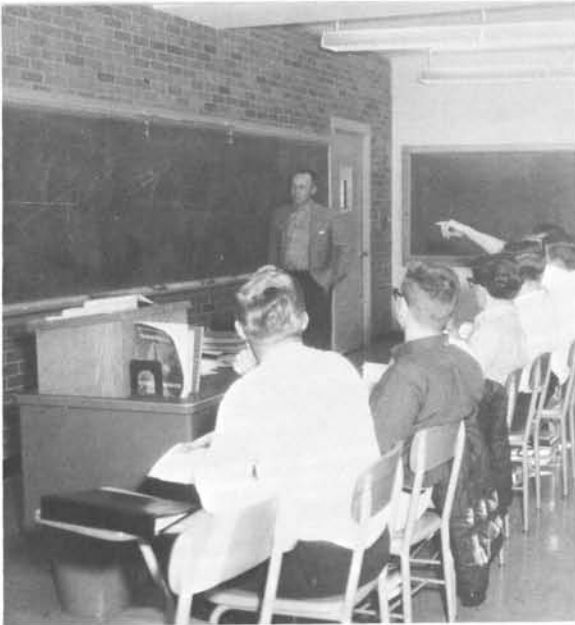
Mathematics

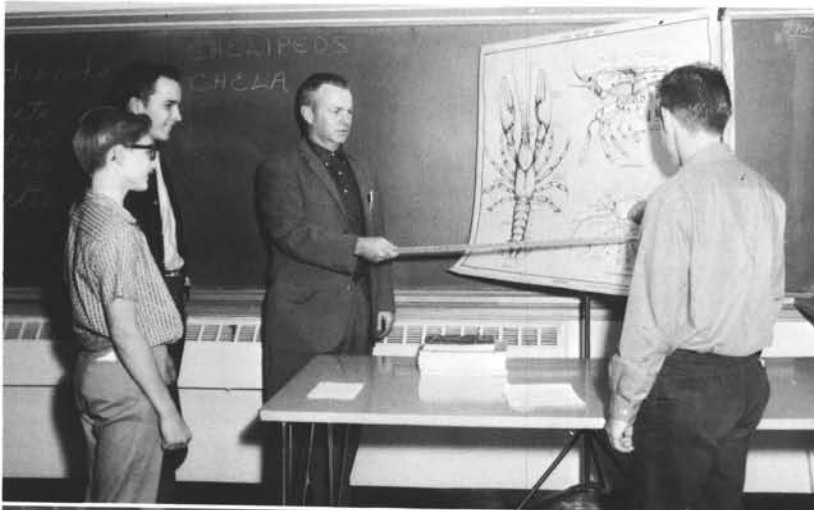

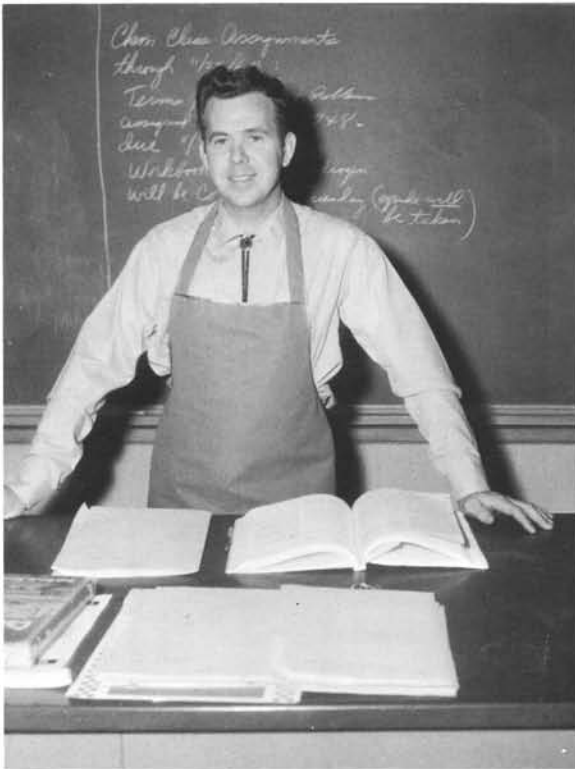

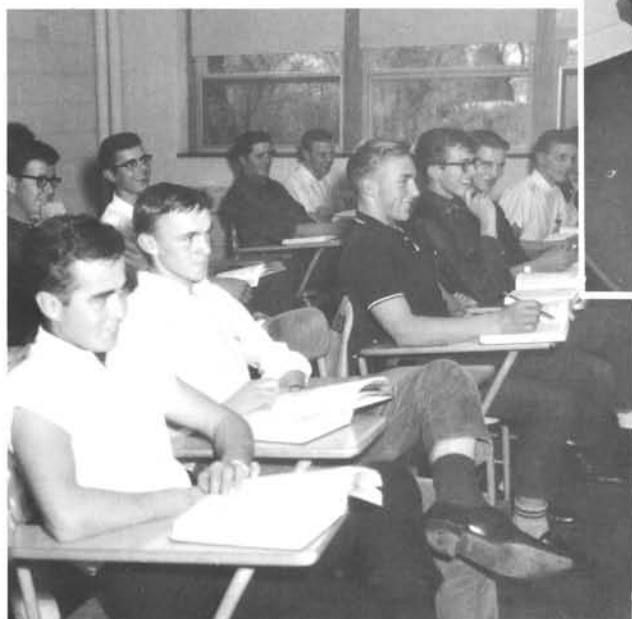
Geography

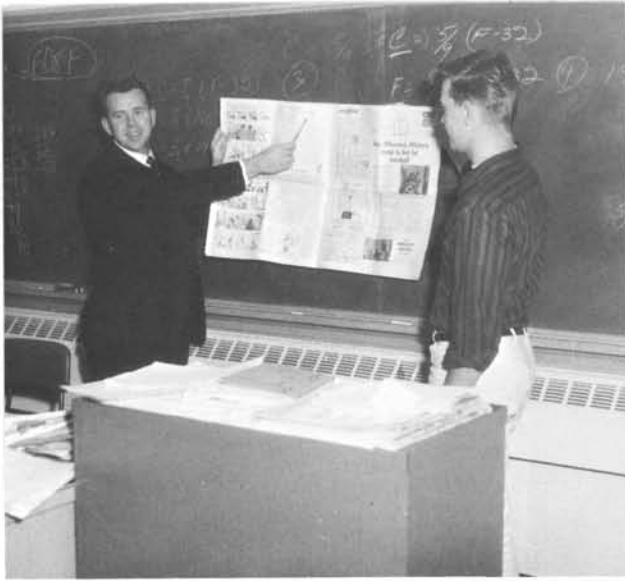

