The Duluth Arena has two spacious and modern press boxes, one for radio and TV broadcasts and the other for newspapers and other news media. However, reservations must be placed to secure space.

THE UNIVERSITY

UMD has launched its 26th year of service to the citizens of Minnesota with a record number of new academic programs.

A new two-year School of Medicine, dedicated to training family physicians for non metropolitan areas, opened in September with a class of 24 students. After spending two years at UMD, the students will transfer to the Twin Cities campus to complete their degree requirements.

The School of Social Work, which will graduate social planners for rural and regional positions, began operation August 28. Students will spend from one to two years, depending on their previous training and experience, earning a Master of Social Work degree. The first class has 23 students.

A two-year Dental Hygiene Program began classes in September with 16 students. The program seeks to meet the needs of state dentists for auxiliary personnel to handle such duties as examining and charting, taking x-rays, cleaning teeth, decay control treatment and patient education.

The complete range of courses for the new Master of Arts degree in speech pathology were first offered in the fall. The program provides graduates with a body of knowledge as it applies to the clinical setting, clinical practicum and research.

Also beginning this fall was the new Secondary Teacher Education Program (STEP) which gives students more experience in area public schools before graduation plus increased independent study. The five-phase, performance-based program represents a major change in teacher education at UMD, one which is designed to produce a more professional teacher.

Another new program is the two-year Associate in Vocational Teacher Education degree intended to produce teachers for vocational and technical schools. Students with previous skills experience or training can receive credit toward the degree and, if they choose, can continue study toward a four year degree.

Overall, UMD now offers 14 Master's degree programs, four baccalaureate degrees, and two associate degrees. Courses are offered for 50 major fields in 32 academic areas, 15 pre-professional programs and Air Force ROTC.

Arrangements have been made for student exchanges with both the College of St. Scholastica and the University of Wisconsin, Superior so that students can take advantage of unique offerings at neighboring campuses.

New thrusts in undergraduate programs include internships in urban studies, environmental research, law enforcement and allowing high school students to take UMD courses during their senior year. The new Indian Studies Program and the greater attention being given to all minority and disadvantaged students reflect new directions at UMD for service and education.

Students, themselves, are becoming increasingly involved both in the community and on campus with such programs as the Human Resources Bank for volunteer work in the city and region, the Student Tutorial Program, the free University, and the Students' College.

"During the next quarter century, UMD will continue to strive to provide the best possible education for the students of Northeastern Minnesota and the state as a whole," Provost Raymond W. Darland states. "It is our hope that we can continue to be responsive to the changing needs of both our students and the community so that the quality of our lives can be enhanced even further."

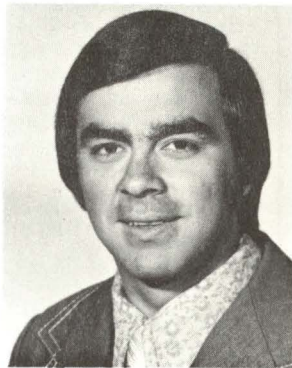
RALPH ROMANO

A university athletic director must expect to put in extra hours of work, tackle never-ending problems and keep his athletic "family" united.

UMD Athletic Director Ralph Romano, now in his fourth year behind the athletic director's desk, has put in extra hours, dealt with and solved problems, and kept his "family" united.

Romano, a native of Thunder Bay and a graduate of Duluth Central High School and UMD, supervises the administration of an 11-sport athletic program.

A former UMD goalie, Romano came into public light as the school's head hockey coach from 1959 to 1967.

Following graduation in 1956, Romano served in the Air Force as a navigator before returning to UMD in 1959 as sports publicity director as well as hockey coach. He soon added the responsibilities of athletic ticket manager to his busy schedule. In 1967 he became assistant athletic director to Lloyd Peterson. Peterson retired in 1969 opening the doors for Romano.

While coaching the Bulldog hockey squad, Romano fought for and won a UMD franchise into the Western Collegiate Hockey Association (WCHA), the most prestigious college hockey league in the nation. He is today one of the most respected officials in the WCHA.

Romano, in an effort to fulfill the wishes of the student-athletes, worked hard to establish baseball as a varsity sport last year.

The 11-sport varsity athletic program now includes football, cross country, swimming, wrestling, hockey, basketball, skiing, track, golf, tennis, and baseball.

Romano's "right hand man" in the athletic department is business manager and sports information director Bruce McLeod.

A graduate of UMD, McLeod captained the Bulldog hockey club in 1968-69. A three-year letterman, McLeod was one of the top scoring threats in the WCHA as a left winger.

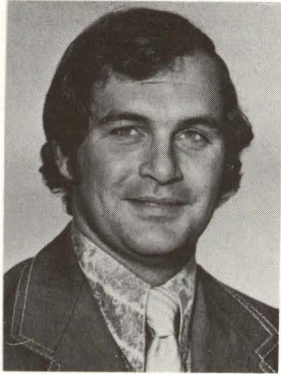
McLeod handles the department's finances and keeps constant correspondence with the press and opposing schools to keep UMD fans on top of all the action.

