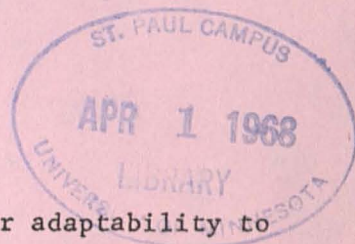

FRUIT VARIETIES FOR 1968

Fruit varieties are recommended on the basis of their adaptability to different areas of the state. For information on varieties recommended for your particular area, ask your county agent for Horticulture Fact Sheet No. 3, "Fruits for Minnesota, 1968." You can also get a copy by writing to the Bulletin Room, University of Minnesota, St. Paul, Minnesota, 55101.

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Mantet is the earliest apple recommended. It's not a keeper, so it must be used quickly. Beacon is another early variety, which is ready for picking around September 1. Haralson is a late maturing storage apple, and Regent is the latest maturing variety recommended.

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Crabapples are generally more hardy, but have smaller fruit than regular varieties. Chestnut is a very good eating crabapple.

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The Boyne (red) raspberry is a relatively new variety which produces large, attractive red fruit. If you want a red everbearer that produces both summer and fall crops, try the September variety. The Sodus (purple) raspberry is productive and has vigorous plants.

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The Earlimore June bearing strawberry will give you the first berries of the year. The Trumpeter is a later maturing June bearing strawberry that produces large attractive berries. If you want to try everbearing strawberries that you can harvest over a longer part of the season, try Ogallala.

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Beta (black) grapes are very hardy. If you have a favorable site and give extensive care to your plants, Worden (blue) will give you high quality fruit.
