Undergraduate researchers tackle tough problems

In most universities, research remains the territory of graduate students. But at UMD, both graduate and undergraduate students find numerous opportunities to initiate and develop research projects related to their specific interests and fields of study.

Jason Bolz co-authored four papers published in international chemistry journals as a result of his 21-month undergraduate research project. Three biology undergraduate students have identified a herpes suppressor. Debi Wilson has been examining censorship of Mark Twain's *The Adventures of Huckleberry Finn*, a book which has been called "the greatest American novel."

During the past several years, UMD has gained national recognition for undergraduate research programs in the sciences, humanities, and education. This year, 11 UMD undergraduate students have been invited to present their research at the prestigious National Council on Undergraduate Research conference in Asheville, N.C. in April. The students' varied research projects have been supervised by faculty members in chemistry, English, psychology, and biology.

One of the major sources of funding for undergraduate research at UMD is the UM Undergraduate Research Opportunity Program (UROP). But faculty who receive other external funding from the National Science Foundation, from state and national grants, and from industry and commerce organizations, often request undergraduate research funding in their grant proposals.

The UMD chemistry department runs a summer-long undergraduate research program which is open to UMD students and visiting students. Last summer, 19 undergraduates participated in

the program.

UMD's commitment to undergraduate research has evolved steadily during the past decade. Its success can be attributed to faculty members who insist undergraduate students are just as capable and creative as graduate students when given opportunities to solve problems. In addition, UMD's educational philosophy values and nurtures undergraduate responses to complex cultural and scientific issues.

"Research gives you that thrilling sense of being someone who pushes back the boundaries in a knowledge field," says Eve Browning-Cole, associate dean of the College of Liberal Arts and an associate professor of philosophy. "Our undergraduates get that. Since coming here, I've

worked with many more undergraduate students on research projects outside the classroom than I did at other institutions. It's part of the culture at UMD."

"Undergraduate research gives many students the chance to work with individual faculty members on a one-on-one basis. This adds a richness to our curriculum and shows undergraduates that the learning process does not just occur in the classroom," says Steve Hedman, UMD associate vice chancellor for academic administration and associate dean of the graduate school. "They discover that they can learn from themselves."

Concentrated research experience also proves advantageous when students enter graduate programs or the job

market. "Students who have worked on one of these projects have an increased understanding of the process of science," says Don Christian, professor and head of the biology department at UMD. "They have the crucial components of problem-solving skills and hands-on experience that increase their competitiveness for employment or graduate work."

Bolz, whose perfluoroalkyl organic chemistry won him the Minnesota Academy of Science's 1995 Winchell Award, graduated from UMD with a major in chemistry in 1995. His advisor on the project was Viktor Zhdankin. Bolz received offers from several graduate programs but decided to take a few years off from school when he was offered a position as a

long-range formulation chemist at Valspar Corp., an industrial and consumer coatings manufacturer.

"One of the most valuable things I learned at UMD was how to think and solve problems, and undergraduate research had a lot to do with that," Bolz says. "Undergraduate research is an arena where you can apply what you've learned and work with your own ability to solve a real-life problem that hasn't been solved yet. It's essentially up to you to decide what is the best method to use to go about solving it."

Bolz believes the UMD emphasis on undergraduate research attracts students in the sciences because they recognize the considerable advantage they have when it comes to employment and graduate school. "Great grades aren't always enough. But great grades and a great research background increases your opportunities," he says.

Tricia Tomlinson, a senior majoring in chemistry, has been working with Professor Don Poe for the past year on a project involving high performance liquid chromatography. Chromatographic equipment is used by the Environmental Protection Agency to study environmental contamination. Tomlinson will present her research at the North Carolina conference.

Tomlinson's project has been funded by the Petroleum Research Fund. As with most basic research, she is finding answers for just one portion of a larger problem. "My approach is that undergraduate research projects are meant to be a learning period for students," says Poe. "Students learn how to use new techniques, how to plan experiments and how to keep records. Everything is designed to address the larger question at stake."