McLeod is assisted by Tom Knutson, a senior physical education major and a 1969 graduate of Duluth East.

Knutson, who has received considerable journalistic experience as a four-year summer intern on the Duluth-News-Tribune sports staff, supplies information for the press releases and brochures. He also assists McLeod with the press box operations at athletic events.

The secretarial chores in the athletic department are handled by Kathy Erickson and Pat Bjorkland.

HEAD COACH TERRY SHERCLIFFE



With his second year of head college coaching behind him, Terry Shercliffe looks enthusiastically ahead to improving on UMD's most successful season ever in the WCHA.

But Shercliffe has high aspirations for UMD hockey and he would like nothing better than to reward UMD's loyal supporters with a Western Collegiate Hockey Association (WCHA) championship and a berth in the NCAA tournament.

"The support given me and UMD hockey has just been terrific," Shercliffe said. "I know our players feel the same way and this year we're going to try and give back to the fans some of what they're already given us."

A native of Regina, Sask., Shercliffe was a three-year letterman for the Bulldogs' hockey team while attending UMD. He captained the squad in his senior year and was voted UMD's Outstanding Senior Athlete Award in 1964-65.

Shercliffe won a B.S. degree in physical education at UMD and following graduation, he became head hockey coach and physical education instructor at Osseo, where Shercliffe established himself as a hard-working, winning coach, former UMD coach and current Athletic Director Ralph Romano persuaded Shercliffe to return to his alma mater as assistant coach, a position he held for four years. He also became an instructor in UMD's physical education department.

It was while Shercliffe was serving as an assistant coach that his talent really came to light. He was placed in charge of recruiting and brought in the best talent from the United States and Canada ever assembled at UMD.

Shercliffe has made extra efforts to share the popularity of UMD hockey with as many areas as possible. He schedules preseason intrasquad games on the Iron Range each year and he arranges exhibition matches around the state and in Canada.

While recruiting keeps him busy during the off season, Shercliffe also is the featured speaker at countless post-season banquets and get togethers, as he tries to communicate with as many young hockey players as possible during such engagements.

In addition to his never-ending job of teaching and coaching, Shercliffe saves time for raising three sons: Ryan, Bryce and Scott. Shercliffe is married to the former Wilma Horen, a UMD graduate.

BRUCE ROGERS

One of the unsung heroes of any team is the assistant coach, who handles as many responsibilities as anybody connected with the team but receives little recognition. Bruce Rogers, a former UMD hockey player himself, is in his third season as the Bulldog's assistant, and Coach Shercliffe acclaims Rogers as just a tremendous help. "He's done a terrific job with the junior-varsity program and his assistance with varsity players and in recruiting has been a great relief for me." A native of Frenchman, Butte, Sask., Rogers lettered for UMD as a right wing. Before he came to UMD in 1967, Bruce played Junior A hockey with the Weyburn Red Wings. He graduated from UMD in June of 1971 and has a degree in geography. He and his wife Mary have established their home in Duluth.

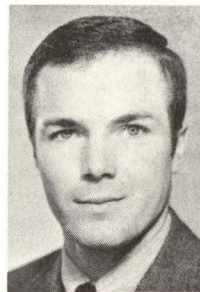
DON ROACH

While most of the staff in the athletic program have an "in-season" and an "off-season", UMD trainer Don Roach works the year round. His job as he defines it is to "prevent as many injuries as possible and to treat those injuries that do come about. People don't realize that prevention of injury is just as important--if not more important--in athletic training as the treatment of injury." Roach is a native of Los Altos, Calif. He received his B.A. degree from San Jose State and taught general science and physical education in California before joining an American Community School in Greece where he was a physical education instructor and a coach. Two years later Roach returned to the United States and obtained his master's degree in athletic training at Indiana before coming to UMD in 1970. Roach also trains student assistants, and this year's team includes Bruce Hall and Mark Nierengarten, both physical education majors.

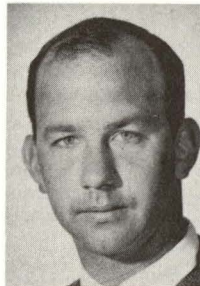
CLARENCE HILLMAN

SEASON OUTLOOK

Terry Shercliffe likes to refer to his 1972-73 edition of the UMD hockey Bulldogs as the "new team."

The Bulldogs indeed are a "new team" in the sense that they will lack the "star" they have had in past years and will rely on a team contribution to manufacture victories this year.

"It seems like we've always had a big gun to turn to," Shercliffe said, "but that's not the case this year. We don't have any individual stars as such, but rather a bunch of good hockey players."

"Now that's not saying we're not going to be a good hockey team because we don't have an individual star. In fact, I'd rather have it this way rather than constantly rely on one or two men to carry the brunt of the attack."

Shercliffe loses five of his top ten scorers from last season through graduation. Included among the group are Walt Ledingham, Cam Fryer, Alan Young, Greg Hubick and David Roy.

Nonetheless, Shercliffe has a formidable list of lettermen returning who he hopes will carry the Freshmen through the early part of the season while the newcomers get the valuable experience they need.

