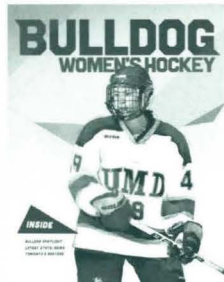

The Bulldogs have won more NCAA national championships than any other team in the history of NCAA Division I women's hockey. UMD has won five in the past 13 seasons, including the only three-peat in NCAA history. The Bulldogs most recent trophy came in 2010, a 3-2 triple-overtime thriller over Cornell at Ridder Arena on March 21, 2010. UMD also won two titles in Duluth (2008, 2003) and the first two NCAA crowns in 2002 and 2001.

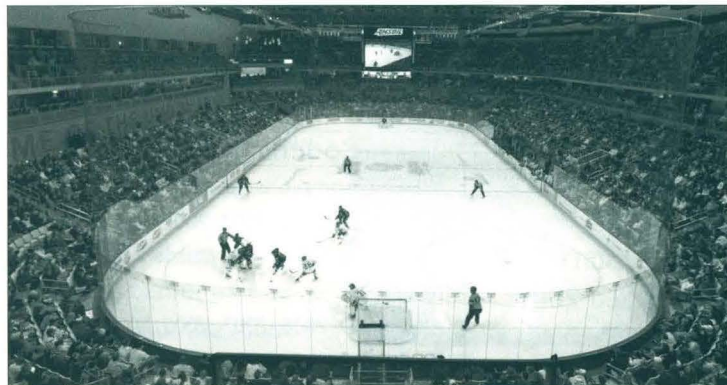

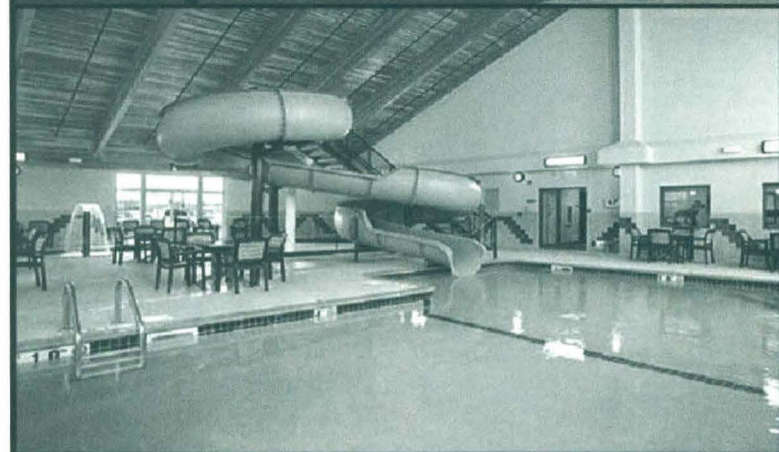
The level of fan comfort has taken on new heights inside AMSOIL Arena. From simple things like seat width and leg room to necessities like additional restroom facilities, fan comfort and convenience will be the hallmarks of the Bulldogs new home. Designers took cues from other successful and popular sports facilities, and incorporated fan-friendly touches like an open concourse around much of the lower seating bowl, meaning that a trip to one of the many concession stands will not mean missing any of the on-ice action. And, if they do, there is a \$1 million, 8' x 14' matrix scoreboard hung above center ice which will provide in-game replays, videos and graphics in 10-millimeter LED display.

AMSOIL Arena is also equipped with something the DECC never had – suites, some 15 in all offering private food and beverage service along with high definition monitors and seating for 12. In addition, the Bulldog Club Lounge, located on the main level adjacent to one of the finest and most spacious press boxes in college hockey, serves as a gathering space for UMD athletic donors and supporters. It is there that patrons can belly up to a bar made of Iron Range taconite and look up at a wall of cracked glass made to resemble Lake Superior's frozen surface. At the other end of the hallway is the Hall of Fame Suite, holds up to 34 fans and can be rented on a per-event basis.

Outside, a new skywalk link connects the extended parking ramp to AMSOIL Arena, leading spectators into what is known as the "Ice Cube". With soft mood lighting and an aquatic-themed terrazzo floor, the second-level commons area evokes images of Lake Superior. Traveling from one level to another you can see the downtown skyline in one direction and the Duluth harbor in the other.

Although AMSOIL Arena will be used for conventions, concerts (with seating for nearly 9,000) and other sporting events, it's first and foremost the home of UMD hockey. This is readily apparent by the generous splashes of maroon and gold and the frequent use of the Bulldog logo throughout the facility. A large student bench seat section on the south end of the rink (where UMD attacks twice) should give the Bulldogs that much more of a home-ice advantage.

On the lower level, out of sight for most visitors, but on full display for current and potential future Bulldogs, are some of the real "goodies". Those include a state-of-the-art hockey offices and facilities, a weight room and athletic training center, player's lounges, two large hydro therapy pools (one of which features a treadmill in its base) and other amenities that rival any other school in the nation. The hallways throughout the Bulldog locker room areas are covered with historical photos and artwork, conveying the storied history of both the men's and women's programs.

## SHANNON MILLER

HEAD COACH



No coach in NCAA women's hockey history has had more success in the NCAA Frozen Four than UMD head coach Shannon Miller, now set to enter her 14th season behind the Bulldog bench in 2012-13

Miller has an NCAA-best eleven Frozen Four wins to accompany her NCAA-record five national titles. Her coaching portfolio also boasts an NCAA-high of 15 tournament wins.

As the only head coach UMD has ever employed, Miller has amassed an impressive overall record of 334-101-35 and has led the Bulldogs to 10 NCAA playoff appearances and five NCAA Championship titles, including three straight (2001, 2002 and 2003). She has led UMD into seven NCAA Frozen Four berths, including two NCAA Championship in a three year span (2008 and 2010). No other hockey program in the country has won five titles, let alone three consecutive NCAA trophies.

Aside from her record haul of NCAA titles, Miller reached her 250th career win faster than any other head coach in NCAA



Division I history on Jan. 23, 2009. As the third winningest coach ever in Division I women's hockey, Miller is just one of two NCAA Division I coaches ever to have collected 200 wins after just eight seasons behind the bench. Miller is also just the fourth head coach ever to win 250 games while remaining at just one NCAA Division I program.

For her efforts, Miller was named the 2000 and 2003 Western Collegiate Hockey Association Coach of the Year and the 2003 American Hockey Coaches Association (AHCA) Women's Division I Coach of the Year. In addition to the incredible NCAA runs, her Bulldogs have captured four WCHA regular season titles (2000, 2003, 2008, 2010) and five WCHA playoff titles (2000, 2001, 2003, 2008, 2010).

During Miller's time at the Bulldog helm, UMD has produced 12 first-team All-Americans, 14 Patty Kazmaier Award Finalists, four WCHA Players of the Year, three WCHA Student-Athletes of the year and one CoSIDA Academic All-American. Since Miller's arrival at UMD, 23 current and former Bulldogs have

represented their respective countries in the Olympics.

Not only has Miller enjoyed incredible success with the Bulldogs, but she also had tremendous success coaching on the international stage with Team Canada.

Miller coached Canada to a silver medal at the 1998 Winter Olympics and stood out as the first and youngest female head coach of any Olympic hockey team. She also coached Canada to three consecutive gold medals at the Women's World Ice Hockey Championships (1991, 1994 and 1997) and to gold medal finishes at both the 1995 and 1996 Pacific Rim Championships. She also struck gold in the Three Nations Cup Tournament with the Alberta Women's Hockey Team (18 and under) in 1989 and two years later was part of a







club which captured a gold medal in the first-ever hockey competition for women in the Canada Winter Games.

