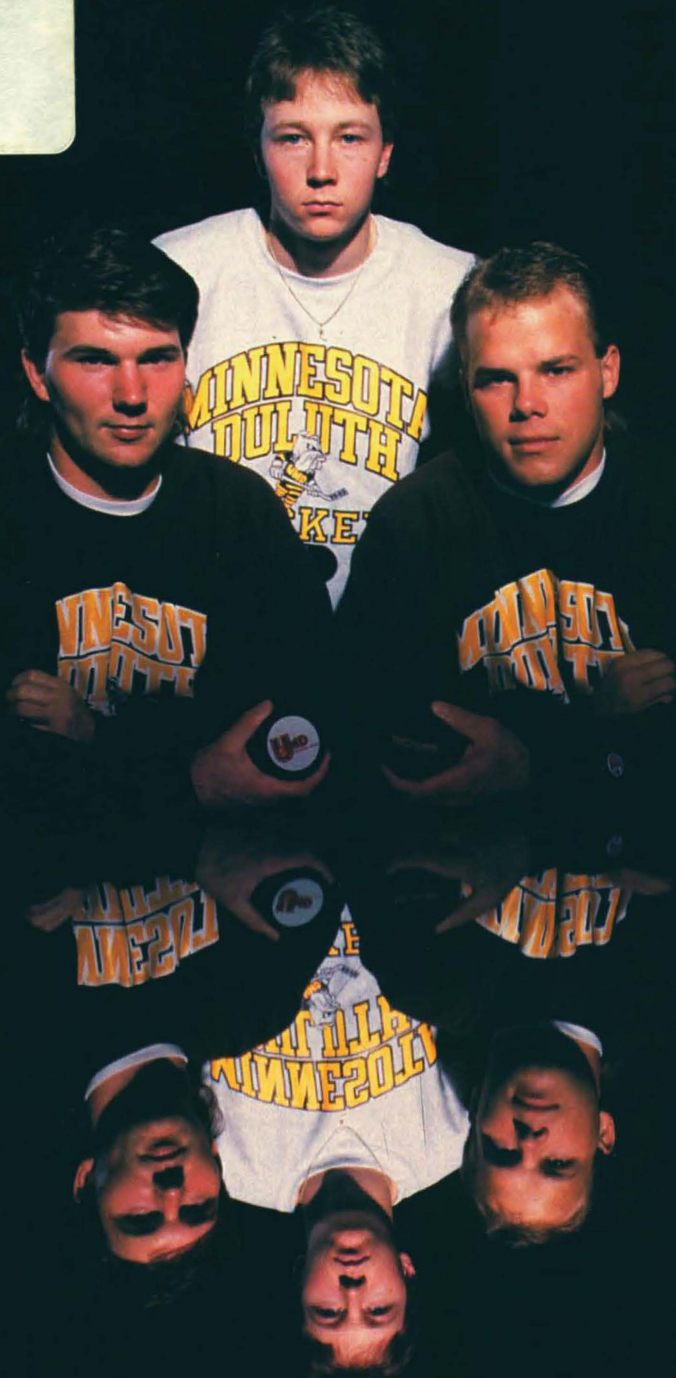

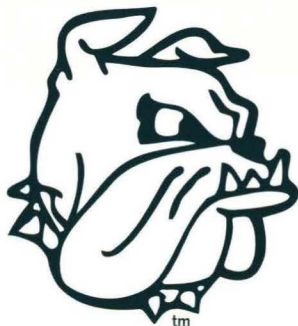

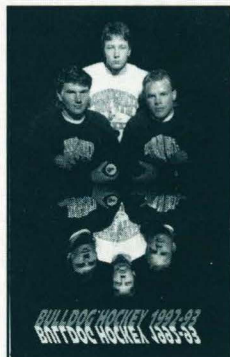


ON THE COVER:

THE UNIVERSITY OF MINNESOTA-DULUTH



If there has been one overriding characteristic about the University of Minnesota-Duluth that hasn't changed in all of its 91 years -- that characteristic is growth.

Before Minnesota-Duluth (founded as Duluth Normal School near the turn of the century) became a coordinate campus of the University of Minnesota in 1947, the site the present day facility occupies was nothing more than brush and woods. By the early 1950s, however, the campus was already taking shape with the Science Building (now called the Chemistry Building) and the Physical Education Building in place. Administrators had a far-reaching plan for Minnesota-Duluth's orderly development to 1970. The plan envisioned a student body of 3,500 students by 1970 - more than 5,000 students were actually enrolled by then.

Today, as indicated by this year's enrollment of over 7,800 students, Minnesota-Duluth continues its steady growth. New programs recently developed at Minnesota-Duluth include the first four-year computer engineering program in the state of Minnesota and two four-year degrees in

industrial and materials processing engineering.

Minnesota-Duluth also offers more instructional programs than ever for both undergraduate and graduate students in six colleges and schools. Students choose from over 70 undergraduate majors leading to four associate (two-year) degrees and 10 bachelor's degrees, with teacher licensure offered in about 40 areas. Graduate students can earn five master's degrees in 14 fields, with the School of Medicine offering the first two years of graduate basic science.

The campus, located in the Arrowhead region of Northeastern Minnesota overlooking Lake Superior, has 35 buildings, some unique to college campuses: Tweed Museum of Art, Marshall W. Alworth Planetarium, Marshall Performing Arts Center, Sports and Health Center, and the nearby Glensheen Mansion.

Minnesota-Duluth's 91 years of continued growth, now under the leadership of sixth-year Chancellor Dr. Lawrence A. Ianni, is a prime example of the area's commitment to quality higher education.

