ELECTED/SELECTED

Arthur Johnson, department of medical microbiology and immunology, has accepted an invitation to serve on the National Board of Medical Examiners Part I Microbiology Test Committee. The Board, which includes over 100 individuals selected from distinguished teachers in the U.S. and Canada, is responsible for determining the thrust and content for the individual subject areas in the examination.

Dale Olsen was elected to the Nominating Committee for selection of the Board of Directors of the Council of University Institutes for Urban Affairs (CUIUA), at a March 21 meeting in Washington. Olsen will serve for the 1980-81 academic year.

Judy Trolander was recently elected to the Executive Committee of the Minnesota Regional Research Centers. This system consists of eight historical centers around Minnesota and is coordinated by the Minnesota Historical Society.

Richard Sielaff was elected 1980 chairman of the Business and Economics Section, Minnesota Academy of Science, Mankato, Minnesota, at their April meeting.

Judith Witt, home economics department, has been appointed a member of the Board of Trustees for the Chisholm Museum. Witt has also been cited in the 1980 edition of Who's Who in the Midwest.

AWARDS

Major Gary Sims, department of aerospace studies, recently was selected for the Colonel Leo A. Codd Memorial Award. This award is given annually to the outstanding ROTC instructor for each military service. Major Sims traveled to Washington, D.C. on April 16 for the presentation ceremony.

James Murphy, department of music, received the Distinguished Alumni Award on April 26 from Central Methodist College, Fayette, Missouri. Murphy was recognized for his contributions in music by the CMC Alumni Association and the college.

David Caswell, biology student of Steve Hedman, shared in the top award at a conference held May 8 at UWS. The conference was entitled "Student Perspectives: Conference on Letters and Science" and recognized independent scholarly work by undergraduates. Caswell presented both an oral and a written report in which he described studies he did last summer and during the current academic year under the direction of Hedman. The title of his paper for which he received \$50 in first place recognition was "Parameters affecting germination of *Neurospora* ascospores from selected crosses."

GRANTS

John Adams, geography, has received a \$75,000 grant from the National Science Foundation, Division of Applied Research, to undertake a 13-month field investigation of fish consumption patterns in Trinidad, St. Vincent, St. Lucia and Belize. Field work will begin this August and continue through the 1980-81 academic year.

Jon Crane (communication), Sharon Friedler (theatre), and Virginia Katz (communication) have just received a grant of \$1870 from the Arrowhead Regional Arts Council. The money will be used to fund a video-taping and airing of the UMD Dance Theatre production of *Folios*. *Folios* is a dance and theatre piece based on historical research into life in Northern Minnesota and Wisconsin around the turn of the century. It will be produced in the studios of WDSE, Channel 8 in May with local air dates to be arranged for next fall.

William Boyce is the Project Director of a grant from the National Endowment for the Arts in the amount of \$20,000 awarded to the Tweed Museum of Art in April, to research the American paintings in the Permanent Collection of the museum.

Ajit Das has received a grant for \$400 from the Office of International Programs, under Title XII of the International Development and Food Assistance Act, to do a content analysis of the new school curriculum for rural development in India.

Barbara Flannery, home economics, has received a Graduate School Grant in Aid of Research for \$5500. The grant will be used to study housing, neighborhood and community satisfaction of elderly residents of government subsidized housing. Flannery also received a \$1500 grant from the Minnesota Energy Agency to research and develop a set of video-tapes and corresponding teaching materials on topics related to energy efficient interior design.

Edna Garte was recently awarded a National Endowment for the Humanities fellowship to participate in a summer seminar on Ethnicity in 20th Century America. Ms. Garte's research project is in the area of Jewish cultural identity in the arts. The seminar will take place in Minneapolis at the University of Minnesota.

Jack Hargis, biology, has received \$50,373 from the U.S. National Park Service since June 1978 for "Ecological Analysis of the Plankton Communities of Voyageurs National Park." The third field season of this study will be conducted during summer 1980.

On May 15, 16, and 17 A. Dean Hendrickson served as a group leader at a meeting of Directors of National Science Foundation projects funded under the Pre-College Teacher Development in Science Program held in Denver. The grant of \$27,597 is to conduct, for the second successive year, a program in mathematics for 48 K-3 teachers in Duluth and on the Range.
