Women's campaigns mirror national trend

Although Election '92 has been called nearly as many names as its presidential candidates, its most steadfast label — Year of the Woman — provides the most constant political fodder for journalists, analysts and millions of disgruntled voters.

That's because a record number of women are seeking — and favored to win — office on the national, state and local levels.

In the U.S. Senate, women are strong contenders for at least five of the six-year posts; the momentum from the primary victories of several candidates — Democrats Carol Moseley Braun in Illinois, Barbara Boxer and Dianne Feinstein in California, and Lynn Yeakel in Pennsylvania, and Republican Charlene Haar of South Dakota — may just sweep them into office. Currently, men outnumber women 98 to 2 in the Senate.

In Minnesota, a record 123 women are running for legislative

seats. A coalition of Democratic Farmer-Labor women is well on its way to collecting \$1 million for a yet-to-be selected female Senate candidate to challenge Dave Durenberger in 1994.

Analysts say the momentum for female candidates is fed by anger over the Clarence Thomas confirmation hearings and strong anti-incumbent sentiment. They caution, however, that for women under 30, politics is sometimes still a man's world.

Twentysomething politics

At least six University students or recent graduates have decided to seek state office in Minnesota. All are men. The youngest woman seeking office, 32-year-old Ellen Anderson, graduated from the University's law school in 1986.

"Unfortunately, men who are

23 or 24 are considered better equipped to make decisions than women the same age," said Shirley Nelson, director of the St. Paul-based Women Candidate Development Coalition, a coalition of 10 women's groups with home or local offices in Minnesota. "Sometimes the reasons have been as blunt as 'a woman just can't win.'"

The coalition, which is in its seventh year, helps develop future female legislators by giving emotional support and suggestions for funds and campaigning to women seeking office.

In fact, several national surveys show that voters perceive women as sensitive and ethical, but also as lacking toughness, savvy and leadership ability.

And Steve Smith, a University

Oversight questioned

Integrity of studies left to researchers

Analysis

Though two stories detailing allegations of drug-study misconduct by University researchers are new, the questions they raise about the University's ability to act as its own watchdog are not. Now, however, the University may have no choice but to answer them.

Currently, two University organizations exist to oversee medical researchers' dealings with industry: the Office of Research and Technology Transfer Administration, and the Industry-University Relationship Review Committee.

ORTTA and the review committee, however, exist primarily

to approve studies before they've begun, not to monitor them while they're underway. That's a problem, and needs to be changed, according to Thomas Heffelfinger, the former attorney of a research assistant who brought to the University allegations of fraudulent research data by her superior.

Heffelfinger says Michelle Rennie eventually was hounded out of her job for being a whistleblower, and that the panel appointed to check out her allegations had a clear conflict of interest.

U medical studies come under fire

Recent charges that the University violated federal drug laws and failed to adequately examine a professor now under investigation by the Justice Department seem to have a common theme: a lack of oversight.

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration ordered the University to stop distributing an experimental drug for organ-transplant patients, according to a story in Sunday's Star Tribune. The FDA order came after flaws were found in research data and because the University failed to report serious side effects of the drug.

In an unrelated story, the Star Tribune reported Saturday that University researcher Barry Garfinkel, an associate professor in the psychiatry department, is under criminal investigation by the U.S. Justice Department for his role in falsifying clinical research.

Garfinkel, an expert on teen suicide, has been accused of falsifying research in a \$1 million study of Anafranil, an antidepressant drug.

Both Star Tribune stories point out problems the Univer-

sity has had in controlling and monitoring research.

The FDA reported that the University violated federal regulations "dozens of times" in its manufacturing and sale of the drug ALG, according to the Star Tribune. The University also failed to report serious patient reactions — which may have included death — in a timely manner to the FDA.

The University has been testing ALG since 1970 and is the only producer of the drug in the United States.

The report also found "no evidence" that the studies were properly monitored by the University. The FDA said it could not find important files related to the study and that it couldn't even be sure how many patients were involved in the study, according to the Star Tribune.

