F.F.A. Officers Elected

James B. Foss of Kenyon was elected president of the state Future Farmers of America, and Roger A. Carlson of Spicer was elected secretary. We are proud of these two F.F.A. boys, students in our School of Agriculture, who are at home on their farms at the present time. They will be back to complete their School of Agriculture work in the fall term, beginning Monday, October 7.

Being president and secretary of an organization that includes 11,604 members in 281 local chapters is not only a significant honor but also a great responsibility. Serving in these offices is an activity directly in line with the emphasis in the School of Agriculture training of leadership and cooperation in the interest of better living. A strong alumni F.F.A. organization is one of the regular groups meeting during the School year.

Both of these young men made outstanding records in the School of Agriculture during the past School year. We congratulate James B. Foss of Kenyon and Roger A. Carlson of Spicer.

Many things have happened since our last issue of the *Agreview*. We have concluded another fine School year, and elsewhere in this paper you will read the list of the graduates and also of the students in attendance during the year.

Sixty-four counties in the state were represented, and there were students enrolled from Illinois, Iowa, New Jersey, and Wisconsin, as well as from Denmark and Sweden. This year we will have six young men from Denmark as the first contingent of the new Danish Exchange Program. Last year when Dr. Sherwood O. Berg, Agricultural Attache of the American Embassy in Denmark, was here with the Minister of Agriculture from Denmark, we talked of the possibility of a program for Denmark similar to that which has been in operation since 1949 with Sweden. With the cooperation of Dr. Berg in Copenhagen, the National Youth Committee of Denmark, and the Danish-American Brotherhood of the Twin Cities, we amended the provision to include young men from Denmark. (Incidentally, we are delighted with the appointment of Dr. Berg as head of the Department of Agricultural Economics to succeed Dr. O. B. Jesness, who retires June 30 of this year.)

Axel Hansen, Agricultural Director of the Minneapolis Tribune and one of the outstanding Danish leaders of Minnesota, and I are co-chairmen of the special Danish Exchange Program Committee. Others serving on the committee are Ralph Wayne of the Agricultural Extension Service and Professor Ralph E. Miller and Paul W. Brown of our School staff.

Paul Steenberg, President of the Danish-American Brotherhood, works very closely with us on this program. The wages earned by the Danish young men on the farms are sent directly to Mr. Steenberg, who keeps the money in trust for their needs when they arrive here at School in the fall.

Bankers Scholarships Available

With the fine cooperation of all members of the staff, another great year of the School has ended. The students are back on their farms, and those who have not yet been graduated are planning to return in the fall for the opening on Monday, October 7. We already have many new applications in from young men and young women who are planning to enroll at that time.

Bankers Scholarships are being offered in about 40 counties. New Building to Be Called "The Student Center"

As I prepare this feature for the *Agreview*, I write it more or less as a letter to those of you who are interested, so one topic may follow another that is not too closely related. However, I believe this next item of news is linked to all the others. The Board of Regents has officially designated the name of our future student building out here as the Student Center of the St. Paul Campus. That will be the name of what we have been referring to as the St. Paul Campus Union. Gordon Starr, Director of the Student Unions, says, "I hope that the students on the St. Paul Campus make the building just what the name implies—"The Student Center'." However, he goes on to say that ". . . this does not mean that the building will be restricted to use by students. It also will be open to the faculty, parents, and all guests of the University."

It is hoped that the ground breaking for the building will take place before the end of this spring quarter, while students are still on the campus.

An article in the *Minnesota Daily* says, "The new structure will have three times as much floor space as the Old Dairy Hall, which now houses the St. Paul Union. . . . The basement will contain most of the activity space, with an eight-lane bowling alley with automatic pin setters, six billiard tables, and three ping-pong tables. One man will be able to control all of this area from the central game control booth.

"The basement also will contain a dark-room, hobby shop, and desks for the use of campus organizations.

"The first floor is designed for casual use. There will be a lounge, complete with radio and television, and a snack bar and bag lunch room seating 330 people. There will be a large conference room, together with the manager's office.

"There will be a ballroom capable of

seating up to 700 people, a stage, and conference rooms. The ballroom will be connected to the 472-seat cafeteria."

This new building will take the place of the Old Dairy Hall, which was built in 1891 at a cost of \$15,000. The students in the School of Agriculture may look forward with real pleasure to the use of these new facilities on this campus. It is also hoped that the construction of a new Food Service Center will get underway soon. Money was appropriated for the Food Service Center by the legislature this year.

George Swenson Wins Conservation Award

We are delighted to call attention to the Blair Conservation Award for 1957. George D. Swenson of Windom, Minnesota, a student in our School of Agriculture here on the St. Paul Campus, was named winner of the Frank Blair Junior Conservation Achievement Award. This is given annually in the name of the former state director of game and fish, who still is active as a conservationist after 47 years of work.

George Swenson and his father received an all-expense-paid trip to the Northwest Sportsmen's Show, where George was presented with the Blair trophy on April 13.

George was selected by a state committee which screened applications from nearly 100 young men and women who are carrying on beneficial conservation work throughout the state.

Ralph V. Nordstrom of the U. S. Soil Conservation Service says, "George has been conscientious in planning and carrying out good conservation practices."

