UMC Launches \$5 Million Campaign

"Campaign Minnesota,"

an unprecedented fund-raising effort for the University of Minnesota, will raise \$1.3

billion. As part of that campaign,

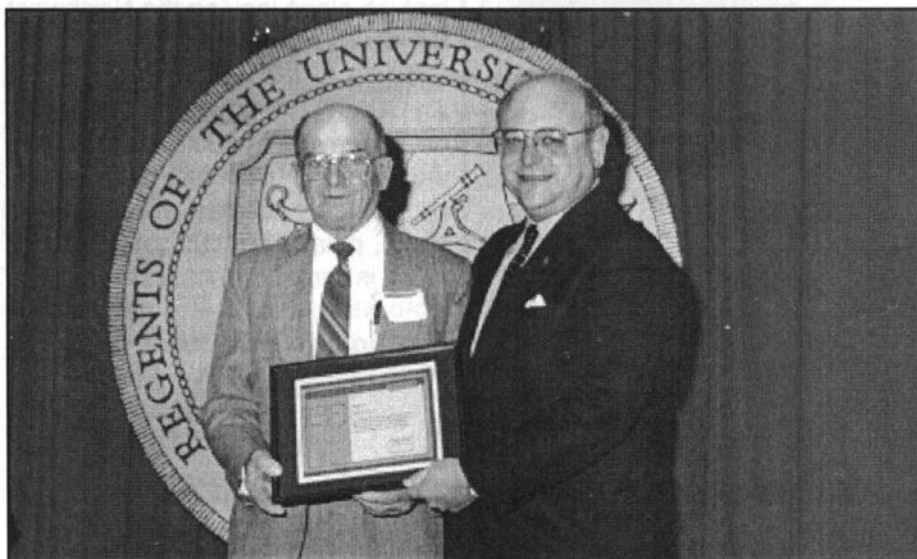
the Crookston campus announced its goal of \$5 million last evening (Wednesday, November 3) at the annual Torch and Shield Recognition. The campaign is the largest ever raised on the UMC campus, and the University goal is among the largest ever raised for an American public university.

The massive fund-raising campaign, which will be completed in 2003, is described by University President Mark Yudof as "a defining moment" for the university as it strives to remain nationally competitive for top faculty and students, and to meet the needs of a burgeoning Minnesota economy.

"Economic success and growth during the next century - in Minnesota, as well as nationally - will be dependent upon developing the talent, creativity and knowledge of our people," said Yudof in summarizing the need for the campaign. "We are witnessing exciting breakthroughs in fields such as cellular biology, plant genetics, medicine and digital technology. As we begin the new millennium, the University of Minnesota has an unprecedented opportunity to become one of the world's premier land-grant institutions."

Major priorities for the Crookston campus include:

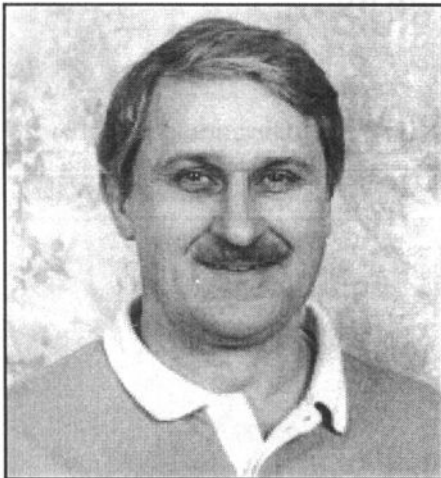
- \$500,000 for the Center for Rural Economic Development which will act as a catalyst for connecting information with opportunity, creating jobs, producing income and serving the public good.
- \$1.5 million for endowed UMC scholarships and \$1.25 million for current UMC scholarships.
- \$1 million for the Education and Technology Resource Center, a diagnostic clinic to assess technology skills and internet environment, which will also serve as UMC's Distinguished Teacher Academy and recognize faculty, staff and students for creativity and outstanding contribution in teaching and learning.
- \$500,000 for Agricultural Research, in collaboration with the Northwest Research and Outreach Center, the former Northwest Experiment Station.
- \$250,000 for Outreach to connect the University and Community for extending the University's reach to citizens and communities.