MINNESOTA-DULUTH ATHLETICS

Now in its 60th year of existence, University of Minnesota-Duluth athletics continues to reign as one of the most well-balanced and competitive programs in the Upper Midwest. Minnesota-Duluth is a member of both the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) and the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA). The Bulldogs belong to the seven-school Northern Sun Intercollegiate Conference in all sports with the exception of hockey which is aligned with the prestigious Western Collegiate Hockey Association, an NCAA Division I circuit.

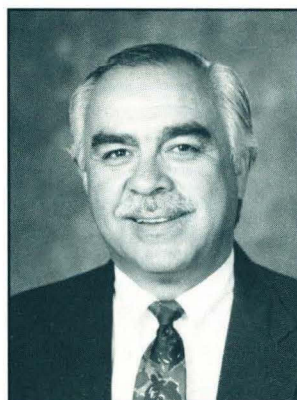
During the course of the 1991-92 athletic season, Bulldog teams captured conference championships in baseball, men's basketball, softball, men's tennis, wrestling, and women's volleyball. The men's and women's basketball contingents both advanced to the NAIA National Championship last winter while the wrestling, volleyball and men's and women's track teams sent representatives to NCAA II national and/or regional events. In addition, Minnesota-Duluth laid claim to its seventh straight NSIC men's all-sports title.

Overseeing the Bulldogs' 14-varsity sports (eight men and six women) program is Bruce McLeod, who is in his eighth full year as the Director of Intercollegiate Athletics. McLeod, 45, succeeded the late Ralph Romano in December 1983 after working his way through virtually the entire Min-

nesota-Duluth Athletic Department. He served, at one time or another, as the sports information director, the business manager, and assistant athletic director (a position he held from 1977-1983).

A native of Fort Frances, Ontario, McLeod first made his mark at Minnesota-Duluth as a standout left winger on the Bulldog hockey team. During his three-year collegiate ice career (1966-69), McLeod racked up 81 points in 77 games and was the Bulldogs' captain as a senior during the 1968-69 season.

McLeod, a 1969 graduate of Minnesota-Duluth, is married to the former Sande Halstad of Two Harbors, MN. He has two daughters, Leah and Shannon.

THE DECC



The Duluth Entertainment and Convention Center, which is generally regarded as one of the top college hockey complexes in the country, has, for the past 26 years, been the "Home of the Bulldogs."

Located on the waterfront near Duluth's famous Aerial Lift Bridge and Canal Park, the "DECC", as it is more affectionately known, has become a landmark in its somewhat brief history. Built in 1966 at a cost of \$6.5 million, the Arena portion of the complex houses a 85 x 190 foot hockey rink with a 5,664 seating capacity, six locker rooms, and several meeting areas. The Bulldogs now occupy a spacious locker room facility, which was built just prior to the start of the 1991-92 season. The rink area is extremely versatile as it can easily and quickly be converted into a different "stage" allowing the DECC Arena to hosts many concerts, dinners, conventions, shows, and other programs.

A catwalk system above the DECC's ceiling makes for easy access to eight spotlights in baskets, all of which are controlled by a centralized technician's console. A ventilating system capable of changing the air every eight minutes and air conditioning provide for excellent spectator comfort. There are three spacious and well-equipped press boxes to accommodate radio, television, and newspaper media. Suspended from the DECC's

ceiling above center ice is a new, state-of-the-art scoreboard and message board that tells the story of each game to every fan.

A spacious lobby, where ticket sales originate, separates the Arena from the Auditorium. The Auditorium plays host to concerts, symphonies, plays, operas, high school and college graduations, and a variety of other activities. Individual groups also rent out the mezzanine portion of the Auditorium for private parties.

Paulucci Hall, located beneath the DECC lobby, is the center for many post-game activities as well as other social functions.

In 1976, an addition was built - Pioneer Hall and the Duluth Curling Club. Pioneer Hall contains a hockey rink and a smaller seating capability with fold-out bleacher seating. Pioneer Hall is also the home of the Duluth Curling Club with eight curling rinks and an upstairs lounge. The DECC, incidentally, served as the host to the 1976 and 1984 Silver Broom World Curling Championships.

A recent addition to the DECC complex is the aesthetic \$16 million Convention Center, which annual is the site of numerous social and entertainment events.

An adjacent parking lot allows for close parking, and a skywalk system - Northwest Passage - links the DECC to Duluth's downtown.

THE WESTERN COLLEGIATE HOCKEY ASSOCIATION

Brett Hull ... Jon Casey ... John Mariucci ... Tony Esposito ... Keith Magnuson ... John MacInnes ... Lou Nanne ... Mark Johnson ... Lou Angotti ... Neal Broten ... Ed Belfour ... Herb Brooks ... and the list goes on and on!

You'd be excused if you mistook the aforementioned list of hockey notables as a sampling of the names out of the Hockey Hall of Fame. Rather, each of the names played a significant role in the growth and development of what has come to be considered the elite college hockey league in the country - the Western Collegiate Hockey Association (WCHA).

The WCHA as we know it today was born in 1959, but its ancestry can be traced all the way back to 1951-52, when Colorado College laid claim to Midwest College Hockey League championship. Mariucci's Minnesota Golden Gophers rode the crest of John Mayasich's heroics to the 1952-53 title before the Midwest Collegiate Hockey League was transformed into the Western Intercollegiate Hockey League (WIHL). Michigan and Colorado College dominated the WIHL throughout the 1950s until the league was dissolved in 1958-59.

The seven original schools that made up the MCHL and WIHL -- Colorado College, Denver University, Michigan, Michigan State, Michigan Tech, Minnesota, and North Dakota -- regrouped in 1959-60 to begin the Western Collegiate Hockey Association.

