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### **From the Student Success Center**

Did you know UMN Crookston's tutoring program is now certified through not just one, but two different national organizations?

ACTLA Online Tutoring Program Certification

In April 2018, Josh Parrill and Kelsey Torgerson were invited to attend the Association of Colleges for Tutoring and Learning Assistance (ACTLA) national conference to participate in a day-long workshop with other tutoring and learning assistance professionals. The goal

year, helping to revise and edit the standards. In April 2019, ACTLA published their [Principles, Standards, and Effective Practices for Quality Online Tutoring](#) which now serve as a framework for online tutoring support services.

Shortly after the standards were published, Josh and Kelsey were invited to participate in the pilot program for ACTLA's Online Tutoring Program Certification. The tutoring program at UMN Crookston has been a leader in online tutoring and ACTLA wanted our campus's input as this new certification was being developed. Josh and Kelsey worked together to compile documentation, submit the application, and provide feedback for this new certification. We are pleased to announce that just a few weeks ago UMN Crookston has officially earned ACTLA's Online Tutoring Program Certification. Our campus will be recognized at the upcoming national conference in April and UMN Crookston's tutoring program is now serving as a resource for other universities as they work to expand and improve their online tutoring offerings. Josh and Kelsey have both been accepted to present their work at various national conferences and have been invited to host multiple webinars over the past few years to share best practices of online tutoring. This national recognition has not only allowed us to share with other universities our best practices, but it has helped us to grow and improve our own tutoring program in order to better serve our students here at the UMN Crookston.

#### CRLA International Tutor Training Program Certification

In addition to the new ACTLA Online Tutoring Program Certification above, you may not have known UMN Crookston has also been nationally recognized through the College Reading and Learning Association (CRLA). For the last four years, UMN Crookston's tutoring program has held [CRLA's International Tutor Training Program Certification](#). This

certification provides national recognition and positive reinforcement for our peer tutors and our tutoring program. The CRLA International Tutor Training Program Certification also sets an internationally accepted standard of skills and training for tutors. In 2015, Josh Parrill and Stacie Varnson compiled documentation and submitted the extensive application for this certification and in late 2016, the tutoring program at UMN Crookston officially earned the International Tutor Training Program Certification through CRLA. The certification runs on a 1-year, 3-year, and then 5-year renewal basis. In 2017, Josh submitted for renewal and was approved. At the end of this past year, Josh, with the help of Kelsey Torgerson, submitted another renewal application. Due to the extensive nature of the application and the thorough review process, we do not expect to hear back for several months but are confident we will continue to uphold our certification.



minimum of 10 training hours and uses a minimum number of recommended training topics; 3) tutoring experience directly with students for a minimum of 25 hours; and 4) regular evaluation by a knowledgeable and experienced evaluator. To complete the required training, the peer tutors hired through the Student Success Center are expected to complete a tutor training course, which is a one-credit eight-week course taught by Parrill and Torgerson. Since first earning the International Tutor Training Program Certification, UMN Crookston has had over 90 peer tutors complete the training requirements. The curriculum and training topics align with the CRLA standards, outcomes, and assessments set forth in the International Tutor Training Program Certification. Some of the training topics we train our tutors on include professional ethics, role-modeling, active listening, Socratic questioning, communication, referral skills, session management and leadership, cultural competence and sensitivity, tutoring diverse learners, goal setting, and critical thinking skills. The mission of our tutoring program is to assist students to become successful, independent learners and the training the peer tutors receive continually works to uphold that mission.



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### **From Athletics**

The University of Minnesota Crookston had nine student-athletes earn the NSIC Myles Brand All-Academic with Distinction Award. The honor, named for the late NCAA President Dr. Myles Brand, is bestowed to senior NSIC student-athletes who have a cumulative grade point average of 3.75 or higher, are exhausting their eligibility and are on track to graduate (student-athletes can only earn the award once). Each student-athlete will be recognized by the NSIC with a certificate of achievement and a wristwatch. A record number 227 student-athletes from the NSIC's 16 institutions will receive the award in its 12th year, 33 more than last year's record of 194.

The UMN Crookston women's basketball team earned a split last weekend with a 73-65 win Saturday over UMary and a 59-55 loss on Friday. The Golden Eagles were led on Saturday by Jes Mertens with 17 points and seven rebounds. Mary Burke added 17 points, as well. The Golden Eagles take on No. 8 University of Minnesota Duluth at home on Friday, February 5 at 5:30 p.m., and Saturday, February 6 at 1:30 p.m.