Additionally, the story found that the University built a \$12.5 million complex, finished more than a year ago, for the program. The building was to be funded through the sale of ALG, but the drug hasn't been produced there

Women seeking office in record numbers

political science professor, said young people running for office already have two barriers in their way: lack of money, and skepticism from older voters.

Young women face additional gender-based stereotypes that sometimes lead them to disqualify themselves from candidacy, Nelson said.

Rep. Kathleen Blatz (R-District 41B) can testify to that. Blatz was 24 when she won her first race in 1978. She remembers one voter who told her she "should be at home with her kids." When she replied that she was unmarried, the man told her she was too young to seek office.

But luckily, said the 38-year-old attorney and mother of three, that attitude is changing. "There's only been that one person in my 14 years in office that has been overtly against me," said Blatz, who is seeking re-election and would represent the redrawn District 40B. "Now, men and women alike believe there should be more women in the state Legislature. I've gotten a lot of support."

Getting into a political race is half the battle, said Anderson, a first-time office seeker. She said she hadn't thought about politics as a career until staff members of Sen. Paul Wellstone's election campaign, where Anderson was a top researcher, suggested it.

Blatz says women usually disqualify themselves as candidates because they don't believe they're qualified.

"Men tend to overestimate their strengths and women tend to underestimate them," said Anderson, one of three DFL candidates for Senate in District 66. "But women are more willing to take risks than men." The former Minnesota Education Association attorney's risk paid off; Minnesota political analysts have named her the favorite to succeed DFL-incumbent Gene Waldorf, who is not seeking re-election. If she wins, she will be one of the youngest state legislators.

Women also have to battle the "beauty queen" syndrome, Nelson said, in which at-

tractive women are treated more as if they're running for a beauty contest than a political one.

"There is some heavy-duty stuff in our society that trivializes women," she said.

Christine VeLure, the 20-year-old College of Liberal Arts junior who unsuccessfully ran for Minnesota Student Association president last year, said she's tried to fight the "dumb blonde" perception that hinders many young women.

Despite her impressive accomplishments — honors student, vice-chair of the faculty-dominated Twin Cities Campus Assembly and veteran of the University's student government — VeLure says she has experienced a subtle sexism that judges women by their looks rather than their intelligence.

"I'm a person who doesn't say much at first," said VeLure, who plans to seek a career in public policy. "I listen first, and then I speak. That initial silence has caused some people to assume 'she's just a blonde, she doesn't know anything.'"

History and role models

When Nelson graduated from the University in 1955 with a B.S. in education, running for office "was not the thing women thought about doing." During the 1950s, women had few role models, Nelson said.

When VeLure ran for MSA student body president last year, she thought it a natural thing to do. Her role models ranged from former MSA President Jennifer Alstad to two of VeLure's aunts, who are successful businesswomen. And the woman of the hour is the sharp-witted Hillary Clinton, an attorney more financially successful than her presidential candidate-husband.

Anderson also points to her mother, who earned a master's degree in chemical

engineering from Iowa State University in the 1940s and raised six children.

Things are changing. Slowly.

In Minnesota, the only woman elected to the U.S. House of Representatives was Coya Knutson, in 1954. No woman ever has been elected to the Senate, though Muriel Humphrey was appointed to her husband's post in 1978 after his death, and served until a special election was held.

Although the number of women serving in the Minnesota Legislature has increased from 12 percent in 1981 to 21 percent in 1991, that number still is far shy of representing the state's 53 percent female population.

Women usually are elected in higher numbers to school boards, Nelson said, where their historical roles as educators are perceived as more appropriate for the job. Only 12 percent

are elected to the county boards, however. Some areas, such as Dakota County, have never had a woman as county commissioner.

But now, national trends are in women's favor.

Nationally, the total number of female legislators at the state level has increased from 4.8 percent in 1971 to 18.2 percent in 1991, according to a special edition of the Minnesota Women's Consortium's weekly Capital Bulletin on July 1.

The anti-incumbency mood also is working for women; the Good Old Boys political club is out — and outsider, grass-roots politics is in.

