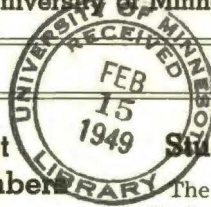

## Outcome of 57th Annual Track and Field Meet in Doubt Seniors Will Match Skill and Strategy with Junior Numbers

Saturday, February 5, marks the day of the 57th annual indoor track and field meet at the School of Agriculture. On this day, the men and girls in the school will be given a chance to participate in the 17 events offered at the meet. Most of the events should be of interest, not only to students taking part, but the lookers-on as well. **Two o'clock at the Gym is the time and place. Competition will be on the basis of classes, not individuals. Numbers favor the Juniors, but the Seniors have experience.**

For the men there is the rope climb which has a record time of 5.7 seconds, good time in any meet. The high jump has been placed at 5 feet 4½ inches and the shot put recorded a distance of 37 feet, 1 inch. In the running events, the record for the one mile is 4 minutes, 52.6 seconds; 2 minutes, 2.6 seconds for the half mile, and in the quarter mile a record of 1 minute, 1.2 seconds. Along with the running events come the 25-yard dash, shuttle, race and potato race. The swimming events include the 80-yard relay with a record of 1 minute, 42.4 seconds.

The girls have 6 events to take part in including a nail driving event in which the girls drive 10 nails in a 4x6 board to better the record of 20 secnds. The running races are a relay which was completed at 38.8 seconds for the record, along with a 25-yard dash with the time being 3.9 seconds. The one event in swimming is a 40-yard swim which has a record of 27.5 seconds. A rope vault and archery event round out the program for the girls.

Homecoming is also a feature of the day which begins at assembly when the president of the Alumni Association, Victor Christgau, addresses the student body.

It is hoped that a large number of alumni will be present throughout the day.

In the evening, soon after dinner two basketball games will be played. Alumni squads will meet each, the Aggie boys and girls basketball teams. Following that,

will be the annual Homecoming dance at the gymnasium.
