

Duluth-- The Rev. Earl H. Brill, Episcopal chaplain at American University Washington, D. C., will speak to several UMD student and faculty groups during an April 28 to May 1 visit to the campus.

One of Mr. Brill's talks will be "A White Man's Response to Black Power," a discussion of the issues raised by the Dick Gregory convocation on Tuesday. Mr. Brill will speak at 1 p.m. Tuesday (April 30) in the Kirby Student Center Rafters.

(Dick Gregory is scheduled to speak at 10:30 a.m. Tuesday in the Physical Education building. His topic will be "Civil Rights.")

Both convocations are open to the public.

Mr. Brill will speak on several other topics during his visit. The topics times and locations are:

* "The Church and Society: the Controversy of Controversy," to be given at 10:30 a.m. Monday (April 29) in Social Science 116 and repeated at 1:30 p.m. in Home Economics 80.

* "Personal Freedom and National Responsibility," a discussion of conscience and the draft, at 2:30 p.m. Monday in Kirby Ballroom.

* "The Church and the Urban Crisis," at 9:30 a.m. in Kirby 375.

Mr. Brill assumed his position at American University in 1961. He also is a lecturer in American Civilization and chairman of the university's Center for Liberal Studies. He serves the Episcopal Diocese of Washington as chairman of its Department of Christian Social Relations.

He is the author of "The Creative Edge of American Protestantism" and "Sex is Dead and Other Postmortems," both published by Seabury Press, N. Y.

Mr. Brill holds an A.B. degree from the University of Pennsylvania, a Th.B. degree from Philadelphia Divinity School and a Th.M. degree from Princeton Theological Seminary. He currently is a candidate for the Ph.D. degree.

The UMD Council of Religious Advisors is sponsoring Mr. Brill's appearance on the campus.
