THE UNIVERSITY OF MINNESOTA-DULUTH

There has been one overriding characteristic about the University of Minnesota-Duluth that hasn't changed in all of its 41 years — that characteristic is growth.

Before Minnesota-Duluth (founded as Duluth Normal School in 1902) became a coordinate campus of the University of Minnesota in 1947, the site the present day facility occupies was nothing more than brush and woods. By the early 1950s, however, the campus was already taking shape with the Science Building (now called the Chemistry Building) and the Physical Education Building in place. Administrators had a far-reaching plan for Minnesota-Duluth's orderly development to 1970. The plan envisioned a student body of 3,500 students by 1970 — more than 5,000 students were actually enrolled by then.

Today, as indicated by this year's enrollment of close to 7,500 students, Minnesota-Duluth continues its steady growth. New programs recently developed at Minnesota-Duluth include the first four-year computer engineering program in the state of Minnesota and two four-year degrees in industrial and materials processing engineering.

Minnesota-Duluth also offers more instructional programs than ever for both undergraduate and graduate students in six colleges and schools. Students choose from over 70 undergraduate majors leading to four associate (two-year) degrees and 10 bachelor's degrees, with teacher licensure offered in about 40 areas. Graduate students can earn five master's degrees in 14 fields, with the School of Medicine offering the first two years of graduate basic science.

The campus, located in the Arrowhead region of Northeastern Minnesota overlooking Lake Superior, has 36 buildings, some unique to college campuses: Tweed Museum of Art, Marshall W. Alworth Planetarium, Marshall Performing Arts Center, the new Sports and Health Center, and the nearby Glensheen Mansion.

Minnesota-Duluth's 41 years of continued growth, now under the leadership of Chancellor Dr. Lawrence A. Ianni, is a prime example of the area's commitment to quality higher education.

ON THE COVER:

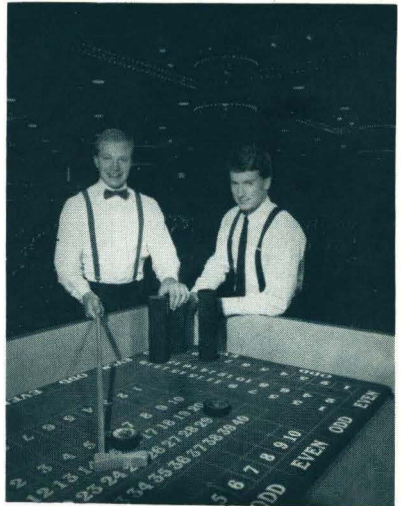

THE DULUTH ARENA

The Bulldog hockey program is enhanced by the beautiful and recently renovated Duluth Arena that's the "Home of the Bulldogs."

Located on the waterfront near Duluth's famous Aerial Bridge and Canal Park, the Duluth Entertainment and Convention Center has become a landmark in its somewhat brief history. Built in 1966 at a cost of \$6.5 million, the Arena portion of the complex houses the 85 x 190 foot hockey rink of 5,664 seating capacity, locker room facilities, and several meeting rooms. The rink area is extremely versatile as it can easily and quickly be converted into a different "stage" — The Arena also hosts many concerts, dinners, conventions, shows, and other programs.

A catwalk system above the Arena's ceiling makes for easy access to eight spotlights in baskets, all of which are controlled by a centralized technician's console. A ventilating system capable of changing the air every eight minutes and air conditioning provide for excellent spectator comfort. There are two spacious press boxes to accommodate radio, television, and press media, and a four-sided \$25,000 scoreboard above center ice tells the story of each game to every fan. An appealing and informative message board was added to the scoreboard four years ago.

A spacious lobby where ticket sales originate separates the Arena from the Auditorium. The Auditorium plays host to concerts, plays, operas, high school graduations, and a variety of other activities. Individual parties also rent out the mezzanine portion of the Auditorium for private parties.

Paulucci Hall, located beneath the lobby, is the center for many post-game parties.

In 1976, an addition was built — Pioneer Hall and the Duluth Curling Club. Pioneer Hall contains a hockey rink and a smaller seating capability with fold-out bleacher seating and is used primarily by St. Scholastica's hockey team and area high school teams. It is also the home of the Duluth Curling Club with eight curling rinks and an upstairs lounge. The Duluth Arena, incidentally, was the site of the 1976 and 1984 Silver Broom world curling championships.

Currently under construction adjacent to the Arena is the \$16 million Duluth Entertainment and Convention Center, which is expected to be completed later this year and will host a number of social and entertainment events.