"This is an exciting moment in the history of the campus," said UMC's Chancellor Donald Sargeant. "To ensure that UMC can capitalize on this moment, we must enlist the support and talent of all who care about UMC."

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From the Director

Campaign Minnesota - A Defining Moment

If you've been on campus lately you would have seen the many changes that have occurred the past few years. At the moment the latest round of construction projects are being finished up. More important than the facilities changes are the programmatic and reputation changes that have and are also taking place. The University of Minnesota, Crookston has earned the right of passage and is coming of age. For the second year in a row UMC has been named "A U.S. News Best College" and has moved up in the rankings to number two in the Midwest region.

To see the growth in programs, numbers, facilities and reputation is exciting. On November 3, 1999 we kicked off another exciting chapter in the history of the campus. President Mark Yudof was with us to celebrate our annual Torch & Shield Event and kick-off, the UMC version of Campaign Minnesota - A Defining Moment. Campaign Minnesota is the largest capital campaign effort ever launched by a public university in the country. Overall it is a \$1.3 billion University-wide fund raising endeavor. UMC's goal is to raise \$5 million, which is also a record undertaking for the campus.

The breakdown for UMC's portion of Campaign Minnesota is summarized as follows:

- Rural Economic Development Center \$500,000
- UMC Student Scholarships Endowments \$1,500,000 Current \$1,250,000
- Outreach to Connect the University and Community \$250,000
- Agricultural Research \$500,000
- Education & Technology Resource Center \$1,000,000

GRAND TOTAL: \$5,000,000

In the opening paragraph of the All-University Capital Campaign Case Statement President Yudof stated "every in-

stitution has its defining moments - points in time when talented individuals, working cooperatively, can influence the course of events for generations to come." I believe that UMC is poised to make this a truly defining moment in the history of its development and service to the region.

I would like to conclude this article with a statement from Chancellor Sargeant in which he said (and I quote) "This is an exciting moment in the history of the campus. To ensure that UMC can capitalize on this moment, we must enlist the support and talents of all whom care about UMC. Please join me - along with the UMC students, faculty, staff, alumni, and friends in gathering this support."

From the Chancellor

The New Millennium

The new millennium is finally here. It is a benchmark in history. At the turn of the last century, this campus was much, much different. A five-year-old ag experiment station and no educational programs. Now, 100 years later we begin this century with a University land grant coordinate campus with one of the most modern information age colleges in the country and a first rate research and outreach center. What will they say in the year 2100 about UMC!

Times change and yet they don't change. The campus focus has been on preparing students for careers and on applied research for our rural economy. This is reflected in the Capital Campaign that places emphasis on raising funds for student scholarships, for additional applied research, and for

rural development initiatives. Students' financial, academic and personal needs remain a top priority. We want to make adjustments to better prepare them for their careers. Our faculty and researchers are great assets in helping in economic development in the region and want to do more. I hope you will consider a financial contribution to UMC as part of this Campaign.

I would remise if I did not mention that Barb Weiler who has been responsible for organizing the Aggie the past twenty years retired in December from UMC. She was the one in the background - organizing picture taking, writing articles, planning special events, and contacting media to promote UMC. So thanks to Barb and we wish her and her husband Phil well in the years ahead.

As we look ahead, the Minnesota legislative session this spring is a capital bonding session. The University bonding request includes \$6.5 M for UMC to remodel Kiehle Hall with an addition for centralizing our campus technology services. Kiehle, built in 1910, obviously is in need of upgrading. The project includes remodeled space for the alumni service staff and for NWSA memorabilia. Kiehle Auditorium has been a place of many, many forums on issues of importance to this region for 90 years and it too is in need of refurbishing. So speak to your legislator on the importance of refurbishing Kiehle.

Heritage Fund Annual Drive Changes

In the fall issue of the Aggie the changes in the Heritage Fund annual drive were announced and outlined. By the time you receive this issue of the Aggie you should have received two letters on the 1999-2000 Annual Fund Drive, one from University President Mark Yudof and the other from NWSA Alumni President Bill Gatheridge.

As outlined in the fall Aggie, earlier this year the NWSA Alumni Association Board made the decision to do the annual Heritage Fund Drive in conjunction with the University of Minnesota Annual Fund Drive. All of your gifts will go for the same purposes and come to the Crookston Campus as they have in previous years. The only change being that the mailings will come out of the University of Minnesota Foundation Office rather than the Crookston Campus Development Office.

