Happy November greetings! Tomorrow is Election Day. If you are still hanging on to an absentee ballot DO NOT put it in the mail--but instead drop it off. This came from our government relations people Friday afternoon.

1. Drop ballots off at an early voting drop box or county election office. (locations at <https://www.sos.state.mn.us/elections-voting/find-county-election-office/>)

2. Use in-person early voting, with extended weekend hours. (locations at <http://z.umn.edu/votes>)

3. Vote the traditional way on Election Day, Tuesday, November 3



Changes in Enrollment Management

Mike Griffin, director of enrollment management, will be leaving UMN Crookston at the end of the academic year. Jessica Hanson will step in immediately as interim director of enrollment management. Mike will work with Jessica and Janessa Quanrud, assistant director, over the next eight months to facilitate a smooth transition and continued progress with new student enrollment. Mike, Jessica, Janessa and their team have done an excellent job of recruiting students during this difficult COVID-19 pandemic and are off to a strong start for the 2021-22 year.

As you may recall, Mike started with us as a consultant to guide our admissions office and was later selected as the director. In addition to supporting and mentoring Jessica and Janessa, Mike will assist with increased usage, analysis, and capabilities of our new enrollment management software, Slate; develop specific marketing campaigns for targeted potential student populations; institute strategies for greater leveraging with financial aid; and other important admissions functions. The financial aid team will also continue to report to Mike.

United Way

Our United Way campaign wraps up Friday, November 6 and we need your support. In anticipation of so much disruption of COVID-19, we significantly lowered our usual campus giving from \$13,000 to \$6,000. Sadly, we aren't reaching this goal. We have raised \$4,554, which is 75% of our goal of \$6,000.

Of the 348 NWROC, Extension, and UMN Crookston staff/faculty, 97 have returned their envelopes or emailed indicating their intentions with only 29 people who have contributed