Mr. R. W. Palmby, county agricultural agent in Jackson County, says, "He has always been a keen student of soil and water conservation."

George has been very active in the Future Farmers Association, the National Luther League, and the National 4-H Congress. He has previously been awarded the Minnesota Junior Farmer Degree, the Farm Bureau Citation, and the Good Citizenship Award.

We wish for him all that is best in the years ahead and look forward to his visits to this School and campus. Mr. Larimore and the late Mrs. Larimore were godparents of the class of 1947.

On March 29, Ralph Williams of the Music Staff served as judge of music groups at the Buffalo Lake Music Contest, in which students from surrounding towns participated.

On April 5 Mr. Williams was a judge at Mobridge, South Dakota, where he has judged vocal groups for the past five years. Students from towns in west central South Dakota participate in this event.

On April 6, Mr. Williams directed a massed choir of several hundred voices at Renville, Minnesota, and on April 13 he directed a 500-voice choir at Watertown, South Dakota. Singers from larger cities in that area participated. Two of Mr. Williams' newer choral compositions were presented at the Watertown, South Dakota, program.

Mr. Glemming, director of the band, has also written many compositions for bands which have been played by symphonies and bands throughout the country.

The students in this School of Agriculture are indeed fortunate to have instruction in music by as outstanding a music faculty as we have here.

Professor Canfield Greatly Missed

The School of Agriculture lost a great friend in the death of Professor Thomas H. Canfield, Jr., who died unexpectedly on Sunday, March 10, just before worship services in the Hennepin Avenue Methodist Church in Minneapolis.

Professor Canfield has been nationally honored and recognized for his work as a teacher. Although most of his time was spent in teaching, he had done extensive research in poultry raising and had received honors for that work as well.

Professor and Mrs. Canfield were godparents of the School of Agriculture Class of 1941. His cheerful and loyal cooperation will be sadly missed by all who knew him.

Letters Received from Boys in Sweden

Douglas Triplett of Annandale says: "The time has gone very fast since we left School. I am very sorry we had to leave School early, because those were the best two years of my life. On the ship we had a good time, although the ocean was rough and we had to go 200 miles south to miss the icebergs. When I left the ship in Gothenburg I was met by Lars Larsson, my farmer's son. The farm where I am located is very modern and the Larssons are very good farmers. I am

sure I can learn very much here. Lars Larsson, as you know, was a former Exchange Student, working on a farm in Minnesota and attending the School of Agriculture. He sends his greetings to you. I like Sweden very much."

Wayne Carlson of Stanchfield writes as follows: "After being in Sweden for two months I am getting used to their way of life and their language. The folks for whom I am working do not speak any English. Mr. Anderson, the farmer, is a modern and efficient farmer. His methods and machinery are equal to any farm in Minnesota with the same acreage.

"Both Donald Nickel and Douglas Triplett live only a few miles from here, so we often get together and talk over our life in Sweden and our past pleasant experiences at the School of Agriculture."

Ronald Uter of Waverly, Minnesota, says: "I am now pretty much settled in my new home here in Sweden. I arrived on this farm March 15. I started to work here on the following Monday, and I have been working every day since then. I start work at seven o'clock in the morning and work until one o'clock in the afternoon. I have a coffee break in the morning from nine-thirty until ten o'clock. I then start working again at two o'clock and work until five-thirty in the afternoon. I have been doing all sorts of farm work and I like the farm and work very much.

"This farm consists of 1900 acres of arable land and 5,000 acres of good forest. They have on this farm a large lumber mill that takes care of all their own forest products. There is a large brick factory here also. The men from the forest and lumber mill work in this brick factory during the summer and early fall. They have a nursery and greenhouse here as well. They have a grain elevator that takes care of all their grain which is mostly sold for seed.

"There are over four hundred head of dairy cattle on this farm. Of this four hundred, about 160 are milk cows. The milk is sent directly to the creamery that they have here on the farm. They make cheese and ice cream here. The whey from the creamery is then sent to the hoghouse. They have over 200 head of Yorkshire hogs.

"This farm is located on the shore of Lake Vättern, the second-largest lake in Sweden. It is about six English miles to the town of Hjo, which has a population of about 5,000. This is in the province of Västergötland."

Donald Nickel of Mountain Lake, Minnesota, says: "I am getting along very nicely and have a very wonderful place to work. You are acquainted with Skane, I am sure, and it is a beautiful atmosphere to work in. The instructors here at the school speak some English so they are a wonderful aid to me. We have been working very hard on getting in the crops. We are almost finished with the seeding, with the exception of the potatoes which we will complete next week. Other crops

which we are raising are barley, sugar beets, peas, legumes for seed, and some grasses for seed.

"My so-called 'Swedish parents,' Mr. and Mrs. Karl Dolby, are coming to America in the first part of June, and they plan to visit the University of Minnesota and the School of Agriculture. They are very wonderful people and have shown me around much. They also plan to visit my home in Mountain Lake." (Editor's note: Mr. and Mrs. Karl Dolby and their four children will be in Minnesota in June. They will be visiting the School of Agriculture on June 20 and 21.)

Those enrolling in Practical Nursing and Home Management will enroll one week earlier on Monday, September 30.