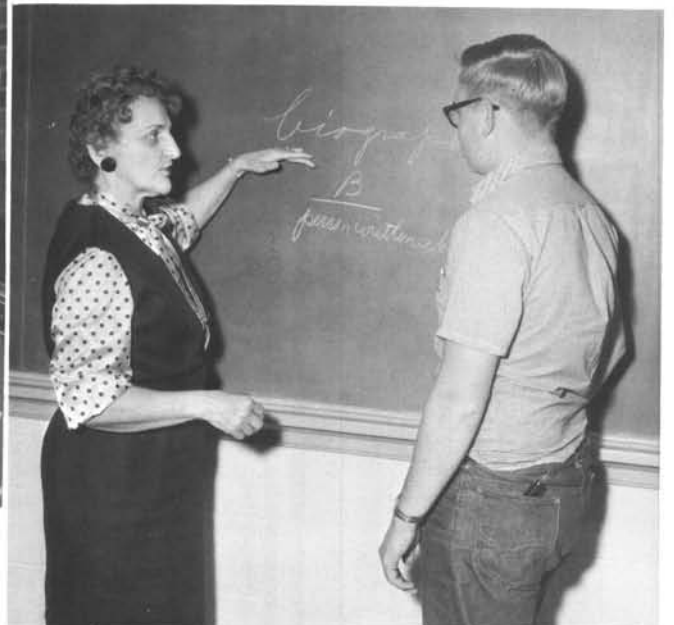

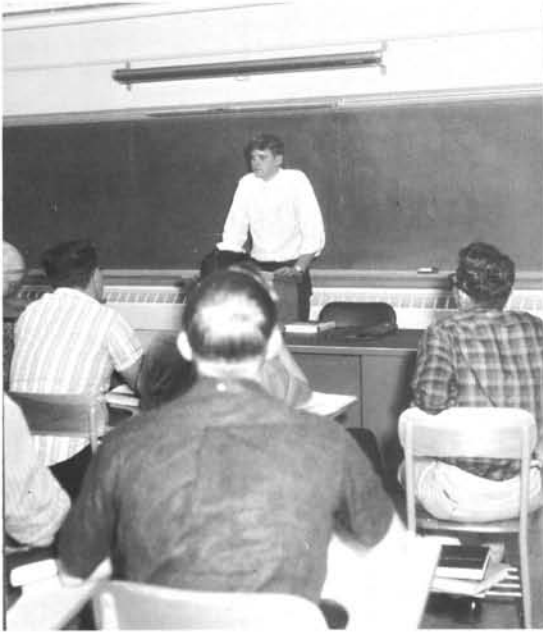
English Classes

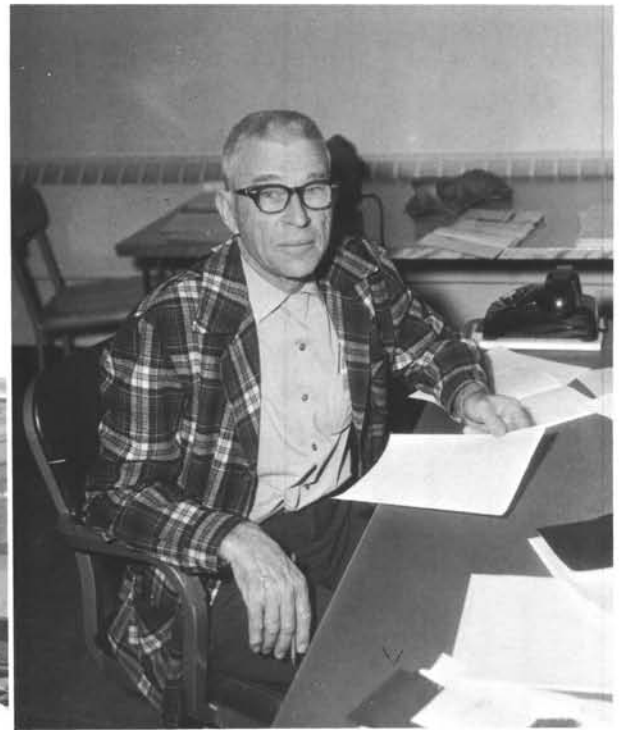
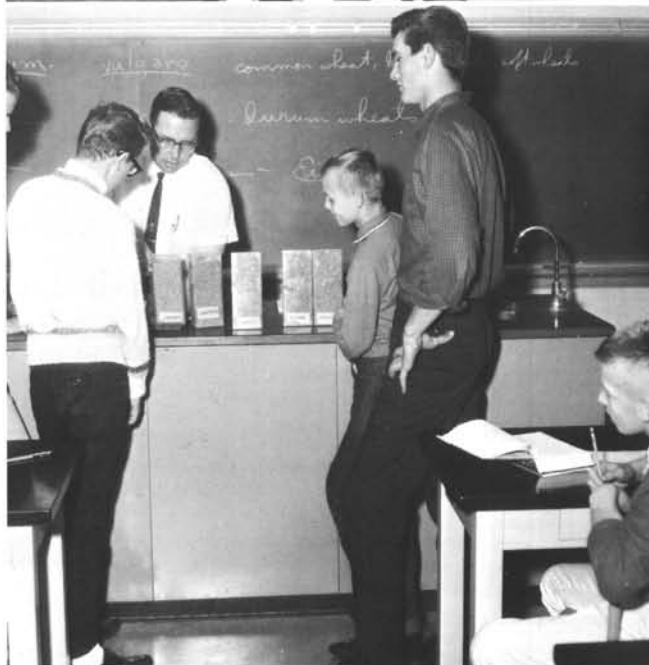

Carpentry

The industrial arts program at our school is provided with a well equipped shop in which students get the opportunity to build model hog houses, automobile garages, and a variety of other practical and useful assignments.



