## HOCKEY HISTORY

The Unveristy of Minnesota-Duluth begins its 35th year of hockey in 1978-79.

The program began in 1931, when Frank Kovach took the first team to the ice against high school and junior college opponents. UMD, then known as Duluth State Teacher's College, played only two seasons, laying dormant until the University became a branch of the University of Minnesota. Hank Jensen piloted UMD until 1951, when his former star performer, Gord Eddolls, succeeded him. The Bulldogs played in the Minnesota Intercollegiate Athletic Conference after 1949, and under Eddolls they started a dominance of the conference unparralled anywhere. Eight times in nine years UMD won the MIAC title, and when John "Connie" Pleban took over the head coaching job in 1955 the Bulldogs reeled off 60 consecutive MIAC wins.

Ralph Romano, currently UMD's Athletic Director, took the helm in 1959, and after two more undefeated MIAC seasons, the Bulldogs left the MIAC to play an independent schedule in 1961. For four years, UMD played the top collegiate teams in the nation, and admitted to the Western Collegiate Hockey Association in time for the 1965-66 season.

Playing in the Duluth Curling Club, the Bulldogs struggled during their first league season, but defenseman Bob Hill became the first All-American ever at UMD in hockey and the WCHA tradition had started.

UMD opened the 1966-67 season at the Duluth Arena by thrashing Minnesota 8-1 as Keith Christiansen set up six Bulldog goals. Christiansen led the WCHA in scoring that year, and linemates Bruce McLeod and Pat Francisco finished second and fourth, respectively. Christiansen also was named to the All-American team, and went on to lead the U.S. Olympic team in the 1968 Olympic Games. His number nine will never be worn by another Bulldog puckster.

Romano became the Athletic Director in 1968, and former North Dakota head coach Bill Selman took the Bulldog post. Selmon produced two All-Americans in Ron Busniuk and Murray Keogan in 1969-70. He was succeeded by Terry Shercliffe, a former Bulldog star, in 1970. UMD posted their best league mark under him, 15-13, in 1971-72, and for the second straight year left wing Walt Ledingham was an All-American. UMD continually placed high in their own Christmas City of the North Tournament, and they also won first places at the RPI Invitational (1972) and the National Invitational Hockey Tournament (1974). Pat Boutette was the school's sixth All-American in 1972-73.

Gus Hendrickson replaced Shercliffe in 1975, and led the Bulldogs to the playoffs last year for the ninth time in the 14 years UMD has been a WCHA member. Curt Giles, the Bulldog's captain this year, became All-American number seven last season.

## 1978-79 OUTLOOK

Gus Hendrickson begins his fourth season at the helm of the Bulldogs, and the head mentor is optimistic about the upcoming season.

UMD, 14-22-1 last year, made the WCHA playoffs, capturing seventh place in the loop with a 12-19-1 mark. One more win in conference play would have propelled the Bulldogs into the upper division of the league.

Two seniors were lost to graduation: right wing Carmen Haakstad and goalie Rick Heinz. Both were four-year lettermen, and Heinz holds many UMD netminding records. He also has the WCHA mark for most saves in a season, and last year he led the league in games played and saves.

Two goalies will vie for the post vacated by Heinz. Senior Jeff Johnson has experience in his corner. He has been a backup for three seasons, and turned in some effective games last season as the number two goalie, including a near-shutout, ruined when Brown University scored with three minutes left in a 4-1 Bulldog victory. Johnson will be challenged by sophomore Bill Perkl. Perkl, a non-letterman, appeared in only one game.

The defense is strong and experienced. All-American Curt Giles, last year's second leading scorer (11-36-47), will once again captain the Bulldogs. As a junior last season, he was the leading vote getter on both WCHA post-season all-star teams, and he should be the WCHA's top blueliner again. He is joined by veteran Keith Hendrickson, a junior, who was fourth on the team with 21 assists. Junior lettermen Stan Palmer, Don Hedlund, and Pat Regan return, as do sophomores Tom Madson and Chris Knauff, last year's Outstanding Freshman.