A huge parking lot allows for close parking, and a skywalk system — Northwest Passage — links the Convention and Entertainment Center to Duluth's downtown.

THE WESTERN COLLEGIATE HOCKEY ASSOCIATION

John Mariucci ... Tony Esposito ... Keith Magnuson ... Lou Nanne ... Mark Johnson ... Lou Angotti ... Brett Hull ... Neal Broten ... and the list goes on and on!

You'd be excused if you mistook the list of hockey notables as a sampling of the names out of the Hockey Hall of Fame. Rather, each of the names played a significant role in the growth and development of what has come to be considered the elite college hockey league in the country — the Western Collegiate Hockey Association (WCHA).

The WCHA as we know it today was born in 1959, but its ancestry can be traced all the way back to 1951-52, when Colorado College laid claim to the Midwest College Hockey League championship. Mariucci's Minnesota Gophers rode the crest of Mayasich's heroics to the 1952-53 title before the Midwest Collegiate Hockey League was transformed into the Western Intercollegiate Hockey League (WIHL). Michigan and Colorado College dominated with WIHL throughout the 50's until the league was dissolved in 1958-59.

The seven original schools that made up the MCHL and WIHL — Colorado College, Denver University, Michigan, Michigan State and Michigan Tech, Minnesota, and North Dakota — regrouped in 1959-60 to begin the Western Collegiate Hockey Association.

Denver and Michigan Tech became the domineering teams as two of college hockey's legendary coaches — Murray Armstrong of Denver and Tech's John MacInnes — each won six league titles in the first 17 years of the league's existence. Since 1976, however, Minnesota, Wisconsin, and North Dakota have become the "New York Yankees" of college hockey.

Minnesota-Duluth became the first "expansion" team in the WCHA when it was inducted into the ranks in 1965-66 and Wisconsin made it a nine-team league in 1969-70. The last addition to the conference came in 1971-72 when Notre Dame was added.

The WCHA remained a 10-team league for 10 years, continually sending representatives to the NCAA championships and bringing home title after title. However, there was upheaval in 1981-82 with the abduction of four teams — Michigan, Michigan State, Michigan Tech, and Notre Dame — to the Central Collegiate Hockey Association (CCHA). Nonetheless, the shrunken WCHA, now reduced to six teams, remained the top league in the land.

As the 1982-83 season closed, rumors persisted of an impending merger between the WCHA and CCHA. Rumors soon turned into fruitful negotiations that seemed to be going well until a last-minute stumbling block sent representatives from both leagues home.

But in 1984-85, the WCHA expanded once again back to eight teams as charter league member Michigan Tech returned along with newcomer and Upper Peninsula neighbor Northern Michigan. Both schools had been members of the CCHA.

So as the WCHA prepares to begin its 30th year of operation, eight teams consisting of some 250 players and coaches will continue to write the success script begun by the Mariuccis of yesterday. And, with 11 of the last 16 NCAA Championship titles going to WCHA schools, that's one heck of a success script.

MIKE SERTICH

Head Coach

It was the spring of 1982 and the University of Minnesota-Duluth had just completed another so-so hockey season. Something, declared the athletic department powers-that-be, had to be done. Enter Mike Sertich, a man who had virtually no previous track record as a head coach at any level, but a man who nevertheless had already been recognized as a great motivator and hockey tactician. The results, to say the least, were splendid. Almost immediately, Sertich instilled a new sense of pride and positive attitude in the Bulldogs which parlayed into success on the ice rink. And now, some five odd years later, he continues to make Minnesota-Duluth one of the most revered teams in college hockey.

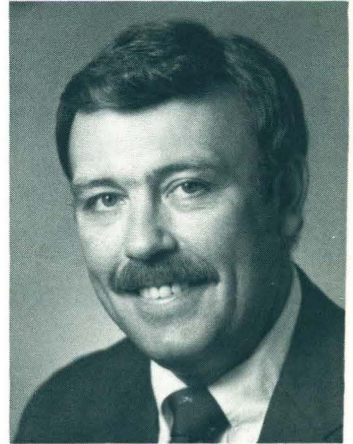
In his half dozen seasons with the Bulldogs, Sertich has assembled a list of statistics that would really do any collegiate coach proud. For openers, his career coaching record at Minnesota-Duluth stands at 148-98-12 (for a winning percentage of .596) which far and away ranks him first among Bulldog coaches in lifetime victories. In addition, he is the only Minnesota-Duluth head man to guide the Bulldogs to a Western

Collegiate Hockey Association championship, a feat he accomplished not only in 1983-84, but also in 1984-85, and to the NCAA playoffs (on three occasions). Sertich's high performance rate has hardly gone without notice. During his first three seasons with the Bulldogs, he was selected WCHA Coach of the Year (an unprecedented achievement) and, in 1984-85, was also named the American Hockey Coaches Association Division I Coach of the Year (Spencer-Penrose Award).

