From the Chancellor

I hope you had a chance to enjoy some of our nice weather before the reality of colder temperatures and snow affect us. As I am sure you are all aware, the cases of COVID-19 have been increasing rapidly. Three weeks ago, we had less than 400 cases in Polk

a per capita basis, North Dakota has the highest affected rates in the U.S. and some of the highest in the world. Remember to use your saliva test if you want to know your infection status. While we may be tired, the virus is not. Don't let your guard down, stay away from large gatherings, and only associate with people in your pod.



On Saturday, Joe Biden and Kamala Harris were named winners of the 2020 election for President and Vice President of the United States. Regardless of your political affiliation, if ever there was a time to support our leaders, it is now. In part, this is the case because we are in the midst of a historic pandemic that touches nearly every aspect of our lives, has killed more than 240,000 in the United States, and is having catastrophic economic consequences. Additionally, Kamala Harris will make history as the first woman, Black woman, and woman of Indian descent to hold the office of Vice President of the United States. For women across the country, especially those who are Black or Desi-American, this election marks the shattering of a glass ceiling and opening a door for leadership to future women and women of color—perhaps one of our students here at the University of Minnesota Crookston.

The agenda will include the protocol for students safely returning to their homes and returning back to campus in January. Dear Students, Staff, and Faculty:

The University is hosting gatherings to help us reach across our political differences and move forward collectively. We hope you will join students, staff, and faculty in [With Malice Toward None](#) gatherings developed by the nonprofit and nonpartisan [Braver Angels](#).

The goal of these forums is to engage in meaningful dialogue that facilitates teaching and learning in our University community. There will be two stages and opportunities for engagement. In the first stage, groups of people who feel similarly about the presidential election will discuss how they want to engage with those who feel differently. In the second stage, groups of people who hold differing political views about the presidential election will come together to better understand each other, find common ground, and in the words of Braver Angels, “build the capacity of we-the-people to depolarize our politics and forge a new citizenship.”

Please note these forums are not meant to obscure strong political differences or encourage people to support a particular candidate or party. Instead, they aim to advance dialogue, encourage respect for others, and build connections for civic work across differences.

For now, [we invite you to register](#) for the initial gathering with people who feel similarly about the presidential election—either a large group University-hosted gathering or a small, self-hosted gathering. 
Grateful Voices - Video Series

Retirement Gatherings

"Over the summer we discussed employee retirement gatherings and whether they could be held on campus while complying with the University's COVID-related health and safety criteria. Given that [Minnesota and the Midwest are seeing an uptick in cases](#), I think it is important to revisit this topic.

The Minnesota Department of Health [Guidance for Mitigating COVID-19 at Higher Education Institutions](#) limits indoor gatherings to 10 people. However, [we encourage student groups under the Maroon and Gold Plan](#) to conduct all activities, events, and meetings virtually. As faculty and staff, we serve as role models to students and we should demonstrate the same behaviors we ask of students by avoiding unnecessary in-person social gatherings whenever possible. Our continued vigilance is needed to control the virus spread as much as possible during the fall and winter. With social gatherings largely held indoors during this time, in-person social celebrations pose an even greater risk for virus spread that we want to avoid.

At the local level, the number of retirements may seem small, but altogether more than 700 faculty and staff are taking advantage of the RIO program. If each of these individuals has nine people at a retirement celebration, it could lead to 7,000 people gathering for retirement events on campus over the next several months. This would run counter to the advice of epidemiologists within our institution to discourage in-person social gatherings.

For now, COVID-19 has disrupted our ability to connect socially and it is disappointing that we are unable to celebrate our colleagues' service to the University, but there are a number of creative approaches that departments can use to recognize people virtually or to plan a future celebration when we are able to do so safely."