Minnesota-Duluth became the first "expansion" team in the WCHA when it was inducted into the ranks in 1965-66 and Wisconsin made it a nine-team league in 1969-70. The last addition to the conference came in 1971-72 when Notre Dame was added.

The WCHA remained a 10-team league for 10 years, continually sending representatives to the NCAA championships and bringing home title after title. However, there was upheaval in 1981-82 with the defection of four teams -- Michigan, Michigan State, Michigan Tech, and Notre Dame -- to the Central Collegiate Hockey Association (CCHA). Nonetheless, the shrunken WCHA, now reduced to six teams, remained the top league in the land.

As the 1982-83 season closed, rumors persisted of an impending merger between the WCHA and CCHA. Rumors soon turned into fruitful negotiations that seemed to be going well until a last-minute stumbling block sent representatives from both leagues home.

But, in 1984-85, the WCHA expanded once again back to eight teams as a charter league member Michigan Tech returned along with newcomer and Upper Peninsula neighbor Northern Michigan. Both schools had been aligned with CCHA. In 1990-91, St. Cloud State was added to the WCHA after being an NCAA independent the previous two years.

For the past five seasons, the WCHA has held its playoff championships (semifinals and finals) at the St. Paul Civic Center. The new format had been greeted with near sellout crowds which have witnessed an abundance of thrills and excitement.

So as the WCHA prepares to begin its 40th year of operation in 1992-93, nine teams consisting of some 250 players and coaches will continue to write the success script begun by the Mariucci's of yesterday. And, with 13 of the last 20 NCAA Championship titles going to WCHA schools, that's one heck of a script.

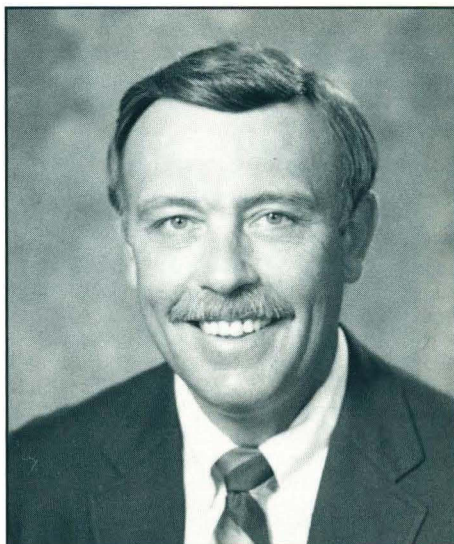
HEAD COACH MIKE SERTICH

It was the spring of 1982 and the University of Minnesota-Duluth had just completed another so-so hockey season. Something, declared the athletic department powers-that-be, had to be done to give the Bulldog program a shot in the arm. Enter Mike Sertich, a man who had virtually no previous track record as a head coach at any level, but who nevertheless had already been recognized as a great motivator and hockey tactician. The results, to say the least, were splendid. Almost immediately, Sertich instilled a new sense of pride and a positive attitude in the Bulldogs which parlayed into success on the ice rink. And now, just over a decade later, he continues to make Minnesota-Duluth one of the more revered teams in college hockey.

In his 10 seasons with the Bulldogs, Sertich has assembled a list of statistics that would do most collegiate coaches mighty proud. For openers, his career coaching record stands at 212-179-24 (for a .540 winning percentage) which far and away ranks him first among Bulldog coaches in lifetime victories. In addition, he is the only Minnesota-Duluth head coach to guide the Bulldogs to a Western Collegiate Hockey Association championship, a feat he accomplished not only in 1983-84, but also in 1984-85, and to the NCAA playoffs (on three different occasions). Sertich's high performance rate has hardly gone without notice. During his first three seasons with the Bulldogs, he was selected WCHA Coach of the Year (an unprecedented achievement) and, in 1984-85, was also named the American Hockey Coaches Association Division I Coach of the Year (Spencer-Penrose Award).

But despite the relatively enormous amount of success, the 45-year old Sertich has remained basically the same quick-witted, personable guy that he was when he accepted the Bulldogs' head coaching position back in April 1982.

"I have always believed that it's critical to keep your priorities in order," says Sertich, who "If you



start losing sight of what's important and what's not, it might not be long before you find yourself losing touch with a lot of things."

Sertich found himself in a somewhat similar predicament a dozen years ago when, beset with personal problems, he seriously contemplated leaving hockey for good and, in fact, had submitted his letter of resignation as a Bulldog assistant coach. But, after some deep soul searching, he eventually took athletic director Ralph Romano up on his offer to succeed his long-time coaching associate Gus Hendrickson as the Bulldogs' 11th head coach.

Born and raised in Virginia, in the heart of Minnesota's Iron Range, Sertich was not exactly an extraordinarily gifted athlete himself, but a strict adherence to the work ethic made him stand out in hockey, football, and baseball at

Roosevelt High School in Virginia. Upon graduation from the prep ranks in 1965, Sertich was offered a football scholarship to the University of North Dakota, but instead opted to pursue his first love, hockey, at the University of Minnesota-Duluth, a school that had just gained entrance into the prestigious WCHA. During his three seasons (1966-69) with the Bulldogs (freshmen were not allowed to compete in intercollegiate sports at that time) Sertich, as he himself is quick to admit, was no superstar. However, he was perhaps one of the hardest workers on the club. His career statistics for his three-year collegiate stint include two goals and seven assists for nine points in 64 games. Realizing full well that these are not Wayne Gretzky-type numbers, Sertich still jokes on occasion of the "scoring prowess" he possessed while a defenseman at Minnesota-Duluth. After all, history does indeed show that the only goal he rang up in WCHA play came at the expense of a fellow by the name of Tony Esposito, then a goaltender

with Michigan Tech University and later of Chicago Blackhawks fame.

