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## 4-H/COSTA RICAN EXCHANGE CEMENTS FRIENDSHIPS, UNDERSTANDING BETWEEN THE TWO COUNTRIES

**A**s the eight Costa Rican teenagers said good-bye to their host families and headed for home in February after nine months in Minnesota, it was clear that the experience had left a lasting impression on all concerned.

"I will remember the school, computer science, the snow—but most of all my host family," said German Eduardo Sanchez Seguar, 17, from the rural town of Cobano near the southern tip of the Nicoya Peninsula.

"They treated me like their own son and now I feel like they are my parents," Sanchez said about Andy and Dian Lopez of Morris.

Sanchez and the seven other Costa Rican youths were in Minnesota as part of the Central American Peace Scholarships (CAPS) program sponsored by the U.S. Agency for International

Development and administered by the National 4-H Council. It was the third year Minnesota participated in the program, and another eight Costa Rican students will arrive in Minnesota in June.

"The most important thing I learned was to change a little my understanding of the United States—how people live, what they think," Sanchez said. "It's different than what we see on TV or in the movies.

"In Morris, I was a soccer coach for kids 5 and 6 years old. We won almost all our games although they didn't know how to kick the ball when we started. That was a really good feeling."

Jeremy Lopez, Sanchez's host brother, says his most vivid memory is of the time "Eduardo visited my mother in the hospital. He brought his guitar, and he played beautiful music for her until his fingers were blistered, and it made her very happy."

"I guess the most important thing I learned was that, despite our differences, we have the same aspirations—we're all working to create a better world," Lopez said.

Ana Patricia Gamboa Venegas, 18, from Santa Cruz de Leon Cortes, about 40 miles south of San Jose, said she'll never forget the Paul and Betsy Hoppe family of Mora. "I remember special things about each one," she said.

"My mom helped me with English and my dad, who was in Vietnam, helped me to understand American history and culture.

"The most important things I learned in Minnesota were my own value as a person, how I have to relate to other people and a sense of direction for my life. I know now that I want to build on this experience and have a career in which I'll deal with people from other countries," Gamboa said.

The majority of CAPS participants are from rural areas or small towns, and they are chosen by 4-H's sister organization in Costa Rica on the basis of academic achievement and demonstrated leadership.

Objectives of the CAPS program are to promote understanding and friendship between the people of Costa Rica and the United States; to acquaint Costa Rican young people with the principles of democracy and free enterprise as practiced in the United States; to develop the long-term leadership capabilities of talented Costa Rican youths; and to further rural development in Costa Rica.

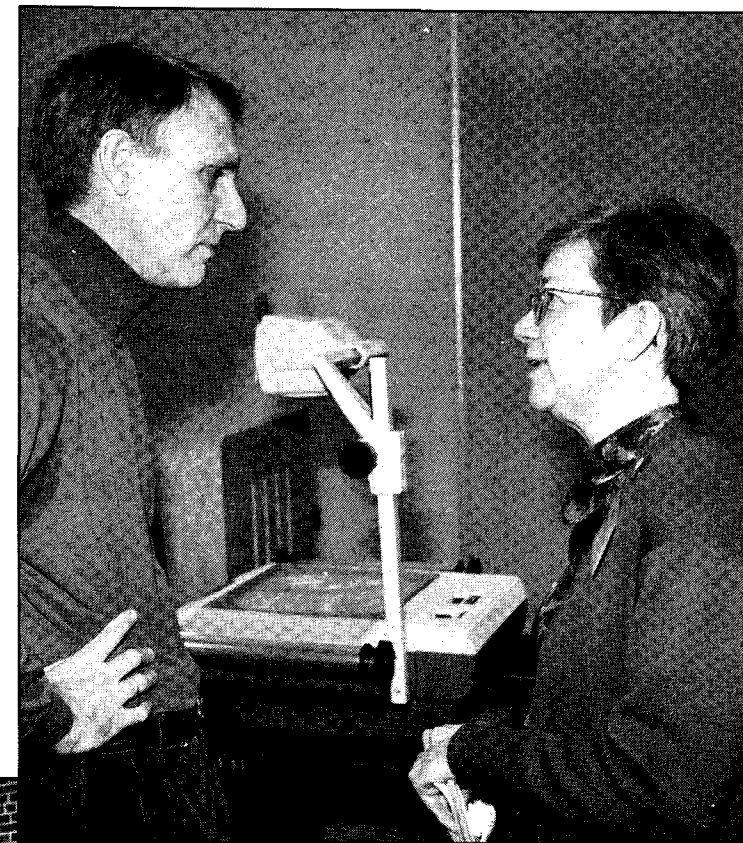

V. JOSEPH MCAULIFFE, former associate director of program development for Minnesota 4-H, has received the National Partner in 4-H award at ceremonies at the National 4-H Center in Chevy Chase, Md. Now retired from his position as state 4-H leader in South Dakota, McAuliffe and his wife continue to travel and promote the 4-H Wildlife and Fisheries program. McAuliffe was on the Minnesota 4-H staff from 1967 to 1973.

BLUE EARTH COUNTY celebrated Agriculture Industry Day in March with a series of events intended to focus on agriculture's importance to the county economy. More than 600 people attended the program in Mankato, which included remarks by Minnesota Commissioner of Agriculture Elton Redalen, displays and demonstrations and recognition for the family of Charles and Dale Wishart of Mapleton, chosen as the county's farm family of the year.

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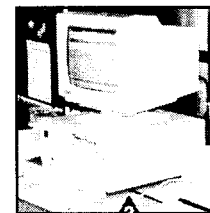
