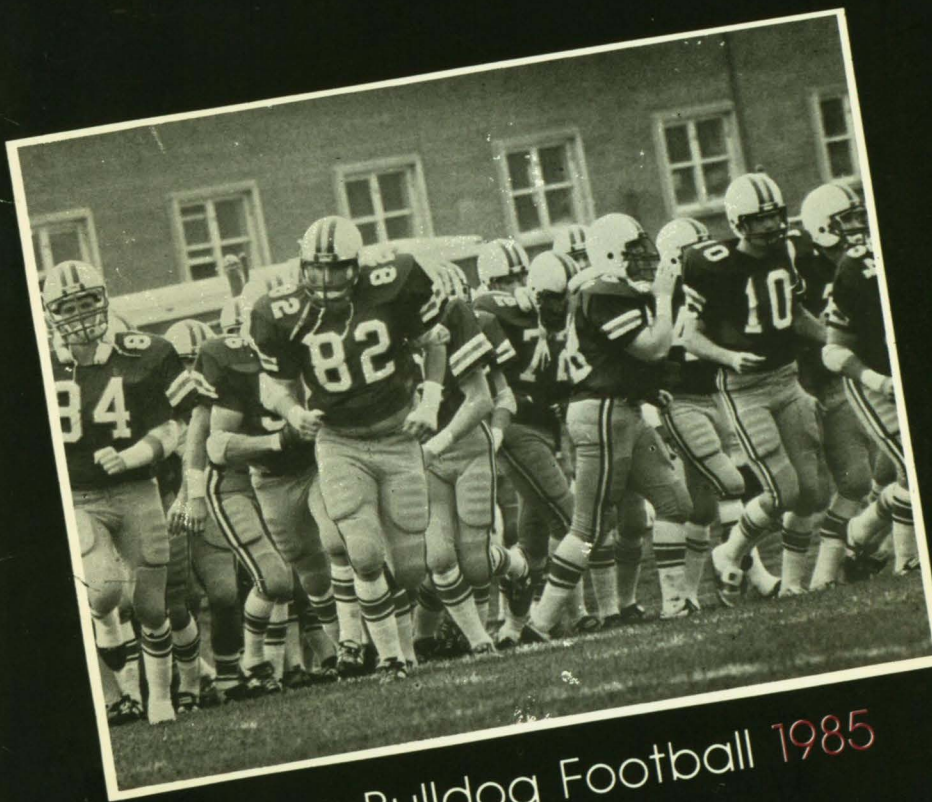

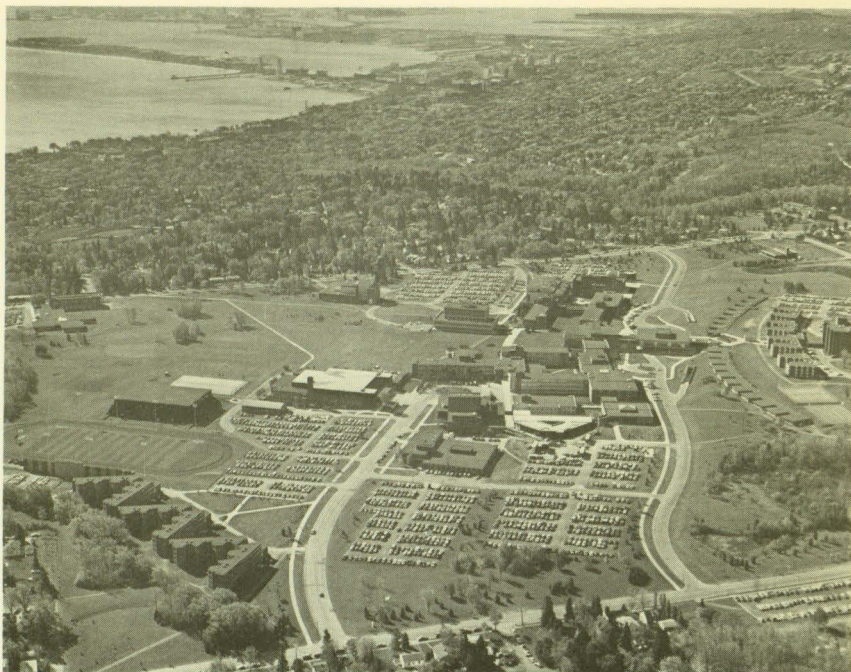

## THE UNIVERSITY OF MINNESOTA-DULUTH

There has been one overriding characteristic about the University of Minnesota-Duluth that hasn't changed in all of its 38 years — that characteristic is growth.

Before UMD (founded as Duluth Normal School at the turn of the century) became a coordinate campus of the University of Minnesota in 1947, the site the present day facility occupies was nothing more than brush and woods. By the early 1950s, however, the campus was already taking shape with the Science Building (now called the Chemistry Building) and the Physical Education Building in place. Administrators had a far-reaching plan for UMD's orderly development to 1970. The plan envisioned a student body of 3,500 students by 1970 — more than 5,000 students were actually enrolled by then.