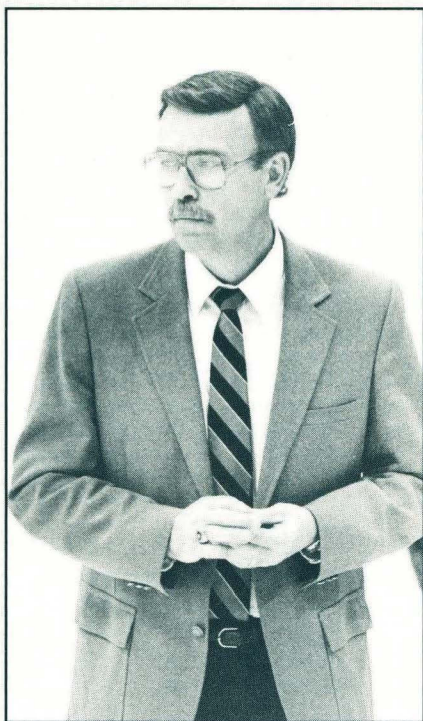
Following his graduation from Minnesota-Duluth in 1969 with a bachelor of science degree in physical education, Sertich wasted little time in landing his first teaching and coaching job, joining Head coach Gus Hendrickson at Grand Rapids High School. After the two had literally built a hockey dynasty with the Indians in the early and mid-1970s, Minnesota-Duluth officials persuaded both Hendrickson and Sertich to try their coaching magic at the collegiate level. Sertich, who had also been an assistant baseball coach at Grand Rapids High School, served as Hendrickson's right-hand man and the Bulldogs' chief recruiter for seven years before accepting his current post.

A member of the 1994 U.S. Olympic Coach Selection Committee, Sertich has been involved in a number of coaching endeavors with USA Hockey over the past decade. He and his wife, Audie, have three children - Scott (24), John (22), and Lori (15).

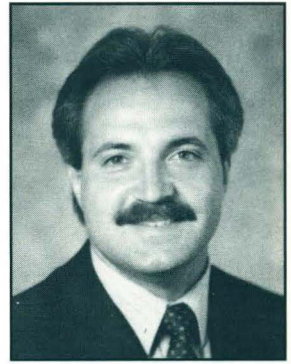
Jim Knapp, who signed on with Mike Sertich's original coaching staff after a five-year coaching and teaching stint at Aurora-HoytLakes High School, now begins his 11th season with the Bulldogs.

Knapp's return to the Twin Ports in 1982 was somewhat of a homecoming. From 1972-76, the International Falls native skated at defense for the Bulldogs, winning the Goldie Wolfe Most Inspirational Player Award following the 1975-76 season.

Following graduation from Minnesota-Duluth in 1976 with a physical education degree, Knapp worked as a student assistant coach with the Bulldogs for one year before securing the head coaching post in Aurora. While at A-HLHS, he elevated the Blackhawk program from the depths of the Iron Range Conference standings while turning out a number of top-notch college prospects (including former Bulldog standouts Matt Christensen, Bob Lakso, and Mike Valesano).

Knapp, who is also employed by the University's Department of Physical Education, Health and Recreation, served as an assistant coach at two U.S. Olympic Festivals (1989 and 1990). He has also been on the coaching staff with a pair of U.S. National Junior Teams (1988 and 1989) as well as various other USA Hockey-sponsored clubs.

The 38-year old Knapp and his wife, Laurie, have three sons - Jesse (16), B.J. (12), and Dan (10).

KULYK**

Another product of the Minnesota-Duluth hockey program, Glenn Kulyk is in his 12th season with the Bulldogs, making him the ranking member of the Minnesota-Duluth coaching staff.

The Prince Albert, SASK, native enjoyed a successful playing career with the Bulldogs as a center from 1976-80. During that span, Kulyk racked up 44 goals and 74 assists for 119 points in 136 games to rank 28th (tied with fellow Prince Albertite and 1985-86 Bulldog teamcaptain Mark Odnokon) on the all-time Bulldog scoring charts. As a senior in 1979-80, Kulyk paced Minnesota-Duluth in scoring with 62 points on 22 goals and 40 assists and served as an alternate captain.

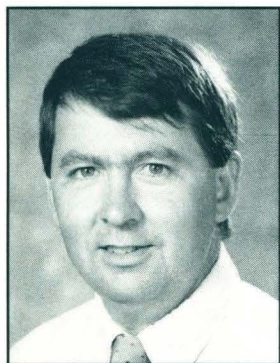

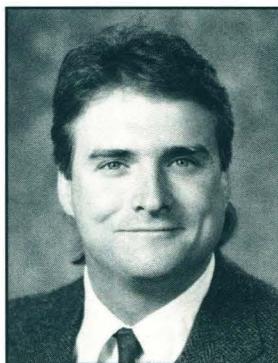

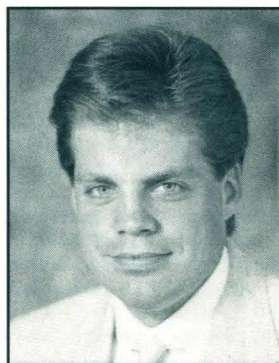


TERRY HANSON Hockey Trainer

The last several years have seen Minnesota-Duluth athletics rise to a new position of public awareness, and keeping the Bulldogs in the minds of the media and public is Sports Information Director Bob Nygaard.

Now in his 10th year at the Minnesota-Duluth Sports Information helm, Nygaard holds a B.A. degree in journalism from the University of Wisconsin-Eau Claire and served as an assistant sports information director for two years in the Blugold Athletic Department. A 1983 Wisconsin-Eau Claire graduate, Nygaard had previously worked in the Minnesota-Duluth sports information office for two years while a student in 1979-81.