Evan Trewyn, a 21-year-old senior in international relations and environmental studies, said he is more likely to vote for an "outsider" than an incumbent, because "new ideas have to be brought in."

"People have gotten set in their ways a little too much," said Trewyn, who represents the College of Natural Resources in

the University Senate.

Today's elected officials, Trewyn said, "have gotten stale; they've gone nowhere."

Future female legislators: education and encouragement
Increasing the number of women politicians means encouraging them from a young age, Nelson said; women must be taught that they can succeed in the political arena.

"We women have to change the culture and start teaching girls in school and one-on-one that they can do it, too," she said.

Most people who run for office have had an interest in public affairs from a young age, Smith says.

Democratic vice presidential candidate Al Gore, Jr., was preceded in office by his father Al Gore, Sr. Similarly, Blatz's father, Jerome, was a Bloomington state representative for years. Anderson grew up watching her parents participate in civil rights demonstrations and Vietnam War protests, and helped elect her former Carleton College professor, Wellstone, two years ago.

"These things don't just happen from scratch," Smith said. "They're acquired."

That's why making women feel confident is so important, said VeLure, who didn't participate in student government until college. Joining campaigns or lobbying will encourage women to challenge the status quo more often.

"You're going to hit brick walls," she said. "But whatever you do, be a strong woman and do it the best you can."

Encouragement and risk-taking can pay off, say Blatz and Anderson, who have not ruled out seeking other offices in the future. Anderson's supporters have even talked of a future campaign for governor.

"I've never planned this far ahead in my life," said the New Jersey native, who likes Minnesota politics because of its accessibility for citizens. "But I think I've found my calling."

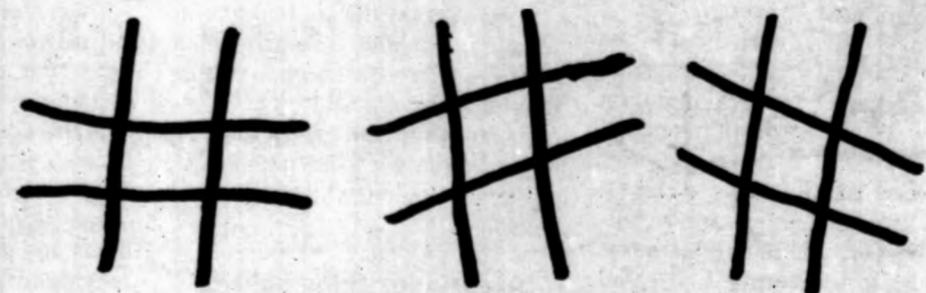

College minority population rising

The number of minorities seeking education beyond high school rose in Minnesota for the ninth straight year, increasing more than 10 percent in 1991, according to a report released Thursday by the Minnesota Higher Education Coordinating Board.

The study, which focused on Minnesota post-secondary schools, indicates that the rise exceeds growth in Minnesota's minority population.

The number of minority students in higher education climbed from 15,032 in 1990 to 16,562.

That means minority students now constitute about 6.6 percent of

the state's 248,914 post-secondary students. In 1980, by contrast, less than 5 percent of post-secondary students in Minnesota were members of minority groups.

According to 1990 census data, 5.6 percent of the state's population are members of minority groups, an increase of 2 percent over the last decade.

The increase is the result of a concerted effort by Minnesota colleges and universities to address diversity, according to Jerry Nelson, communications director for the state's community colleges.

The community college system has been particularly successful in maintaining high minority enrollment. The community college system has seen minority enrollment

rise from 1,160 in 1983 to 3,119 in 1991, the largest increase over that period among all state post-secondary institutions.

Nelson said he's not surprised to see the number of minority students rise, especially among the six metropolitan community colleges.

"It's just the result of what we've been doing the past few years," he said. "A few years back we began making an effort to double the number of minority students and staff."

"Our goal is to eventually mirror the make-up of the state's population."

Currently, 20 percent of Minneapolis Community College's enrollment consists of minority students, the highest percentage in

the state's community college system.