But despite the sudden and enormous amount of success, the 41-year-old Sertich has remained basically the same quick-witted, personable guy that he was when he accepted the Bulldogs' head coaching position back in April 1982.

"I have always believed that it's critical to keep your priorities in order," says Sertich. "If you start losing sight of what's important and what's not, it might not be long before you find yourself losing touch with a lot of things."

Sertich found himself in somewhat the same kind of predicament about seven years ago when alcohol began to unwantedly seep into his life. About the same time, Sertich seriously contemplated leaving hockey, and in fact had submitted his letter of resignation as a Bulldog assistant coach. But after some deep soul searching, Sertich was able to conquer his bout with the bottle and eventually took the athletic director Ralph Romano up on his offer to succeed his long-time coaching associate Gus Hendrickson as the Bulldogs' 11th head coach.



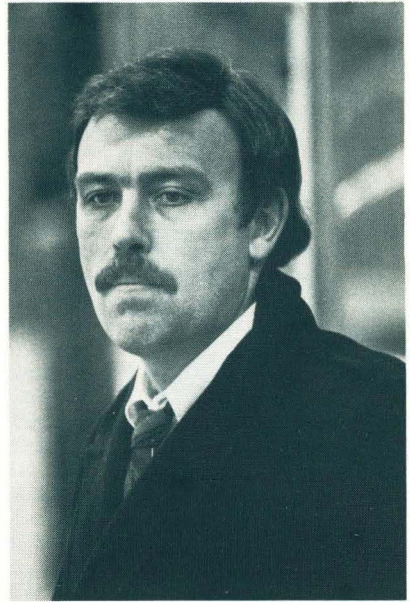

Born and raised in Virginia, in the heart of Minnesota's Iron Range, Sertich was not exactly an extraordinarily gifted athlete himself, but a strict adherence to the work ethic made him a standout in hockey, football, and baseball at Roosevelt High School in Virginia. Upon graduation from the prep ranks in 1965, Sertich was offered a football scholarship to the University of North Dakota, but instead opted to pursue his first love, hockey, at the University of Minnesota-Duluth, a school that had just gained entrance into the prestigious Western Collegiate Hockey Association. During his three seasons with the Bulldogs (freshmen were not allowed to compete in varsity sports at that time) — 1966-69 — Sertich, as he himself is quick to admit, was no superstar. However, he was perhaps one of the hardest workers on the club. His career statistics for his three-year collegiate stint include two goals and seven assists for nine points in 64 games. Realizing full well that these are not Wayne Gretzky-type numbers, Sertich still jokes on occasion of the "scoring prowess" he possessed while a player at Minnesota-Duluth. After all, history does indeed show that the only goal he rang up in WCHA play came at the expense of a fellow by the name of Tony Esposito, then a netminder with Michigan Tech University and later of Chicago Blackhawk fame.



Following his graduation from Minnesota-Duluth in 1969 with a bachelor of science degree in physical education, Sertich wasted little time in landing his first teaching and coaching job, joining head coach Gus Hendrickson at Grand Rapids High School. After the two had literally persuaded both Hendrickson and Sertich to try their coaching magic at the collegiate level. Sertich, who had also been an assistant with the Grand Rapids baseball team, served as Hendrickson's right-hand man and the Bulldogs' chief recruiter for seven years before accepting his current post.

Active in many local community groups and organizations, Sertich and his wife, Audie, have three children — Scott, 20 (a member of the College of St. Scholastica hockey team); John, 18; and Lori, 11.

"We take too many things for granted in life and playing hockey at the University of Minnesota-Duluth is a once-in-a-lifetime privilege. Part of my job, as I see it, is to make sure our players make the most of their opportunity as members of this hockey program and University."

JIM KNAPP **Assistant Coach**

One team's loss is another team's gain.

So it went with Jim Knapp who, in 1982, was laid off from his teaching and head coaching duties at Aurora-Hoyt Lakes High School only to latch on as an assistant hockey coach with then first-year head coach Mike Sertich at the University of Minnesota-Duluth.