Today, as indicated by this year's enrollment of over 7,500 students, UMD continues its steady growth. New programs recently developed at UMD include the first four-year computer engineering program in the state of Minnesota and two four-year degrees in industrial and materials processing engineering.

UMD also offers more instructional programs than ever for both undergraduate and graduate students in six colleges and schools. Students choose from over 70 undergraduate majors leading to four associate (two-year) degrees and 10 bachelor's degrees, with teacher licensure offered in about 40 areas. Graduate students can earn five master's degrees in 14 fields, with the School of Medicine offering the first two years of graduate basic science.

The campus, located in the Arrowhead region of Northeastern Minnesota overlooking Lake Superior, has 35 buildings, some unique to college campuses: Tweed Museum of Art, Marshall W. Alworth Planetarium, Marshall Performing Arts Center, and the nearby Glensheen Mansion.

UMD's 38 years of continued growth, the last eight under the leadership of Chancellor Robert Heller, is a prime example of the area's commitment to quality higher education.

# JIM MALOSKY

## Head Coach

With 27 years of Bulldog coaching behind him, Jim Malosky enters the 1985 season as truly the elder statesman of the UM-Duluth football staff.

In just over a quarter of a century at UM-Duluth, Malosky has racked up some mighty big numbers, including a 168-78-8 (.677) overall record which makes him the winningest active coach in the NCAA Division II ranks.

But perhaps consistency, even more so than winning, has been Malosky's foremost trademark. Since 1972, Malosky-coached teams have lost more than three games in a season only once (last year). His 1980 contingent, regarded by many as the finest football group ever assembled at UM-Duluth, turned in a perfect 10-0 record and finished among the nation's top 10 Division II schools. And, like a fine wine, Malosky just seems to get better with age. In the 1980s alone, he has guided the Bulldogs to a 38-13 overall mark.

Malosky surpassed the longevity record of his predecessor, Lloyd Peterson, when he completed his 25th season with UM-Duluth in 1982. Peterson coached the Bulldogs for 24 years, and except for two games coached by Frank Kovach in UM-Duluth's inaugural campaign way back in 1930, he and Malosky have strolled the sidelines for every other Bulldog football contest since then.

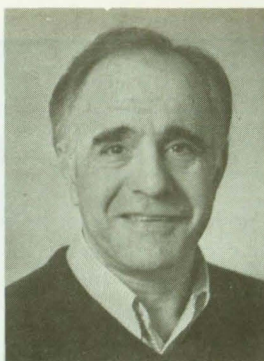
Malosky first became known in Minnesota football circles when he captured All-State honors while quarterbacking Crosby-Ironton High School. He was recruited by the legendary Bernie Bierman at the University of Minnesota, and, during his collegiate career from 1946-49, the Gophers compiled a 25-11 record, including 7-2 marks in Malosky's junior and senior seasons when he was the club's starting signal-caller.

After receiving a B.S. degree in physical education from Minnesota in 1951, Malosky began a stint in the U.S. Army. From there it was on to Morris, MN, where he taught and coached at Morris High School, leading the Tigers to the West Central Conference championship with an 8-1 record. In 1956 he landed another prep coaching job at Morningside High School in Edina, MN, and, in his second year guided his squad to a 9-0 record, a Lake Conference championship and a No. 1 ranking in the State by the Associated Press.

The following year, 1958, Malosky accepted UM-Duluth's invitation to become only its third football coach in history. In only his third season as the Bulldogs' head man, Malosky directed UM-Duluth to the MIAC title, a feat the Bulldogs repeated again in 1961.

In all, Malosky has won three MIAC titles, two NIC championships and he has been named Coach of the Year by the MAIC, the NIC and the NAIA District 13 on seven occasions.

Malosky, and his wife, Lilah, have four children—Lisa, Linda, Jim (a sophomore at UM-Duluth), and Tammy. In addition to his football duties, he is also an associate professor in UM-Duluth's physical education department.

