) of his shots from the field and 80 percent (12-15) of his free throws. The 31 points vs. Oregon was a career-high for Clark. Clark leads the team with 13 three-pointers and is hitting at a 43 percent clip (13-30). He is shooting 50 percent (27-54) overall and 83 percent (19-23) from the stripe.


Lewis and Clark Trail: The road to the postseason for Minnesota has been aptly named the Lewis and Clark Trail and the two seniors are well on their way to leading their team through to an excellent start of the season. Quincy Lewis (Little Rock, Ark.) leads the team and the Big Ten in scoring at 23.3 points per game and is 12th in the nation. He is followed by Clark at 21.5 points per game in the Big Ten rankings. The top two scorers in the Big Ten, this duo has collectively scored 179 of Minnesota's 375 points (47 percent). They have shot 50 percent from the field, 43 percent from three-point range and 86 percent from the free throw line.

Lane Closed: Like bad construction on a Minnesota highway, the opponent's lane has been closed this year and that obstruction has been the Maroon and Gold's two young centers Joel Przybilla (Monticello, Minn.) and Antoine Broxsie (Tampa, Fla.). The two have combined for 37 blocks in five game and along with their teammates have a Big Tenleading 9.0 blocks per game. Przybilla has been an unbelievable force in the paint the past two games blocking 17 shots, including a career-high 10 vs. Fresno State. The 10 blocks was two short of Mychal Thompson's school-record 12 vs. Ohio State (1/26/76) and the 12 team blocks was one short of the team record 13 set in that same game vs. Ohio State. Przybilla's wingspan and timing along with Broxsie's make it extremely difficult for teams to get inside scoring against the Golden Gophers. Przybilla leads the Big Ten and the nation in blocks per game at 5.0. Przybilla's dominating defensive pressure held Fresno State's Melvin Ely scoreless. Ely came into the game averaging 17 points and seven blocks per game.

Cardiac Kids Part I: The Golden Gophers have pulled out a a pair of cardiac comebacks in the past two weeks that has demonstrated the explosiveness of the offense. The most recent comeback was a 72-61 win over Oregon at Williams Arena last Monday night. Minnesota played a lethargic first half and Oregon was red-hot, hitting six three-pointers to take a 14 point halftime lead. After a halftime gut check, the Golden Gophers exploded for 47 second half points led by Kevin Clark's 25 second-half points. Clark was 5-5 from three-point range in the second half, including three straight bombs to start the half. He tallied 17 of Minnesota's 19 points to start the half cutting Oregon's lead to three points. Clark's 31 points was a career-high. Minnesota outscored Oregon 47-22 in the second half and outrebounded the Ducks 28-14. Minnesota's increased defensive pressure held the Ducks to 23 percent shooting in the second half and 4-of-19 three-point shooting.

Cardiac Kids Part II: The earlier version of the Cardiac Kids was vs. Seton Hall on Nov. 24 when senior All-America candidate Quincy Lewis' career-high 36 points spurred the Golden Gophers to a come-from-behind win. Lewis hit a big three-pointer with 31 seconds left in the first half to cut the Pirates lead to eight and scored 24 second half points to lead Minnesota to the 77-70 win. The point total was the most by a Golden Gopher at Williams Arena since Voshon Lenard hit 38 in triple-overtime against Iowa in 1994, and the most points overall since Bobby Jackson had 36 points vs. Clemson in overtime in the NCAA Midwest Semifinal game in 1997. Lewis was 12-of-23 from the field and 9-of-10 from the free throw line.

**Defense, Defense:** The Golden Gophers used stifling pressure defense in the second half to climb back into the Seton Hall and Oregon games. The pressure comes in a variety of manners, zones, traps, man-to-man half and full court. Minnesota is holding its

#### On Kevin Clark's Performance Last Week

Kevin Clark is one of the premier shooting guards in the country and if he continues to play this well he will get the recognition he deserves."

#### On Quincy Lewis

"Quincy is playing consistent basketball on a very high level. He leads the Big Ten in scoring and is making big shots without forcing them. In addition, he is playing great defense and rebounding the basketball. He is a complete player and really a joy to coach."

#### On Joel Przybilla's Impact

"We knew Joel was going to be an impact player on the defensive end for us right away. He is so good at timing when to jump and jumping in control so he doesn't foul. As he grows as a player he will become a dominating force in the paint."

opponents to an average of 64.4 points per game, while scoring at a 75.0 clip. The Golden Gophers are limiting their opponents to 37 percent shooting from the field and 32 percent from three-point range, while forcing an average of 16.6 turnovers per game.