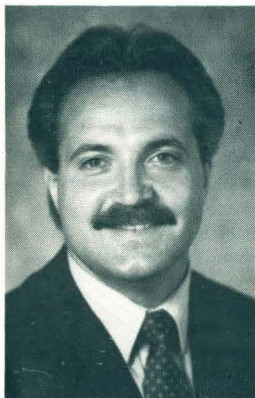
Knapp's return to the Twin Ports was somewhat of a homecoming. From 1972-76, the International Falls native skated at defense for the Bulldogs, winning the Goldie Wolfe Most Inspirational Player Award as a senior in 1975-76.

Following the graduation from Minnesota-Duluth in 1976, Knapp served as a student assistant coach for one year before securing the head coaching post at Aurora-Hoyt Lakes High School. While at A-HLHS, he elevated the Blackhawk program from the depths of the Iron Range Conference standings to a legitimate Minnesota prep powerhouse.

In his five seasons at the Blackhawk helm, Knapp turned out a number of top-notch college prospects including former Bulldog standouts Matt Christensen, Bob Lakso and Mike Valesano.

An avid outdoorsman, Knapp has coached various AHAUS elite camp teams the past three summers. In addition to coaching, he is also an instructor in Minnesota-Duluth's Department of Health, Physical Education and Recreation.

The 35-year old Knapp and his wife, Laurie, have three sons — Jesse (12), B.J. (9), and Dan (6).



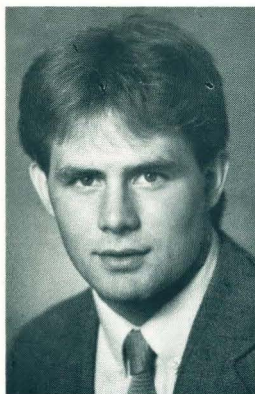
GLENN KULYK **Assistant Coach**

Another product of the Minnesota-Duluth hockey program, Glenn Kulyk is in his eighth season with the Bulldogs, making him the dean of the Minnesota-Duluth coaching staff.

The Prince Albert (Saskatchewan) native enjoyed a successful playing career with the Bulldogs as a center from 1976-80. During that span, Kulyk racked up 44 goals and 75 assists for 119 points in 136 games to rank 27th (tied with fellow Prince Albert native and 1985-86 Bulldog captain Mark Odnokon) on the all-time Bulldog scoring charts. As a senior in 1979-80, Kulyk paced Minnesota-Duluth in scoring with 62 points.

Following his collegiate playing days, Kulyk spent one season with the Baltimore Clippers (a minor league affiliate of the Winnipeg Jets) of the American Hockey League.

Kulyk, 30, who was graduated from Minnesota-Duluth in 1980 with a B.A.S. degree in physical education, is responsible for recruiting and working with the Bulldog forwards in practices.



BRIAN JOHNSON **Assistant Coach**

After closing out his collegiate playing days with the Bulldogs two years ago, Brian Johnson returns to his alma mater as a Minnesota-Duluth assistant coach for the 1988-89 season.

One of Minnesota-Duluth's alternate captains as a senior in 1986-87, Johnson, 23, was a four-year hockey letterman who began his Bulldog career at defense, but was later switched to center to maximize his polished offensive skills. In 1986-87 he was second on the Bulldog scoring charts with 40 points (20 goals and 20 assists) after a 48-point junior season. Johnson's 112 career points in 158 games rank 30th on the all-time Minnesota-Duluth scoring list.

A member of the 1986 U.S. National Team which competed in the World Ice Hockey Championships in Moscow, Johnson was also a two-time U.S. Sports Festival participant while attending Minnesota-Duluth.

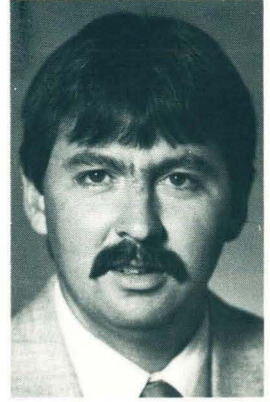
Johnson, a native of Silver Bay, MN, went on to receive a tryout with the 1988 U.S. Olympic Team and attended the Hartford Whalers camp (he was a 1983 draft pick of the NHL club) that same year.

The former Silver Bay High School hockey standout is presently completing his physical education degree at Minnesota-Duluth.