In the past your checks came to Crookston, we tabulated them and sent them on to the Foundation and had them put in the NWSA Heritage Fund. Now they will go directly to the Foundation and be put in the Heritage Fund. We then will request funds from the Foundation just as we have in the past for scholarships and NWSA operations.

The University of Minnesota Foundation staff will also conduct the phonathon portion of the annual fund drive. The NWSA Alumni Association Board intends to evaluate the success of this year's annual fund drive before implementing this change on a more permanent basis for future years.

Retirement Has Not Slowed Ray's Activities

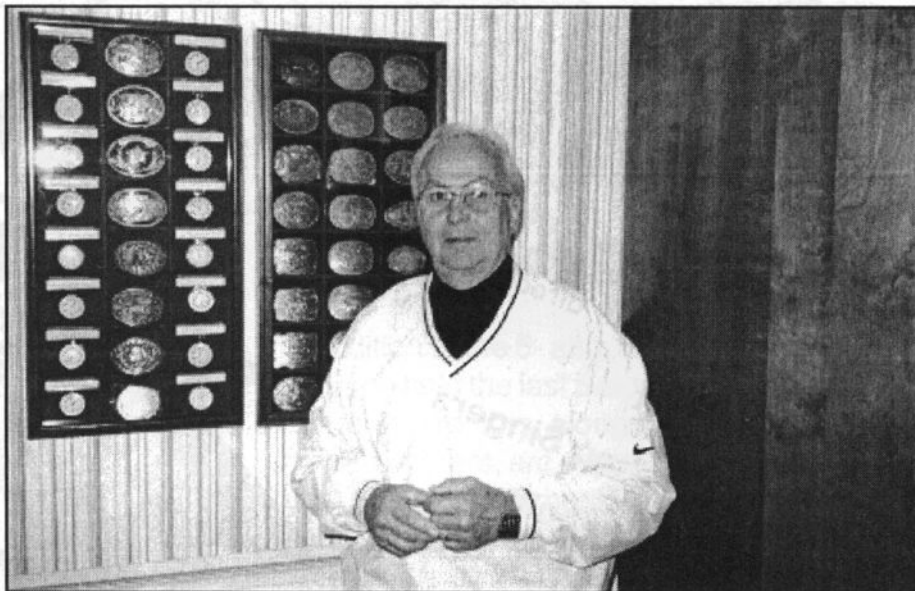
Ray Johnson '46 • Cincinnati, OH

After graduating from NWSA, Ray Johnson joined International Harvester Company (IHC) and became the youngest assistant zone manager in the history of IHC. During the Korean conflict, Ray spent four years in the Air Force as an instructor. After the Air Force, he entered the University of North Dakota and received a bachelor's degree from the School of Engineering. He joined Sangamo Electric Company in 1958 and spent ten years in Texas as a sales engineer.

In 1968, he was promoted to district manager and moved to Kansas City. In addition to his normal work schedule, Ray became active in numerous civic and church activities. He was committee chairman of Boy Scout Troop 284 for five years, tripling the troops size and was instrumental in helping several boys attain their Eagle Scout rank. Because of this community involvement, Ray was recognized in Kansas "Who's Who" in 1975. In 1977, Sangamo promoted Ray to regional manager and he transferred to Cincinnati, Ohio. In this capacity, he managed the sales activity for Schlumberger Industries, (which bought out Sangamo Electric Co.) in 12 states and supervised 10 district managers. He has conducted product training schools in many states and hired several people who later held key positions at Schlumberger. Ray retired in 1992 after 34 years with the company.

During his working career, Ray was honored for several achievements, including The Capacitor Salesman of the Year in 1971 and 1972, "Quota Buster" trips to England, Hawaii, Bahamas, Barbados and several U.S. resort locations. In 1987, he was awarded the Salesman of the Year for Schlumberger Energy Management Division North American and International operations.

Ray has been married to Joanne for 45 years. They have two children and four "lovely" grandchildren.

He is active in his church and volunteers at the Cincinnati Museum of Natural History and Science, the City of Montgomery and the Tornado Memorial Committee.
