Register to Vote:

As members of a diverse University community, we all share in the responsibility of shaping our society. For citizens of the United States age 18 and older, voting is the easiest way to participate in a social dialogue. The deadline if you live in Minnesota to pre-register to vote is October 13. However, after that date you can still vote absentee or register at your polling location on Election Day. If you are from a different state and plan on voting there, please check your state's rules and deadlines.

During these unprecedented times, voting may take a little more planning than it has in the past. However, the state of Minnesota provides you with three reliable options casting your ballot:

- Vote in person on November 3 at your [polling place](#). To vote in person, you must be registered by October 13 at 5:00 p.m. or take advantage of Minnesota's "same day registration" option.
- [Apply to vote absentee by mail](#). Using this method, your ballot must be postmarked by November 3 and arrive at your county election office by November 10.

We hope these different options will make it possible for students to vote without missing class.