BULLDOG HOCKEY STAFF

RICK MENZ **Equipment Coordinator**

A man whose value to the Bulldog athletic program is hard to appraise because of his behind-the-scenes type of work, Rick Menz is in his ninth year with the Minnesota-Duluth hockey contingent as the equipment coordinator. Born and reared in Duluth, Menz is a 1969 graduate of Cathedral High School. During his high school days, he was employed by the Duluth Arena, where he worked his way up the ranks to become the ice maintenance supervisor in 1975. In the fall of 1979, he was appointed equipment coordinator at Minnesota-Duluth in charge of buying, issuing, repairing, and maintaining equipment for all Bulldog varsity sports. While working at Minnesota-Duluth, Menz completed his undergraduate degree in history and geography. In 1983, he was the equipment coordinator at the National Sports Festival in Colorado Springs, CO. The 37-year old Menz and his wife, Sue, have a daughter, Lauri (8), and a son, Derek (5).



BETTY FLEISSNER **Assistant Trainer**

A product of the student training program initiated in the early 1970s, Betty Fleissner has served as Minnesota-Duluth's assistant athletic trainer for the past eight years, working primarily with the Bulldog hockey and football teams. Fleissner was graduated from Duluth Denfeld High School in 1976 and was an All-State selection in basketball after helping lead the Hunters to the Minnesota State Tournament in 1976. She was also a member of the Denfeld volleyball and softball units and is a former All-City badminton champion. Fleissner continued to compete in volleyball, basketball and softball at Minnesota-Duluth where she earned a B.A.S. degree in physical education in 1981. She is married to former Bulldog football standout Kelly Fleissner.

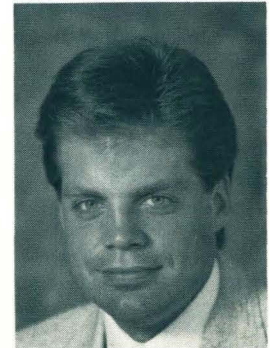


BOB NYGAARD **Sports Information Director**

The last few years have seen Minnesota-Duluth athletics, particularly hockey, rise to a new position of public awareness and keeping the Bulldogs in the minds of the media and public is sports information director Bob Nygaard.

Now in his sixth year at the Minnesota-Duluth SID helm, Nygaard holds a B.A. degree in journalism from the University of Wisconsin Eau-Claire and served as an assistant sports information director in the Blugold Athletic Department. The 1983 graduate of UWEC had previously worked in the Minnesota-Duluth sports information office for two years while a student in 1979-81.

As the sports information director, the 28-year old native Duluthian is in charge of supervising publicity, programs, press releases, records, press facilities and public relations for the 16-sport Bulldog athletic program.



A FEW THOUGHTS FROM MIKE SERTICH

On the strengths of the 1988-89 Bulldogs:

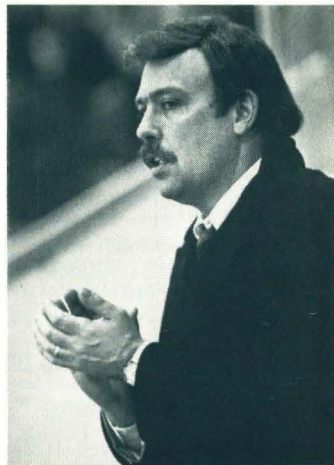
“We have quite a few people returning that have at least one solid year of experience under their belts. Our wings look to be in good shape, we have all of our defensemen — except for Mike DeAngelis — back as well as all of our goaltenders. And, I think we’ve recruited an outstanding young goaltender besides. So, right now our strength is in our numbers and probably experience. The key then will be to get the maximum production and play out of each of these individuals.”

On areas that need improvement:

“Defensively, we are going to have to do a better job as an entire team. I’d like to see us cut down on the number of shots we give up and our goals against average. I’d also like to see us be more aggressive with a lead. Last year we let some games slip away from us that could have meant the difference from maybe finishing as high as second place in the WCHA.”

On the WCHA race in 1988-89:

“It should be interesting. Minnesota, as everyone knows, returns quite a few players from its championship club of a year ago, along with a couple of U.S. Olympians. What they lost compared to what they have coming back gives me every indication to think they are going to be an exceptionally strong hockey team. Michigan Tech and Northern Michigan will be young, but still solid. North Dakota came on strong at the end of last year and it looks like they had a pretty good recruiting year. Colorado College has a new coach and I think they’ll be improved and Denver has a large majority of their people back so they’ll be a team to contend with. Overall, I look for the whole league to be very competitive, top to bottom, with maybe the exception of Minnesota if they get out of the blocks early.”



