International Travel while on University Business

The University has extended the restriction on University-purpose international travel until April 30, 2021. We continue to monitor public health guidance in anticipation of possibly removing the restriction in late spring or early summer. There continues to be an exception process available for faculty, staff, and graduate students who must travel internationally as part of their University research or scholarship. This restriction applies only to international travel for University purposes and not to personal travel. Specific guidance on international travel is available from the U.S. Department of State.

Identity theft happens and the latest issue of OUCH outlines ways in which you can protect yourself. [March 2021 edition of the "OUCH!"](#) If you suspect that your identity has been stolen, follow the checklist provided by the FTC at <https://www.identitytheft.gov/>. Other items for consideration include:

- Just because someone receives email that appears to come from you does not necessarily mean your account was hacked. It's easy to spoof the From or Sender address of an email. Change your password if you are concerned at <https://my-account.umn.edu>.
- Running anti-virus to clean up a device after a malware infection will typically not catch all of the malicious files; the best way to be sure is to wipe the device and reinstall from scratch.
- Regular, automated backups should be part of your strategy to protect yourself and your data.
- Don't take action at the request of an email; be suspicious of anything an email asks you to do (click, open, download, login, etc.)

Athletics

The UMN Crookston baseball team has continued their phenomenal start to the 2021 season. The Golden Eagles have a 7-0 record, marking the best the program has had during the NCAA Division II era. Minnesota Crookston opened conference play Saturday and Sunday in Winona, Minn. The Golden Eagles picked up 10-0 and 12-11 wins Saturday, and a 14-9 win on Sunday. UMN Crookston is currently at the top of the NSIC standings. They are tied with Minnesota State University and Minot State University in first with a 3-0 NSIC mark.

The Golden Eagles have been led by Brock Reller (Sr., OF, Grand Forks, N.D.). Reller has earned back-to-back NSIC Player of the Week honors. He was also named National Collegiate Baseball Writers Association (NCBWA) Central Region Player of the Week for the week of March 6-13. Reller is hitting .345 on the season with a league-high seven home runs. The Golden Eagles have been led on the mound by Jake Dykhoff (Jr., RHP, Wadena, Minn.). Dykhoff pitched a 10-0 shutout on Saturday. He limited the Warriors to just four hits with 10 strikeouts and just two walks.

UMN Crookston will play University of Sioux Falls at The Birdcage in Sioux Falls, S.D. Thursday, March 25 at 1:30 and 3:30 p.m. The Golden Eagles will then travel to Fayette, Iowa for three games on the road against Upper Iowa University.

The University of Minnesota Crookston hockey program has officially been invited to join the Western Collegiate Club Hockey Association (WCCHA) as a full member beginning with the 2021-22 season. The Golden Eagles have graciously accepted the membership offer. The WCCHA has been one of the premier leagues in ACHA Division II. During the 2019-20 season, the WCCHA qualified four teams for the ACHA Division II National Tournament.

UMN Crookston will be a member of the Northwest Division. The WCCHA includes club teams for Bethel University, Gustavus Adolphus College, the University of Minnesota, the University of Minnesota Duluth, Minnesota State University-Mankato, North Dakota State University, Saint John's University, St. Cloud State University, St. Thomas University, the University of North Dakota, Winona State University, the University of Wisconsin, and the University of Wisconsin-Eau Claire.

The Golden Eagles will join the Northwest Division with Minnesota, North Dakota State, St. John's, North Dakota, St. Cloud State, and Bethel. The Southeast Division will consist of St. Thomas, Wisconsin, Minnesota State, Minnesota Duluth, Gustavus Adolphus, Winona State, and Wisconsin-Eau Claire.

The Minnesota Crookston volleyball team played their first official NCAA match since the 2019 season last Friday. The Golden Eagles played a hard-fought match and dominated the second set with a 25-18 victory. The Golden Eagles were led by Lauren Wallace (R-Jr., OH, Bloomington, Minn.) with 16 kills, while Mara Weisensel (Fr., MH, New Ulm, Minn.) added eight kills. Natalie Koke (R-So., S, Caledonia, Wis.) led the way with 30 assists. Madison Klimek (Fr., DS, Oakdale, Minn.) paced the Golden Eagles with 20 digs.

The Golden Eagle tennis team returns to the court Saturday, March 27 and Sunday, March 28 against St. Cloud State University and University of Minnesota Duluth in Duluth, Minn. UMN Crookston has been led at No. 1 singles by Tasha Achermann (Fr., Motley, Minn.), while Michelle Swyter (Jr., Perham, Minn.) has competed at No. 2 singles.

The UMN Crookston western equestrian team will wrap up their 2020-21 season Friday, March 26, Saturday, March 27, and Sunday, March 28 at North Dakota State University. They will compete in two IHSA shows at NDSU, before concluding the regular-season with the IHSA Regional Championships Sunday. The rest of the IHSA postseason has been canceled for 2021.

Alumni Changle Li

Software engineering grad Changle Li "misses the snow" all the way from China as the University of Minnesota Crookston helps him capture two promising internships.

Changle Li, a Chinese transfer student and UMN Crookston graduate, recently discussed the numerous opportunities and “technical skills” that the University of Minnesota Crookston equipped him with, first with his positions at the United Nations International Institute of Global Health and then as a data analyst at Mitsubishi.

“Definitely, yes!” Li says as he describes how the University of Minnesota Crookston’s software engineering program and its professors from the business department helped guide him through various studies on campus that aided him when landing these large-scale internships. On top of that, he is also working towards his masters degree in public health at the University of Tokyo.

“The things I have learned and accomplished at UMC have impacted me a lot, that’s why I’ve had such a great experience in the job force early on,” Li notes. “I had no specific background before I came to UMC. My recommendations from UMC helped me get into the masters program in Tokyo, so yeah, I love UMC a lot.”

Li’s path to Crookston began at a California community college. After his two years out West, he was looking to move on and excel in his desired field, but there was one issue holding him back.

“When I was looking to transfer from a community college to a major university, almost all of the tuition prices around my area were ridiculously high. So, after searching for prestigious universities with reasonable tuition I came across a slogan that stood out to me: Small Campus. Big Degree,” Li recalls.

Li liked the sound of that. “On larger campuses you don’t get the chance to consistently work with professors,” he says.

One of his favorite experiences in the Business Department involved the Harvard Case Study that students had an opportunity to be a part of, in collaboration with their professors. “When I was at UMC I spent a lot of time with the business department professors,” Li recalls. “They provided me with more knowledge about the business, marketing, and financial side of things.”

Asked if he could sum up UMC in one word, Li didn’t hesitate: Opportunity.

After completing his masters program in Tokyo in 2023, Li says his dream job is to become an investment banker.