Clark Is On The Mark: Kevin Clark was one of the top three-point shooters in the conference last season and is one of the best this year. A year ago, he finished fourth in the Big Ten in three-point percentage at .456. For the season, Clark hit at a .400 clip. He was scorching hot the second half of the season hitting at a .500 clip (26-52) in the Golden Gophers' last 14 games. During that span, Minnesota posted an 11-3 record. The Golden Gophers were 7-1 when he hit two or more three-pointers over that same span. Clark finished as the MVP of the NIT when he averaged 29 points in the two final games. For the year, Clark is now hitting at a 43 percent clip (13-30).

Point Man: The Golden Gophers' point guard was up in the air coming into the season and it appears Kevin Nathaniel (Camarillo, Calif.) has won the position. A back-up to Eric Harris a year ago. Nathaniel is a versatile player who can play any of the three perimeter positions. He is averaging 6.2 points, 3.6 rebounds, 3.6 assists and just 1.7 turnovers. Nathaniel had an excellent game against Fresno State under tremendous defensive pressure on the road. He scored four points, had six assists, seven rebounds, two steals and only two turnovers in 28 minutes of play.

The Windex Man: Senior Miles Tarver (Oakland, Calif.) has been a powerful force on the glass after hauling down 25 rebounds in the two games. He leads the team at 10.0 rebounds per game and is 22nd in the nation. Tarver also led the team last year with 6.3 boards per game. He is averaging 3.3 offensive boards per game this year. Tarver is not a huge scoring threat, but brings great defense and tenacious rebounding to the starting unit.

**Deep Bench:** Minnesota has quickly demonstrated the depth of its bench in the first four games as 8 players are averaging in double figures for minutes played and two players are just below that figure. Clark leads the team at 31.3 minutes per game and Lewis is next at 30.3. Tarver is averaging 27.8 minutes with Ohnstad (22) and Nathaniel (26) both averaging 20+ minutes per game.

**Bench Scoring**: The Golden Gophers bench has provided some great scoring and rebounding this season. Against Winthrop, Minnesota's bench scored 27 points and pulled down 11 rebounds. Against Seton Hall, Minnesota's bench contributed 21 points and 15 rebounds. Overall, Minnesota's bench has outscored its opponents by an average margin of 20.0-14.0 margin (100-70) and have outrebounded its opponents by an 11.0-8.0 average margin (55-40).

Not Only a Rejecter: All of the preseason talk about freshman Joel Przybilla has been about his ability to block shots, and he has done that, and much, much more He is an excellent passer and can outlet the ball on the break. His shot blocking ability can turn a game around as it helped do against Oregon and Fresno State. He rejected 17 shots in the two games and altered many others leading the two teams to rely solely on their perimeter shooting. Przybilla has quickly proved why so many people are talking about his potential impact for the Golden Gophers. The highly-touted center was ranked as high as number two in the nation overall (Bob Gibbons) and was Gibbons' top pick at center. The school's first McDonald's All-America selection since Kevin Smith (1984-85).

The Rebounding Story: Minnesota struggled early rebounding the ball consistently, but seems to be turning that around after outrebounding Oregon (47-34) and Fresno State (47-44). The Maroon and Gold has great size, but is still learning how to utilize that size in rebounding. Tarver leads the team in rebounding at 10.0 rebounds per game followed by Przybilla at 7.4 per game and Lewis at 6.8.

Minnesota vs. MAC Conference: Minnesota has a 10-2 record all-time vs. teams from the 'Mid-America Continent. The record is 7-2 for games at Williams Arena. The two losses are

an 83-75 loss on 12/19/88 to Toledo and a 63-57 loss overtime loss to Ball State on 11/26/88. Head Coach Clem Haskins has a 12-2 alltime record vs. teams from the MAC and a 8-2 record while at Minnesota.

Minnesota Enters AP Poll at #24: Minnesota is ranked 24th in the nation in this week's AP poll, the school's first appearance this season and the first since they finished the 1996-97 season third in the nation. The Golden Gophers were ranked as high as second that year. That was the highest AP ranking in school history. The previous high final AP ranking a Minnesota team has ever had is sixth (1948-49). The 1964-65 team finished seventh, and the 1972-73 team finished 10th. When Minnesota won the Big Ten in 1981-82, the team finished seventh in the AP poll and was ranked as high as fifth (1/18/82) during the season.

How Haskins Ranks: Clem Haskins is in his 13th season as the Golden Gophers' head coach. He has a 228-154 record and a 329-227 career coaching record. He is now third for length of tenure with 13 seasons. Dr. L.J. Cooke leads the list with 27 seasons (1897-1924), while Dave MacMillan is second with 18 seasons (1927-42, 1945-48). Haskins' 228 wins at the University of Minnesota puts him second to Cooke (244), trailing by just 16 wins.

