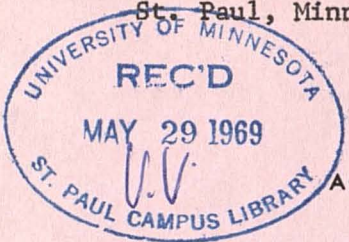

VISIT THE LANDSCAPE ARBORETUM

The University of Minnesota Landscape Arboretum has over 3,000 different kinds of plants. These plants are evaluated for their ornamental value and hardiness. Plant collections come from all parts of the country and many parts of the world.

Consider the arboretum a living library of plant materials for study and observation. You'll want to revisit the arboretum several times a year.

One of the highlights of a June trip to the arboretum will be the rose gardens where old-fashioned and hybrid roses will be on display.

You may want to visit the shade tree collection to help decide what type of tree you'd like for a planting. Both evergreen and deciduous type shade tree collections are on display.

Picnic facilities are available for visiting groups. On weekends, the charge is \$1 per car for non-arboretum members, but there's no charge during the week. Free tour guides are available to groups requesting them in advance. For more information, write to Mervin Eisel, University Landscape Arboretum, Box 132-1, Route 1, Chaska, Minnesota 55318. The arboretum is located 4 miles west of Chanhassen on State Highway 5.