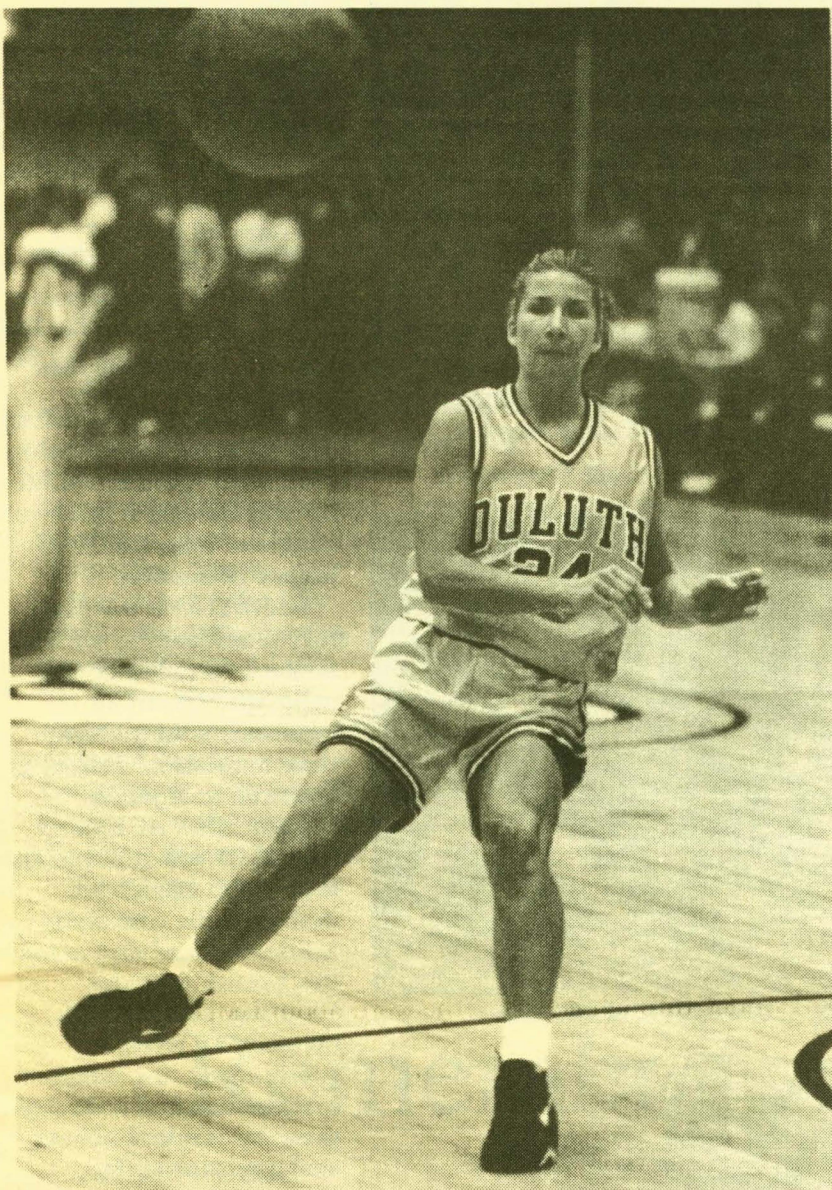

Women's basketball ends outstanding season with heartbreak loss to NDSU



Kris Mielke, a junior from Monticello, helped lead the Bulldogs to a 12-0 record in the NSIC North Central Conference. The Bulldogs lost just five games overall.

The UMD Women's Basketball team ended a stellar season when they fell to defeat against North Dakota State University (NDSU) Friday, March 8 at Romano Gymnasium.

NDSU, the #1 seed, went on to win the Northern Sun Intercollegiate Conference (NSIC) championships that weekend.

NDSU was out to avenge a December loss to the Bulldogs. It was that defeat which put the brakes on a 49-game NDSU winning streak, the longest in history of NCAA Division II women's basketball.

"I think that was what they (the NDSU players) were remembering, along with the fact that we were the team that stood in the way of becoming the national champion," said Linda Larson, UMD women's athletics coordinator. "We've been in that position for the past couple of years. I think we've got the toughest route to the national championships," she added.

UMD will graduate three seniors, Jodi Ierino, a center from Duluth, Sara Belanger, guard from Elk River (the 'Dogs two leading scorers) and Wendy Hansen, a forward from Arden Hills. Among the returning players, the Bulldogs have a strong

group of sophomores and juniors.