Haskins Named USA Basketball Coach of The Year: Head Coach Clem Haskins was named the USA Basketball Coach of the Year on Nov. 11 for his outstanding job leading the Goodwill Games team to the gold medal in New York City last summer. Picked to fare no better than fifth place, Haskins brought his team back after a tough tournament-opening loss to Puerto Rico to win five straight games, including an overtime win over Australia in the gold medal game.

Instant Offense: Minnesota's Quincy Lewis established his nickname of "Instant Offense" his first two seasons when he averaged 7.4 points per game off the bench. A player who can score a lot of points in a short period of time, he is the Golden Gophers go-to scorer in the front court. In his first three seasons, he played behind Minnesota's fifth-all-time scorer Sam Jacobson at the wing position. Lewis, an All-Big Ten Tournament selection last year, is coming off a fine summer that saw him help lead Team USA to the Gold Medal at the Goodwill Games in New York City.

Ohnstad Leads Bench: Sophomore guard Mitch Ohnstad (Faribault, Minn.) is the team's leading scorer off the bench with 8.0 points per game. Ohnstad is tied for the team lead in assists with 18.0 (3.6 apg). A fine outside shooter, Ohnstad is the team leader, hitting 50 percent (7-14) of this three-pointers. The winner of the 1996 "Mr. Basketball Award" in Minnesota, he played one season at Cal-Poly SLO before transferring to Minnesota and sitting out last year. Ohnstad played in all 30 games for Cal-Poly. starting 24 and averaging 10.9 points and 4.4 assists per game.

There's No Place Like Home For Blockin Broxsie: There is no place like home, and sophomore Antoine Broxsie is looking to go home with his teammates in the spring for the Final Four. Last year the Golden Gophers took Eric Harris home to the NIT in New York and the team goal this year is to get to Broxsie's hometown. Broxsie is a big part of that equation. A fine shot blocker, he is second on the team with 2.4 blocks per game. He has also made big progress as a scorer and rebounder and gives Minnesota a trio of big players in the paint. Broxsie tallied eight points, six rebounds and five blocks against Appalachian State in his finest game as a Golden Gopher.

Minnesota Picked Fourth in Big Ten Preseason Polls: The Golden Gophers were picked fourth by both the conference coaches and the Big Ten media leading into this season. Michigan State was the consensus pick to win the title, followed by Purdue and Indiana and the Golden Gophers. Penn State was picked fifth by the coaches and Michigan was picked fifth by the media.

### Minnesota held an opponent to less than 50 points:

Jan. 27, 1998. Minnesota beat Wisconsin 58-48 in a defensive thriller. The Golden Gophers held the Badgers to 33 percent shooting. Minnesota forced 13 turnovers and had five blocks.

Jan. 15, 1992. The Badgers held Minnesota to 49 points in a 49-48 Minnesota victory. Dana Jackson hit a rebound basket with 4.2 seconds left to give Minnesota the win. Wisconsin held Minnesota to 40 percent shooting (19-47), but the Golden Gophers overcame a 28-15 halftime deficit, outscoring the Badgers 34-20 in the second stanza. Note: The last time Minnesota was held to less than 50 points and lost was Feb. 4, 1987, at Iowa, when the Hawkeyes beat the Golden Gophers 78-47.

Nov. 30, 1998. Kevin Clark scored a career-high 31 points in a 72-61 win over Oregon. Clark was 11-17 from the field and 5-5 on three pointers in the second half when he scored 25 points.

Dec. 4, 1998. Kevin Clark scored 29 points in a 77-65 road win over Fresno State. Clark hit 5-11 three-pointers and shot 8-18 from the field and 8-11 from the free throw line.

## Minnesota had a player score 20 points or more:

Dec. 4, 1998. Kevin Clark scored 29 points in a 77-65 road win over Fresno State.

#### Minnesota had a player with 15 or more rebounds:

Nov. 30, 1998. Joel Przybilla had a career-high 15 rebounds in a 72-61 come-from-behind victory over Oregon. Pyzybilla had five offensive rebounds as Minnesota outrebounded Oregon 47-34.

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The Sandman: Sophomore Kyle Sanden (Thief River, Falls, Minn.) started 32 games at center a year ago, but due to his medical issues he was never able to get into great game shape. Over the summer he worked very hard in the weightroom and toned up his body. He increased his weight to 265 pounds and is much stronger. A tenacious competitor, with one of the top shooting strokes on the team, he is looking to emerge as a scoring and physical force this season. He is a career 56 percent three-point shooter.