At center, junior Dan Lempe (18-30-48), the leading UMD scorer for both of his seasons here, leads a strong contingent. Juniors Mark Pavelich (14-30-44) and Glenn Kulyk (6-14-20) turned in fine sophomore campaigns and will be counted on heavily. Kulyk led a penalty killing unit which scored 10 shorthanded goals, and limited opponents to a 26% efficiency in one of hockey's most important areas. Another letterman returning is sophomore Barry McCulloch; in addition, freshman Scott Carlston and Bill Oleksuk can play either center or wing, lending depth to the club.

On the right side, senior alternate captains John Rothstein (26 goals) and John Harrington (22 goals) lead the shooting gallery. Junior Mitch Corbin (14 tallies) and Dave Johnson are also back, and freshman Gary DeGrio will join a crew which scored over 40 percent of the team's goals.

Chief among the left wings is senior Bruce Olson (7-13-20), who combined with Lempe and Rothstein on the Bulldog's first line last year. The rest of the portsiders are young: sophomores Al Cleveland, Tom Conroy and Dave McDonald.

If the Bulldogs improve in 78-79 as they did last season, they will be a force to reckon with in the WCHA.

## HEAD COACH GUS HENDRICKSON

Gus Hendrickson became the ninth hockey coach in Minnesota-Duluth history in 1975, and since then has worked hard to instill the Hendrickson system in his hockey players and to recruit young men who could excel under that system to bring a winning team to Duluth.

Those efforts appear ready to pay off this season, Hendrickson's fourth at the helm. All of the Bulldog players were recruited by Hendrickson and his assistant coach Mike Sertich, and after a strong finish last season the team is primed for 1978-79.

Hendrickson, after prepping at Eveleth (MN) High School, was a three year letterman at Michigan State in hockey under veteran coach Amo Bessone, graduating from MSU with a B.S. degree in physical education in 1962. Following graduation, he was stationed in Germany for two years while with the Army. He and his wife Peggy returned to the United States in 1964, settling in Grand Rapids, Minn., where Hendrickson was active as a bantam and midget hockey coach.

Hendrickson continued his education with an M.S. degree in physical education from Bemidji State University.

In 1968, Hendrickson became the head coach at Grand Rapids High School. He never had a losing season there, leading his club to the Minnesota State High School Tournament three times.



In 1975, the Indians won the State Tournament, and Hendrickson succeeded Terry Shercliffe as head mentor at UMD. Since beginning the job, Hendrickson has compiled a 38-69-3 mark, and last season the Bulldogs made the WCHA playoffs, finishing only one win away from a first-division spot. Although UMD lost in the first round to defending NCAA champion Wisconsin, the invaluable experience gained by his young players during the fight for the playoffs will help Hendrickson in molding this year's squad.

## ASSISTANT COACH MIKE SERTICH

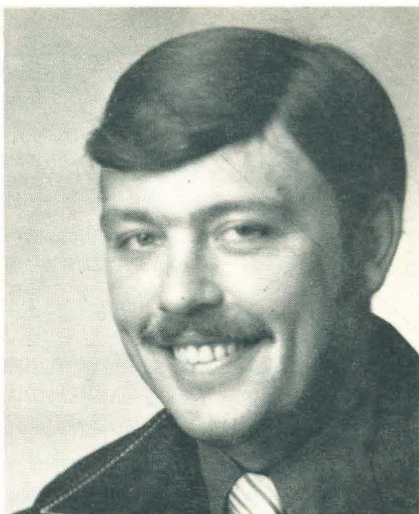
When Gus Hendrickson came to UMD in 1975, he brought his assistant coach Mike Sertich with him—and Sertich has proved himself a valuable addition to the Bulldog hockey program.

"Mike is a real hard worker who knows how to get the point across to our players," Hendrickson said. "His work really compliments our program."

Mark "Mike" Sertich hails from Virginia, Minn., where he was an all-round athlete, competing in football, hockey and baseball. Hockey, however, was a Sertich strong point—his brother Steve was captain of the 1976 Olympic team, and is currently playing pro hockey in Nuremburg, Germany.

Sertich came to UMD in 1965 as a freshman left wing. He moved up to the varsity the following year, winning three letters. Versatile on the ice, he also played defense for the Bulldogs before his graduation with a B.S. in Physical Education in 1969.

As Hendrickson's assistant at Grand Rapids, Sertich collaborated on three state tournament entries with his boss.



At UMD, Sertich is an instructor in the physical education department in addition to his numerous hockey duties. He is in charge of the Bulldog scouting and recruiting operations, and works with the players, in practice, on defensive techniques.