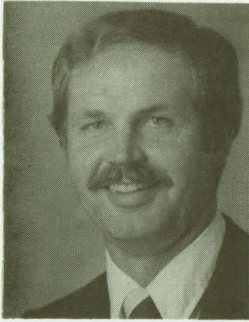

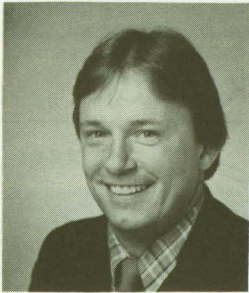


## NEIL LADSTEN — Offensive Coordinator

The veteran of Malosky's assistants, Ladsten is in his 15th season with the Bulldog football program. Ladsten captained the 1968 UM-Duluth grid squad as a senior, winning All-MIAC honors as an offensive tackle that season and after junior campaign as well. For his football and classroom heroics, Ladsten was accorded the E.L. Duce Rasmussen Scholastic Achievement Award in 1969. Ladsten, an instructor in the UM-Duluth physical education department, also has directed the Bulldogs' wrestling team the past 14 years. The Spring Grove, MN, native was bestowed with NIC Coach of the Year laurels in 1982-83 after guiding UM-Duluth to the conference title. Since 1979-80, Ladsten-coached teams have compiled a 52-27 overall record and four Bulldogs have earned NCAA Division II All-American recognition.

## SCOTT HANNA — Linebackers/Defensive Line

A former All-MIAC center, Hanna played four years for UM-Duluth from 1969-73. As a senior, he was voted the club's Outstanding Lineman (Glenn Johnson Award). Hanna, a native of Duluth, also played baseball for the Bulldogs in 1972 and 1973 and has been UM-Duluth's head baseball coach the past seven years, racking up an impressive 108-74 overall record. Hanna is in his seventh season as a Bulldog assistant coach and has helped develop a host of top-notch linebackers and defensive linemen during that time. He is employed by the UM-Duluth athletic department as an equipment manager.

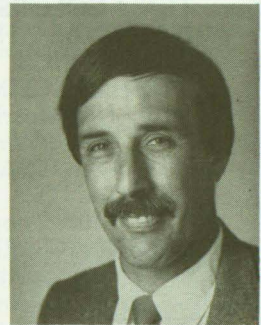


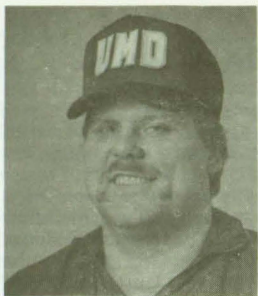
## VINCE REPESH — Defensive Coordinator

An old familiar face in the Bulldog football coaching circles, Repesh returned to UM-Duluth last fall after a four-year stint as an assistant coach at nearby UW-Superior. Repesh, who served as an assistant coach with the Bulldogs from 1977-79, was credited with producing one of the nation's finest defensive units while in charge of the defense at UW-Superior. A native of Chisholm, MN, Repesh played two years of football at both Hibbing Junior College (MN) and the University of North Dakota as a split end and defensive back. After graduating from UND in 1973, he remained with the Fighting Sioux football program, assuming assistant coaching duties. Repesh, who works in the admissions office at UM-Duluth, also was the head football man at Mt. St. Benedict High School in Crookston, MN.

## JOHN NACHTSHEIM — Offensive Backfield

A former three-time All-Conference halfback with the Bulldogs during the early 1960s, John Nachtsheim returns to his alma mater and his former coach Jim Malosky to work as an assistant coach. Nachtsheim comes to Minnesota-Duluth with an abundance of football coaching experience, including 9 years at the high school level. Shortly after graduating from Minnesota-Duluth in 1963 with a bachelor's degree in physical education, Nachtsheim landed his first head football coaching job at Hurlay High School in Wisconsin, where he served for three years before moving on to nearby Bayfield High School. While at BHS, Nachtsheim directed the Troller boy's basketball program for 11 seasons in addition to heading the boy's track and field contingent for three years. From 1979-1984, Nachtsheim was the head football coach at Washburn (WI) High School, producing such current Bulldog standouts as defensive tackle Tom Rapps, defensive back Kevin Nevala, and halfback Mark Nachtsheim, his son. Nachtsheim enjoyed a brilliant three-year career (1960-62) with the Bulldogs as a halfback, racking up 1,843 yards rushing (a school record at the time which stood for over a decade) and 2,292 yards of total offense. The 1958 Robbinsdale (MN) High School graduate was selected to the All-Minnesota Intercollegiate Athletic Conference football team all three of his years at Minnesota-Duluth, a feat matched by only three other Bulldogs.





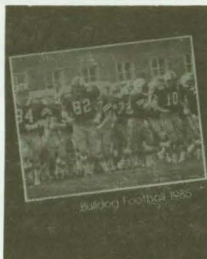
## MIKE THOMAS — Offensive Line

One of the finest offensive linemen to don a Bulldog uniform, Thomas played at UM-Duluth for four years and capped off his career in 1980 by being named to the Associated Press' Little All-American third team — the first Bulldog lineman to ever be so honored. A starter for Malosky's grid contingent in 1978, 1979 and 1980, Thomas was an All-NIC selection as both a junior and a senior and was given the E.L. "Duce" Rasmussen Scholastic Achievement Award in 1981. Thomas, who has also worked as an assistant with the UM-Duluth baseball team the past three years, is in his fourth year as a member of the Bulldog football coaching staff. He is a native of Silver Bay, MN, and a 1981 UM-Duluth graduate.