Miller started her coaching career as an assistant with the Alberta Women's Hockey Team (18 and under) in 1989 and two years later was part of a club which captured a gold medal in the first-ever hockey competition for women in the Canada Winter Games.

Before leaving Canada, Miller was given the prestigious Canadian Advancement of Women in Sport Award for all of her successes for women's hockey in Canada.

In 1985, Miller graduated from the University of Saskatchewan with a bachelor's degree in physical education and received her Masters of



Education degree from UMD in 2005.

Prior to being hired by the Olympic Oval in Calgary to build the first-ever international high-performance training program for women's hockey, Miller was a police officer in Calgary from 1988-1996.

In addition to her duties at UMD, Miller chairs the Ethics Committee for US women's college hockey, and also serves on the NCAA Division 1 Championships Committee. She is one of only two coaches in the entire country on the committee.

In June of 2011, Miller was named the coaching mentor for the Russian Senior National Team in preparation for the 2014 Winter Olympics in Sochi, Russia. During the program term (from July 1, 2011 till the end of January 2014), Miller will communicate every 2-3 weeks between the coach, mentors and ambassadors and the coaches of both the senior and under-18 national programs.

Miller -- who became a United States citizen on May 2, 2012 -- also operates hockey schools across North America and is a professional speaker at local, national and international events.

Laura Schuler, who has spent the last four years as a coach with Team Canada, will begin season number five behind the bench as a Bulldog assistant coach in 2012-2013.

Schuler was named an assistant coach for Canada's U-18 squad for the 2012-13 World Championship season after guiding Canada's U-22 Team as a head coach in 2012 Meco Cup. Canada's senior national team also selected Schuler as an assistant coach for the 2010 Four Nations Cup, as well as a camp coach for the 2010 Senior National Development Camp.

A native of Scarborough, Ontario, Schuler spent four seasons at the helm of Northeastern University, rebuilding the program and elevating the team's standing two places in the league in her last three seasons. Prior to landing back at her alma mater Northeastern, Schuler spent three years building a program at UMass Boston and was named the ECAC East Coach of the Year after leading the Beacons to a 13-12-1 record and an ECAC semifinal appearance in 2003-04.

No stranger to the international ice sheet as a player, Schuler spent 11 seasons suiting up for the Canadian national team. She helped Miller claim a silver medal for Canada in 1998 in the first-ever Olympic women's ice hockey competition in Nagano, Japan. During her tenure with Team Canada as a player, she also won World Championship titles in 1990, 1992 and 1997.

A recent inductee into the Northeastern University Hall of Fame (2004) for her achievements in the sport of hockey, Schuler helped the Huskies to a 74-24-5 record in four seasons, including four playoff berths. Over her collegiate career, she netted 64 goals and dished 57 assists for a total of 121 points.

Schuler graduated in 1994 from Northeastern after earning a bachelor's degree in Cardiovascular Health and Exercise.

Steve Macdonald will begin his second season as an assistant coach with the Bulldogs in 2012-13.

Macdonald is currently in Hockey Canada's national team coaching pool and attended Hockey Canada's August selection camp in Toronto, Ontario as an assistant coach with the National U-18 program. He was named to the coaching staff of the Canadian National U-18 team that competed against the USA in Lake Placid in a three game exhibition series in the fall of 2011 and was also involved at Hockey Canada's strength and conditioning camps in 2008. Prior to serving as the Balmoral Hall School (Winnipeg, Manitoba) Director of Hockey and Varsity Prep head coach, Macdonald was an associate coach and Athletic Specialist at Balmoral for three years. During the 2010-11 season, Macdonald led Balmoral to a bronze medal finish in the elite Junior Women's Hockey League (JWHL), with an overall record of 31-17-9.

The 33-year old Macdonald has coached Manitoba's U-18 provincial team and won a bronze medal in 2008 at the Canadian U-18 Nationals 2008. An active coach mentor in Manitoba, Macdonald recently attended National Coach Mentorship Program national seminar and has been involved with the Hockey Manitoba Female program of excellence since 2003. His coaching education includes High Performance I Seminar, Theory levels I, II and III in the National Coach Certification Program (NCCP), and the National Coach Mentorship Program (NCMP).

Macdonald received his Bachelor of Arts from the University of Winnipeg in 2005 with a double major in Kinesiology & Applied Health and Psychology. He then attended the University of Ottawa for his pre-masters in Sport Psychology before returning home to complete his masters at the University of Manitoba, specializing in Coach Education. He is actively involved in the field of Sport Psychology and has worked as a Sport Psych consultant in a variety of sports, including with athletes competing at the Canada Games, specializing in athlete development and performance enhancement.

Former UMD goaltender Brant Nicklin will begin his fourth-full year working with the Bulldog netminders in 2012-13.

Nicklin, who has been an assistant coach at The College of Saint Scholastica for seven years, was a four-year starter with a then NCAA-record 76 consecutive starts for the Bulldogs from 1996-00. He played 137 games between the pipes for UMD and still ranks third all-time for wins (55), second for saves (3,880) and third for career saves percentage (.895). An owner of four UMD records, including most consecutive starts and games played (76), most shutouts in a career (eight) and most shutouts in a season (five), Nicklin still has the WCHA's record for consecutive league starts (80). Nicklin was also bestowed The Golden Wolfe Award given to the Most Inspirational Player as voted by his Bulldog teammates in 1999-00.

The WCHA's Rookie of the Year in 1996-97, Nicklin signed a free agent contract with the Pittsburgh Penguins and played in two training camps with the team, followed by four years of pro hockey in the AHL, ECHL, UHL, and CHL.

Nicklin currently lives in Superior, Wis., with wife Kelly and two children.

Blake Palmer will be the Bulldogs strength and conditioning coach and equipment manager for a third season in 2012-13.

Prior to landing at UMD, Palmer spent three years handling that same role with the United States Hockey League's Waterloo Blackhawks.

While working in Waterloo (where he doubled for two seasons as the team's equipment manager), Palmer helped over 50 athletes realize their dream of playing NCAA I hockey and saw nine get selected in the National Hockey League draft. He also spent two years as a strength & conditioning coach for the XL Sports Acceleration Program (where he had the opportunity to train current San Jose Shark Joe Pavelski).

His resume also includes a stint as a graduate assistant strength and conditioning coach at the University of Northern Iowa.

A native of Northwood, Iowa, Palmer earned both his bachelor's degree in exercise science (2006) and his Master's Degree in exercise physiology (2008) from Northern Iowa. He resides in Superior with his dog Maverick.

Straining against the incessant tug of gravity, you make your way up the steep cobblestone sidewalks of the bustling downtown. The air is filled with the honking horns of cars, cabs and busses. Mingling with the sea air is the wafting scent of freshly baked bread coming from one of the ethnic grocery stores, restaurants, and bakeries in the tightly packed neighborhood. You're walking the streets of San Francisco, right? No, it's Duluth.

The boardwalk is simply alive today. Down the street from the casino, and in front of hundreds of waterfront hotel rooms, there is every mixture of people enjoying the gentle breeze off the water. Tourists mingle with businessmen on their lunch break, and in-line skaters zoom past a mime entertaining the kids as couples check out the galleries and coffeehouses that line the sun-splashed strip. Is it Atlantic City, Miami Beach, or Santa Monica? No, it's Duluth.

## A MEETING PLACE

Centuries before the first Native Americans pitched their teepees and launched their primitive canoes in the waters of the massive lake they called "Gitchee Gummee," there were countless meetings in the place that would come to be known as Duluth. The crashing waves of Lake Superior came here to meet the churning waters of the St. Louis River.