On how hockey has changed in the two decades since he last skated for the Bulldogs:

“The game is much more wide open now. Basically, there are many more highly skilled players than there were 20 years ago. A lot of the kids today are bigger, stronger and faster. I’m not taking anything away from the Huffer Christiansens, the Bruce McLeods, or Pat Franciscos of my era, but now there are more of them on the ice. I also think college hockey has become a little bit more violent. I don’t think there is as much respect among players now because of all the equipment they are wearing. A lot of that, of course, relates to the facemask. Some kids have gotten to the point where they don’t care where their stick is because they know, for all practical purposes, they are not going to injure anybody. The facemask has given some kids a false sense of courage.”

1987-88: Was at times unnoticed, but certainly not unappreciated, by those that followed Minnesota-Duluth hockey ... did an admirable job of complementing partner and All-WCHA defenseman Mike De-Angelis on the Bulldogs' No. 1 blueline unit ... exceeded his previous two-year scoring totals with six points on one goal (against Lowell in 2-1 Bulldog loss on Jan. 15) and five assists.

AS A BULLDOG: Will serve as Minnesota-Duluth's 45th team captain this winter ... enters senior year with more collegiate game experience (89) than any current Bulldog ... is the least penalized Bulldog over the last three seasons with just six penalties for 12 minutes ... wore No. 23 for the Bulldogs as a freshman and sophomore ... is the consummate stay-at-home type of defenseman ... recognized as Minnesota-Duluth's spirited and motivational leader on and off the ice.

BEFORE UMD: Attended hockey-rich Athol Murray College of Notre Dame ... rang up 37 points (seven goals and 37 assists) as a the Hounds co-captain in 1984-85 ... toiled three seasons for the hockey Hounds ... was Notre Dame's starting quarterback for two years.

PERSONAL: Born Patrick John Janostin on Nov. 17, 1966 in Battleford, SASK ... son of Ben and Jeanette Janostin ... has two brothers and sisters ... nicknamed "Haff" ... is the property of the New York Rangers (fourth round and 70th pick overall in the 1985 NHL draft) ... majoring in communication at Minnesota-Duluth.

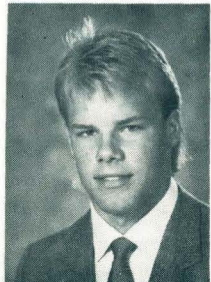
1 Chad Erickson

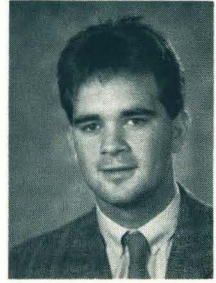

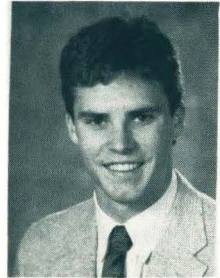

A HISTORY OF BULLDOG HOCKEY: 44 YEARS OF TRADITION

It all began well over a half century ago on a frozen sheet of outdoor ice near the east side of Duluth. The equipment was, to say the least, crude and the talent certainly wasn't much better.

But those hardy souls of yesteryear, as well as those that were to follow later, are the ones who helped shape and mold the University of Minnesota-Duluth hockey program into really what it is today — one of the finest in the nation.

In the winter of 1930, an industrial education instructor by the name of Frank Kovach rounded up a handful of aspiring athletes and formed the first hockey program at what was then known as Duluth State Teachers College. Kovach, who also instigated the first football and basketball teams during that same year, did the most with what he had (DSTC had begun accepting male students just two years earlier) in the inaugural campaign, but nevertheless finished the year with a 0-3-0 record losing twice to Eveleth Junior College and once to Duluth Central High School. Kovach awarded 15 letters that year and the following season his charges turned in a 2-5 mark. But, just as player interest had begun to swing upward, the mighty hand of the Great Depression hit DSTC hockey with a stinging blow. In fact, it wasn't until 1946-47 before hockey would return to the DSTC campus.

Under player coach Joe Oven and faculty adviser Ward Wells, DSTC turned in a commendable 11-6-1 overall record in 1946-47. The following season, DSTC officially became a branch of the University of Minnesota system with the hockey coaching duties going to Hank Jensen. Jensen headed the Bulldogs for four years, compiling a 17-9-1 record during that span, including a perfect 7-0 mark in 1948-49, UMD's only unbeaten season.

UMD joined the Minnesota Intercollegiate Athletic Conference (MIAC) just prior to the 1949-50 season and began a kind of domination that is rare in sports.