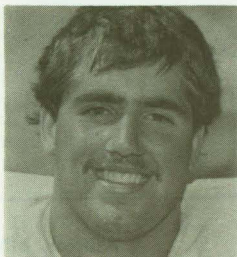




# RETURNING LETTERMEN

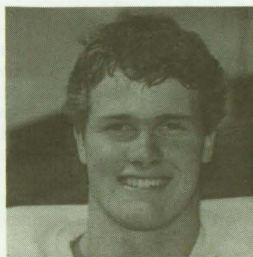

The Bulldogs' center on punts and field goal attempts the past couple years, Banks will be looked to for leadership on a very inexperienced offensive line. He is a 1982 graduate of Milaca Senior High School where he earned nine letters in football, basketball and golf. The son of Chuck and Lorraine Banks, Leon is majoring in business administration. ## TIM BARNUM

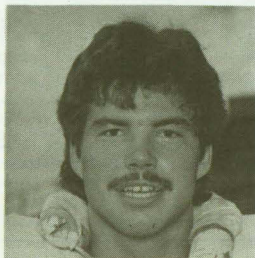

The winner of Minnesota-Duluth's Outstanding Freshman Award for 1984, Holsten was nothing short of a pleasant surprise for the Bulldogs in his debut campaign a year ago. A somewhat reserved player, Holsten let his left foot do most of the talking last fall as he booted five field goals in eight attempts to go with a pair of extra point kicks. Holsten's finest hour as a collegian came against Southwest State when he converted a school-record four field goals on a school-record four attempts in helping the Bulldogs to a 25-6 triumph over the Mustangs. Holsten, whose shortest field goal last year was from 31 yards out and had kicks of 42 and 45 yards, was an Associated Press All-State kicker while at Stillwater High School, where he played three years of football. 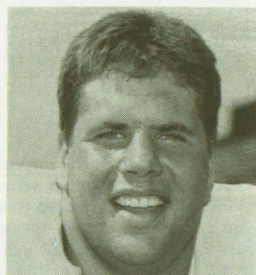

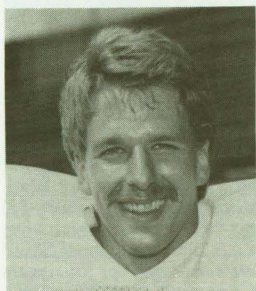

In terms of numbers, Kragseth is the Bulldogs' top returning passer, but like last year he will have to battle a number of worthy candidates, most notably Jim Malosky, for the rights to the starting quarterback job this fall. Kragseth, who started in one game last season (against Mankato State) but received playing time at the signal caller spot in seven contests, hit on 11 of 21 passes for 277 yards with no touchdown throws and three interceptions in 1984. As the Bulldogs' primary punter for the second year in a row last season, Kragseth punted for 1,920 yards on 56 kicks — for a 34.3 yards per punt average. Kragseth, who shared the punting duties as a freshman with Gene Giles, now is the Minnesota-Duluth career leader in punts (151) and punting yardage (5,221). Kragseth's height and experience are his biggest quarterback assets. A 1982 graduate of St. Louis Park High School where he participated for three years in football,

golf and basketball, Steve is the son of Norm (an official in the National Football League and one of the finest prep athletes to ever come out of Duluth) and Phyllis Kragseth. He was born on 3/29/63 in St. Louis Park.

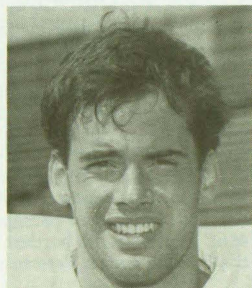

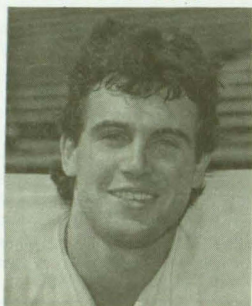
If the name sounds familiar don't be alarmed. It's supposed to. Playing for his father/coach last fall, young Malosky was called into action in eight games (all from off the bench) and that rookie experience should help his chances at landing the starting quarterback honors this fall. A tall, broad-shouldered type of athlete, Malosky is not afraid to carry the football which is an ideal characteristic to have in Minnesota-Duluth's run-oriented style of offense. He was good on four of 19 attempts for 80 yards in 1984, 65 of those yards coming against Minnesota-Morris, a game in which he threw his lone touchdown toss. A 1984 graduate of Duluth Central High School, Malosky was a three-year starter in football (quarterback), basketball (center) and baseball (pitcher, first base, and outfield) for the Trojans. He was born on 11/20/65 in Duluth.

