### Educational Programs in Aging

One of the central interests of AUCA is educational opportunities in aging at the University of Minnesota. Students can specialize in aging at either the undergraduate or graduate level through a variety of programs. Some of these are described below. For further information call the All-University Council on Aging at 612/376-1759. Counseling for students interested in coursework or programs in aging is available through the AUCA office.

#### UNDERGRADUATE

##### College of Liberal Arts

Bachelor of Arts (BA) or Bachelor of Science (BS)--

Major in one of the traditional disciplines, such as sociology or social work, with appropriate aging courses in major and/or minor departments. The Department of Sociology specifically offers an undergraduate minor in aging.

Individually Designed Inter-Departmental Major (IDIM)--

Interdepartmental program of coursework on the theme of aging is developed in consultation with faculty and staff advisors.

Bachelor of Individualized Studies (BIS)--

Coursework grouped into "areas" that may be departmental or interdepartmental in composition. Aging comprises one of these areas.

##### University College

Inter-College Program (ICP)--

The ICP allows students to design a 190 credit interdisciplinary, inter-collegiate program leading to the BA or BS degree with an emphasis on aging drawn from many segments of the University.

University Without Walls (UWW)--

UWW advisors and the student work closely to develop individualized programs in aging combining courses, directed study projects, and experiences.

##### General College

Certificate on Aging Studies Program--

Intended for employed or voluntary personnel already working with the elderly in nursing homes, advocacy homes, and in aging services.

#### GRADUATE

The University of Minnesota graduate student can develop related areas and supporting program in aging while earning a graduate degree in a traditional field or department. Students can major in one department while minoring in the gerontology coursework of another. The Master's Degree related area and the Ph.D. supporting program may be constructed from courses on aging offered by two or more departments.
