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DULUTH--Were all of her history-searching travels laid end to end, Maude L. Lindquist, UMD professor and head of history, this summer would be circling the globe for the sixth time.

As it is, her 1959 history field tour will carry her 6,200 miles into Eastern Canada and U. S. points en route. She estimates she has traveled some 140,000 miles on historical and personal trips.

The tour group may be augmented to 20 if others are interested in joining. The itinerary begins July 21 with St. Ignace, Mich., as the first day's destination. It will end with the return to Duluth Aug. 19.

Early fishing villages on Prince Edward Island, B. C., the cities of Toronto and Montreal, Port Royal, N. S., oldest white settlement north of the Gulf of Mexico, and scores of other history-rich stops are scheduled.