The Golden Eagle men's basketball team also earned a split on the weekend. Minnesota Crookston picked up a 72-58 win over the Marauders in Bismarck, N.D. on Friday. They fell 73-60 to UMary on Saturday. The Golden Eagles were led on Friday by career highs by Josh Dilling (27 points) and Leonard Dixon (23 points). UMN Crookston heads to Minnesota Duluth to take on the Bulldogs Friday, February 5 at 6 p.m., and Saturday, February 6 at 4 p.m.

The Minnesota Crookston hockey team fell in a pair of games at home against Williston State College 3-1 and 7-3. The Golden Eagles will host UMary Saturday, February 6 at 3 p.m., and Sunday, February 7 at 1 p.m. at the Crookston Sports Center.

### **Updated Athletic Events Attendance Policy**

We are excited to welcome fans back to our home athletic events! We are grateful for the opportunity to see fans cheering on our student-athletes in person once again! It is no surprise however, that due to the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic the way we conduct our events looks different. We promise that our fan policy ensures the health and safety of our students athletes, coaches, event staff, NSIC officials, and fans. The University of Minnesota Crookston fan policy must be adhered to at all times. Fans must follow the procedures outlined below. Fans who fail to comply will be asked to leave the arena. Thank you and we appreciate your help in creating a healthy and safe playing environment.

Fan Policy:

- If you are showing any symptoms related to COVID or have been in contact with someone who tested positive for COVID please do not attend the athletic event.
- Two tickets per player: A pass list is stationed at the ticket gate at the south entrance of Lysaker and the south entrance of the Crookston Sports Center. When fans enter please provide your name and what player you are listed under. Your name must be on this list to receive admission. There will be no admission charge.
- Fans must wear face coverings that cover the nose and mouth at all times. If a fan has no mask or fails to properly wear the mask they will be asked to leave the arena.

- We will open the doors for fans 30 minutes prior to all home events. Please do not plan to arrive until 30 minutes prior to the games.
  - Fans will be seated in the south bleachers of Lysaker Gymnasium and six ft. of distance between guests will be enforced. Fans will be seated in the open areas of the bleachers at the Crookston Sports Center and six ft. of distance will be enforced.
  - Fans must exit the arena immediately following the conclusion of the game.
  - Fans cannot come within 12 ft. of the playing surface.
  - Hand sanitizing stations are available throughout the arena.
  - No game day, programs, roster sheets, or fan promotions.
  - No walk-up admissions allowed.
  - Due to a multi-team event no fans will be allowed at home equestrian events at this time.
  - The same fan policies will be adhered at Choice Health and Fitness for home tennis matches.

*From Financial Aid*

the Office of Financial Aid & Scholarships offered an incentive to all new high school students set to start Fall 2021. For the month of December, students who submitted their FAFSA and completed the Specialty Scholarship application were entered into a contest which gave them a chance at one of 15 gift cards. Here is what was done in an effort to get students to complete these forms:


- First, these students were sent an email outlining the details of the incentive.
- The office called admitted students who had not yet completed the FAFSA application for 2021-2022.
- More than 140 students were contacted to discuss the benefits of FAFSA completion, as well as the specialty scholarship application.
- Following the phone calls, we had a current student create a short video encouraging other students to complete the applications and the importance of both. This video was sent via text to all students as a reminder to take advantage of the incentive. The purpose of doing this in December was to get applications in prior to estimated financial aid offers so more students would receive their estimate when this process was run at the beginning of January.
- Last year, our office ran estimated financial aid offers at the beginning of February, and at that time, 135 students had a FAFSA on file and were mailed their estimated offer. For aid year 2021-2022, we ran the estimated financial aid offer process at the beginning of January, and at that time, 170 students were eligible and received a letter in the mail. We also saw an increase in the specialty scholarship applications for new students.

Within the estimated offer letter, we included a postcard encouraging students to sign up for a one-on-one session with one of the counselors in our office. In these sessions, students would be able to discuss their estimated financial aid offer as well as receive answers to any of their questions.

A follow-up message is being developed that will be sent to these students from their Admissions counselor reminding and encouraging them to sign up for a financial aid session. Our office will continue to reach out to students and their families as well as participate in admissions events to provide financial aid counseling and resources for all students.

During his tenure at the Polk County Sheriff’s Office, he worked with UMN Crookston senior lecturer, David Seyfried. “He had always promoted UMC and was instrumental in helping me register and navigate through my undergraduate coursework.

Growing up in Crookston and having a parent as a professor, Selzler said maroon and gold had always been a part of his life. “When thinking about what college to attend, UMC is a top ranked baccalaureate college in the U.S. that provides an outstanding state of the art learning experience on a small close-knit campus.