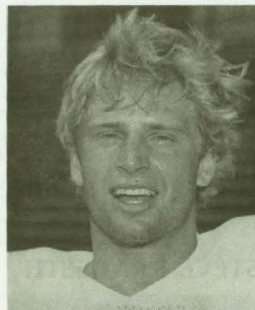
A relatively unknown commodity his rookie season in 1982, Nevala broke into the starting lineup the following year and his presence in the Minnesota-Duluth line-up ever since has gone anything but unnoticed. Although not particularly tall, Nevala makes up for any physical shortcomings with terrific leaping ability. He came up with two interceptions last fall (one each against Moorhead State and UW-Platteville) after swiping four opposition passes the previous year. In 1984, he was tenth among Bulldogs in tackles with 31. The business administration major (who maintains a 3.1 grade point average) is one of a handful of past and present Bulldogs from the northern Wisconsin city of Washburn. While at Washburn High School, Nevala earned three varsity letters in football under head coach John Nachtsheim, a former Bulldog football captain, as a quarterback, running back and defensive back. He also was a standout in

basketball as well as baseball. A 1981 graduate of WHS, Mark is the son of Marvin and Carol Nevala. He was born on 6/5/63 in Milwaukee, WI.

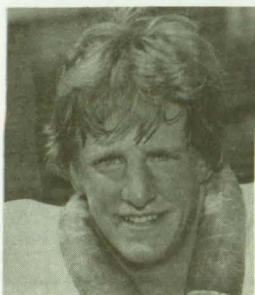
**MARK NILSEN**

Nilsen just may feel like the odd-man-out at the beginning of the 1985 season as he is the lone full-time offensive starter from a year ago back this fall. With Minnesota-Duluth's traditional running-style offense, Nilsen's activities are somewhat limited as far as pass catching is concerned. Still, he does manage to take advantage of the opportunities when they come knocking. Last year, a season in which he played quarterback for two games, Nilsen latched on to seven passes for 200 yards. His 28.6 yards per catch average topped the Bulldogs for the second season in a row (he recorded a 30.8 yards per grab mark in 1983). His longest snare of the year was a 46-yard effort in the Bulldogs' season finale against UW-Platteville. Nilsen attended Bemidji State where he started at wide receiver for one year after graduating from Superior Senior High School in 1981. He led the Spartans as a quarterback to a 9-1 record during his senior year and a first-ever WIAA playoff appearance. The son of Walter and Mary Nilsen, Mark is majoring in industrial technology/graphic arts. He was born on 1/26/63 in Superior.

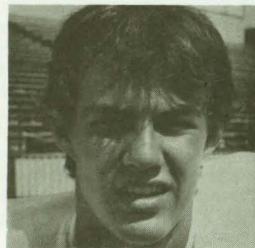


If he can overcome a nagging knee injury which required surgery this past spring, Ogren should certainly be in the thick of things for a starting outside linebacker assignment this year. In spot duty last year, Ogren had 21 tackles. His older brother Mark was a steady linebacker for the Bulldogs for four years (1980-83) and was in the New York Jets organization for one season after graduating from Minnesota-Duluth. A 1983 graduate of South Shore High School, Ogren competed in football for four years as a prep, gaining All-Indianhead Conference recognition as a junior (defensive end) and senior (quarterback and safety). A student council president, Ogren also played three years of baseball and track. He is the son of Willard and Geraldine Ogren and was born on 2/19/65 in Duluth. Ogren is majoring in business at Minnesota-Duluth.

**STEVE PETERSON**

The 1985 Bulldog team captain, Peterson enters his final collegiate campaign accompanied by a number of question marks — most of which center around where exactly he will play this fall. Peterson, who exemplifies a consummate Malosky-type of ballplayer, faced a similar situation in 1984 when he left the Bulldog defensive secondary to serve as a fullback only to return to the defensive backfield later that year after a brief stint at linebacker. Coach Malosky would like to keep him on the defensive side of the football again this year, but a lack of experienced runners on offense may prompt the veteran coach to switch Peterson. Probably the hardest hitter (with or without the ball) on the Bulldog roster, Peterson is certainly a prime pre-season can-



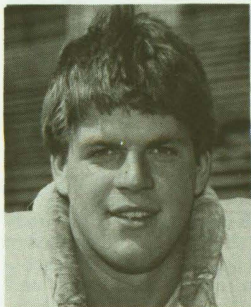


didate for All-NIC honors. He wound up fourth in tackles (53) among his teammates a year ago and recovered one fumble. The previous year he racked up five interceptions. A fish and wildlife management major, Peterson is a 1981 graduate of Littlefork-Big Falls High School. ## CRAIG POCOTNIK

LB 6-2 230 Jr. Biwabik, MN



Potocnik came to Minnesota-Duluth by way of Mesabi Community College (Virginia, MN) a year ago and, by season's end, became one of the biggest assets of the Bulldog defensive corps. Despite not gaining a starting linebacker spot until the third game of the season, Potocnik still ran away with the Minnesota-Duluth defensive honors in 1984, finishing first in unassisted tackles (39), assisted tackles (64) and total tackles (103). His total tackles mark, incidentally, was 43 more than the next nearest Bulldog. Potocnik also had one interception to his credit in his debut season with Minnesota-Duluth, against UW-Platteville in last year's finale. A heady middle linebacker who's very unyielding against the run, Potocnik certainly has what it takes to become an All-NIC selection this season. A 1983 graduate of Horace Mann High School in Biwabik, Potocnik was a three-sport standout with the Braves (football, basketball, and track).

