

HISTORY AND PHILOSOPHY

The Reserve Officers' Training Corps (ROTC) plays an important role in the national defense framework of our nation. The American tradition of military instruction on civilian college campuses began in 1819 when a former superintendent at West Point established the American Library, Scientific and Military Academy which later became Norwich University. Military Instruction soon spread to other institutions - Virginia Military Institute in 1839, the University of Tennessee in 1840, and the Citadel in 1842.

In 1862 the Congress of the United States, forseeing the dual necessities of creating additional institutions of higher learning as well as providing a means of schooling young men in the military arts, passed the Morrill Land Grant Act. This act provides money from the sale of government lands to establish colleges and universities and specified that courses in the military arts should be offered at these institutions.

The University of Minnesota opened its doors in 1869 through the benefits made available by the Morrill Act. One of the original nine faculty members was the University's first professor of military science, Major General Richard W. Johnson. For 70 years ROTC training at the University prepared young men for entrance into the Army. Then in 1939 a Naval ROTC unit was established, and in 1949 an Air Force ROTC program was begun.

For more than 150 years, ROTC programs on civilian college campuses have provided intelligent, well-educated leaders for the national defense. This is in keeping with the typically American concepts of the citizen-soldier and civilian-oriented military officers from all geographic and social strata whose leadership has been characterized by initiative, ingenuity, and flexibility. Also, because ROTC officers may return to civilian status when they have fulfilled their military obligation, ROTC programs provide leadership resources not only for national defense but also for civilian enterprise.

VICE ADMIRAL WILLIAM P. LAWRENCE CHIEF OF NAVAL PERSONNEL

VADM William Porter Lawrence, USN was born in Nashville, Tennessee, January 13, 1930, and graduated from the U.S. Naval Academy in Annapolis, Maryland in 1951. During his final year at the Academy as Class President, he led the establishment of the present-day Brigade Honor Concept.

Upon receipt of his aviator wings in Pensacola, Florida in 1952, he was assigned to Fighter Squadron 193, homeported at NAS Moffett Field, California, and deployed to the Western Pacific aboard the attack aircraft carrier USS ORISKANY. Next he attended Naval Aviation Safety School at the University of Southern California and the U. S. Naval Test Pilot School at the Naval Air Test Center, Patuxent River, Maryland, where he was designated the Honor Graduate. Subsequently, he served as a test pilot in the Flight Test Division and as an instructor on the Test Pilot School staff.

VADM Lawrence, as a Lieutenant, served as Flag Lieutenant to Commander Carrier Division Six aboard the aircraft carrier USS SARATOGA, deploying to the Mediterranean and North Atlantic. He next served as Assistant Operations Officer of Fighter Squadron 101, Naval Air Station, Oceana, Virginia, followed by a tour as Navigator of the qun cruiser USS NEWPORT NEWS.

As Maintenance Officer of Fighter Squadron 14, Naval Air Station, Cecil Field, Florida, he deployed to the Mediterranean aboard the attack aircraft carrier USS FRANKLIN D. ROOSEVELT. He then served as Senior Aide and Executive Assistant to the Commander in Chief, U.S. Strike Command, headquartered at MacDill Air Force Base, Florida.

VADM Lawrence made cruises to Vietnam aboard the multi-purpose aircraft carriers USS RANGER and USS CONSTELLATION. While Commanding Officer of Fighter Squadron 143, he was shot down over North Vietnam in June 1967 and held as a POW until March 1973.

After repatriation and convalescence at the Naval Hospital Memphis, he attended the National War College where he was designated a distinguished graduate. During the same period, he pursued a course of study at George Washington University, leading to the award of a master's degree in international affairs in July 1974.

After promotion to Flag rank in July 1974, VADM Lawrence served as Commander Light Attack Wing, U.S. Pacific Fleet at the Naval Air Station, Lemoore, California. Subsequently, he served as the Director, Aviation Programs Division and Assistant Deputy Chief of Naval Operations (Air Warfare) in the Pentagon. He became Superintendent for the Naval Academy on 28 August 1978 and was promoted to Vice Admiral on 1 August 1980. VADM Lawrence assumed command of the U.S. Third Fleet in September 1981.

On 28 September 1983, he became the Deputy Chief of Naval Operations (Manpower, Personnel and Training)/Chief of Naval Personnel, responsible for formulating and overseeing execution of Navy policies on all personnel issues.

VADM Lawrence is the author of "Oh Tennessee, My Tennessee," which he composed while a POW in North Vietnam. The poem has been designated as the official poem of the state of Tennessee.

VADM Lawrence is the recipient of the 1979 National Foundation and Hall of Fame Gold Medal, the Foundation's highest honor awarded to a former college player who has distinguished himself by his personal qualities, professional life, and contributions to his country.

In 1980, he received an honorary doctor of human letters from Fisk University in Nashville, Tenn.

The National Collegiate Athletic Association selected him for the 1984 Theodore Roosevelt Award, recognizing VADM Lawrence as one "for whom competitive athletics in college and attention to physical well being thereafter have been important factors in a distinguished career of national significance and achievement."

VADM Lawrence is married to the former Diane Wilcox of Montoursville, PA. They have four children: Bill, Jr., Fritz, Laurie and Wendy.

VADM Lawrence's awards include: Distinguished Service Medal (3), Silver Star (3), Legion of Merit, Distinguished Flying Cross, Bronze Star with Combat V, Air Medal (3), Joint Service Commendation Medal, Navy Commendation Medal (2) with Combat V, and Purple Heart (2).
