## ON CAMPUS

'You think classes are crowded now? Wait until we bring our kids to school!!'

'We want day care! We want it now!'

The cry for daycare has been renewed on campus, this time by MPIRG's Social Justice Task Force. The task force has been meeting since the early part of the fall quarter to discuss the need for day care and begin investigating options for the coming years. Students have met with administrators Bruce Gilseth and Joe Michela. While they feel that there is possibly a need, UMD has limited financial and spatial options to make daycare on campus a reality. They feel that recent

funding and budget cuts have restricted expansion of programs on campus.

The task force is currently looking into financial options for implementing a campus daycare. Ten on-campus daycare programs at universities and colleges in the region have been assessed for their financial support and program organization. The results of this survey will be compiled in the next few weeks and recommendations made concerning financial options. Students feel that these options could include private grants, legislative funding, and user fees.

The task force is planning future events as well. A needs survey is in the planning process for winter quarter. However, their most current project other than the survey is a picnic! A picnic to celebrate children and support the need for daycare on campus will be held in the Bullpub on Thursday, Nov.3, at 5 P.M. Staff, students, and their children are invited to attend. Games will be played and refreshments served. Please mark your calendars.
