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Lyla Mae Anderson Appointed Men's Residence Director; Replaces Johanna Hognason

Lyla Mae Anderson has been appointed assistant professor and men's residence director in the School of Agriculture. She replaces Johanna Hognason, who had held that some post for 31 years.

Miss Anderson was graduated from the University of Minnesota in 1945 with a B.A. degree in Personal Psychology. While at the University, she was active in student activity work. She represented the University for several years in Big Ten Intercollegiate Debate and Oratory competition.

She was president of the Student War Efforts Committee which coordinated all war work on the campus during World War II. As a cabinet member of the YWCA, she directed the annual University of Minnesota Freshman Camp for 160 students. In addition, she was active in University musical activities, and the Radio Guild. In her senior year, she was appointed, as one of sixteen students, to the Senate of the University.

New Regulations for Men's Dormitories Bring More Individual Freedom, Responsibility; Conform with Other U. S. Colleges' Standards

This year will bring about the change of dormitory rules for the men. The object is to bring the personnel policies up to the standard of other college dormitories in the United States.

The purpose for this is due to the fact that most of the men now attending the School of Agriculture are high school graduates, so that the age level has been changed to a much older group of men. The rules governing the men before were in accordance with the age of the men, the majority of whom were not high school graduates and were also younger.

This will give the men a chance to have their freedom to rely on their own judgment,

according to each individual's taste. Late leaves will be left up to each man, who will be responsible for himself. Each dormitory will have its own social life, such as coffee parties, popcorn parties, and taffy pulls. These parties will be held frequently during the year.

Miss Lyla Anderson will be the counselor for the men. She will give opportunity to each man to discuss social problems, personal adjustment and financial status whenever he wishes. She will be assisted by advanced students who are the administrative assistants in each dormitory. They are John Perry, Al Lauer, and Bob Garner.

William Boss, Early Graduate, Talks at Anniversary Banquet

Coach Nowotny's Background Shows Successes In Basketball, Track, Football, and Coaching

Joseph Nowotny, our basketball coach, hails from Arlington High School. He has had an imposing basketball background. At Arlington school, he was all-district forward for three years and all-regional for two years. He won eighty-two medals in track during his high school career. He also was an outstanding halfback and was often mentioned in the state for his outstanding work in football.

When he left high school, he went to the University of Minnesota, where he earned letters in basketball and track. He attended the University from 1928 to 1932. Nowotny received his Master's Degree in Education later.

His first coaching job was at Alden where he was basketball coach. His team won the subdistrict championship. The second year he had an all sophomore team which won every game it participated in. From there, he went to Marshall, where he served as physical education teacher for seven years. While there, he set up an intramural system which was one of the best in the state. He was also recreational director of the city. In that post, he set up the best recreational program in the state at that time. From 1937 to 1943, he was active in setting up a recreational institute for the State Department.

Then he moved to the Twin Cities, where he coached for a year before coming to SAUM in 1943. He is now working on a Doctorate in education. He has this to say: "The greatest satisfaction I have had was

the cooperation of the administrative offices of the St. Paul Campus. Dr. J. O. Christianson and Dean Bailey have been especially helpful in aiding me to set up a physical education and athletic program.

"We have endeavored to provide a sound program which will make available a wide variety of equipment and activity, and yet work within the budget which we are allowed for the conduct of such a program."