Welding



Arc Welding is the advanced stage of gas welding. Only students who have successfully completed gas welding may take arc welding. Perhaps this is due to the greater difficulty being able to work metal successfully with an electric welder.

In Owen Hall, gas welding is taught by Mr. Soderburg. Most of the students wear coveralls to protect them from flying sparks, but sometimes it doesn't help. Oxygen and acetylene gases are used in this form of welding. The work exercises begin with simple welding two pieces of metal together and proceeds to more difficult welds.

Husbandry

Dr. Marx teaches the students about selection, care and management of the dairy herd. Calf raising, feeding of the livestock, production of milk, milk testing and herd records are some of the subjects dealt with in dairy production.

Dr. Windels touches on the principles you are confronted with on the business side of livestock production. Such things as buying and selling of livestock and keeping up and maintaining of equipment. This and other ideas connected with this field are taught in livestock management.

Engines

Engines class teaches students various facts on the care and repair of engines. It is one of the most interesting and helpful classes that can be taken in school. The class period is two hours long. The first hour is spent in the classroom where the students work mainly on the facts and figures concerning engines, while the remaining hour is the most interesting because it is spent repairing and overhauling engines. In their shop Mr. Diehl emphasizes the learning of the basic principles of mechanics. In tearing motars down the boys are instructed to do it with a purpose so that it can be put together efficiently.

A very beneficial part of the class demonstration is the circuit demonstration board, which is used to show parallel and series circuits as well as ammeter and voltmeter circuits.



