

The Sexual Harassment Advocate's Office is now located in 209B Bohannon Hall, inside the Institute for Women's Studies. Janet Pribyl has assumed full-time responsibilities as Sexual Harassment Educator and Advocate on our campus. Ms. Pribyl's background in counseling, program development and university operations uniquely qualified her for this position.

As Sexual Harassment Educator, Ms. Pribyl will present workshops and training sessions on sexual harassment to administrators, faculty, staff, and students. She is also available for class presentations. She can provide information for individuals experiencing problems with sexual harassment at UMD, answering their questions with understanding. Finally, in conjunction with others working on outreach programming from the Institute, Ms. Pribyl will organize a resource collection of materials on sexual harassment, date rape, and sexual abuse.

As Sexual Harassment Advocate, Ms. Pribyl will help those involved in harassment situations to understand the issues and their rights. Discussions with her are strictly confidential and do not commit anyone to further action. Whenever possible and appropriate, she will help to mediate solutions on an informal basis. If a person wishes to proceed with a formal complaint, she will provide advocacy and support throughout the process. Other designated entry-level officers on campus will investigate and make recommendations on formal complaints.

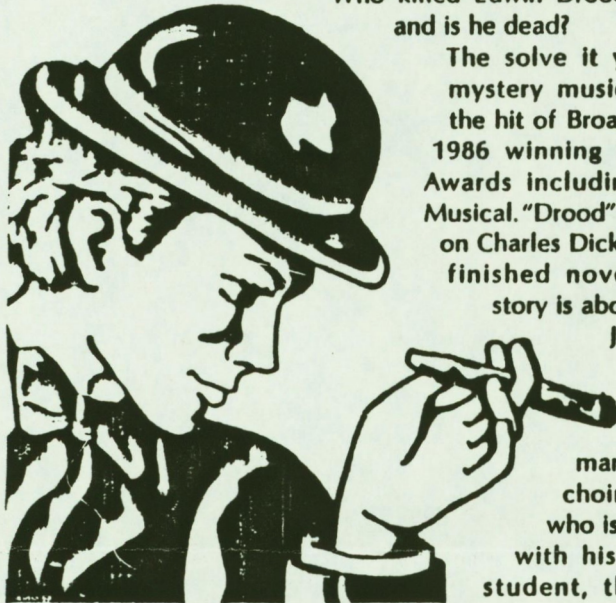