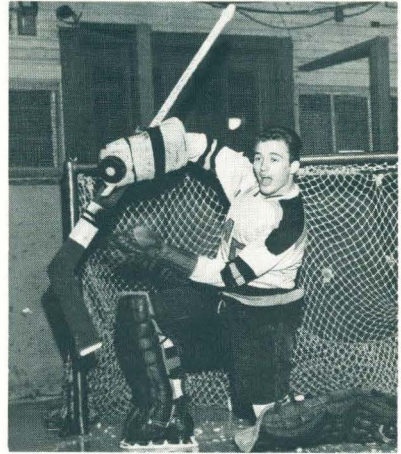
Under coach Gord Eddolls, a former Bulldog hockey standout who succeeded Jensen in 1951, UMD copped its first MIAC title in 1951-53, sharing the honor with St. Thomas. The following season, the Bulldogs won their first outright MIAC championship behind a group of Duluth Denfeld High School alumni — Alex Sisto, Frank Johnson, Al Peterson and Bob Boyat. Another Denfeld graduate, Duane Dubug Johnson, had a superb year in the nets and his backup goalie that year was former UMD athletic director Ralph Romano.

The 1954-55 Bulldogs (coached by Bob Boyat) slipped to second place behind St. Thomas in the MIAC race, but Don Bourdeau, who ended a long coaching stint two years ago at nearby Duluth East High School, finished as the conference's scoring champion. Connie Pleban, who had coached the 1952 U.S. Olympic Team to a silver medal in the Winter Games at Helsinki, Finland, took over the coaching duties in 1955-56 and Harvey Flaman paced the club in scoring that year with 54 points, a school record at the time.

UMD's conference unbeaten string was stretched to 25 games through the 1956-57 season as the Bulldogs assembled one of the best hockey outfits in school history. Canadian imports Flaman, Elmer Schwartz and Jerry Kleisinger each played a big role for UMD during that year. Flaman and Schwartz each set six individual scoring records while Kleisinger had an amazing 1.10 goals against average in the conference as the Bulldogs skated to a 16-4-3 record overall.

The 1957-58 season has been chronicled as "the turning point" in UMD hockey lore as the Bulldogs began to play a national-caliber schedule. Their unbeaten string in MIAC play not only reached 35, but the scores were becoming so one-sided that officials began to consider dropping out of the MIAC to pursue a higher calling.

Pleban, at the time the winningest coach in UMD hockey history, left the UMD program to accept a position with the 1960 Olympic team and Ralph Romano kept the Bulldogs' MIAC streak alive the next two years, reaching 56 before UMD elected to abandon the MIAC in hopes of establishing itself as a legitimate

national power.

For the next four years, UMD played an independent schedule, largely against teams from the prestigious WCHA, and their record steadily improved against the best college hockey teams in the land. Finally, in 1965-66, the Bulldogs were awarded the first "expansion franchise" in the WCHA.

UMD's infancy in the WCHA was highlighted by the fascination of Bulldog fans with pint-size center Keith "Huffer" Christiansen, who set five scoring records in 1966-67, led the league in scoring, and followed by one year the selection of teammate Bob Hill as an All-American. Bruce McLeod, who today is the athletic director at UMD, and Pat Francisco finished second and third in the WCHA scoring race as UMD enjoyed its best season to that point against national competition. That also was the year that the Bulldogs left the cozy Duluth Curling Club to move into Duluth's renowned new Duluth Arena complex.

Romano resigned as head coach in 1968 to move into administration, and the torch was passed on to Bill Selman, who coached at UMD for two seasons as the Bulldogs continued to press hard to move up in the WCHA Standings. Ron Busniuk and Murray Keogan become UMD's third and fourth All-Americans in 1970, and Walt Ledingham won the same honor the next two seasons.

Selman's assistant, former player Terry Shercliffe, then began a five-year stint in 1970 as head coach that included UMD's first season in the WCHA over .500 in 1972-73. Pat Boutette joined the All-American Club, and Tom Milani, who still holds the school record for most goals in a career with 100, was the new man in town.

In 1975-76, UMD officials persuaded Gus Hendrickson and Mike Sertich, who had built a hockey dynasty at Grand Rapids High School, to take over the program. Hendrickson's first couple of years concentrated on rebuilding the program with the likes of Dave Langevin, Rick Heinz, and Curt Giles, but in 1978-79 the Bulldogs posted a 22-14-4 record, and at one point were ranked the No. 1 team in the country! Mark Pavelich and Bah Harrington of Olympic fame were two of the leading characters in the script that year.