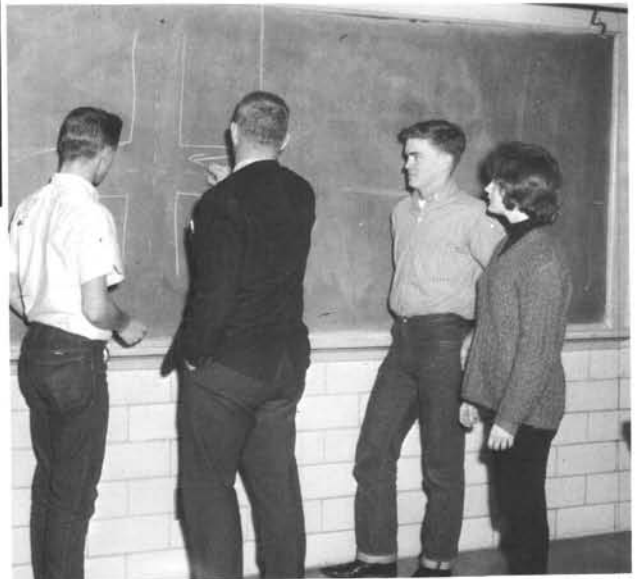

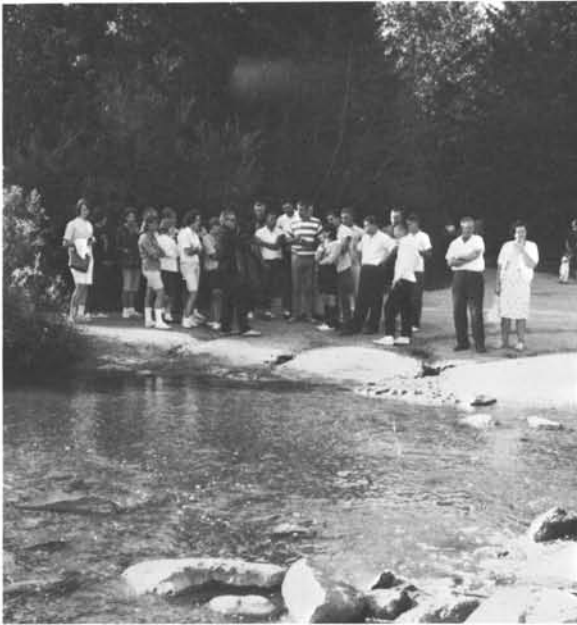

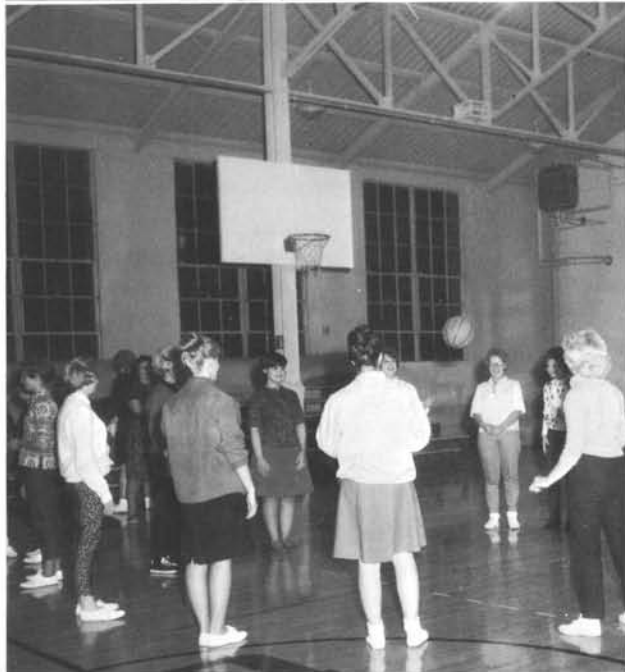

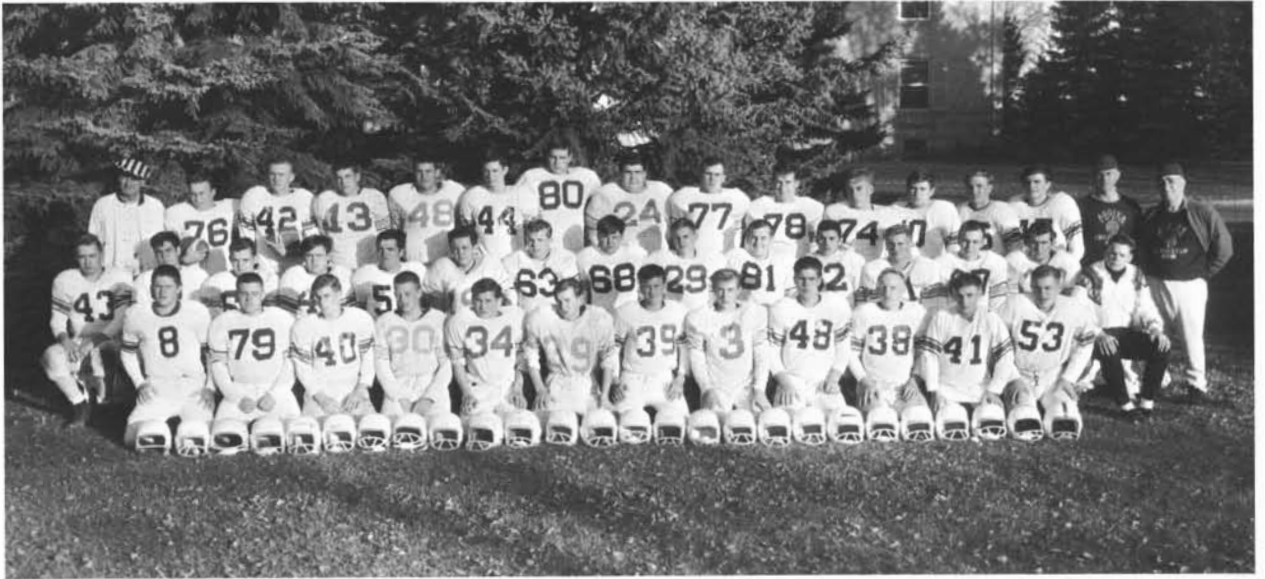
