Now and in the coming weeks and months, as details unfold, compounded with the ongoing trial of Derek Chauvin for the murder of George Floyd, we must acknowledge the pain and fear that many of us are feeling, particularly those within the Black community. As we navigate these times together, be sure to check in with one another as well as your colleagues, friends and family.

## **Athletics**

The UMN Crookston baseball team has continued their historic start to the 2021 season. The Golden Eagles are currently in first place in the NSIC for the first time and are 16-2 (11-2 NSIC) entering this week. The Golden Eagles are currently No.19 in the NCBWA poll, the highest-ever ranking for the program. They are slated to play two games against No.15 Minnesota State University, Mankato during the week. The games are currently in flux on what day they will occur due to forecasted weather. UMN Crookston will host University of Mary Saturday, April 17 at 1 and 3 p.m. and Sunday, April 18 at 12 p.m. at the UMC Baseball Field. The Golden Eagles took 3-of-4 games from Concordia-St. Paul last weekend. UMN Crookston has won 6-of-7 games against the Golden Bears.

The University of Minnesota Crookston hunt seat equestrian team wrapped up their 2021 regular-season Saturday, April 10 and Sunday, April 11 with two home shows and the IHSA Regional Championship at Charles H. Casey Equine Arena at UTOC. The Golden Eagles claimed the Zone 7, Region 3 Championship for the third season in a row. In addition, Rachel Johnson earned the Cacchione Cup for Zone 7, Region 3. The Golden Eagles were named High Point Team on Saturday, led by Johnson earning High Point Rider, and Katie Orth claimed Reserve High Point Rider. Sunday, Minnesota Crookston was again named High Point Team, led by Orth earning High Point Rider, followed by Johnson earning Reserve High Point Rider.

The tennis team concluded their season Friday in Grand Forks, N.D. UMN Crookston has continued to show improvement throughout the season. Minnesota Crookston honored seniors Karli Renney and Samantha Hartung, as well as 2020 senior Ashley Smith. Smith returned to Choice Health and Fitness in Grand Forks after not getting a true senior day due to COVID-19.

The UMN Crookston women's golf team is playing as we speak, as they are competing in their first tournament of the season at the Hardrocker Invite hosted by South Dakota School of Mines & Technology at Arrowhead Country Club in Rapid City, S.D. UMN Crookston's Student Chapter of The Wildlife Society cleared 35 acres of bushland habitat in Roseau

The University of Minnesota Crookston's Student Chapter of The Wildlife Society along with faculty, staff, and other students cleared over 35 acres of brushland habitat in the Palmville Wildlife Management Area (WMA) in Roseau County last month. "It's the labs that provide the hands-on learning experience that convinced me to come to Crookston," said David Dunblazier, senior, natural resources. As a natural resource student, Dunblazier said all of his classes have heavy lab components where students get to take what is learned in the classroom and actually experience it, while learning the skills they need in their career.

John Loegering, Ph.D., certified wildlife biologist, professor, and wildlife extension specialist said the Student Chapter sponsored the vans, the Minnesota Sharp-tailed Grouse Society bought everyone lunch and while the student chapter led the effort, they welcomed anyone willing to get outside to come along. Dunblazier said in-class discussion evolved around managing land for late successional species or early successional species, and for this brush cut they were clearing Tamarack trees to reset the successional clock and maintain an early successional habitat for Sharp-tailed Grouse.



Thirteen students and one faculty coordinated with Gary Huschle from the Minnesota Sharp-tailed Grouse Society, who sponsored the event, cleared about 35 acres of tamarack trees in an important area used by many brushland wildlife, such as the sharp-tailed grouse, American woodcock, golden-winged warblers, and others. "They had great fun," said Loegering. He went on to say this is a fantastic hands-on experience where students can directly apply what they learn in class to habitat management on the ground. "Students did fantastic work to enhance this brushland for species like Sharp-tailed Grouse. Grouselike cover types that are open and treeless with a few shrubs," he said. Loegering shared the tamarack trees close in the area cleared are possible perch sites for predators. "Cutting them opens the landscape and improves the cover for many species. Our work will open that brushland for the next 25 years or more," he said.

The fifteen volunteers logged ten hours each of time and those hours are valued at approximately twenty-dollars an hour. "The Minnesota Sharp-tailed Grouse Society (MSGGS) is a private non-profit professional organization and can use our hard work as an organizational match or buy in when they apply for grants, so that is \$3,000 dollars worth," said Loegering. He went on to say the Minnesota Sharp-tailed Grouse Society applies for grants that typically require a five percent match. "Thus, our work (\$3000) translates into an additional \$60,000 in grant funds," Loegering said. It's that additional money that will be used to pay for the prescribed fire crew or the winter bulldozer and brush shearing crew that will follow the students' efforts. "The work we did on Saturday was impactful beyond habitat improvement," he concluded.



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