As the sports information director, the 32 year-old native Duluthian is in charge of supervising publicity, programs, press releases, records, press facilities, and public relations for the 14-sport Bulldog athletic program.

A FEW MINUTES WITH MIKE SERTICH

On what he perceives as his club's strengths

"Depth, numbers and experience is an obvious plus. On defense we have seven veterans back, including a number of fourth and fifth-year people like Jon Rohloff, Brett Hauer, and Jeff Parrott who we will look to for leadership. With Jerome Butler and Tony Flint both returning, we retain our top two goaltenders from last season and that's something we haven't had in a while around here. At forward we are also pretty well set in terms of numbers, but the key for us will be to get quality years out of guys like Chris Marinucci, Joey Biondi, Corey Osmak, Brian Caruso, Marty Olson, and some of the other veterans. They are going to have to pick up the slack left by departure of both Kevin Kaiser and Doug Torrel, who accounted for over one-fourth of our total goal output last season. Derek Plante, well, he's a bonafide All-American, Hobey Baker, All-WCHA, All-Everything candidate. But believe me, he's going to draw a lot of attention which means we'll need other players to take some of the pressure off him."

On Minnesota-Duluth's areas of concern

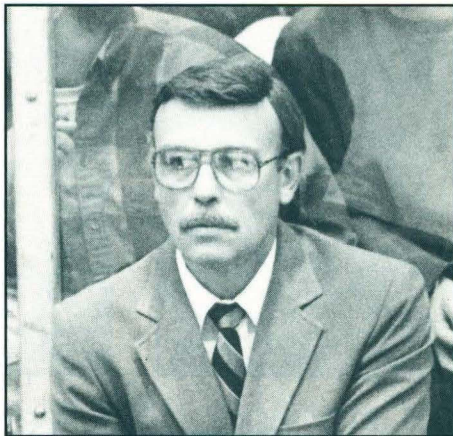
"We definitely are going to have to cut down on our goals allowed and I think we are capable of doing that. Our team goals against average and saves percentage both slipped quite a bit last year from the previous season. Certainly our inexperience in the goal played a part in that. But I'm confident that we've solidified that situation and you'll see some improvement there. Another area which needs to improve is the play of our specialty teams. For the most part, our power play was okay for most of last year then it kind of fell apart near the end. Our penalty killing unit was also pretty good, but it still could have been more consistent."

On the 1992-93 schedule

"We are going to hit the ground running, so to speak. Just a little over a week after our first official day of practice, we'll be up in Eveleth to take on North Dakota in the Hall of Fame Game before jumping into the regular season just one week later. Overall, I have no real complaints about the layout of our schedule, we are never away for more than two consecutive weekends and our home dates are pretty evenly distributed throughout the year. As usual, getting off to a fast start will be our first goal."

On how the WCHA stacks up in 1992-93

"One thing is for sure -- there is a lot of talent that needs to be replaced around the league, probably as much as I've seen in my 11 years as a head coach. I can really think of only two teams, Denver and Colorado College, who weren't effected that much



by this exodus of key players. Every team will have questions to answer. At Minnesota, it's on defense and at Wisconsin, it's in the goal now that Duane Derksen is gone. Both North Dakota and Northern Michigan lost a huge amount of their scoring punch from last winter. Even here, we have question marks like who is going to compliment Derek Plante now that both of his linemates of the past two years have left. I think you'll see a real competitive and balanced league this season. The biggest gains will perhaps be made by Denver and Colorado College because, like I said, they have a large majority of their regulars from a year ago returning. I'm curious to see what transpires out at Michigan Tech with their recent coaching change."

On Alaska-Anchorage being accepted full WCHA membership next season and as a playoff participant this winter

"I'm excited about it. I don't think there isn't any question that they have waited and paid their dues. And, they've certainly showed they can compete. It will be interesting to see how they react now that every weekend will count. As far as the playoff situation is concerned, starting this year, all of the league's teams get a shot at post-season play. To me, that's healthy. I think expansion is something we as a league have to be willing to accept and take part in. Anytime a program is in jeopardy of collapsing due to a lack of an affiliation, we can't turn our backs. Having Alaska-Anchorage join us and Alaska-Fairbanks latch on with the CCHA gives both of those programs some credibility and a new lease on life. That's what this is all about."

On the WCHA utilizing two referees during its 1992-93 season

"I think the one-referee system is still the right way to go. As I see it, the underlying problem is, and probably always will be, that there is a great deal

of pressure on guys that are doing this (officiating) as a part-time job. I don't know if a lot of those guys can handle it. I don't agree that it's the system's fault that things aren't working. I just think we are asking an awful lot out of some people who maybe don't have the makeup to effectively deal with it. In that case, then yes, maybe going to two referees is the proper course to take. Personally, I voted for it. I know there had been quite a bit of concern about the direction in which college hockey was headed -- the violence, the high sticks and such. I think a lot of that has been cleaned up. Whether the new system achieves those same ends remains to be seen. As far as I know, we are the only league in the country which made the switch. The movement for others to change is there. I think the biggest hindrance at this point was the expense involved."

On the state of college hockey

"I'm concerned about some things regarding where the NCAA is coming from. Obviously the cutback in the schedule (38 regular season games to 34 beginning last year) really hurts a place like Duluth because with budgets being as tight as they already are, we can't afford to lose that income. I also am worried about the reduction in the coaching staffs. I don't like the idea of having 30 or so guys on your team and just two full time coaches and one-part timer to run things. You get into the recruiting season and you're left pretty shorthanded. I'm not

very fond of the cut in scholarships (from 20 to 18 full rides), either. That definitely impacts the way you recruit, the way you spend your money, who you go after and when you go after him. From what I gather, the reason for all of these reductions was to save the individual schools money. But I see it as a backlash of what's been happening in NCAA legislation with big-time basketball and football."