He was twice named to the All-Arrowhead Conference football honor squad as a tight end and linebacker. The son of Anthony and Becky Potocnik, Craig was born on 2/28/65 in Merced, CA.

## TOM RAPPS

DT 6-5 245 Sr. Washburn, WI

Back for his third year as a starting left tackle, Rapp's return is one of the reasons Coach Malosky speaks with optimism about his defensive unit in 1985. While his size, strength and athletic aptitude are Rapps' obvious trademarks, his ability to get into the passing lanes in a hurry (as evident by his four quarterback sacks in 1984 — second best among Bulldogs) makes him that much more of a complete defensive lineman. Rapps suffered a thigh injury that sidelined him for the last half of his sophomore season, but last year he was back at full strength, registering 56 total tackles (third best on team) and topping Minnesota-Duluth with three fumble recoveries. A bonafide All-NIC candidate, Rapps will serve as an alternate team captain this fall. The soft-spoken business major played four years of football, basketball and baseball while attending Washburn High School, where he was graduated in 1982. A two-time All-Top of Wisconsin Conference football pick, Rapps helped lead the Castle Guards to a perfect 8-0 record as a senior. Tom, the son of Bruce and Kathy Rapps, was born on 3/15/64 in Fort Atkinson, WI.

## JEFF SAJDAK

DB 6-2 190 Sr. Schroeder, MN



A true veteran of the 1985 Bulldogs, Sajdak returns for his fourth year as a starter at one of the Minnesota-Duluth's cornerback posts. An All-NIC pick last season, Sajdak has all of the necessary talent to repeat that honor and could very well turn out to be the finest defensive back in the conference. Sajdak, perhaps Minnesota-Duluth's most aggressive hitter, is equally as steady against the pass as he is against the run. He finished second among Minnesota-Duluth defenders in tackles for the second year in a row last fall with 60. Sajdak also came away with one interception (versus Southwest State) and one fumble recovery. The Bulldogs' 1985 alternate team captain, Sajdak was a four-year letterman in football at Cook County High School in Grand Marais, MN, where he played offensive end, linebacker and defensive back for coach Lyle Anderson's Vikings. A 1982 graduate of CCHS, Sajdak also lettered three times in track and

twice in basketball while a prep. He is the son of Bernard and Roberta Sajdak and was born 10/6/63 in Superior, WI. He is majoring in physical education.

Schultz is one of a handful of prospects that will be setting his sights on a starting offensive guard assignment this year. Schultz, a hard working player who will always give you 100 percent, is a 1982 graduate of South St. Paul High School and earned two football letters for the Packers as a tackle. A business major at Minnesota-Duluth, Paul is the son of Ken and Mary Schultz and was born on 10/8/63 in South St. Paul.

So. St. Paul, MN



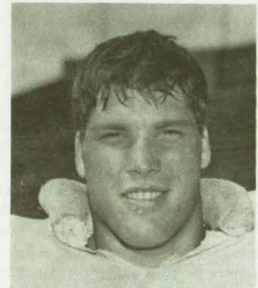

DT 6-0 220

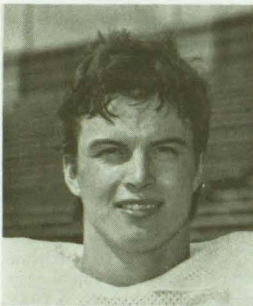
Jr. Duluth, MN

A deceptively quick lineman, Turcott is exceptional at plugging up the middle against the run. Last year he racked up 42 total tackles which placed him seventh on the Minnesota-Duluth defensive charts. A 1983 graduate of Duluth Denfeld High School, Turcott was a three-time football letterman with the Hunters as an offensive center and was named to the All-Lake Superior Conference team as a senior. He also was a member of the Hunter hockey and track contingents as well. The industrial education major is the son of Floyd and Caryl Turcott and was born on 6/2/65 in Duluth.