Those meetings of natural forces formed a 10-mile long strand of sand where, on warm summer days, you will find thousands of modern-day Twin Ports visitors shedding the wraps of winter and meeting the rays of the sun.

And that stretch of beach, now known as Park Point, provided a huge natural harbor where everything from tiny canoes to immense ocean-going ships, can find shelter from the wind and waves of the great lake. Around this natural harbor where the lake met the river, cities grew.

Today, Duluth and its Twin Ports partner, Superior, Wis., are viewed as meeting places more than ever.

It is here that small-town truckers in jeans and feed caps haul loads of grain down to the giant elevators next to the docks. More than 1,000 miles from the salt waters of the nearest ocean, they meet sea captains from ports from every corner of the globe who will haul that wheat, corn, and barley east through the Great Lakes and the St. Lawrence Seaway, then across the Atlantic Ocean to foreign ports.

Mile-long trains loaded with iron ore and taconite pellets from the mines of Minnesota's Iron Range come to Duluth to fill ships (commonly called lakers) that will haul their goods to the steel mills of Indiana, Ohio, and Pennsylvania. There, the ore will be used to make the structural steel for buildings of the future and for the automobile frames being designed for use in the new century.

A vibrant tourism industry brings in countless visitors from throughout the Midwest to shop, eat, relax, and be entertained by the endless variety of things to see and do in and around the

Twin Ports. Goods are for sale in every variety, from tiny galleries where local artisans display seagull figurines carved from the driftwood found along the shore of Lake Superior, to sleek modern shopping malls filled with the latest designer fashions.

Diners choose from options like grabbing a quick burger and a soda on their way to the game, or sitting down to hot coffee, a bowl of steaming chowder and warm apple pie, or savoring prime rib and fine wine at a linen-covered table in a four-star restaurant.

For active visitors, Duluth and the surrounding area offer every kind of outdoor recreation imaginable, from hiking, kayaking, sailing, and biking along the rugged shore of the lake, to first-class downhill and cross-country skiing, snowmobiling, and dog-sledding that takes advantage of the area's common lake-effect snows to provide the finest winter recreation conditions between the Adirondacks and the Rockies.

Dozens of open spaces in and around the city are complemented by a lakewalk that stretches for miles from Canal Park up the North Shore, passing countless parks, monuments, and places to sit and ponder the inland ocean, and providing ample outdoor opportunities for walkers, bikers, skaters, or those who favor a horse-drawn carriage ride. No wonder *Outdoor Magazine* recently listed Duluth as one of the top 20 places to live in the U.S.

And, for those who like to take their entertainment sitting down, Duluth, quite

literally, offers something for all interests. Broadway entertainment and dozens of movie screens bring the stars of the East and West Coasts to the Twin Ports. National recording artists perform by the shore of the lake during concerts, including the region's annual Bayfest Blues Festival. For the sports fan, Duluth is home to a Northwoods Baseball League franchise, one of the nation's most prominent marathons each summer, a major dog sled race each winter, and top-level intercollegiate athletic competition in the form of the

16 teams who wear the maroon and gold of the University of Minnesota Duluth Bulldogs.

When it comes to staying up to date on what's happening around town, around the region, and around the globe, Duluthians enjoy four local television stations, several print media outlets and more radio stations per capita (in every available format) than nearly any community in the nation. Duluth's television and radio stations – which, in terms of geographic reach, are located in one of the country's largest markets – cover news, sports, and weather in the Twin Ports, northern Minnesota and northwestern Wisconsin.

**A GREAT UNIVERSITY ON A GREAT LAKE**

For more than 100 years, the modest teacher's college that has grown and evolved into the University of Minnesota Duluth has been offering students of all ages and interests a window into the opportunities that come with knowledge.

The University of Minnesota system (which has campuses in Minneapolis, St. Paul, Morris, Rochester and Crookston, as well as Duluth) was started by an act of the Territorial Legislature

in 1851, seven years before Minnesota achieved statehood. It took another 44 years before public higher education came to the north woods with the opening of the Duluth Normal School in 1895. Renamed Duluth State Teacher's College in 1921, the school became a coordinate campus of the University of Minnesota in 1947.

The modern-day UMD has a campus community of nearly 12,000 students pursuing 13 bachelor's degrees in 74 majors, graduate programs in 24 different fields, and three Ph.D. programs.

In addition, UMD offers a College of Pharmacy program and a two-year program at the School of Medicine through the Minnesota-Twin Cities campus. A university with a unique combination of quality and value, UMD consistently ranks among the top Midwestern, regional universities in *U.S. News & World Report's* "America's Best Colleges" issue.

Complemented by a staff of about 2,000 employees, including 464 full-time and another 138 part-time faculty, UMD draws students who come to Duluth and call it their home during their college years and beyond. Unlike the sprawling commuter schools of the Midwest's



metropolitan areas, where parking spaces outnumber library periodicals, UMD is a community where close to a quarter of the undergraduate population resides in the many on-campus housing options or in the historic neighborhoods surrounding the campus.

Comprising some 50 buildings (all constructed since 1948) and set on 244 acres of residential land with scenic views of Lake Superior, the

UMD campus is a city unto itself, with housing, dining facilities, a theater, a planetarium, research laboratories, athletic venues, parks, wilderness areas, radio and television studios, a newspaper, the latest computer technology, medical facilities, shopping, entertainment, and a state-of-the-art library which merges the print and digital worlds, providing students with the region's most advanced gateway to information. created an economy and several communities, transportation is in abundant supply.

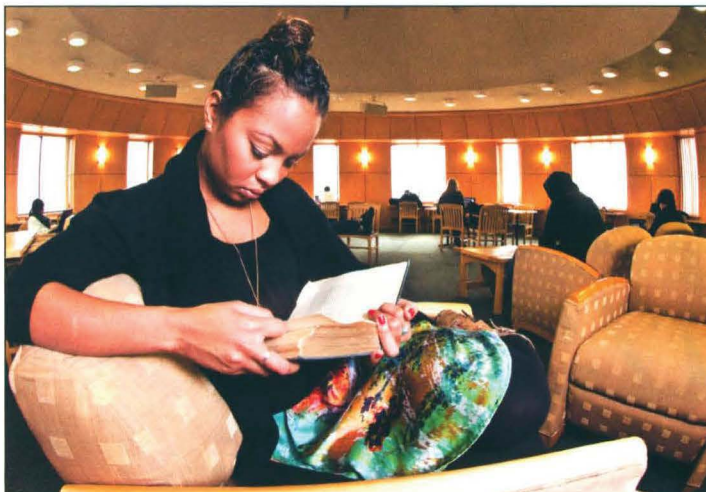

# THIS IS BULLDOG COUNTRY

Now in its 82nd year of operation, the University of Minnesota Duluth Department of Intercollegiate Athletics continues to maintain one of the most competitive and well-balanced sports programs of its size in the country.

Fourteen of UMD's 16 teams – baseball, men's and women's basketball, men's and women's cross country, football, women's soccer, softball, women's tennis, men's and women's indoor and outdoor track and field, and volleyball – are members of the NCAA Division II Northern Sun Intercollegiate Conference. The UMD men's and women's ice hockey programs, meanwhile, are aligned with the Western Collegiate Hockey Association, a NCAA Division I circuit. This year marks the Bulldog men's final go-around in the WCHA after a 47-season run, as they will join the new eight-team National Collegiate Hockey Conference in 2013-14.



Middle distance runner Lexi Williams joined an elite circle of UMD individual national champions last May.