In addition, Gina Perich from Esko has signed a letter of intent to play Bulldogs basketball next year. Perich is a star on the track in addition to her talents on the court. "She will be a great addition," Larson said. "She's just an outstanding athlete."

Spring will be a busy season for athletics. UMD will host conference championships in tennis, softball, and track in April and May.

Kragness takes new position

Chancellor Kathryn A. Martin has announced the one-year appointment of Lucy Kragness to the position of Executive Assistant to the Chancellor.

Lucy will serve as the primary support person for the Office of the Chancellor and assist the Chancellor in off-campus outreach, development efforts, grant writing, preparation of the annual report, and various other assigned responsibilities.

"Personally, I am very grateful to Lucy for her willingness to accept this challenge and to assist me in meeting the obligations of the Chancellor's Office," Chancellor Martin said.

New book celebrates those who made UMD

UMD Comes of Age: The First 100 Years relives the sometimes tumultuous history of Duluth Normal School, Duluth State Teachers College and the University of Minnesota Duluth. The author-photographer team who created this wonderful book, Neil Storch and Ken Moran, chose events and photographs that eloquently retell the story of the people who made UMD what it is today.

Drawing on his training as a historian, Neil Storch, professor of history at UMD, has written a story that vividly portrays the presidents, provosts, chancellors, faculty, staff, and community members who treasure UMD and the values it has established for Northland education.

Ken Moran, campus photographer at UMD since the early 1950s, researched archives containing thousands of photographs from Duluth Normal School's beginnings to the present. The more than 400 UMD pictures finally selected for the book prove that

photographs truly can recreate a sense of the past.

The book evokes the spirit of those many risktakers who turned DSTC into UMD, who fought for the School of Medicine and the Natural Resources Research Institute, and who fervently believed that UMD could become a cultural resource for the community. In both words and photographs, it honors UMD's "Bulldog" spirit.

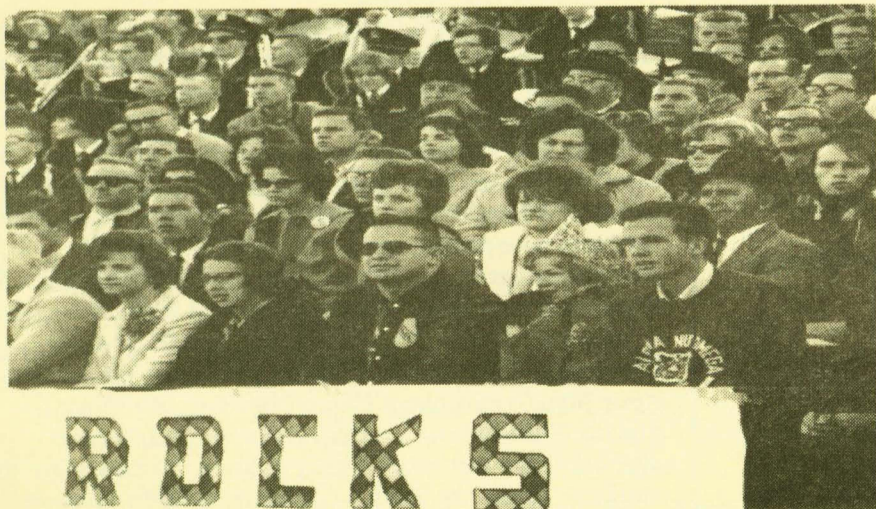

NASULGC grants UMD membership

The University of Minnesota Duluth has been granted membership into the National Association of State Universities and Land Grant Colleges (NASULGC). The only other Minnesota member is University of Minnesota Twin Cities.

Founded in 1887, NASULGC is the oldest higher education association in the nation. Its 182 members represent all 50 states, plus the U.S. territories and the District of Columbia. Membership gives UMD greater visibility and influence in all circles of importance to higher education.

NASULGC is a voluntary organization, with a mission to enhance the capacity of member institutions to perform their traditional teaching, research and public service roles. As a member, UMD will share in the NASULGC agenda to: maintain the university academic base and activities (which includes fostering partnerships between all levels of government, the member institutions and industry); preserve student access and opportunity by protecting student financial assistance programs; reduce excessive, burdensome and costly federal regulations; and focus on state issues (where federal and state issues intersect, such as accountability, accreditation and student financial assistance).