**COREY VEECH**

HB 5-9 165

Jr. Hermantown, MN



Whether he likes it or not, a good deal of the Bulldog offense this season may fall on the small, but sturdy shoulders of one Corey William Veech. Used more and more each season, Veech has slowly dispelled any of the skeptics' doubts that thought he would be too small to take the punishment of college football. As a part-time starter last year (he replaced Greg Saarela in a couple of games when Saarela was switched from halfback to cornerback), Veech rushed for 375 yards on 87 carries and two touchdowns to rank fourth in Bulldog rushing (and is the top returning runner back this year). Last October against Northern State, Veech enjoyed his brightest day so far as a collegian as he gained 140 yards in just 20 carries and added a touchdown in the Bulldogs' 32-3 triumph over Northern State at Griggs Field. For his effort, Veech was named NIC Player of the Week. In addition to his backfield work, Veech has also been Minnesota-

Duluth's ace punt and kick return specialist the last two seasons. In 1984, he averaged 22.4 yards per return on 23 kickoffs and 8.9 yards a return on 17 punts. Veech owns virtually all Bulldog punt and kick return records. A 1982 graduate of Hermantown High School, Veech took home three letters each in football, baseball and track. A two-time All-Sea Range Conference running back, Veech was chosen to the Associated Press All-State team as a senior. The son of Richard and Caryl Veech, Corey was born on 5/15/64 in Duluth.



# 1985 MINNESOTA-DULUTH OUTLOOK

Like the Griggs Field complex, University of Minnesota-Duluth head football coach Jim Malosky will have some major reconstructing of his own to do as he embarks on his 28th season with the Bulldogs this fall.

However, with only one full-time starter (senior wide receiver Mark Nilsen) returning to the Minnesota-Duluth offense, the term reconstruction may just be to mild of a word to use under these circumstances. What Malosky and Co. really face in 1985 is a downright sweeping overhaul.

"This is by far the worst situation I have had on either offense or defense in my 27 years here," says Malosky, who will enter 1985 as the winningest active coach in NCAA Division II football. "We are going to have to do a virtual wholesale rebuilding job offensively and let me tell you right now it isn't going to be easy."

The Bulldogs, who posted a 6-4-0 overall record and a 4-2-0 mark in Northern Intercollegiate Conference play for the second season in a row a year ago, have the complete opposite predicament on the defensive side of the field, where nine of the 11 starters are back from 1984. Included in that group are all four defensive backs — senior cornerbacks Jeff Sajdak, an All-NIC selection and three-year starter and Kevin Nevala, senior strong safety, and 1985 Bulldog team captain Steve Peterson and junior free safety Scott Claflin. At linebacker, 1984 captain Andy Verhel has graduated but the Bulldogs do retain All-NIC candidate Craig Potocnik, a junior who topped Minnesota-Duluth in tackles last season, and sophomore Chuck Elliott. Up front, the Bulldogs appear to be in as equally good standing as 1984 regulars Tom Rapps, a senior defensive tackle, Jon DeRungs, a senior defensive end, and Mark Turcott, a junior defensive tackle all return to give Minnesota-Duluth one of its most seasoned defensive corps in years. Backups such as defensive backs Tim Barnum and Wayne Preston along with linebacker Greg Ogren and defensive linemen Graig Greenwood, a transfer from the University of North Dakota, and Dave Lindstrom should provide the Bulldogs with plenty of depth when the opposition has the ball.

"We're hoping the defense can help pull us through the early portion of the season," says Malosky. "But we realize full well that although a defense can carry a team some, you've still got to be able to put points on the board."

Although the Bulldog defense for the most part pretty much held its own last season (back-to-back shutouts in the final two games), their offensive counterparts didn't exactly blow any fuses in the scoreboard either. In fact, the Bulldogs managed just under 17 points per game in 1984 — their lowest total in a decade and about half the point total the Minnesota-Duluth contingent had recorded just two years earlier. Besides Nilsen at wide receiver, the Bulldogs will have to rely on a number of part-time starters from a year ago including junior guard Jeff Johnson, junior halfback Corey Veech, and quarterbacks Steve Kragseth, a senior who doubles as the Bulldogs' punter, and Jim Malosky, a sophomore, for extra guidance this fall, especially with the virtually inexperienced offensive line the Bulldogs will have to work with.

# HISTORY OF BULLDOG FOOTBALL

*"Duluth State Teachers College had its first team in 1930, and 28 players responded to Coach Kovach's call."*

So records the 1930-31 yearbook, *The Chronicle*, depicting the origins of Bulldogs history when UMD wasn't UMD at all, but rather the Duluth State Teachers College (DSTC). "Coach Kovach" is Frank Kovach, an industrial arts specialist who organized and coached the first team that would evolve into one of the most successful college football programs in the land.

Appropriately enough, Kovach also became UMD's first coach to shepherd his flock to an unbeaten season as the Bulldogs debuted in 1930 with two ties in their only two outings—a scoreless tie against Itasca Junior College, and a 6-6 deadlock versus Duluth Junior College.