On his experiences as part of a coaching exchange program for USA Hockey at last spring's International Ice Hockey Federation World Championships in Czechoslovakia:

"I gained a wealth of information over there. My mission at the tournament was to evaluate and scout one particular team, and I was assigned the Confederation of Independent States. I met with their coaches and discussed their tactics and techniques. I also attended all of their practice sessions and games in the tournaments. To actually sit down and be with a team for an entire week is very intriguing, to say the least. The coaching symposium, which was held in conjunction with the Championships, featured some of the brighter hockey minds in the world. If any coach was given this opportunity and called to ask for my advise, I would recommend highly that they take part in it because not only will they be exposed to that elite player, they'll also be exposed to that elite coach."

1992-93 BULLDOG OUTLOOK

For the past three years they've been knocking. Now they want to come in.

Armed with virtually its entire defensive and goaltending corps from a year ago, as well as one of the most dynamic players in the country, the University of Minnesota-Duluth appears well-equipped to set up residence in the Western Collegiate Hockey Association's upper division after three successive fifth-place finishes.

The Bulldogs (15-12-0 overall and 14-16-2 in the WCHA last winter) retain the services of 20 lettermen from their 1991-92 club, which, if it weren't for a sluggish regular season finish (three wins in their last 11 outings), would have clinched a home WCHA playoff berth for the first time since 1986.

One of the Bulldogs most apparent strengths this season should be at defense where no less than seven experienced players return, including a trio of senior mainstays -- **Brett Hauer**, **Jon Rohloff**, and **Jeff Parrott**. Hauer is coming off his most productive year as a Bulldog (eight goals and 14 assists for 22 points) as is Rohloff (a career high 18 points on nine goals and nine assists despite missing 10 games with a pulled abdominal muscle). Also returning for active duty in the Bulldog blueline battalion are the likes of senior **Steve Cronkhite**, junior **Rod Miller** and sophomores **Rod Aldoff** and **Brett Larson**.

In goal, second-year regulars **Jerome Butler**, who posted a 9-11-2 record, a 4.12 goals against average and an .860 saves percentage mark in 22 starts as a rookie, and **Tony Flint**, a senior who was 4-7-0 with a 4.08 goals against mark and an .882 saves percentage figure in 12 appearances a year ago, are both back to provide the Bulldogs with ample puck-stopping support.

Up front, senior center **Derek Plante**, the Sporting News' NCAA Pre-Season Player of the Year, resumes his position as the

Bulldogs' offensive pacesetter. The 1991-92 All-WCHA second team selection topped Minnesota-Duluth in scoring for a second straight year last winter, amassing 27 goals and 36 assists for 63 points -- the largest output by a Bulldog since Brett Hull collected 84 points back in 1985-86. Plante, who finished his junior campaign owning an 18-game scoring streak, also had a hand in 43.75 percent of his club's total goals this season, a figure unmatched by any of his WCHA colleagues.

Plante's notoriety and revered playmaking skills obviously means he'll draw plenty of attention from opponents this winter. This of course makes it a necessity for other teammates to take some of the scoring and offensive burden off him. The list of candidates to fill that request is quite lengthy. Sophomore winger **Rusty Fitzgerald**, the leading scorer among the 1991-92 Bulldog newcomers (nine goals and 11 assists for 20 points) and the club's Rookie of the Year, junior forward **Chris Marinucci** (6-

13=19) and senior center **Joe Biondi** (8-6=14) are a few of those who are being targeted to carry a larger chunk of the offensive load as are senior wingers **Brad Penner** (4-6=10) and **Marty Olson** (5-4=9), sophomore center **Chris Sittlow** (5-4=9), junior center **Kraig Karakas** (2-5=7), junior wingers **Brian Caruso** (2-3=5) and **Corey Osmak** (1-4=5), and sophomore wingers **Joe Tamminen** (1-3=4) and **Marc Christian** (1-0=1).

Centers **Mike Antonovich** (Greenway High School) and **Joe Ciccarello** (Calgary Royals of the Alberta Junior Hockey League), defenseman **Greg Hanson** (Dubuque Fighting Saints of the United States Hockey League), winger **Brad Federenko** (Melfort Mustangs of the Saskatchewan Junior Hockey League), goaltender **Taras Lendzyk** (Humboldt Broncos of the SJHL) and winger **Jeff Romfo** (Blaine High School) are just some of the members of this year's freshmen class who could figure in Minnesota-Duluth's immediate future plans.

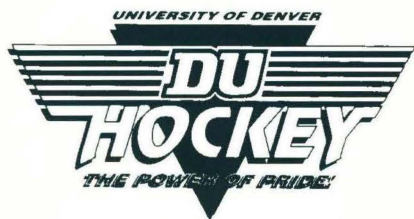

MINNESOTA-DULUTH HOME ATTENDANCE

The University of Minnesota-Duluth has long been praised for its loyal and dedicated hockey following. In the 25 years the Bulldogs have occupied the Duluth Entertainment and Convention Center, for example, they have drawn close to 2.5 million spectators to their home engagements. During 12 of the last 13 years Minnesota-Duluth has played in front of home crowds averaging over 5,000 per game. In 1984-85, the Bulldogs established a single-season attendance record with 157,257 while selling out no less than 25 of their 28 games at the 5,664-seat DECC

MEMORABLE DATES IN BULLDOG HOCKEY HISTORY

December 10, 1930. Duluth State Teacher's College announces that intercollegiate ice hockey will be added to the institution's varsity sports program.