NASULGC has adopted four major goals for the '90s: first, to show the linkages between public higher education and the nation's economic and societal interests; second, to affirm that the nation must provide access and opportunity for a college education to all who can benefit from the experience; third, to help strengthen the credibility of public higher education where its credibility has been threatened; and fourth, to make the case that the nation must invest in higher education at federal and state levels.

UMD chemistry professor named vice chancellor

Chancellor Kathryn A. Martin named Vince Magnuson Vice Chancellor for Academic Administration. "Vince's dedication to UMD and to the community of Duluth, his strong belief in the quality of our faculty, and his

willingness to continue to pursue excellence in all areas on campus were the determining factors in my selection," said UMD Chancellor Martin.

Magnuson, who has been a chemistry professor at UMD since 1973, has been interim vice chancellor since July. He replaced Sandra Featherman, who became President of the University of New England in Maine. "I am very honored to

have been chosen for this position," Magnuson said. "My goals are to provide students with an affordable education in a comprehensive university that focuses on an exemplary undergraduate learning experience," he added.

In addition, Magnuson hopes to increase opportunities for students to be involved in active learning experiences and to promote and support faculty creativity and research.

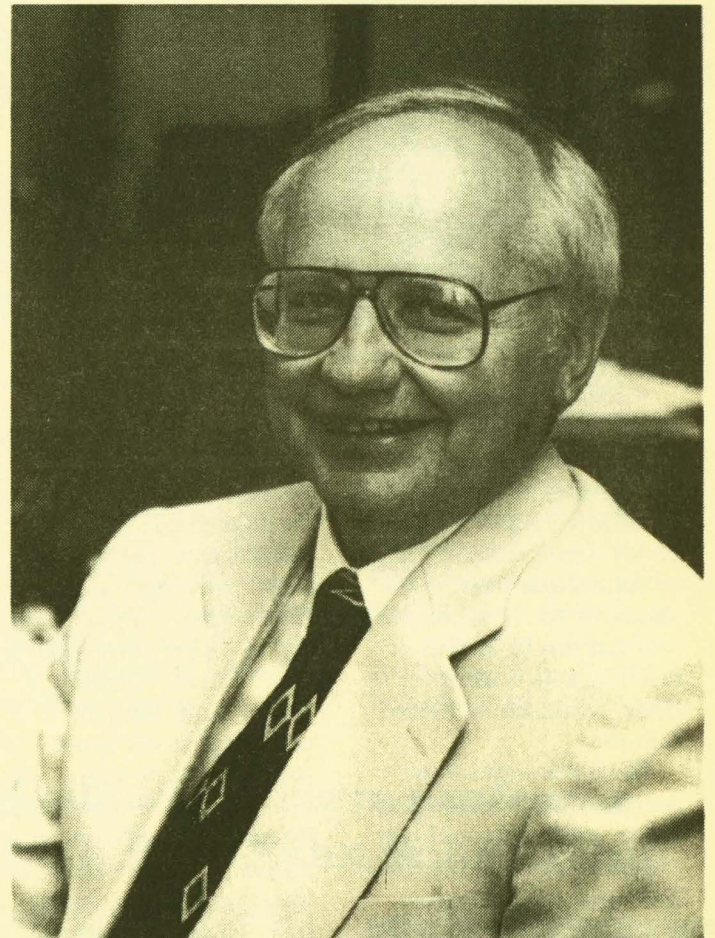
Magnuson also will concentrate on strengthening academic ties with the community colleges of northern Minnesota. These outreach efforts include increasing transfer agreements and joint admissions, providing for more distance education, and increased cooperation in terms of sharing resources.

Magnuson received his

Ph.D. in inorganic chemistry from the University of Illinois, Urbana in 1968. He received his M.S. in chemistry from the University of Wisconsin, Madison in 1965, and his B.S. from the University of Nebraska, Lincoln in 1963.

He is a past Chair of the UMD chemistry department, past American Chemical Society National Councilor and past chair of the UMD Campus Assembly. He is also active in a research program involving both graduate and undergraduate students in molecular structure determination by x-ray diffraction.