Minnesota on Television: The Golden Gophers will have every game televised this season. CBS will carry the Minnesota/Michigan game in Ann Arbor (2/7/99) nationally. Midwest Sports Channel will broadcast 21 games that will be produced by ESPN Regional Sports and can be seen across the country. ESPN has selected three Minnesota games, with a fourth (Purdue 2/24/99) as a wildcard. ESPN2 will telecast the Penn State game (1/9/99) and Minnesota has been chosen five times for the Big Ten Game of the Week which will be carried locally by KSTP-TV.

Depth is Back: After playing last year with very little depth due to injuries and unanticipated departures, the Golden Gophers are back to full strength. The Maroon and Gold are two-deep at every position and can now play the type of pressure defense that took them all the way to the Final Four in 1997. With 17 players on the roster, the competition for playing time is intense. Coach Haskins will play from 8-10 players per game. In 1996-97 Minnesota had nine players averaging in double figures for minutes played.

Speed Kills: The Golden Gophers have as much team speed and quickness as any team Haskins has coached. His philosophy of running under control will mean that if Minnesota can control the boards you will see them test the opponents defense by getting behind them as they did two years ago with Bobby Jackson. Ohnstad is the fastest player baseline to baseline with Clark right there with him. The defensive pressure of Clark, Nathaniel, Ohnstad and Simmons at the guard spot, should create some fast break opportunities as well.

Minnesota Connection: The Golden Gophers have seven players on the roster from the state of Minnesota and two of three signed for next year are from the Land of 10,000 Lakes. As many as half of the players next year will be from Minnesota and these are all nationally-recruited players. Only Purdue (11), Michigan State (9) and Illinois (8) in the Big Ten have more in-state players on their rosters this season.

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Gophers Sign Three Elite Players to National Letters of Intent: The University of Minnesota basketball office announced that three national recruits signed letters of intent to attend the University of Minnesota. Michael Bauer a 6-8, 200 pound forward from Hastings, Minn., Shane Schilling a 6-6, 195 pound swingman from Minnetonka, Minn., and Ryan Wildenborg a 6-11, 255 pound center from Kirkland, Wash.

All three players are ranked in the top 35 in the nation by various publications. Bauer is an outstanding athlete who can score from outside or go high to the basket and score. He has excellent jumping ability and finished second in the Minnesota State Track and Field Championships last spring with a high jump of 6'-8", losing the title on number of misses. This past summer he went to the Nike All-America Camp and exploded on the national scene, finishing the camp as the top power forward and the top overall player according to director George Raveling. Bauer led Hastings High School (Minn.) to a 19-5 record last year and its first conference title in 39 years. A second team all-state selection as a junior, he averaged 16.5 points, 9.9 rebounds and shot 47 percent from three-point range. He tallied a career-high 52-point effort vs. St. Anthony as a sophomore. He also holds career-highs of 19 rebounds (Tartan, '97-98) and 14 blocks (Northfield, '97-98). He is listed as the 32nd best player in the nation by *Hoop Scoop* magazine.

Schilling also had an excellent season last year. He led Minnetonka High School (Minn.) to a 25-2 record and the state Class AA title. The 32nd best player available according to *Street and Smith's* magazine, he averaged 25.9 points and 8.4 rebounds per game last year. He already holds the school's all-time scoring record with one season remaining with 1,208 points. His 700 points as a junior set a school mark as did his single-game record of 48 points vs. Rochester Mayo. He followed his prep season by being invited to the USA Basketball Junior National Team trials in Colorado Springs, Colo. From a field of 50 players, he made the 14-man finalist roster and ended up being the last player cut when they reduced the roster to 12 players. Another exceptional athlete, he has a vertical leap of 36 inches.

Wildenborg is a true post player at 6-11, 255. He has strong hands and is a physical presence in the paint. He is ranked the 34th best player available, and the third best center available in the country by *Hoop Scoop* magazine. Wildenborg averaged 10.2 points, 8.2 rebounds and 4.0 blocks per game last year. His season-high of 20 points was in an elimination game in the playoffs against highly recruited Curtis Borchardt of East Lake High School. He also had a season-high 10 blocks vs. Schome High School. Wildenborg shot 71 percent from the free throw line, 60 percent from the field and helped lead his team to a Mountain Division Championship.

"We are very excited that these three young men have decided to join the Golden Gopher family," said Head Coach Clem Haskins. "Each of them has fantastic physical tools. Mike and Shane are superb athletes who can shoot the ball from outside and score inside with their athleticism. Ryan is a prototypical Big Ten post player with great size and strength already. All three players are tremendous competitors who not only are ranked high nationally, but also have proven themselves against some of the best players in the country. They will add to our already strong group of young players and give us great hope for the future."
