TAKE BACK THE NIGHT More than 1,000 women, children and men participated in the "Take Back the Night" march August 8 in protest to violence against women and other powerless persons. Marchers participated in a rally at Leif Erickson Park, then marched past St. Lukes Hospital and through Superior Street.