A pair of senior megastars – Jack Connolly and Lexi Williams – highlighted a prosperous 2011-12 UMD athletic season. In April, Connolly, a three-time All-American, capped off the most decorated career in the 68-year history of Bulldog hockey by winning the Hobey Baker Memorial Award as the most outstanding player in the country. Williams captured the 800-meter run crown at the NCAA Division II Outdoor Track

and Field Championships, becoming, in the process, the school's fifth national individual titleholder in any sport.

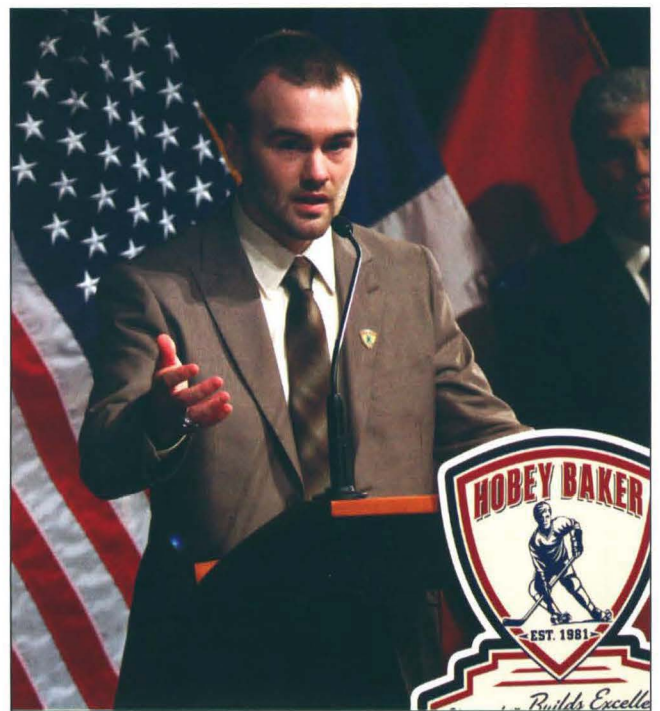
Connolly, winner of the 2011-12 Lowe's Senior CLASS Award for Division I men's ice hockey, and Williams were among the one dozen Bulldogs who attained All-American status of some kind in their respective sports one year ago. That

group also included the likes of J.T. Brown (hockey), Cody Eich (football), Cory Flesch (football), Garth Heikkinen (football), Rob Huberty (football), Eleena Iisakka (volleyball), Tyra Kerr (softball), Kate Lange (volleyball), David Nadeau (football) and Derrick Zappa (football). In addition, the 2011-12 season marked the end of the line collegiately for Morgan Place, who, since her arrival on the UMD campus in 2008, secured All-American recognition a school-record eight times (three in cross country, four in indoor track and one in outdoor track) while qualifying for 11 of a possible 12 NCAA II national meets.

Nationally speaking, the Bulldogs placed 45th in the

2011-12 NCAA II Learfield Directors' Cup all-sports standings. UMD racked up 331 points, a mark bettered by only three other NSIC colleagues, as points were awarded based on each institution's national finish in up to 14 sports. Three years ago, UMD wound up 18th (an all-time high) in that same competition and was 27th in 2010-11. The Bulldogs qualified for 2011-12 NCAA post-season competition in women's basketball, women's cross country, men's hockey (where it advanced to the national quarterfinals after winning it all the previous year), softball, women's outdoor track, and volleyball (for a program-best 10th straight year).

The man in charge of supervising Bulldog sports is Bob Nielson, who officially took over as UMD's Director of Intercollegiate Athletics on December 1, 2003. Nielson also doubles as UMD's head football coach, a position he held from 1999-2003 before returning to the sidelines four years ago. Since that time he and his UMD charges have gone a remarkable 52-5 while capturing two NCAA II championships, four straight NSIC championships and never failing to crack the top 20 in any major Division II weekly poll.

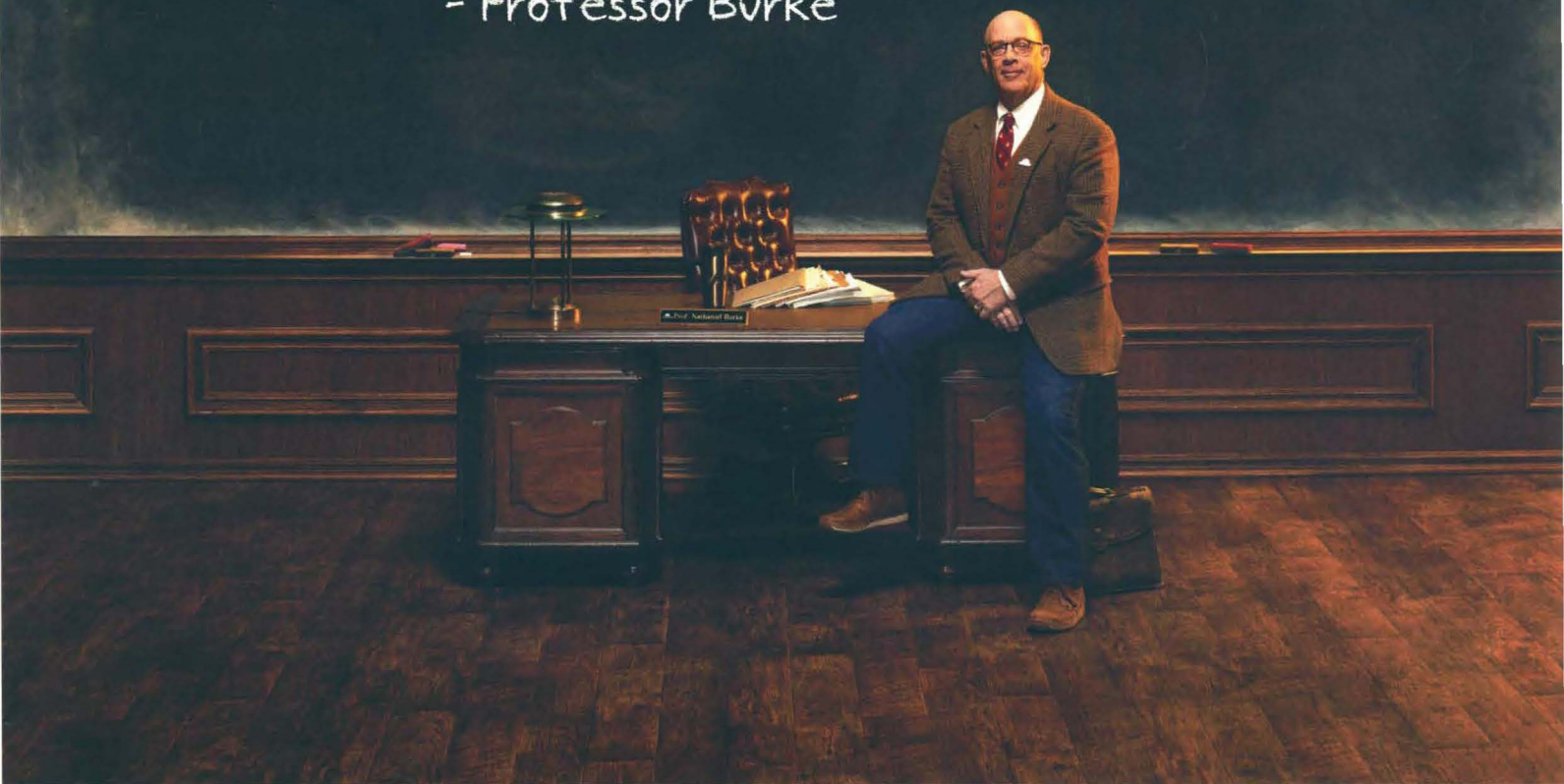

# The Expectations of Jamie Kenyon

It was virtually impossible to miss **Jamie Kenyon** last weekend in UMD's series against St. Cloud State. Paired with senior **Jessica Wong** and sophomore **Jenna McParland**, Kenyon seemed to literally appear in every scrum around the net. Never mind that on Saturday, Kenyon, with two goals and plenty more near misses with eight shots, was experiencing flu-like symptoms after many of her shifts. Kenyon still skated and crashed the net like her life depended on it, and on Sunday, added two more goals on four shots. Some players just get sick. Jamie Kenyon gets sick and scores WCHA Offensive Player of the Week honors.

