Your beginnings at UMD will probably be no different.

Your experience at UMD will begin at your orientation session. This orientation session has been carefully planned to provide you with all the information you need to make a good beginning.

If you've been accepted to UMD, you will soon be receiving an invitation to attend one of our orientation sessions. Two student sessions are scheduled to take place on the orientation day. A general morning session and a college specific afternoon session.

General Academic Information Group Session (Morning)—during this meeting students would:

- Learn of the educational mission on the University
- Get an introduction to the Liberal Education requirements
- Discuss nature of transition from high school to college
- Discuss academic adjustments involved in University life

Small group meetings in Colleges (Afternoon)

- Students meet with representatives of the college in which the student plans to enroll to discuss academic plans and the educational programs and standards of that college. The nature, structure, requirements, purpose, and mission of the college or program of enrollment will be covered.
- Students would become acquainted with the services provided by several University offices
- Students would learn to use the UMD Bulletin, Class Schedule, and Student Handbook in preparation for developing a schedule of classes with an advisor that afternoon.

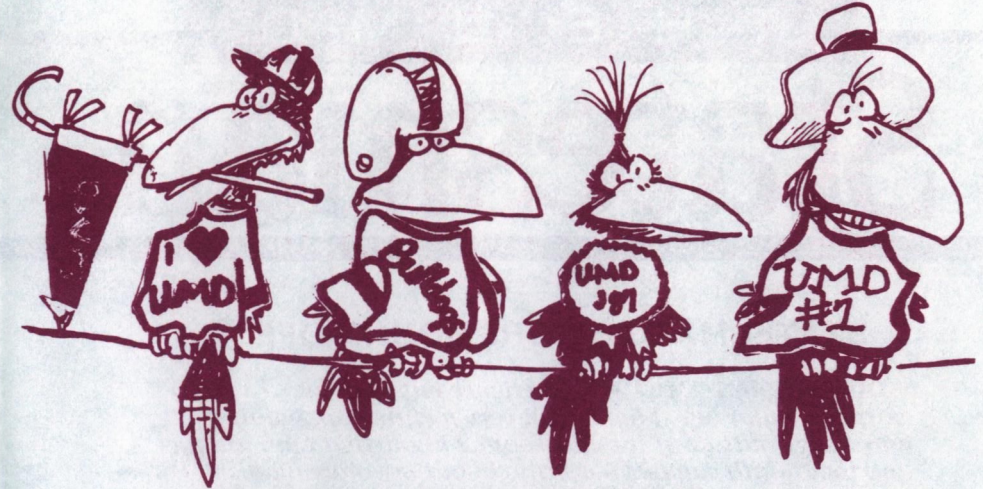