During his term as interim vice chancellor, Magnuson served as co-chair of the Chancellor Transition Committee for then Chancellor-designate Martin.

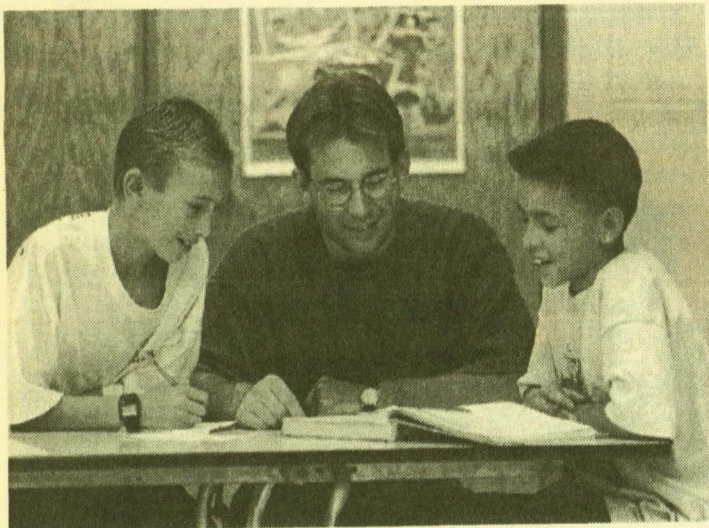
Most students have received the scholarship twice, and all have been at UMD throughout their first and second years.

Darland Intergenerational Program seeks community support

Many readers will remember R. J. Falk, Armas Tamminen, Donna Wolean, Jean (Livingston) Harries, Janine Watts, Eleanor Collins, and Dean Kjolhaug as classmates or UMD professors. Along with Art Barschdorf, Jan Bower, CEHSP Dean Mitizi Doane and student volunteer representatives Kim Tarvestad and Mike Reckard, these committed individuals comprise the governing body of the Darland Intergenerational Program.

The program, formerly known as the Darland

Center, connects caring adults with area kindergarten through twelfth-grade students who are having difficulty with their school work. UMD students, retired UMD staff, and older community members work as tutors and mentors with the children. In most instances, sessions result in increased self-esteem and motivation and improved academic performance for the student.

Like the students they serve, program volunteers also benefit. UMD students gain valuable

experience for future years. Most importantly, both senior and student volunteers have opportunities to participate actively and meaningfully in community life, sharing their experience, knowledge, and caring to enhance the life of others. Volunteers have said they derive a great sense of satisfaction from witnessing changes in the children they assist.

The Darland Intergenerational Program is possibly the only local program totally focused on providing tutoring and mentoring services to children in their own school at the request of the student's teacher or parent. Program volunteers have been assisting students individually and in small groups since 1990. During the fall quarter of 1995, more than 40 volunteers provided direct assistance to

190 students at 14 area schools and contributed more than 1,000 hours of service. Presently, 90 student volunteers are placed in 19 area schools.

The Darland Intergenerational Program depends on the financial support of area foundations, businesses, and individuals. Because requests for the services of trained volunteers are expected to increase, the program has embarked on a funding campaign. Holocaust memorial lectures established

Dying in an American field hospital, after being starved and tortured by the Nazis, Walter Baeumler's grandfather told him, "It is better to have tyranny end with terror than to have terror without end," and admonished him to better the future.

On March 5, UMD announced the establishment of the Baeumler-Kaplan Holocaust Memorial Lecture Series. The series is established by the families of Walter Baeumler (1928-1993), 28-year professor of sociology at UMD, and Mortrud Kaplan (1908-1986), founder of the Community Council of Duluth, now the Twin Ports Jewish Federation.

"Unfortunately, ignorance about the Holocaust is widespread in America, especially among young people," said Harry Hellenbrand, Dean, UMD College of Liberal Arts. "Consequently if the Holocaust indeed is not to

happen again — to Jews or other people — it is essential that the young in college, high school and even earlier, be educated about forces and attitudes which lead to dehumanizing others," he added.