The "A" on her jersey this season is no accident. While the product of Sparta, Wisc. may not be the most vocal player on the team, the junior forward is without question one of its heralded leaders, quietly going about her business in a way that makes what she does matter to the team.

"First, I am honored to be able to be an assistant captain and it's great to know that the coaches see me as a leader," said Kenyon earlier in the week. "I would consider myself a leader, but one more by example. Growing up I was a captain on most of my hockey teams and also for my volleyball and soccer teams in high school. I think that it is really important for not only our captains but everyone at certain times to step up since we are so young. I think I've always been looked at for my hard work ethic and led in that way. But in the last year, I feel I've needed to step up a little vocally, become more outgoing and reach out to the girls in way I hadn't before."

Kenyon is effective without being flashy or attracting an immense amount of scrutiny. Perhaps it took the St. Cloud series to grab our attention, despite the fact that Kenyon has recorded seven points -- five of them goals -- in her last six skates. It may be no accident that in those last six games, UMD is unbeaten and playing some of the best hockey so far this season. With all eight of her goals having come in all-important WCHA play, Kenyon leads the Bulldogs with goals in league play and is tied for the most points with 13. Even more telling is Kenyon's plus/minus rating, a +7 in WCHA games, tying her with Wong among UMD forwards. Five times this season Kenyon has had multiple-point games, and UMD is 6-2 overall when she has gotten on the scoresheet.

If head coach **Shannon Miller** leaves Wong on Kenyon and McParland's line, the sky may be the limit for a Bulldog squad that flexed defensive muscle all of the first half of the season but struggled to put goals on the board.

"This weekend was such fun," said Kenyon. "Wong and McParland are both great players and I'm grateful to be able to get the chance to play with them. Wong and I always kind of knew we could find each other but it really showed this weekend and I think it kind of caught us off guard. It's great to have McParland there as well. She can really finish and adds more of the scoring to our line. We were meshing well last week during practice, but I think it surprised all three of us how fast and how easily we can find each other."

"Jamie is smart forward who listens, works hard and takes pride in doing the little things right," said Miller about Kenyon. "Jamie is an assistant

captain, a selfless player and all round good teammate. Because of Jamie's coachability, skills and work ethic she logs time on the PP and PK on top of playing her regular shifts. Jamie has played with many different people this season and happily adjusts to whatever the team needs. This past weekend was the first time Kenyon, Wong and McParland have ever played together on a line and they had great chemistry, each contributing in different ways and it paid off in a big team win. Coachability and work ethic are key favors to success, but so is chemistry."

The almost unassuming Kenyon constantly credits the players around her, as she did when discussing the St. Cloud series. But the maturity of Kenyon is crystal clear when she speaks confidentially of what she expects of herself offensively on the ice.

"I think I have improved on being more consistent and being counted on as someone who will contribute," said Kenyon. "I knew that I needed to be more accountable and focused on trying to be in the right spot at the right time and just go to the net hard and try to make things happen. I'm always hopeful that I'll contribute to our offense but as long as we're winning and playing well, it really doesn't matter who is getting the job done."

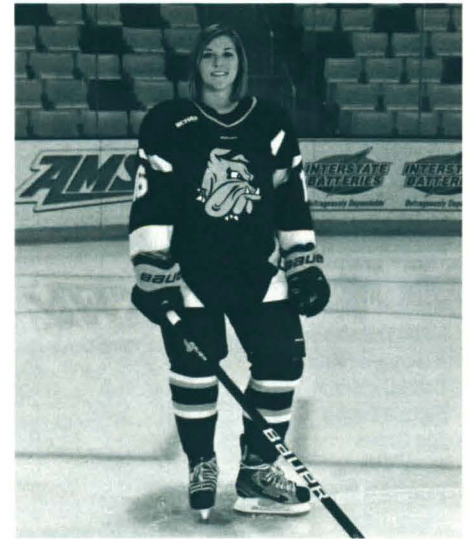
After missing 14 games last season as a sophomore due to injury, Kenyon -- who registered six goals and five assists for 11 points in just 22 games -- learned an immense amount about herself and the rest of the Bulldog team when she was forced to watch from the sideline.

"I learned a lot about myself and my team during those 14 games and it was really tough and was really hard on me only being able to watch my team and not be able to do anything," said Kenyon. "When watching I was able to learn a lot about how our team played and things I needed to work on so when I came back, I was able to be better for the team. The first few weeks I didn't play were really hard on me but my parents were really great and always there for me. They come to all of our games now and even when I was injured, they still came and watched almost all the games with me. Having them around really helped me out a lot."

Kenyon's parents made the drive from Sparta, Wisc., arguably closer to the University of Wisconsin than to UMD. Yet Kenyon knew that she was meant to be a Bulldog, falling in love with Duluth long before she ever came to town on an official visit.

"I get this question a lot because I'm from Wisconsin and as everyone knows there is a Wisconsin-Minnesota rivalry, but I love Duluth and when I visited, it just felt like home and where I should be," said Kenyon. "It is also the winningest program in women's hockey and to be able to play for a team that is that good with such a great coach close to home made it an easier decision. I have always loved the city of Duluth. My family goes on a fishing vacation every summer in Canada and we have always driven through Duluth. Even if I was going to take a nap, I would make my parents wake me up in Duluth so I wouldn't miss driving through it."

She chose UMD despite growing up watching her cousin Cyndy Kenyon play for the Badgers, one of two people Kenyon's cites as her biggest hockey



influences. The other, her older brother Chad encouraged her to play hockey and pushed her to get better.

"The history of winning at UMD is a reason I came here, not just because they win but because there is that high expectation of winning. I am very hard on myself and liked to be pushed and I feel that having that high expectation of winning and being the best you can has really helped me develop as a player and a person."

That expectation of winning sealed the deal for Kenyon to become a Bulldog. Quietly confident, she has goals for both herself and the Bulldogs, and she isn't afraid to speak candidly about them.

"I would say a big goal I have is becoming a memorable player," said Kenyon. "I would like to leave UMD having made a good impression on the hockey program, the town and the university. I would also love to win an NCAA title. I watched UMD win in 2008 at the DECC and watched the 2010 game on TV and would love to have that experience."

With her leadership skills in full view and her offensive contributions starting to come into focus, no wise fan would bet against Kenyon and her Bulldogs. After all, if the St. Cloud State series was any measure of what she can do when she is sick, just imagine what Kenyon and her new linemates are capable of at full-strength.

Probably safe to say Kenyon is ready for the expectations to begin.

# Tonight's Game

**THE SERIES:** The Bulldogs are 54-3-2 all-time against the Beavers, including a series sweep in Bemidji, Minn. earlier this season. All three of UMD's losses to BSU have occurred over the past two previous seasons and two of the three went down in Bemidji, Minn. The Bulldogs have gone 7-3 against BSU since after the 2009-10 season, but have outscored the Beavers 28-18 over that time. UMD went 2-2 with BSU a season ago.

