

ICI Collaborating with University Medical Community on Projects

The Institute on Community Integration (ICI) is collaborating with the University medical community on three projects to better prepare professionals to provide health care for persons with developmental disabilities using a consumer-driven model. The projects include ICI and the School of Nursing, School of Public Health, and Department of Pediatrics.

One of the projects involves the School of Nursing and ICI in developing a new area of graduate study called Children with Special Health Care Needs. Developed by Barbara Leonard, Patricia Tomlinson, and Patricia Tommet of the School of Nursing, and Jennifer York of ICI, this program is the result of four years of collaborative work between the School of Nursing, ICI, the School of Public Health, and the Department of Educational Psychology. It prepares clinical nurse specialists for leadership roles in the care of children with special health care needs in interdisciplinary and community-based contexts. In addition to clinical skills, students acquire knowledge and skills needed to work across the various service systems and effect systemic change.

The second project is the four-week Developmental Disabilities Rotation required of all pediatric residents in the University's Medical School. The rotation is lead by Dr. Peter Blasco and coordinated by Harriet Kohen, both of the Department of Pediatrics. In addition to the clinical aspects of the rotation, residents participate in the Parents as Teachers component coordinated by PACER Center, and the Community Agency component coordinated by ICI. The objectives of the Community Agency component are for residents to become familiar with the design and implementation of community services for persons with disabilities, the roles of physicians in linking families with community services, and disability-related legislation. This component includes teaching and discussion sessions with the residents and two visits to community agencies. ICI staff participating in this component include Jennifer York, Marijo McBride, Teri Wallace, Terri Vandercook, and Mary McEvoy.

A third program through which ICI is impacting health care is through collaboration with the Department of Pediatrics project, Preparing Physicians and Other Health Care Professionals to Work with Special Educators and Vocational Counselors to Improve Services to Young People with Disabilities in Transition to Adult Roles. The ICI participates in this interdisciplinary program by providing courses at resident and fellowship levels of physician training and masters and doctoral levels of other health care professions. Fellows receive training through the collaborative efforts of ICI, the National Center for Youth with Disability, and the Center for Children with Chronic Illness and Disability. Dr. Robert Blum and Nancy Okinow of the Department of Pediatrics direct this program.

- **ICI Payroll/Personnel Processes Move to College.** As of March 1, ICI personnel and payroll processes are being handled by the College of Education's Administrative Budget Office. This office was established to provide these services in a more efficient manner throughout the college by centralizing them in one office. Beth Nelson in 102 Pattee is still the first contact for ICI staff in regard to personnel and payroll issues. - **Doing Large Mailings?** If you are doing a mass mailing of over 200 copies of a newsletter, brochure, or flier, you should use the University's Non-Profit permit on your mailing label and send the mailing list (labels or disk) and print materials to Addressing and Mailing. They will label, sort, bundle, and post it. There are very specific rules about this type of mailing and since it's the University's permit at stake, they prefer that you let the pros handle it. The advantage of using the permit is that the postage for this type of mailing is much less than regular mail. To use the permit there must be at least 200 pieces in the mailing and the return address must be here at the University.
