

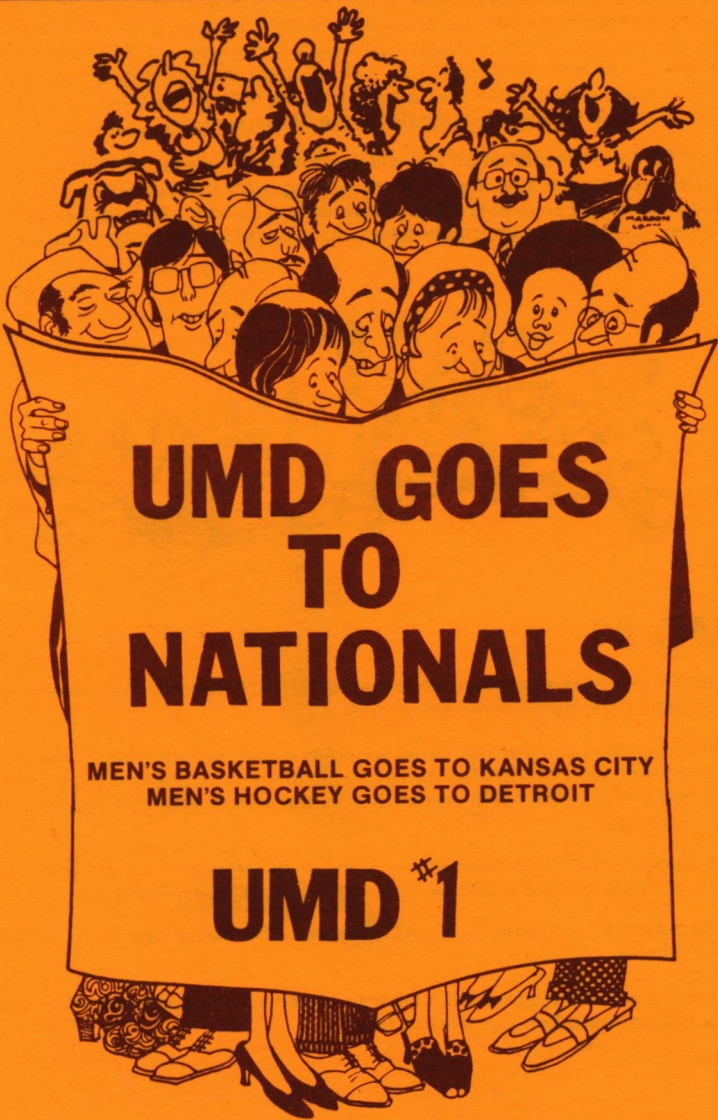

FRESHMAN TRIPS ARE . . . part of Orientation for freshman students at the University of Minnesota, Duluth. Freshman Trips give students an opportunity to meet new people while getting acquainted with the outdoor areas surrounding UMD. The outdoors provide a setting where people can get to know each other on a casual basis. This atmosphere leads to students having an opportunity to learn about life skills in addition to academics. Each student will get acquainted with other freshman students, upperclassmen, faculty, and staff. Students attending Freshman Trips can be better prepared to begin school in the sense that they've already developed a base of friends.

UMD's location provides easy accessibility to Northern Minnesota, one of the most beautiful wilderness areas in the world. UMD will provide all the food, transportation and a trip leader who is knowledgeable about UMD and experienced in the outdoors, so the tough part is choosing which trip to take. Your choices include backpacking, canoeing and base camping within the Boundary Waters Canoe Area or canoeing around the Apostle Islands in a 34-foot Montreal canoe. There are also bike touring trips offered to parks outside Duluth. All trips are offered at various skill levels so there is one right for you.

Trips leave Wednesday, August 28, and return Saturday, August 31, 1985.

When you return from your trip, there will be a Bar-B-Q, live entertainment, and a chance to share your experiences with those from other groups.

Your college experience will begin at Orientation/Registration. The freshmen sessions are a day and a half, with an optional parents' session running concurrently. The sessions for transfer students last one day.

The UMD men's basketball team advanced to the NAIA National Tournament in Kansas City, Missouri, for the first time since 1959.

The UMD hockey team won the '84-85 WCHA title and captured the WCHA play off title for the second year in a row after defeating the Minnesota Gophers in an exciting 10-8 total-goals victory. The team placed 3rd in the nation after the NCAA playoffs in Detroit, Michigan.

The Bulldog men's tennis team recently improved its season record with a sweep of both Gustavus and Mankato State, winning 8-1 and 7-2 respectively.

The UMD Alpine Club recently ended its season after being nationally ranked almost all season long.

The Bulldog women's basketball team was named co-champion with Moorhead State to take the Northern Sun Conference title.

(your name), . . . you're beautiful—don't ever

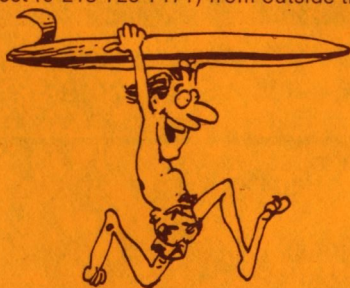

UMD WRITING REQUIREMENT

There is a new writing requirement for freshmen at UMD. This new program has been in effect for nearly one complete year. The program requires three courses for a total of nine credits:

ENGLISH 1100: Word Processing for Writing—1 cr.

Basic skills in word processing techniques useful in writing papers for University classes. The primary goal of the course is to prepare students for the word processing and computer-aided instruction assignments done in English 1110, College Writing.

ENGLISH 1110: College Writing—4 cr.

This course uses a highly structured and intensive curriculum designed to teach academic writing. Students will develop skills in writing essays and research papers. The core materials for the course are complemented by commercial word processing software and computer-aided instruction materials.

ENGLISH 31XX: Advanced Writing—4 cr.

Students will take an advanced course in one of the following areas: Arts and Letters, Business, Human Services, Science, Engineering, or Social Science. This course will not be taken until the student has completed at least 90 credits of courses.

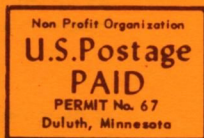