January 13, 1931. DSTC bows to Duluth Central High School 3-0 at the Duluth Amphitheater in the club's first varsity hockey game. Subsequently, the fledgling team drops all three of its contests in its inaugural campaign. Head Coach Frank Kovach, who also instigated both the Bulldog intercollegiate football and men's basketball programs that same year, awards 15 varsity letters.

February 27, 1932. DSTC wins its first intercollegiate hockey game with a 3-2 decision over Two Harbors High School at the Duluth Amphitheater.

June 10, 1946. Following a 14-year absence, ice hockey is reinstated as a varsity sport by administrative officials at Duluth State Teacher's College.

February 24, 1949. Goaltender Norm Thompson and the Bulldogs shut out Carleton College 3-0 in Duluth to conclude the year with a 7-0-0 overall record for their only unbeaten, untied season in history.

June 27, 1949. After two seasons playing as an independent, Minnesota-Duluth is accepted into the Minnesota Intercollegiate Athletic Conference.

February 18, 1959. Junior center Orest Wojcichowsky nets 10 points (four goals and six assists) against Concordia College in what would stand as a Minnesota-Duluth (pre-NCAA Division I) single-game record. The Bulldogs win the MIAC confrontation 16-0 at the Duluth Curling Club.

February 15, 1961. In its final game as members of the Minnesota Intercollegiate Athletic Conference, Minnesota-Duluth blanks Augsburg College 19-0 at the Duluth Curling Club. The victory was the Bulldogs' 56th straight in league play and assured Minnesota-Duluth of its fifth consecutive MIAC title.

August 10, 1961. Minnesota-Duluth abandons the Minnesota Intercollegiate Athletic Conference in hopes of establishing itself as a legitimate big-time college hockey school. The University officially elects to compete as a Division I independent and releases a 1961-62 schedule which features engagements against Western Collegiate Hockey Association powers such as the University of Minnesota, Michigan Technological University, Michigan State University, and the University of Denver.

December 18, 1962. Minnesota-Duluth gains its initial triumph against a Western Collegiate Hockey Association club by besting North Dakota 4-1 at the Duluth Curling Club.

December 19, 1964. In what still stands as an NCAA Division I single-game record, senior goaltender Bill Halbrehder makes 77 saves in the Bulldogs' 6-5 overtime loss to the University of Michigan in Ann Arbor.

March 20, 1965. The 1966 NCAA Division I Ice Hockey Tournament and the accompanying American Hockey Coaches Association Convention is awarded to the city of Duluth and its new \$6.1 Arena-Auditorium Complex. But due to construction delays with the facility (it wouldn't officially open until July 1966), the national event is later switched to Williams Arena in Minneapolis. The Duluth Arena, however, would eventually land the NCAA Championships in both 1968 and 1981.

April 3, 1965. Minnesota-Duluth Provost Raymond Darland announces that the Bulldogs will officially become the eighth team in the prestigious Western Collegiate Hockey Association beginning with the 1965-66 season. The Bulldogs join Minnesota, North Dakota, Colorado College, Denver, Michigan Tech, Michigan State and Michigan in the newly-expanded circuit.

February 11, 1966. The Bulldogs end their 14-game winless Western Collegiate Hockey Association streak by clipping North Dakota 3-2 in overtime in Grand Forks for the school's first league victory.

February 18, 1966. The Bulldogs take to the Duluth Curling Club ice sheet for a final time, falling 8-3 to the University of Michigan. A gathering of just over 2,000 spectators witness the finale.

March 13, 1966. Senior defenseman Bob Hill is among six players selected to 1965-66 AHCA All-American first team, becoming the first Bulldog to ever earn such a distinction.

November 19, 1966. In the first game ever contested at the newly-constructed Duluth Arena, senior center Keith "Huffer" Christiansen, who later that year would be named the Western Collegiate Hockey Association's Most Valuable Player, collects a school-record six assists to help propel the Bulldogs past Minnesota 8-1 before a crowd of 5,700.

December 17, 1971. Over a dozen school-single game records fall by the wayside as the Bulldogs paste Minnesota 15-3 in Minneapolis. A pair of All-American centers -- Walt Ledingham and Pat Boutette -- each record hat tricks to lead the scoring onslaught for Minnesota-Duluth which struck for nine goals in the second period, including eight in a six-minute span, in the Western Collegiate Hockey Association confrontation.

January 13, 1973. In what arguably ranks as the one of the greatest Minnesota-Duluth's comebacks of all time, the Bulldogs rally from a 6-2 deficit with just 5:21 remaining in regulation to edge Michigan Tech 7-6 in overtime at the Duluth Arena. Bulldog center Pat Boutette scored three straight goals (a natural hat trick) in a span of 2:37 during the comeback effort before rookie right winger Tom Milani notched the game-winner 3:02 into the extra session.

MEMORABLE DATES IN BULLDOG HOCKEY HISTORY

February 2, 1974. Minnesota-Duluth sets a single-game attendance record at the Duluth Arena as 6,158 spectators watch Michigan Tech shade the Bulldogs 5-3.

October 24, 1975. In his first collegiate game with the Bulldogs, freshman right winger John "Bah" Harrington raps in a centering pass from Ernie Powell past goaltender Blane Comstock 4:04 into overtime to give Minnesota-Duluth a 4-3 win over the visiting United States Olympic Team.

March 7, 1979. Despite losing 4-2 (in overtime) to Denver, the Bulldogs still manage to win their two-game, total-goal WCHA quarterfinal playoff series with the Pioneers 7-6 at the Duluth Arena to advance to the second round of the league's post-season tournament for the first time.

