

DULUTH--Leadership problems on college campuses are getting thorough study at the regional meeting of the U.S. National Students Association at UMD. One hundred student leaders from 20 colleges and universities in Minnesota and the Dakotas registered Thursday for the meetings in Kirby Student Center.

Donald L. Smith, program vice president of the national USNSA office in Philadelphia, gave the keynote address Thursday night. A film, "Eye of the Beholder," was shown and discussed.

Friday morning sessions will employ the case study method to reach decisions on two topics: the honor system and cheating in class, and student government problems.

On Friday afternoon, a panel on "Dynamics of Group Leadership and Role Playing" will be led by Dr. Armas Tamminen, head of the psychology department, and Edwin O. Siggelkow, coordinator of student activities, both of UMD. Student panelists include Janet Johnson and Frank Borelli, Duluth; Linda Makinen, Keewatin, and Gary Snow, Fort William, Ontario, all of UMD.

Films on "The Invisible Committees" and "Role Playing in Human Relations Organizations" will be followed by further case study discussions. A meeting of student body presidents and an informal dance in Kirby cafeteria will be held Friday evening.

Saturday session workshops will take up topics on: student travel abroad, student government, college unions, NSA coordinators, student editors and campus religious organizations.

A banquet in Kirby Saturday evening will wind up the three day sessions.

Russell Schoumaker, Duluth, regional chairman, will preside over the general meetings.