Aggie Inn

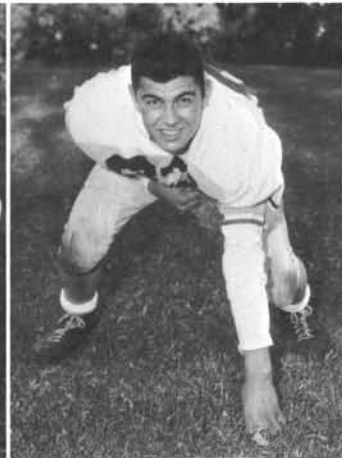

Basketball

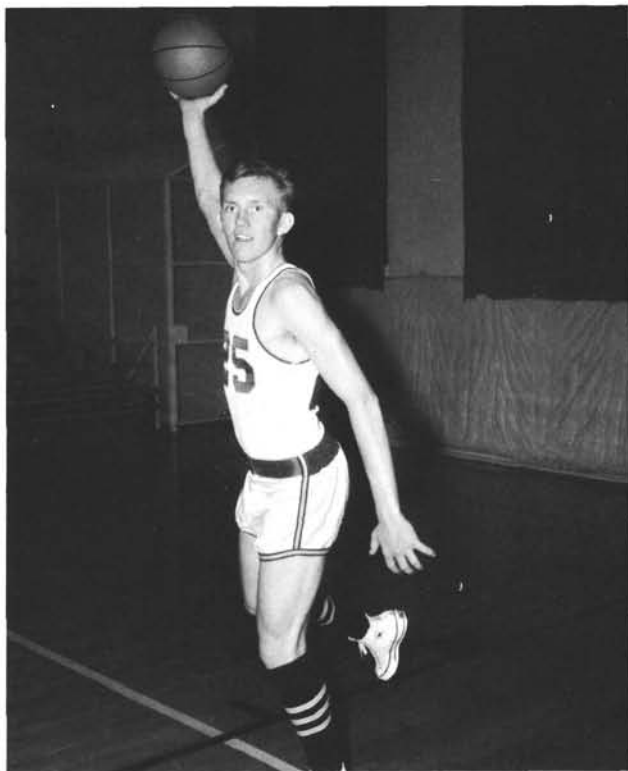

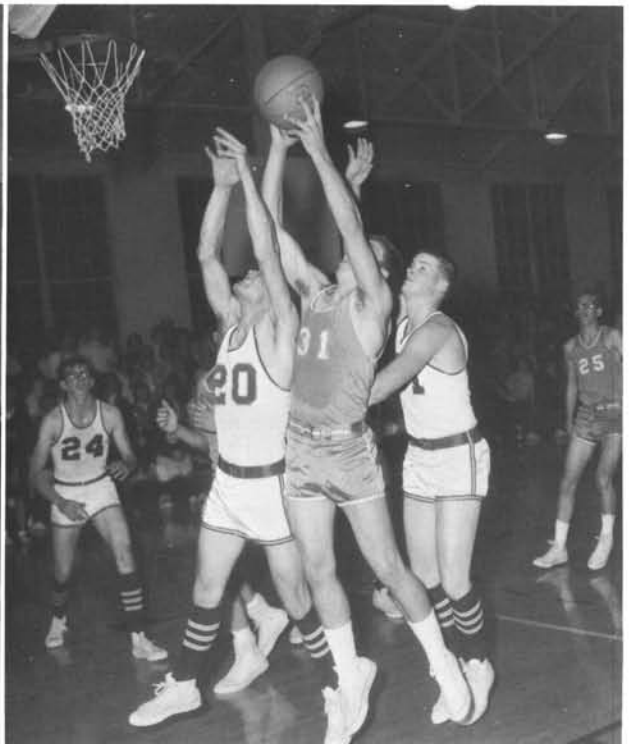
