### 102 Receive Diplomas; Awards Presented

Commencement exercises for 102 graduating seniors were held at the Northwest School of Agriculture on Thursday afternoon, March 22.

Dr. A. A. Dowell of St. Paul, a former superintendent of the Northwest School and now director of resident instruction and assistant dean in the College of Agriculture, Forestry, and Home Economics at the University of Minnesota, gave the Commencement address. He spoke on the subject "The Farmer's Stake in Education." The Reverend Everett Hall, pastor of the Episcopal Church of Crookston, gave the invocation. 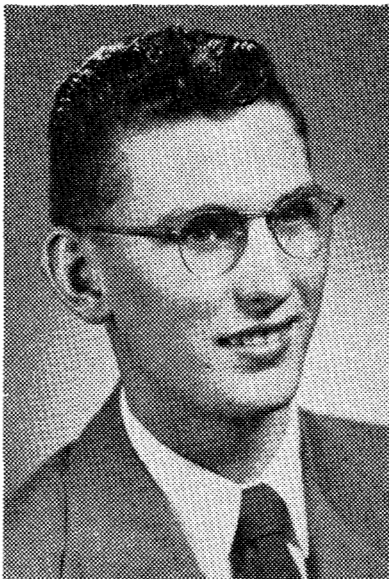

The names of local committee members for the reunion will be announced by the president of the Alumni Association in the April-May issue of the "Northwest School News."

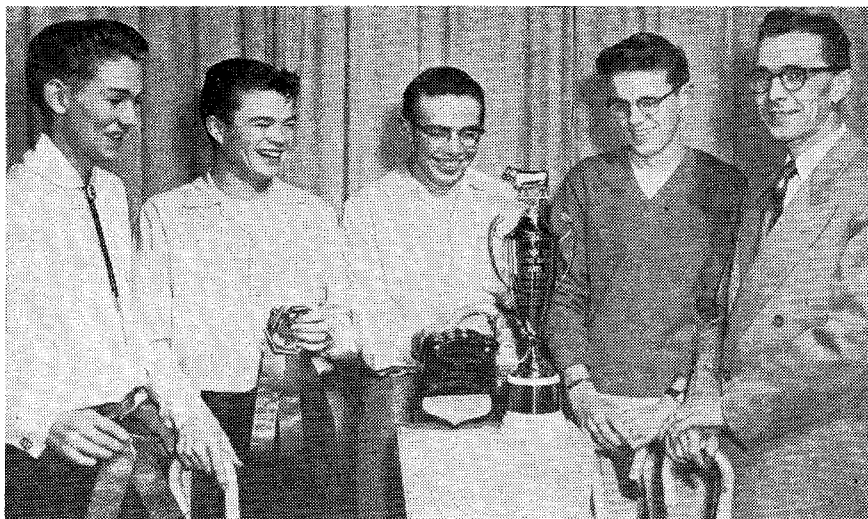

## Winter Shows Has 14,000 Attendance

The 1956 Red River Valley Winter Shows and Northwest School Farmers' Week, Crookston, held February 20-24, was a decided success, with a total attendance of some 14,000 persons. The shows had a gate admission of 11,265. Educational meetings, judging and demonstrations contests, concessioners and exhibitors brought the total attendance above the 14,000 mark.

In keeping with Winter Shows traditions, speakers of national and international fame highlighted the evening and daytime programs. A record crowd of more than 1,000 persons heard the Honorable Harold E. Stassen, former governor of Minnesota and now special assistant and disarmament adviser to President Eisenhower, speak to an evening audience. Large crowds also attended the other evening meetings to hear Captain Wm. Mott of the United States Navy, and George Wilkens, secretary of the Minneapolis Grain Exchange. Mr. Wilkens took the place of Dr. W. E. Peterson on the Wednesday evening program due to the illness of Dr. Peterson.

Some two hundred judging team members took part in the judging contests on Monday. The judging contests in livestock were for sub-collegiate, 4H club, and farmers' club teams. Crops and potato judging contests were held for subcollegiate and high school teams. Northwest School teams ranked first in livestock judging, second in crops judging, and third in potato judging.

Annual meetings of the Red River Valley Livestock Association and Red River Valley Development Association were held during Winter Shows week. T. M. McCall, president of both associations—because of his coming retirement—withdraw from the organizations. William Strickler of Euclid was elected president of the Livestock Association with H. D. Fausch and Diedrich Reimer of the Northwest School staff elected as vice-president and secretary, respectively. O. C. Soine, agronomist at the Northwest School, was elected to succeed Superintendent McCall as president of the Red River Valley Development Association.

Two very successful livestock sales were held on Thursday and Friday, February 23 and 24. In the bred ewes and bred gilt sale on Thursday, 61 hogs and 41 sheep brought a total of \$6,371, with the hogs averaging \$67.75 each for a total of \$4,135. At the cattle sale on Friday, 19 dairy animals and 55 beef animals sold for a total of \$17,965, with a Hereford bull from the Baker herd at Ada topping the sale at \$800. The bull was bought by the Ed Keene farm at Kennedy.

121 animals were entered in the Junior Livestock Futurity to set a