The Bulldogs swept the Beavers back on Dec. 1-2 in Bemidji by scores of 4-2 and 4-1. UMD erased a two-goal deficit on Dec. 1 with an offensive awakening that was started by senior **Pernilla Winberg's** tally at 13:22 of the second period. Blueliner **Emma Stauber** scored the first goal of her UMD career at 2:53 of the third period to even the score at 2-2 and sophomore **Zoe Hickel** put the Bulldogs ahead for good 4:18 later on the power play, batting down the eventual game winner. Sophomore forward **Jenna McParland** cashed in UMD's insurance policy on an empty-net goal with just 42 seconds remaining in the game to wrap up the 4-2 final score. Senior defenseman **Jessica Wong** missed the game due to an ongoing injury.

On Dec. 2, the Bulldogs continued their late Friday night scoring blitz, putting three goals on the board before the Beavers could even muster one in the middle of the third period. Rookie forward **Aleksandra Vafina** scored her first goal of the game (and her career) 12:15 in the opening period on the power play. Hickel, with an assist on Vafina's score, netted one of her own at 11:22 of the second stanza. Junior forward **Jamie Kenyon** stretched the Bulldog lead to 3-0 at the 6:10 mark of the third period, the seventh goal UMD had scored against BSU in four periods of play, dating back to the Dec. 1 game. Vafina added a second goal late in the to help the Bulldogs to their 4-1 triumph.

**LAST TIME OUT:** UMD extended its current unbeaten

streak to six games and picked up its fourth sweep of the season by taking two games from St. Cloud State at AMSOIL Arena last weekend. The Bulldogs earned a 3-1 victory Saturday behind two goals from junior forward **Jamie Kenyon** and two assists from newly moved again linemate senior center **Jessica Wong**. Sunday UMD rolled its offensive sleeves and turned out the most goals in over a year with a 8-2 triumph. 11 different players picked up points, including six with two or more points. The Bulldogs used four goals on a season-high 17 shots in the first period to take control of the contest. UMD outshot the Huskies 41-21 Sunday and 39-25 Saturday to own a 80-46 advantage in shots, despite entering into the weekend averaging just 28.1. All three UMD goaltenders played Sunday, a first for the season and freshman **Kayla Black** also registered her first career assist on Wong's first goal Sunday. With the sweep, UMD is now unbeaten in its last 13 games against the Huskies and own a 48-9-3 all-time record against SCSU.

**KENYON WCHA'S OFFENSIVE PLAYER OF WEEK:** The junior forward was named the WCHA's Co-Offensive Player of the Week Tuesday, the first time Kenyon has earned the honor in her career (she was named the WCHA's Rookie of the Week back on Feb. 9, 2011).

Kenyon, from Sparta, Wis., led UMD by scoring four goals, including two in each game, putting 12 shots on goal and earning a +4 plus/minus rating. She scored the first goal of the series 3:05 into the first period on Jan. 12, then iced the game for the Bulldogs to seal the 3-1 win. She also had eight shots on goal. In the series finale last Sunday (Jan. 13), both of Kenyon's goals came in the third period.

**BULLDOG NOTES:** With her four goals in the SCSU series, **Jamie Kenyon** is now tied with sophomore **Zoe Hickel** for the most Bulldog goals so far this season with eight...Both Hickel and **Jenna McParland** lead UMD with 15 points -- McParland has six goals and nine assists, Hickel eight goals and seven assists...Senior **Katie Wilson's** three point weekend (1g, 2a) brings her to 99 career points...**Jessica Wong's** five-point weekend (2g, 3a) gives her 113 total points and she now owns the No. 13 scoring spot in UMD program history...Five Bulldogs now have recorded 10 or more points on the season -- McParland, Hickel, Wong, Kenyon and Wilson...The Bulldogs are rocking a season-high 2.45 goals a game average...UMD also now has a positive scoring margin for the first time since it swept Wisconsin back on Oct. 13-14, when the Bulldogs owned a +0.00...UMD is now +0.35...Sophomore defenseman **Emma Stauber** leads all Bulldogs with an impressive plus/minus rating of +12...The Bulldogs with an overall record of 9-8-3 and 8-7-1 in the WCHA, are now over .500 for the first time since week three of the current season...UMD is also now in fourth place in the WCHA, four points behind Ohio State and eight behind Wisconsin, with the Badgers having two games in hand...Head coach **Shannon Miller** is now just seven wins away from victory No. 350, and 10 games shy of UMD career game 500...With 113 career points, Wong is now alone in 13 place all-time among Bulldog career scorers...Black's assist was the first by a goaltender since Jenny Harss had a helper back on Dec. 3, 2011, also against SCSU...Last weekend's sweep was only the second sweep at AMSOIL for the Bulldogs this season, where UMD is 4-4-2, with three series and six games at AMSOIL against top-10 teams.

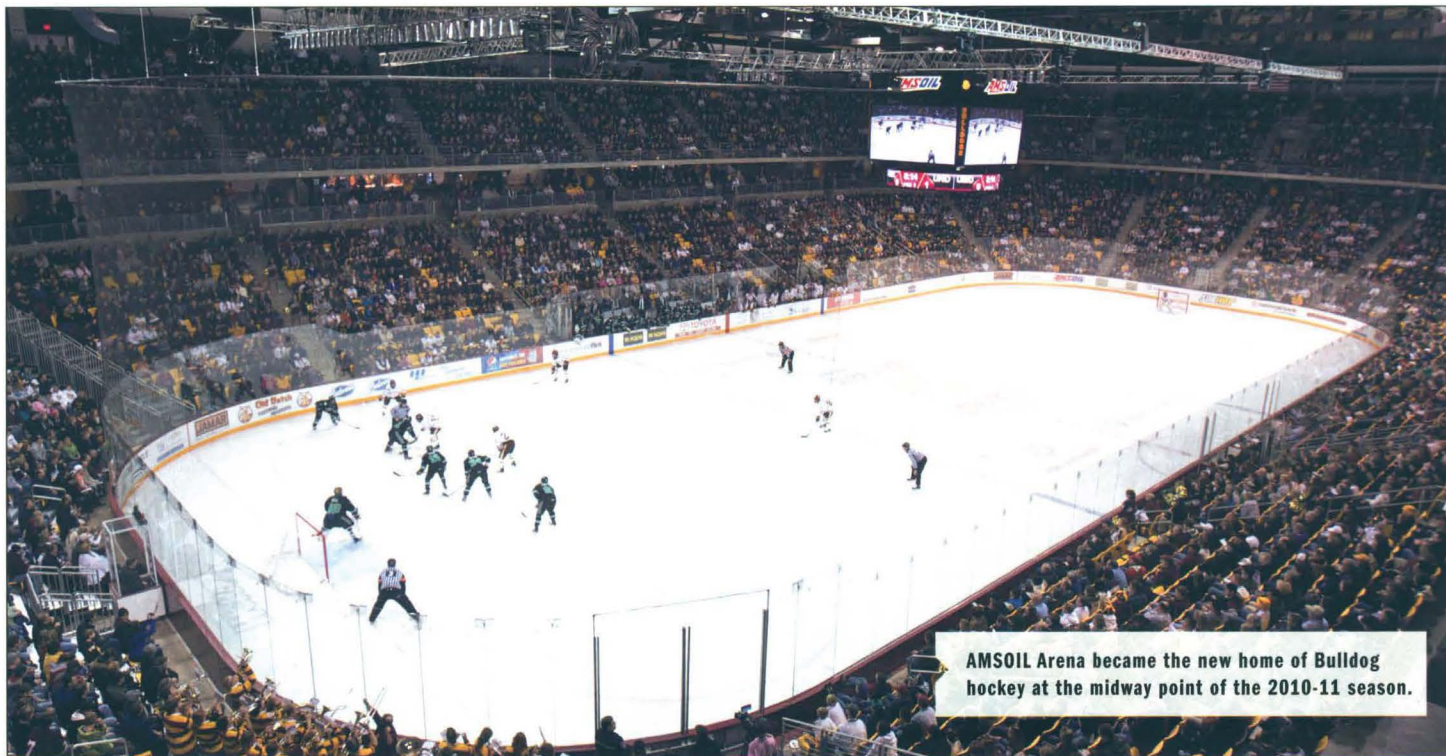

# WHERE THEY PLAY THE GAME



AMSOIL Arena became the new home of Bulldog hockey at the midway point of the 2010-11 season.

