Mobile X-Ray Unit To Check Students at Northwest School

All students and employees, with positive Mantoux tests, have been given detailed chest X-rays at Sunnyrest Sanatorium. All students are now being registered for the X-ray chest pictures on November 25. The X-ray report will be mailed to the parents of the students in school.

Miss Anna M. Nelson, the Northwest School nurse, is in general charge of arrangements for the X-ray chest photographs. The Junior Chamber of Commerce of Crookston and the Polk county field nurse have made local arrangements for the mobile X-ray unit to visit the Northwest School.

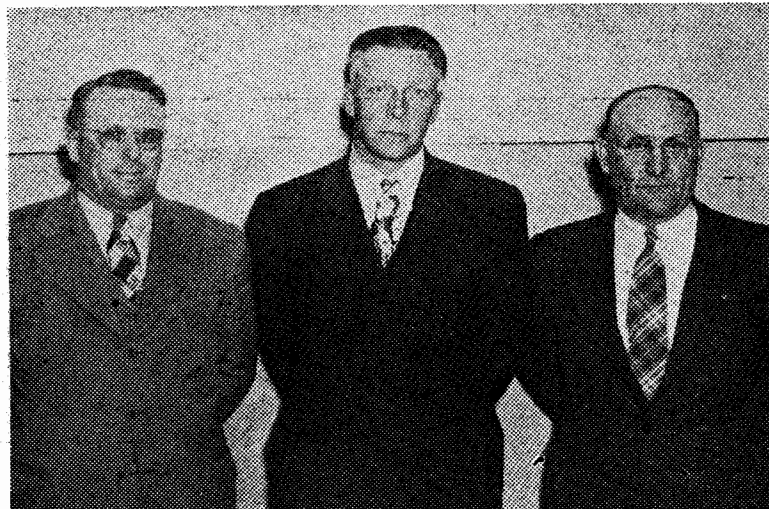
Hi-Y and Tri-Hi-Y Organizations Formed at Northwest School

The Northwest team played an unusually stiff schedule of seven games during the first six weeks of school, completing the season with four wins, two losses and one tie. The second game with the West Central team at Morris was cancelled due to inclement weather conditions.

October 4 found the Northwest Aggies losing in the final minutes of the ball game to a fighting Warroad team, 13 to 12. After losing this heartbreaker, the Aggies went on to win four straight games defeating Roseau High 32 to 0, Crookston Cathedral 6-0, Morris Aggies 23-13, and Frazee High 6-0. 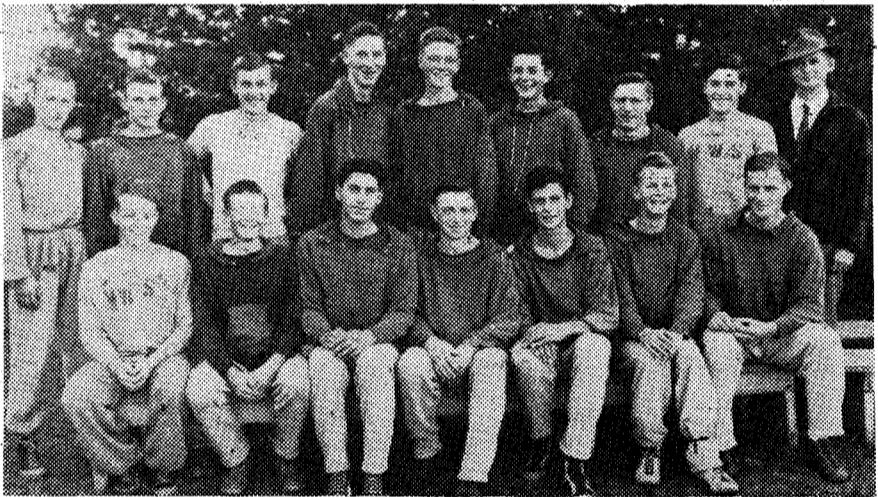

Noel Hanson, '36, To Do Research In Hawaii

Noel S. Hanson, assistant professor of agronomy and assistant extension service agronomist in the College of Agriculture, University of Nebraska, Lincoln, has been granted a three-month leave of absence, effective the first of the year, to go to the Hawaiian Islands where he has been invited by the Hawaiian Sugar Planters Association to study weed control problems. He will leave San Francisco about January 15 by plane for Hawaii. His studies there will include a survey of weed problems in the plantations of the principal sugar producing companies, some small test plot work and field demonstration work. The Association has asked Mr. Hanson to present latest testing results accomplished with such new chemical herbicides as 2-4,D and Ammonium Acetate. The work will be done under the direction of the Association's Experiment Station in cooperation with the various member firms.

Noel Hanson graduated from the Northwest School in 1936 and later completed his undergraduate and graduate work at the University of Minnesota.