March 19, 1983. After bowing to Providence College 7-3 the previous night, Minnesota-Duluth succumbs 3-2 to the host Friars in its first showing in an NCAA tournament series.

February 17, 1984. Buoyed by senior left winger Bob Lakso's hat trick, Minnesota-Duluth upends Wisconsin 4-2 at the Duluth Arena to secure its first Western Collegiate Hockey Association title.

March 10, 1984. Forced to host a "home" series at Williams (Mariucci) Arena in Minneapolis due to a scheduling conflict with the Duluth Arena, the Bulldogs blitz North Dakota 8-1 before a near-capacity crowd of 7,297 in the first of a two-game WCHA playoff championship series. The Bulldogs go on to defeat the Fighting Sioux, 12-6, in the total-goal set and advance to the NCAA quarterfinals at home against Clarkson College.

March 22, 1984. The Bulldogs beat North Dakota in the semifinals of the NCAA championships in Lake Placid, NY. The thrilling 2-1 overtime victory is sealed when two-time All-American right wing Bill Watson scores off a Bob Lasko feed in front of the net at the 3:09 mark of the first extra session.

March 23, 1984. Senior defenseman Tom Kurvers, who was chosen the Western Collegiate Hockey Association's Most Valuable Player earlier in the month, becomes the first Bulldog to win the Hobey Baker Memorial Award, which recognizes the most outstanding player in college hockey.

March 24, 1984. Making its inaugural appearance in the finals of the NCAA championships, Minnesota-Duluth falls 5-4 in four overtimes to Bowling Green in Lake Placid, NY. The 97-minute, 11-second game goes down as longest in NCAA Championship history. Freshman goaltender Rick Kostj turns back a tournament-record 57 shots in the setback.

December 22, 1984. Minnesota-Duluth concludes its six-day tour of the Soviet Union, becoming in the process the first American collegiate ice hockey team to ever visit that country. The Bulldogs split a two-game exhibition series with the Junior Red Army in Leningrad and in Moscow during their historic voyage.

February 16, 1985. The Bulldogs, behind a pair of goals from junior right winger Bill Watson, claim their second straight Western Collegiate Hockey Association regular season crown by skating past Michigan Tech 4-3 at the Duluth Arena.

March 25, 1985. Mike Sertich is selected the Western Collegiate Hockey Association's Coach of the Year for an unprecedented third straight season.

March 29, 1985 One day before he was to record his 109th point of the season (which, at the time, was an NCAA Division I record), junior right wing Bill Watson is bestowed with the Hobey Baker Memorial Award. Watson, who had earlier been named the Western Collegiate Hockey Association's Most Valuable Player after leading the circuit in scoring for a second straight year, becomes the second Bulldog in as many years to receive the Award.

March 30, 1985. After losing a heartbreaking 5-4 triple-overtime decision the previous evening to eventual NCAA champion R.P.I., Minnesota-Duluth rebounds with a 6-5 triumph in one overtime against Boston College to capture third place at the NCAA National Championships at Joe Louis Arena in Detroit, MI.

March 1, 1986. Sophomore sensation Brett Hull beats Northern Michigan netminder Chris Jiannaris at the 15:38 mark of the third period in the Bulldogs' WCHA quarterfinal series with the Wildcats at the Duluth Arena for his 50th goal of the year to eclipse the previous Bulldog single-season mark of 49 tallies set in 1984-85 by Bill Watson. The All-Western Collegiate Hockey Association right wing would go on to finish the year with 52 goals.

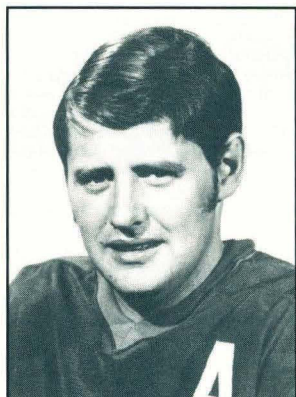
December 11, 1987. Marge Berry, the wife of former Bulldog forward Ed Berry (1947-50), becomes the two millionth paying customer for Minnesota-Duluth hockey to go through the Duluth Entertainment and Convention Center turnstiles. The Bulldogs reward Berry with a 5-3 Western Collegiate Hockey Association victory over the University of Denver.

January 30, 1988. In a special in pre-game ceremony at the DECC, the Minnesota-Duluth Department of Intercollegiate Athletics officially retires Keith "Huffer" Christiansen's familiar No. 9 jersey, marking the only time the school has bestowed any of its athletes with that honor.

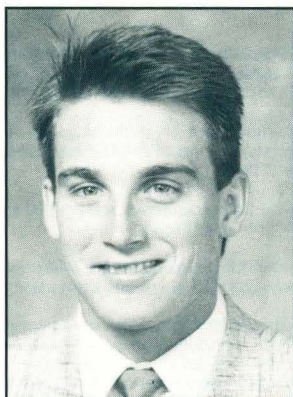
February 25, 1989. Junior Dale Jago scores one goal and assists on another in a 6-3 Western Collegiate Hockey Association playoff loss to Northern Michigan in Marquette. In the process, Jago finishes first among his teammates in scoring and thus becomes the first defenseman to ever do so.

November 4, 1989. Minnesota-Duluth equals its best start for a season ever by overwhelming Alaska-Anchorage 7-1 at home to up its overall record to 8-0-0.

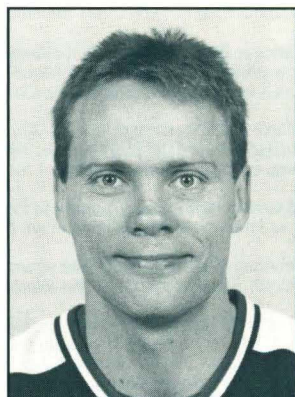