Following Kovach's baptismal year, he yielded the coaching gavel to Lloyd Peterson in 1931, beginning an era that would continue through the 1957 season. Peterson's—and DSTC's—first victory ever came against Winona State Teacher's College in a 7-0 affair, the first of Peterson's 84 victories.

In 1932 the Bulldogs were jammed in a four-way tie for first place, their first taste of championship football, and in 1934 DSTC captured its first outright title. The last part of the '30's was one of the most successful eras in Bulldog history as from 1934 through 1939, DSTC constructed a 31-7-2 record with championships again in 1937 and 1938.

The pre-World War II days found the Bulldogs football program struggling and 1941 was the worst in the school's history to that point with a 1-6 record. When calm was restored, however, the Bulldogs made a quick comeback as they tied for the Conference championship in 1946 and again in 1948.

The Bulldogs played an independent schedule in 1949 and traded in their green and gold school colors in 1950 to become the Maroon & Gold of the University of Minnesota-Duluth.

The Bulldogs joined the Minnesota Intercollegiate Athletic Conference (MIAC) in 1950. The 1952 season boiled down to a showdown between UMD and Gustavus Adolphus, and, in 17-degree wintry weather, the Gusties stopped the Bulldogs' drive to bring home their first MIAC championship. The following season was the most disastrous year UMD has ever experienced as it suffered through an 0-7-1 season.

The mid-'50's was a period for slowly refueling the program with respectability. In 1957 Peterson stepped down after 24 years of coaching the Bulldogs. His replacement was a Crosby-Ironton native who had worked wonders at Morris and Morningside High Schools—Jim Malosky—and within three years, the Bulldogs had earned an MIAC championship.

UMD successfully defended its title in 1961, but the program slumped again in the mid-'60's with three successive sub-.500 seasons. The Bulldogs were nosed out for the crown in 1967 with a 7-1-1 record, but again fell below the .500 mark in 1968 and 1969, the last time a UMD team failed to play .500 football.

In the last decade, UMD has compiled a remarkable 75-24-0 record, and, in the last five seasons, Malosky-coached teams have racked up a 38-11-0 record. The 1980 Bulldog team was the only UMD team in history to complete an unbeaten, untied season. In all, Malosky has won five titles during his 25 years of coaching at UMD, and he has been named "Coach of the Year" seven times by the MIAC, NIC, and NAIA District 13.

UMD has harvested several outstanding football players, including several who have gone on to professional careers—running back Dick Pesonen; end Tom Adams; lineman Vern Emerson; running back Ted McKnight, who is the all-time leading rusher at UMD with 2,957 yards; and Bruce Grant, the Bulldogs career total offense and passing leader. Another Bulldog product who has gained national recognition as a respected collegiate and professional coach is Dan Devine, who captained UMD in 1947.

# The Northern Intercollegiate Conference

Long recognized as one of the most distinguished athletic unions in the Upper Midwest, the Northern Intercollegiate Conference traces its colorful roots back to 1932. Since those 50 plus years, the NIC has undergone several faceliftings, but despite the additions and subtractions, it remains one of the strongholds of college division athletics.



The NIC currently includes seven schools — Bemidji State University, the University of Minnesota-Duluth, the University of Minnesota-Morris, Moorhead State University, Northern State College, Southwest State University, and Winona State University. Bemidji, UM-Duluth, Moorhead, and Winona were charter members when six school joined hands to form the original Northern Teachers College Conference in 1932. Mankato State University and St. Cloud State University were initial subscribers to the NTCC as well. In 1947, UM-Duluth withdrew from the NIC to join the Minnesota Intercollegiate Athletic Conference (MIAC) but 11 years later Michigan Tech University was admitted to restore the NIC to a six team circuit. In 1969, Mankato latched on to the North Central Conference and UM-Morris joined the NIC that same year. The following year, Southwest State became a full-fledged member of the NIC family. However, change did not stop with the advent of the 1970s. UM-Duluth rejoined the NIC in 1976 while Mankato, after a brief reappearance in the NIC (1978-1980), hooked up with the NCC again prior to the 1981 campaign along with St. Cloud State, Michigan Tech meanwhile departed the NIC after the 1979-80 season to join the Great Lakes Conference closer to home. In 1980, Northern State of Aberdeen, SD, officially became part of the NIC, bringing the league to its present seven-member unit.

Though the NIC was conceived in 1932, this season will be the 51st for the conference in football as there was a three-year sabbatical during World War II (1943-45).

Besides football, the NIC holds championships in eight other sports for men including baseball, basketball, cross country, golf, indoor track and field, outdoor track and field, tennis, and wrestling.

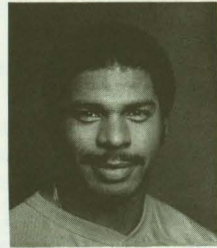
