Commencement Week March 24-28

Large Class To Graduate March 28

A class of one hundred and eleven Seniors will receive diplomas at the Commencement exercises to be held at the Northwest School on the evening of Thursday, March 28. The class of 1940 is only four less in number than the all-time record class of 115 in the year of 1939. In addition to the graduates in the three-year or regular course, sixty students will receive Advanced Certificates for the fourth year work, and nine students will receive business training certificates.

Professor P. E. Miller, director of the Agricultural Extension Division for the University of Minnesota, has been secured to give the Commencement address on Thursday evening. Director Miller, formerly superintendent of the West Central School of Agriculture at Morris, is a splendid speaker and thoroughly familiar with the ideals and objectives of the Schools of Agriculture. The Honorable F. J. Rogstad of Detroit Lakes, a member of the University Board of Regents, will bring greetings from that body. Superintendent T. M. McCall will present the diplomas and scholarship awards.

Commencement week activities begin on Sunday afternoon, March 24, with the reception to the graduating class given by Superintendent and Mrs. T. M. McCall. The baccalaureate sermon will be given by the Reverend Mr. Willard H. Reeves, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church, Crookston, on Sunday evening, March 24.

The Junior music recital will be held on the afternoon of March 25 with the Senior music recital on Wednesday evening, March 27.

Commencement Day activities begin with the Senior class program scheduled for three o'clock in the afternoon with Telfred Slettvedt, vice president of the Senior class, presiding. Music for the Class Day exercises will be provided by the school band, Senior boys' glee club, clarinet quartette, violin duet, and piano solo. Mathew Jansen will speak for the Class of 1940 and Alton Knutson, president of the Junior class, will speak for the class of 1941. The debaters from the Central School, by winning two debates, won the Conference triangular debate with the Northwest School ranking second.

The Northwest School has enjoyed a very successful debating season both in the number of students participating and in the progress made. The question of government ownership of railroads, which was debated this year, was one in which there was great interest.