# DULUTH ARENA AUDITORIUM

The Duluth Arena is home ice for the UMD Bulldogs.

The Arena, city owned and operated, is in its 12th season of existence after being constructed along with a civic auditorium in 1966 at a cost of 6.5 million dollars. Two years ago, Pioneer Hall was added at a cost of 4.4 million.

The Arena-Auditorium complex has seen over six million spectators in 11 seasons, and has had an economic impact on the area of well over \$90 million.

The Arena has a capacity of 5,681 for hockey games, but can seat up to 8,500 for concerts. Every seat in the Arena has an unobstructed view of the ice. A ventilating system has the capability of changing the air every eight minutes, and air conditioning provides for spectator comfort during the summer.

The Arena was host to the 1968 NCAA Hockey championships which saw Denver University defeat North Dakota for the coveted crown. Pioneer Hall, the largest curling facility in the United States, played host to the 1976 International Air Canada Silver Broom Curling Championships. Over 41,000 fans were witness to the event, won by the United

States' entry, the Bruce Roberts Rink of Hibbing, Minnesota.

The Auditorium is the home of the Duluth-Superior Symphony Orchestra, in addition to hosting smaller concerts and plays. Pioneer Hall is large enough for civic exhibits, in addition to its eight curling sheets. The Bulldogs have their own permanent locker room and storage area in the facility, and there are more locker rooms in the Arena for visiting teams. In addition, all Duluth high schools play their home games at the Arena.

Last year, an enclosed all-weather, elevated pedestrian walkway was completed connecting the facility to downtown shopping malls and businesses. Along with parking room for 1200 automobiles at the Arena complex, the walkway will alleviate any traffic problems or tie-ups at gametime. The convenience of the new walkway combined with the excellent Arena-Auditorium-Pioneer Hall facilities make the home of the Bulldogs one of the finest complexes in the country.

The complex is located on the Lake Superior harbor front, two miles down the hill from the University.

# THE UNIVERSITY

One of five campuses in the state-wide University of Minnesota system, UMD enrolls nearly 7,000 undergraduate and graduate students. Academic offerings include liberal arts, business, fine arts, education, social work and basic science in medicine.

The UMD campus represents a \$50-million investment in educational facilities. A unique aspect of the campus is that all buildings are interconnected, so students can move to classes in different locations without going outside. The plan also makes the campus very convenient for students and staff with physical handicaps.

UMD is firmly committed to undergraduate education and prides itself on the fact that its size allows quality programs without depriving the students of their individuality. The 400 part-time and full-time faculty are dedicated teachers, yet maintain active research interests.

In the College of Letters and Science, students have been involved in unique studies. During the summer, six students were part of archaeological dig conducted at a site of a city in Israel that dates to biblical times. Another group of students were involved in a study to determine recreational needs for the state. The college enrolls about 4,000 students in its 18 departments.

Increased visibility is coming to the Master of Industrial Safety Program, offered by the Department of Industrial and Technical Studies in the College of Education. The program, which prepares health and safety personnel for business, industry and government, has enjoyed a 100 per cent placement of its graduates. Elsewhere in the college, students

are studying elementary and secondary education, psychology, physical education and home economics.

Programs in the School of Business and Economics are experiencing a rapid growth in enrollment. The offering in accounting, business, business education and economics allow students opportunities for internships to supplement their classroom study. The school graduated its first Master of Business Administration students last spring.

The School of Fine Arts is making UMD a cultural center for Northeastern Minnesota. During the last year the college presented seven weeks of summer repertory theatre, produced its first complete operas, added dance concerts, sent a 47-member choir on a tour of Poland and Russia and opened a new wing on the art gallery.

The School of Social Development continues its preparation of graduate students to work in planning of social service, as well as offering undergraduate study in social work. The faculty and students maintain close contact with the community through such projects as improving care for rural elderly, and helping Native Americans develop business and management skills for use in their programs.

Ninety-six students are enrolled in the basic science (first two years) program in the School of Medicine.

All told, the schools and colleges at UMD offer students a choice of 73 majors and 16 pre-professional programs. At the graduate level, there are 17 master's degree programs plus certificates in educational administration.