Baeumler, who was born in Nuremberg, Germany, dedicated his teachings to insure that the lessons of the Holocaust would neither be forgotten nor swallowed by a fascination with the horrible. Thus, in his honor, this Memorial Lecture Series has been established to remember, with dignity, the lives and sufferings of the victims and to encourage change through the dissemination of truth, justice and peace.

Kaplan, lifelong Duluth resident and registered pharmacist, was the son of Lithuanian immigrants who worked hard to send their children to college. Honoring Kaplan's, spirit, his sister, Mrs. Ida

Grubnick, instructed her attorney, Robert Karon, to give her funds to an organization that would explore the plight of Jews and Judaism in honor of her brother.

Their gifts to the Baeumler-Kaplan Holocaust Memorial Lecture Series are an effort to combat ignorance about the past, perpetuate the memory of Jews and Jewish traditions, and exhort people (especially youth) to live without bigotry, racism, and violence.

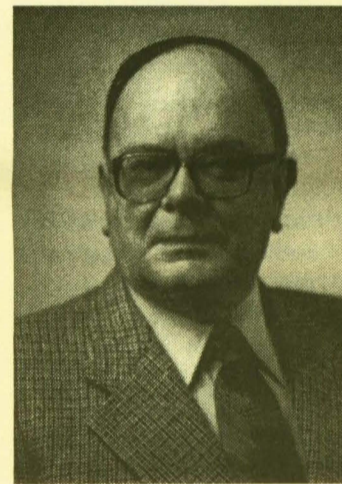
Alumnus honors professor with Von Glahn Scholarship

The scholarship, in honor of UMD professor emeritus von Glahn was endowed by Jim Corson, class of '49. Corson, a retired managing editor of West Publishing Co. and former student of von Glahn, hopes his gift will encourage other students of von Glahn to join him in honoring their beloved professor.

The German-born von Glahn taught political science and economics at Duluth State Teachers College and political science at UMD. He began teaching in 1941, but left to join the military services when the U.S. entered World War II. Von Glahn returned to UMD in 1946, where he served as head of political science for more than 30 years. He retired in 1979.

"Gerhard was simply amazing," said Craig Grau, associate professor of political science. "He was an academic 'role model' before the term was invented. On a personal level, he was a very proud father and had a great sense of humor, even when the joke was on him," Grau added.

Von Glahn's political

science research resulted in two well-known books, *The Occupation of Enemy Territory* (Minnesota Press, 1957) and the best-selling international law textbook *Law Among Nations*, first published by Macmillan in 1965 and published in a seventh edition in 1995.

