Dear Colleagues,

One of my former colleagues, Margaret, spent two years as a Peace Corps volunteer in Swahili early in her career. Later I worked with Margaret on a USAID project in rural Uganda helping to establish boreholes for water and planting gardens for greater food

in Uganda and frequently use the term and concept they used in Swahili “harambee,” which in English translates as “all pull together.”

I recently read an article from another university leader talking about their COVID experiences. He used the same word “harambee,” from his time in Swahili to describe his university’s response during COVID-19. It seems like the perfect word for what is happening here at the University of Minnesota Crookston. You all are going above and beyond and pulling together to help our students learn and grow through this unique time. I’ve been in many meetings where the question is “Can we do this?” and the response is, “We will figure it out.”



Thank you for the many changes you had to make, improvising along the way, sacrificing your extra time and energy to get things done.

COVID-19

While we don’t have all the details yet on the COVID-19 vaccination roll out; let me share what we know and don’t know.

- We don’t know if we will be receiving COVID vaccines through our University System or Polk County Public Health.
- Nan Widseth, one of our primary health professionals on-campus, and others are in coordination with both entities and planning for either option, depending on availability and the organization which can assist us most quickly.
- Neither the University or Polk County Health receive vaccines directly from either the manufacturers or the federal government. Instead, states have the responsibility to determine how to distribute the vaccine doses released by the federal government. In our state, the Minnesota Department of Health (MDH) sets distribution priorities and releases batches of vaccines. Potential vaccine recipients are based on MDH priorities. MDH must approve the University’s and Polk County’s request and then release doses of vaccine.

Hope





From Athletics

The UMN Crookston women's basketball team picked up their first season sweep of perennial power Northern State University in program history last weekend. The Golden Eagles defeated the Wolves 66-63 Friday and 69-64 Saturday in two games that came down to the final whistle.

Minnesota Crookston was guided by Emma Carpenter with 16 points and Mary Burke with 15 points Friday. Freshman Jes Mertens tallied a school-record seven steals in the win.

Saturday, UMN Crookston looked to Mertens with 19 points. Burke added 13 points in the game. Haylee Wheeler, playing in only her second game back from an ACL injury in high school, scored 10 points and secured five rebounds.

The Golden Eagles take on Minot State on the road Friday, January 22 at 6 p.m., and Saturday January 23 at 2 p.m.

In addition, Mertens currently leads all of NCAA Division II in steals per game with 4.83 and is second in the nation with 29 steals.

The Minnesota Crookston men's basketball team returns home after playing No. 2 Northern State tight on the road with much of both games Friday and Saturday. UMN Crookston will play their fifth and sixth games in their friendly confines of Gary Senke Court at Lysaker Gymnasium. The Golden Eagles will face Minot State at 5:30 p.m. Friday and 1:30 p.m. Saturday.

The Golden Eagle hockey team had the week off of games after going 1-1 in their opening weekend against University of Jamestown. Minnesota Crookston will take on the University of North Dakota club team in their first game at the Crookston Sports Center at 7 p.m. Monday, January 25.



UMN Crookston Receives GEER Grants to Benefit Teacher Ed Candidates

Sixteen UMN Crookston candidates are receiving support after the University of Minnesota was recently awarded a Governor’s Emergency Educational Relief (GEER) Grant. GEER funding is a federal grant initiative to address emergency needs during the COVID-19 pandemic. Co-PIs Provost Rachel Croson and CEHD Senior Associate Dean Deborah Dillon determined that the \$104,156 award would be used to meet the needs of future teachers from the Twin Cities, Duluth, Crookston, and Morris campuses. This focus was selected because COVID-19 impacted—and will continue to impact—the progress of many teacher candidates who were in the midst of, or starting critical coursework that required clinical experiences and/or student teaching in PK-12 classrooms. The University of Minnesota (UMN) [Institute on the Environment](#) Educators program is a 15-month fellowship open to all UMN educators - including tenure-track faculty, instructional staff, adjunct faculty, librarians, advisors, and other staff who have a special interest in effective pedagogy and curriculum development. The Educators cohort-based program is:



- Multidisciplinary. Educators bring perspectives from many colleges and departments.
- System-wide. Educators are drawn from all five U of M campuses.
- Innovative. Educators discover new tools and pedagogy for teaching sustainability.

Each IonE Educator develops a focal project around sustainability education, participates and collaborates in a cohort of educators, and has the opportunity to design and implement a collective action (the Sustainability Education Summits, for example) with the cohort. IonE Educators receive 1:1 support from IonE Staff including a dedicated graduate student, as well as consultations and workshops from the UMN Libraries and UMN Center for Education Innovation. They receive the myriad benefits of being an IonE Affiliate.

To apply, email your application materials to ioneaffiliates@umn.edu by March 31, 2021. Individuals can apply by submitting:

- 1) Letter of support from a department chair, dean, or associate dean (or similar supervisory role). If none of these is available, please reach out to ioneaffiliates@umn.edu prior to the application deadline to find out what else could be submitted in place of this letter.
- 2) Cover letter describing environmental or sustainability education experiences; and a description of, and the goals, for an educational project or activity they seek to advance during the fellowship year.
- 3) CV highlighting the qualifications described above

Selection will be based on the potential for the proposed project to significantly advance sustainability education within and outside of the University of Minnesota system. IonE Educators are recommended by IonE's Faculty Leadership Council with council from the IonE Educators Advisory Board and IonE staff. Consultation with IonE education/leadership staff about possible projects is strongly encouraged before submitting an application.