## RALPH A. ROMANO, ATHLETIC DIRECTOR

The University's Intercollegiate Athletic Department has seen a lot of changes since 1947. Ralph Romano has brought a major portion of those changes here, both as Athletic Director and previously as hockey coach.

Romano is currently in his tenth year as the director of the 20 sport department.

Romano is a native of Thunder Bay, Ontario. He attended high school at Duluth Central, where he graduated in 1952. He was a goaltender for the Bulldogs during his college days, graduating from the University in 1956. He served in the Air Force for two years, then returned to UMD to accept the head coaching job of the hockey team.

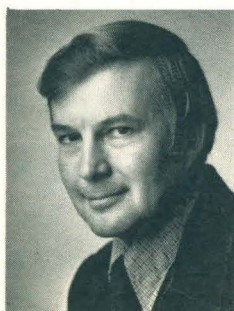
After leading the team to two Minnesota Intercollegiate Athletic Conference championships, Romano decided to move his team from the league and play an independent schedule, with an ultimate goal of joining the prestigious Western Collegiate Hockey Association. During this time, Romano was also serving as UMD's SID, ticket manager, business manager, and assistant Athletic Director. After four independent years, UMD was admitted to the WCHA in 1965-66.

After two more seasons at the helm, Romano stepped down to accept the Athletic Directorship when Lloyd Peterson retired in 1967. He serves on the WCHA's Executive Committee, and has quickly become one of the leaders of the Bulldogs' Northern Intercollegiate Conference.

Romano and his wife Barbara have five children, Ralph Jr. 21, Elaine 20, Jeffrey 18, Kevin 17, and Paul 14.



## FACULTY REPRESENTATIVE RICHARD OJAKANGAS



Dr. Richard Ojakangas, full professor and head of the UMD Department of Geology, is the Bulldogs' faculty representative to both the Western Collegiate Hockey Association and the Northern Intercollegiate Conference.

Ojakangas is the treasurer of the NIC Board of Control, and works with the leagues and the athletic department on league rulings, eligibility, and problems.

A 1955 graduate of UMD, Ojakangas received his master's degree from Missouri in 1960 and his Ph.D. from Stanford in 1964. An avid ski fan,

Ojakangas is a native of Grand Rapids, Minn.

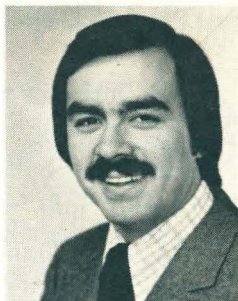
A member of the Fulbright fellowship, Ojakangas has traveled abroad extensively, and has authored textbooks on geology and sedimentary petrology.

**BRUCE McLEOD, ASSISTANT TO ATHLETIC DIRECTOR  
AND SPORTS INFORMATION DIRECTOR**

A 1969 graduate of UMD, Bruce McLeod begins his ninth year as Romano's top aide. He assists with scheduling, budget, arranges athletic housing, eligibility, makes media arrangements, and oversees the Sports Information Department.

A native of Fort Frances, Ontario, McLeod is a former Bulldog hockey player. As a sophomore, he finished second to teammate Huffer Christiansen in the WCHA in scoring, as that duo combined with right wing Pat Francisco as the league's top scoring tandem. The captain of UMD as a senior, McLeod finished his career 22nd on the all-time scoring list with 81 points, appearing in 77 games from 1966-67 to 1968-69. His 41 career goals are 13th highest in UMD history.

Bruce and his wife Monty live in Duluth with their two daughters.

**CHRIS MILLER,  
ASSISTANT SPORTS INFORMATION DIRECTOR**

Chris Miller is in his third year in the UMD Sports Information Department. He handles public relations, news and press releases, game programs, camp brochures, press books, record upkeep and statistics in addition to aiding McLeod with media relations for the Athletic Department.



A junior pre-journalism major, Miller graduated in 1976 from Lincoln High School in Lake City, Minnesota. A former high school basketball player, Miller has been active with the campus newspaper, the Statesman, since arriving at UMD, serving as sports editor during his freshman and sophomore years. He is also a member of the Athletic Committee, and is currently Managing Editor of the Statesman.