But the 'Dogs tumbled back into the lower half of the standings in 1979-80, and it wasn't until 1982-83 that UMD was able to crack the WCHA's upper division. Under then first-year coach Mike Sertich, a former Bulldog himself, UMD placed fourth in the final league standings and gained its first ever invitation to the NCAA championships. The following year, Sertich proved 1982-83 was no fluke as the Bulldogs posted a then school-best 29-11-2 overall record, clinched their first WCHA title and placed second in the NCAA finals in Lake Placid, NY. A year later Sertich's magic continued. Minnesota-Duluth took home its second straight WCHA regular season and playoff crowns and earned another trip to the NCAA Championships in Detroit, where the Bulldogs finished third. Overall, the Bulldogs charted a school-record 36-9-3 mark and three players — right wing Bill Watson, defenseman Norm Maciver, and goaltender Rick Kosti — were named to the Titan All-American Team. Maciver gained All-American status again in 1985-86 while defenseman Mike DeAngelis was a second team All-American team pick last season.

Filling Up The House

The University of Minnesota-Duluth has long been praised for its loyal and dedicated hockey following. In the 22 years the Bulldogs have occupied the Duluth Arena, for example, they have drawn over 2,000,000 spectators to home contests. During nine of the last 10 years Minnesota-Duluth has played in front of home crowds averaging over 5,000 per game. In 1984-85, the Bulldogs established a single-season attendance record with 157,257 while selling out an amazing 25 of their 28 games at the 5,664-seat Duluth Arena.

BULLDOG ATHLETICS

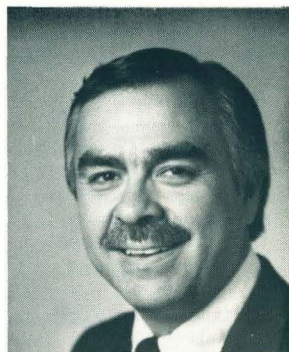
The University of Minnesota-Duluth offers one of the most balanced as well as competitive athletic programs for schools of its size in the country. Minnesota-Duluth is a member of the NCAA (Division II) except for hockey, which competes at the Division I level and the NAIA. The Bulldog men are members of the Northern Intercollegiate Conference (except for hockey which is aligned with the prestigious Western Collegiate Hockey Association) while the Minnesota-Duluth women participate in the Northern Sun Conference.

In 1987-88, Bulldog teams captured conference championships in football, men's basketball, wrestling, men's tennis, women's volleyball, and softball. The men's basketball, wrestling, women's basketball and softball contingents all advanced to the NAIA national championships last year while the volleyball unit earned its second consecutive NCAA II post-season berth. In addition, Minnesota-Duluth laid claim to its third straight NIC all-sports title.

Overseeing the Bulldogs' 16 varsity sports (nine men and seven women) program is Bruce McLeod, who is in his fourth full year as the Director of Intercollegiate Athletics. McLeod, 41, succeeded the late Ralph Romano in December 1983 after working his way through virtually the entire Minnesota-Duluth Athletic Department. He served at one time or another as the sports information director, the business manager, and assistant athletic director (a position he held from 1977-1983).

A native of Fort Frances, Ontario, McLeod first made his mark at Minnesota-Duluth as a standout left wing on the Bulldog hockey team. During his three-year collegiate ice career (1966-69), McLeod racked up 81 points in 77 games and was the Bulldog's captain as a senior during the 1968-69 season.

Presently chairman of the NCAA Division I Ice Hockey Committee, McLeod is a 1969 graduate of Minnesota-Duluth. He has two daughters, Leah and Shannon.

A BULLDOG FOR ALL TIME

He was, after all, somewhat of a Bulldog legend — a diminutive, but crafty, center iceman who simply helped propel the University of Minnesota-Duluth into college hockey's so-called big time back in the 1960s. So when the Minnesota-Duluth Department of Intercollegiate Athletics officially retired his familiar No. 9 jersey on Jan. 30, 1988, Keith "Huffer" Christiansen was at last bestowed with a lasting and just reward. Christiansen, pictured in his hockey heyday (right) and with family and friends at last year's dedication ceremonies at the Duluth Arena (below) concluded his four-year Bulldog career in 1966-67 with 196 points in 102 games. As a senior, he paced the WCHA in scoring while being named the league's Most Valuable Player. Christiansen, a 1966-67 All-American, ranks second only to Bill Watson (the Hobey Baker Award winner in 1984-85) in career points per game (1.92) among Bulldogs and still shares the Minnesota-Duluth record for most points in one game (six against Minnesota in the first Bulldog game ever played at the Duluth Arena in Nov. 19, 1966). Christiansen's jersey, incidentally, is the only one ever retired in any sport by Minnesota-Duluth.