One of the Bulldog's strongest positions should be in the nets, where Jerome Mrazek, last year's co-recipient of the

team's Most Valuable Player Award, and sophomore Ken Turko are back.

"Jerome played well for us last year and Ken did get to play a few games, which I'm sure has boosted his confidence for this year," Shercliffe said. "I'm not really in favor of a platooning system, but until one can clearly indicate to me that he deserves to start all the time, I suspect both goalies will play."

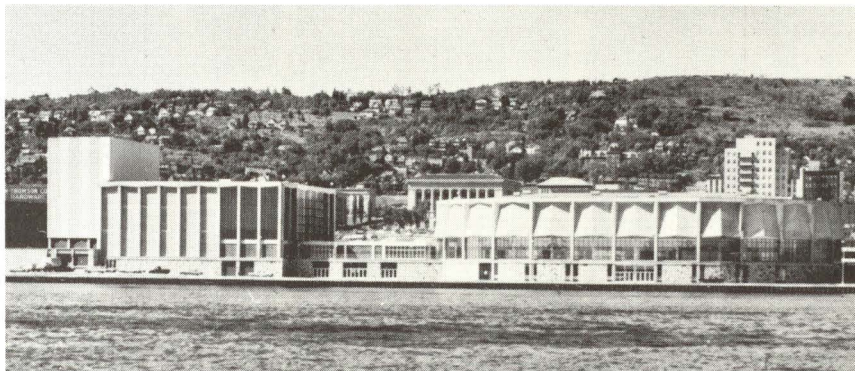
The Bulldogs have three veteran defenseman returning to the lineup in Ernie Campe, Gord McDonald and Dennis Fearing. Pokey Trachsel, who spearheaded last year's blueline crew, will be shifted to center.

"I feel confident that Ernie, Gord and Dennis can do the job for us," Shercliffe said in explaining his transferring Trachsel to center, "and I think Pokey's aggressive play will add to our offensive attack."

"We're going to need some help from freshmen Dave Langevin, Ed O'Brien and Jim Knapp to give us a respectable defensive record."

While most of the losses from last year's team crippled the offense, Shercliffe feels those returning combined with the rookies will be able to score "against anybody in this league."

DULUTH ARENA-AUDITORIUM



HOME OF THE BULLDOGS

The home of the UMD Bulldogs is Duluth's Arena Auditorium built in 1966 at a cost of 6.5 million dollars. The multi-purpose building consists of an arena, auditorium, exhibition hall and seven meeting rooms.

A 2,000 car parking lot paved, lighted and completely maintained and guarded year round is the same level as the central lobby area and provides easy access to every portion of the complex.

The hockey arena seats 5,700 people and is well lit by 174,000 watts of cross lighting from catwalks and eight trouper spotlights in baskets all controlled from the technician's con-

sole. Every seat in the building has a clear, unobstructed view of the ice surface. A ventilating system capable of changing the air every eight minutes and air conditioning provide for excellent spectator comfort. There are two spacious press boxes to accommodate radio, television and the press media. A four-sided \$25,000 scoreboard above center ice tells the story of the game to every fan.

There are four dressing rooms under the stands that can be made into two huge rooms which is done at UMD hockey games.

The structure has been acclaimed as one of the finest facilities of its kind in the country.

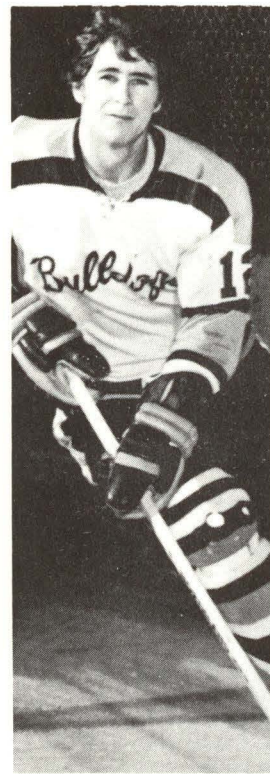

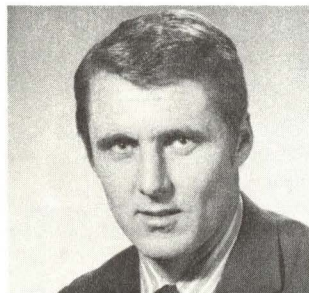

Bothered by a change in coaching early last year, the Gophers, who went to the NCAA tournament two years ago, tumbled to last place last season. However, Paul Giel added another energetic coach to his staff with the selection of Herb Brooks, who was a Gopher assistant coach under Glen Sonmor, to take over the reigns. Brooks will have to rebuild this year and he has a fine nucleus to center his squad around. International Falls' Dean Blais heads the returning lettermen list. The Gophers only averaged 3.1 goals per game last season and its 97 goals scored was by far the lowest in the league. Coach Brooks' main duty will be to revitalize the offense.

Although the Tigers failed to make the WCHA playoffs last season when they split the final series of the year with the Bulldogs, Colorado College showed signs of strengthening its program. Defense is the key to the Tigers' success this year, and former Duluth East player Jim Stebe will play a significant role in that defense. The Tigers have two veterans--Doug Schum and Dan Griffin--in the nets.
