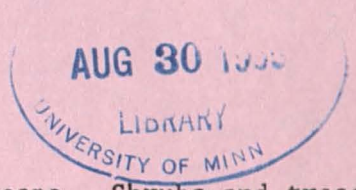

## FALL LANDSCAPING

Fall is a good time to begin the planting of your landscape. Shrubs and trees for landscaping purposes can be successfully planted during the fall season. Container-grown nursery stock and materials that go dormant early can be started at this time too, as well as the balled and burlap plants. This is also a good time to rejuvenate the landscape planting.

\* \* \* \*

Often it's possible to rejuvenate deciduous shrubs by pruning them. Overgrown plant materials may be replaced now. In fact, fall is a good time to make these replacements to take advantage of the winter effect the new plant materials will give to your landscaping.

\* \* \* \*

Where construction is to be accomplished in the landscape design, it is a good idea to start the footings and get the foundations or fill established this fall. Where change of grades for patio or for leveling of the lawn is necessary the fill will settle during the winter season and landscaping can continue the following spring.

For new homes where the foundation has just been completed it's best to wait until spring to put in the foundation planting.

Permanent trees can be planted at this time of the year just as soon as the leaves have fallen. Consult with your landscape nurseryman first of all on the development of the landscape plan, then on appropriate species and transplanting information. Often during the fall season there is more time available to devote to site planning and development.