**DON ROACH, HEAD ATHLETIC TRAINER**

"Doc" Roach starts his tenth year at UMD as head trainer. A favorite among all athletes, the amiable Roach is also an instructor in the UMD Physical Education Department, and is head coach of the defending NIC tennis champions. Roach has been "NIC Tennis Coach of the Year" for the last two seasons.

After receiving his B.A. from San Jose State, Roach taught health and phy ed at schools in California and Greece. He obtained his master's in athletic training from Indiana University in 1970. He oversees training of the twenty sport program at UMD with the aide of three student assistants.

Chief among the assistants is junior Carl Huntley. A native of Aurora-Hoyt Lakes, Huntley is in his third year as an assistant, handling basketball and baseball duties in addition to assisting Roach with football and hockey. Huntley is also a pitcher on the baseball team.

## CAPTAIN CURT GILES

5-9 - 190 - Senior

**Defenseman - Humboldt, Sask.**

Curt Giles became the Bulldog's seventh hockey All-American last year. He also led all the post-season WCHA All-Star teams in voting as he was generally hailed as the top collegiate blueliner in the nation.

Curt holds most of the defenseman scoring record for season and career at UMD, including most assists in a season (37), most assists in a career (90), most points in a season (49), and points in a career (118). He should break Dave Langevin's career goal record of 35 this season.

Ninth on the All-Time Scoring List, Giles will move into the top five this season and should also set a career mark for assists. He currently trails Keith Christiansen by 31.

This will be Curt's second season as team captain. As a freshman, he was the team's Outstanding Freshman, and won MVP honors as a sophomore when he scored 49 points. He was also co-MVP last year, with goalie Rick Heinz.

Giles is the only defenseman ever at UMD to notch a hat trick. He tallied three times last season in an 8-7 win over Michigan. He also is the only UMD player ever to score six points in a game twice, notching six assists last year against Colorado College after scoring a goal and five assists in a game a week earlier against Michigan State.



Drafted by the Minnesota North Stars in the NHL draft this year, Curt turned down pro offers to return for his final season. The former junior star with the Humboldt Broncos will turn twenty during the 1978-79 season.

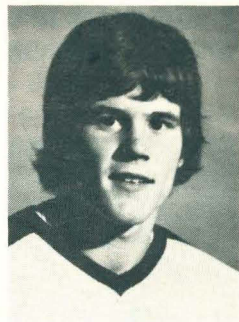
## ALTERNATE CAPTAIN JOHN HARRINGTON RIGHT WING

**5-10 175 SENIOR VIRGINIA, MINN.**

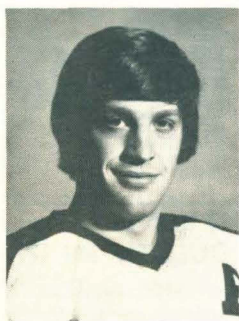
"Bah" Harrington won the Goldie Wolfe Award last season as Most Inspirational Player and also won Most Improved honors. He scored 22 goals despite missing six games with injuries. Harrington also set a Bulldog record by scoring five shorthanded goals, including two during the same penalty against Michigan last season, another UMD first.

Hustle and hard work characterize Bah. He was hampered by injuries during his sophomore season after a good frosh campaign. A three sport star at Virginia High School, he lettered in football and baseball in addition to hockey.

His goal total last year was 14th highest in the Bulldog record books—quite a feat when one considers that he didn't appear regularly on the power play unit. A leader by example, Harrington hopes to close out his career with a flourish. With a good season Bah could become the 16th member of the career 100 point club.

## ALTERNATE CAPTAIN JOHN ROTHSTEIN RIGHT WING

**5-10 177 SENIOR GRAND RAPIDS, MINN.**

John Rothstein was the Bulldogs' fourth leading scorer last season, notching 43 points—chiefly from his team leading 26 goals, third highest for a single season in UMD history.

Also an alternate captain last year, Rothstein has played in 110 consecutive games since coming to UMD, a Bulldog record, and he should break the career record for games played, 146, if he remains injury free this season.

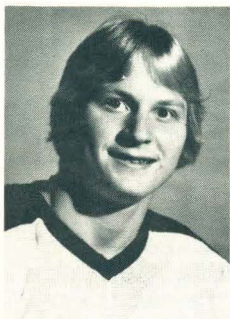
John was one of the most highly recruited prepsters ever, and he was drafted twice by pro teams before he graduated from high school.