The University of Minnesota Duluth is fortunate to have some of the top – and at least one of the newest – facilities in the Upper Midwest for use by its student-athletes.

At the head of that list is the dazzling \$80-million, 6,726-seat **AMSOIL Arena**, which the Bulldog men's and women's hockey teams christened in December 2010. It is located on the St. Louis Bay waterfront near Duluth's famous Aerial lift bridge and Canal Park – a stone's throw from the Bulldogs' previous hockey home, the Duluth Entertainment and Convention Center (DECC).

At first glance, AMSOIL Arena brings to mind a striking contrast with other Western Collegiate Hockey Association arenas and some familiar similarities to the old DECC. Set foot inside rinks like Mariucci Arena (the University of Minnesota), the Kohl Center (the University of Wisconsin) or Ralph Engelstad Arena (the University of North Dakota) and one is immediately struck by their sheer vast size. By contrast, a step onto the ice surface at AMSOIL Arena causes many to notice that despite having more than 1,600 additional seats, it's as intimate as the "old" DECC, with the lower bowl of seats hugging the ice surface and the upper level seats hanging seemingly right over the ice. Truly, there's not a bad seat in the house.

While the DECC was known as a great place to watch a game, the level of fan comfort is taken to new heights inside AMSOIL Arena. From simple things like seat width and leg room to necessities like additional restroom facilities, fan comfort and convenience are the hallmarks of the Bulldogs' new home. Designers took cues from other successful and popular

sports facilities and incorporated fan-friendly touches like an open concourse around much of the lower seating bowl, meaning that a trip to one of the numerous concession stands will not mean missing any of the on-ice action. And, if they do, there is a \$1 million, 8' x 14' matrix scoreboard hung above center ice, which

provides in-game replays, videos, and graphics in 10-millimeter LED display.

AMSOIL Arena is also equipped with something the DECC never had – private suites, some 15 in all. In addition, the Bulldog Club Lounge, located on the main level adjacent to one of the college hockey's finest and most spacious press boxes, serves as a gathering space for UMD athletic donors and supporters. At the other end of the hallway is the Hall of Fame Suite, which holds up to 34 people and contains plaques of the 30-plus Bulldog hockey alums and coaches who are members of the UMD Athletic Hall of Fame.

On the lower level, out of sight for most visitors, but on full display for current and potential future Bulldogs, are some of the real "goodies." Those include a state-of-the-art weight room and athletic training center, player's lounges, two large hydrotherapy pools (one of which features a treadmill in its base) and other amenities that rival any other school in the nation.

James S. Malosky Stadium, Northern Minnesota's premier outdoor athletic venue, has been the home of Bulldog football for the last 47 seasons. In 1999,

the on-campus facility, named after the legendary Bulldog football coach Jim Malosky, received a \$1.6-million facelift with the installation of a new football playing surface (which was then replaced eight years ago) along with an eight-lane, all-weather track. During the summer of 2008, a four-level, \$6.5-million structure, which included concession and washroom areas, a spacious club room, and a press box, was erected behind the main grandstand. In 2009,

a new \$325,000 scoreboard, 48' x 33' in size, was added to the north endzone. In addition to housing the football, women's soccer, and track and field Bulldogs, Malosky Stadium, with a seating capacity of 4,500, also hosts a variety of university intramural activities.

Romano Gymnasium has hosted UMD men's basketball for over a half century (it opened in 1953) and women's basketball and volleyball since the early 1970s. The 2,759-seat facility,

which has undergone a number of substantial renovations over the past two-plus decades, was renamed in honor of the late UMD athletic director Ralph Romano in 1987.

The UMD baseball team plays its home games at **Bulldog Park**. Constructed in 1988, Bulldog Park's natural grass playing surface is generally considered to be the finest in the area, while **Junction Avenue Field** is the UMD softball team's home diamond. Lighted for night play, Junction Avenue Field debuted in 1987.

UMD also utilizes the **Ward Wells Field House**, which contains an indoor running track and tennis, volleyball, and basketball courts.



UMD's exceptional weight training facilities, both on-campus (above) and at AMSOIL Arena, help keep the Bulldogs in peak physical condition.