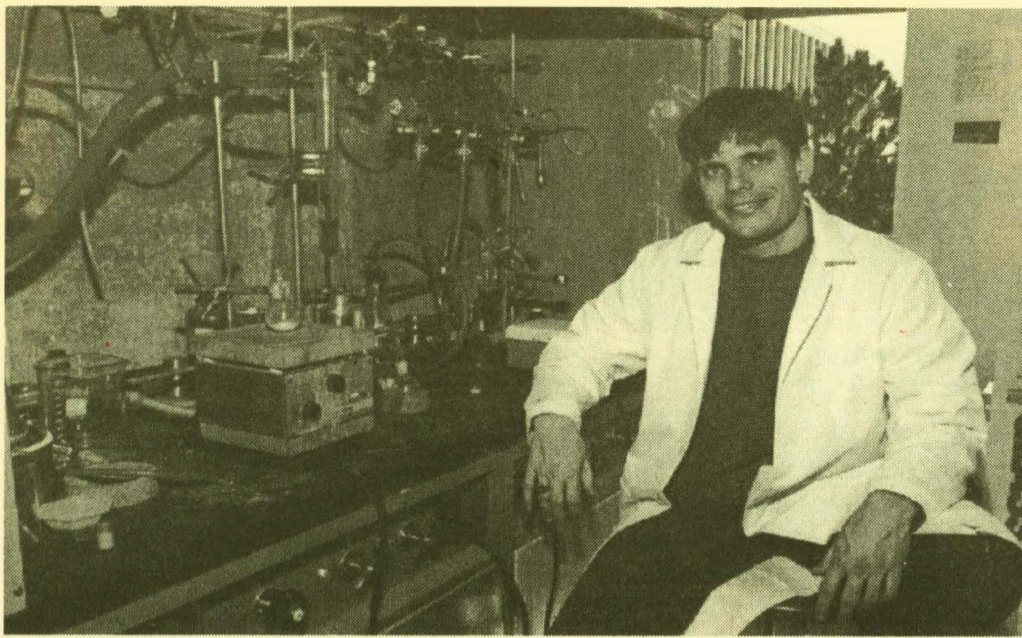

tends to focus on ecological biology and cellular biology. Junior Ashley Moerke, another North Carolina presenter, has been working with Professor Anne Hershey on a stream ecology project. Her research has been funded by the Undergraduate Research Opportunity Program (UROP) as well as Research Experiences for Undergraduates (REU) funds from NSF.

Another biology project which now involves at least one undergraduate student and will likely involve several more is a study examining the feasibility of harvesting brush as a biomass fuel source. A portion of the study relates to how such brushland management would affect the habitat of sharp-tailed grouse, a species now on the decline in Minnesota. "The way we present it to students is to say 'here's a problem that we're trying to address — and here's a piece of the problem,'" explains Christian, who received funding for the brushland management project from the Minnesota Forest Bird Diversity Initiative.

Three undergraduate students have been working with M. Raj Karim, professor of biology, to probe more deeply into a chance discovery made by a group of German doctors. The doctors found that a drug used to treat depression was also clearing up herpes infections in their patients. The drug's ingredients were extracted from a combination of plants which included the common rose, but the Germans could not iden-

tify the specific herpes suppressor.

The UMD students discovered the specific combination which suppressed the herpes. "It's what you would call a 'good' side-effect," said Aaron Johnson, who conducted the research in association with fellow students Matt Thompson and Satoshi Takida. Johnson will present his team's findings in North Carolina. In addition, Karim has been invited to present the students' results to the International Congress of Virology meeting in Jerusalem next August.

"Undergraduate research is a major contributing factor in helping our undergraduates make the transition from student in the classroom or instructional laboratory to independent and mature scientist," says Bilin Tsai, professor and head of chemistry. "They experience the challenge and excitement — as well as frustration — of scientific inquiry."

One seldom talked-about aspect of undergraduate research is the possibility of failure. "In research, you never know what's going to happen," Tsai says "In classroom labs, the experiments are designed around fairly well-known and consistent results. But here, researching on your own, you're going to experience failure some of the time."

Most researchers face failure at least once in their careers, Tsai points out. Students who encounter this scientific truth early in their education begin to understand that a research failure is

not necessarily viewed as a black mark but instead, as a signal to the researcher to try another research approach.

While scientific research often seems more visible to the public than research in other fields, students in the humanities feel equally challenged by the projects they have developed. English major Debi Wilson received a UROP grant to study recent

criticism of Huck Finn, a novel often attacked as racist. In developing her response to the issue, she has had to contrast her own understanding of Twain's satirical intentions against the idea that stereotypes, even when used ironically, can create prejudice. She is working under the supervision of Steve Adams, associate professor of English.

"I am motivated because I am interested in the topic, and I am being challenged to think critically and to produce a valid and thorough thesis and argument about the subject," Wilson says. "I'd encourage all students to take advantage of this kind of opportunity."

Former UMD student Jennifer Ouellette, who graduated from UM Twin Cities in 1995, researched her UROP project while studying in England in 1992. Professor Klaus Jankofsky, English, supervised her research on Margaret of Anjou, a major character in Shakespeare's *King Henry the Sixth* trilogy.

Her project, which emphasized primary source research, examined the character of

Margaret within its textual, historical, and theatrical dimensions. One of the high points of her research, says Ouellette, was interviewing Cherry Morris, an English actress who played Margaret in a Royal Shakespeare Company production of the trilogy.

"I really don't think undergraduate research in the sciences and humanities is that different," says Browning-Cole. "Humanities students still have to figure out how to formulate a research plan and implement it. It teaches them a lot about time management and organizational skills."

"The research isn't that different either," she adds. "When you look at research topics, no matter where they are, they tend to look really micro-level and tiny. But that's what research is — coming at big subjects with small steps."

More importantly, Browning-Cole insists, even seemingly small research eventually leads students to "a better global vision of where we are and where we've been as a species."