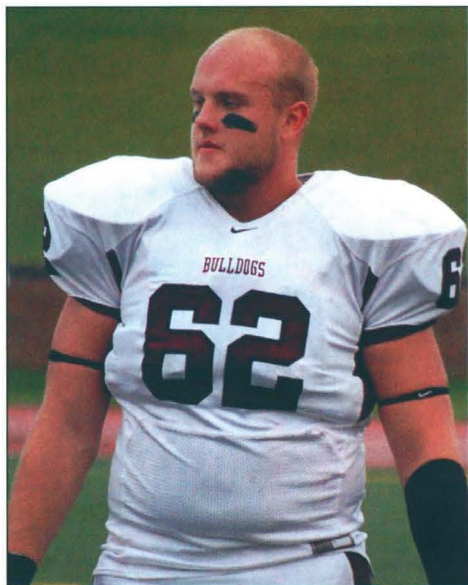
# GIVING BACK

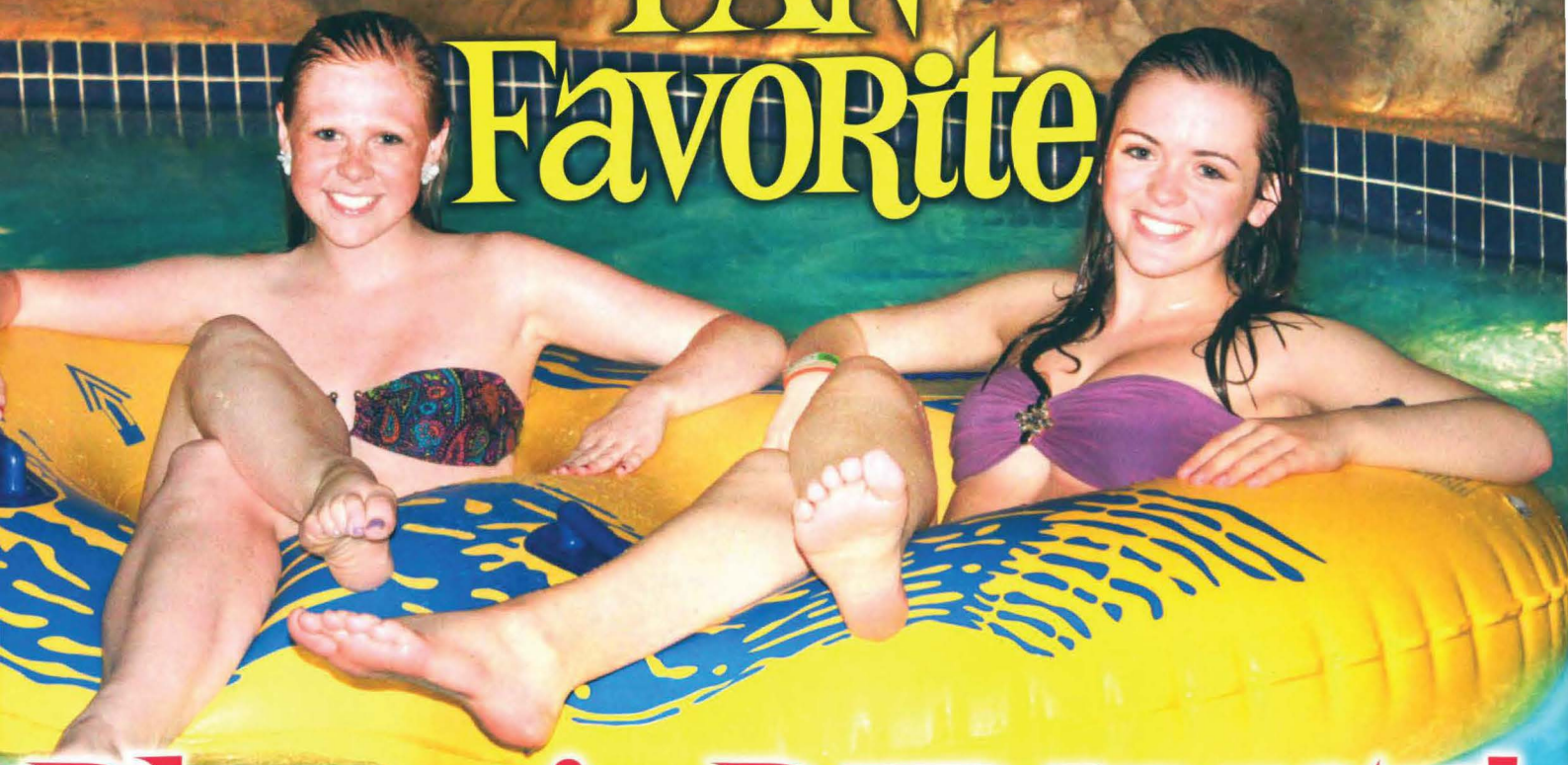

# MAKING THE GRADE

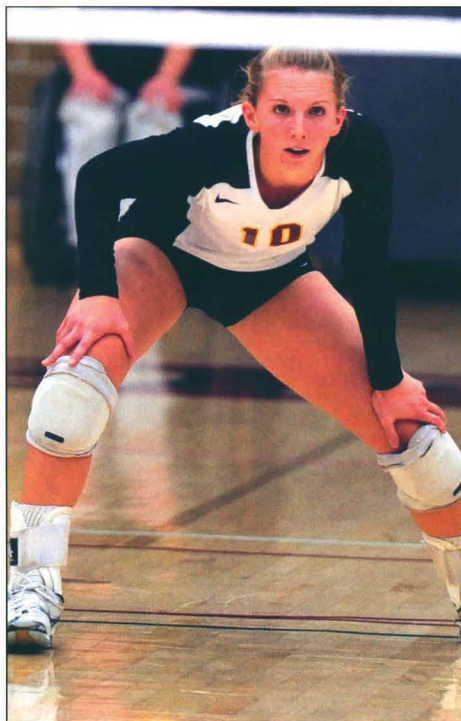
As much as the University of Minnesota Duluth has accomplished on the field of play since the inception of intercollegiate athletics over eight decades ago, it has also maintained an equally strong and proud tradition of academically preparing its student-athletes.

Case in point: Over the past quarter century, nearly 94 percent of those student-athletes who participated in a varsity sport for at least four years have graduated.

In 2011-12, 89 different UMD student-athletes secured Northern Sun Intercollegiate Conference All-Academic honors and 16 Bulldogs (seven men and nine women) were named to the Western Collegiate Hockey Association All-Academic Team. Of that group, six (three men and a school-record six women) earned WCHA Scholar-Athlete status for maintaining a 3.50 grade point average or above. In addition, UMD's 401 student-athletes (which includes redshirted freshmen) posted a collective grade point average of 2.995 in 2011-12 and 82 of those individuals achieved GPAs of 3.50 or above, while 13 turned in perfect 4.00 GPAs. During the fall semester, women's basketball produced the best GPA of all UMD teams with a 3.51 mark, and women's soccer took top honors in the spring, checking in with a 3.44 figure. On the year, women's basketball registered a department-best 3.42 GPA while women's soccer (3.41) and volleyball (3.35) were next.

On the individual front, two Bulldogs — football placekicker David Nadeau (second team) and volleyball defensive specialist Allison Fanta (second team) — received 2011-12 Capital One/CoSIDA Academic All-American recognition. That duo, along with junior hockey winger Audrey Cournoyer (first team), and junior soccer defender Kristi Merhman (first team) attained Capital One Academic All-District V acclaim this past season as well. Fanta was also among six UMD seniors who were bestowed with a NSIC Myles Brand All-Academic With Distinction Award, joining Eric Cyr (cross country/track and field), Megan Stroh (cross country/track and field), Abby Thomas (cross country/track and field), Abby Thomas (cross country/track and field), Emma Van Winkle (basketball), and Matt Venaas (cross country/track and field). Nadeau, meanwhile, was selected to the National Football Foundation's National Honor Society in recognition of their exemplary academic achievements.

Additionally, Fanta, Van Winkle, and fifth-year

senior hockey goaltender Kenny Reiter, who became UMD's first four-time WCHA Scholar-Athlete Award recipient last winter, all received the E.L. "Duce" Rasmussen Award as the school's top senior scholar-athletes in 2011-12.

# PLAY LIKE A CHAMPION

The 2008-09 season was a noteworthy juncture in the annals of University of Minnesota Duluth athletics as it signaled the school's return to the Northern Sun Intercollegiate Conference. When it last parted ways with the NSIC after 2003-04 (to join the now-defunct North Central Conference), UMD was enjoying a league run that was nothing short of dominating. Just how overpowering were the Bulldogs in their NSIC surroundings? For starters, since 1990 all 14 of UMD's NCAA Division II teams (men's and women's track and field have both indoor and outdoor seasons) had won at least three conference titles and, in UMD's final six years of league membership, took home at least one crown. No other NSIC school came close to matching that accomplishment. What's more, UMD staked a claim as the NSIC All-Sports champion for a whopping 13 consecutive years before packing its bags for the NCC.

During its brief, four-year stay in their new digs, the Bulldogs captured four NCC titles in volleyball and shared another crown in football (2005), while taking runner-up honors in men's cross country (2006 and 2004) and softball (2007).

Since re-enlisting with the NSIC, UMD has certainly been the lead dog in football, going 38-2 en route to winning four consecutive league crowns. The Bulldogs were also NSIC kingpins in women's volleyball in 2011 and outdoor track in 2009, while the women's soccer team has finished among the top three

places in the league standings during each of the past three seasons.

But the recent successes have not been limited to just the NCAA Division II sports at UMD. Women's hockey, for instance, was added to the Bulldog athletic offerings in 1999 and has appeared prominently on the national radar screen ever since, winning an unprecedented five NCAA Division I Frozen Four titles, including three straight crowns Division I from 2000-2003, and earning 10 of a

possible 12 NCAA playoff berths. On the men's side, the Bulldogs skated off with their first NCAA championship before a sellout crowd at the Xcel Energy Center in St. Paul in 2011, just two years after they laid claim to the WCHA Final Five playoff title (becoming the first team to do so by going 3-0 at that event). UMD has now qualified for NCAA men's hockey tournament play three of the last four winters and has been to seven of the last 10 WCHA Final Five tournaments.



Over the past four years, the Bulldogs have laid claim a program-best four consecutive NSIC football championships – not to mention a pair of NCAA II national crowns – while losing only two of 40 league games in the process.