Each community college employs a minority staff member to attract minority staff and students, giving minority students "a point of reference," that helps "make them feel more comfortable and confident when they're looking into taking courses," Nelson said.

In addition, vacant staff positions are advertised regularly in minority publications. "We make a major affirmative action push every time a position opens up," he said.

Employing minority professors is the most important way to lure minority students to the classroom, Nelson said. To do that, Nelson and his colleagues set up the Mi-

nority Internship Program.

"The whole idea is that you don't want to recruit minority students only to have them see a parade of white faces at the lectern," he said.

"So we've recruited 40 to 50 black, brown and yellow faces — all with masters degrees, some with Ph.D.s — given them a \$1,000 stipend and put them into the classroom to teach one class for a quarter."

The two-year program, funded by the state and the Otto Bremer Foundation of St. Paul, operates statewide and is set to run through the year.

CitySongs aims to help city kids through music

Helen Kivnick hates it when people suggest the United States might just as well write off the current generation of children growing up in its urban centers.

Her new program, CitySongs, is aimed at helping those children overcome the disadvantages they face — and it starts with refusing to believe they're insurmountable, she says.

CitySongs, which plans to begin its first program this fall, is an after-school program that uses singing and performance as a means to help kids develop the skills and discipline they will need to become successful as adults.

Kivnick, an associate professor in the School of Social Work who moved to the Twin Cities two years ago, had the idea for the program when she came here.

"We need to give (these kids) a chance to get excited about something so they can plug into society and make a contribution," she said. "The importance of that can't be overlooked."

The pilot project site for CitySongs will be the Hallie Q. Brown-Martin Luther King Com-

munity Center in St. Paul. The program may expand to North Minneapolis next year.

Each site will house two choirs, one for 8- to 12-year-olds and one for kids between ages 13 and 18.

Although participants are not required to have any prior experience or musical training, "You won't be allowed to sing on stage 'til you can sing your part on key," Kivnick said.

Most people, Kivnick said, can learn to sing well if they are willing to work hard. In fact, CitySongs is as much about discipline and hard work as it is about music and the music industry, she said.

Kivnick not only wants to teach kids how to sing, but how to figure out the "concrete steps to get from where you are to where you want to go," she said.

The project grew out of Kivnick's own interest in singing. In the early 1980s she studied the importance of singing in the lives of black South Africans, and how oppressed peoples use song as a means of psychic survival. She began to consider the increased self-esteem and the outlet for creativity that singing provides for people who sing as part of their daily lives.

Local musicians Kevin Jackson

and Roland Wilson have signed on as choir directors and Cornbread Harris, a blues pianist, will be a youth and music assistant, Kivnick said.

"At this point," Kivnick says, "it's not me and not my idea. It's all of us. We're building bridges between all of these communities."

CitySongs will give Kivnick a chance to meld together three of her personal passions — her professional interests in life-cycle development, her musical abilities as a folk singer and songwriter, and her longtime involvement with issues of social justice.

She said she hopes to expose kids to something that may become a passion for them.

"We're trying to give them a vehicle to create," Kivnick said. "To do well, to develop solid relations with adults, and also to give something back to their own communities. They need a chance to give something back."

A variety of groups united to fund CitySongs's first year: The University, through the School of Social Work and the Graduate School; the St. Paul Companies; Dayton's and Target Stores; and the Sheltering Arms Foundation.

Grants awarded to U to improve teaching of elementary science

Math and science teachers from local elementary and secondary schools will be able to attend four workshops at the University this year with the help of \$135,434 in federal grants.

The University was among 16 state colleges that received the annual grants, which were approved Thursday by the Minnesota Higher Education Coordinating Board. The board approved 27 grants totaling \$892,290.

The grants are funded by the Dwight D. Eisenhower Mathematics and Science Education Act, a federal program to improve both the skills of elementary and secondary teachers and the quality of math and science teaching.

The workshops that educators will be attending range in topic matter from plant biology to discovering new ways of doing scientific research.

The goal of the program is to encourage teachers who instruct students from economically disadvantaged areas to participate in its workshops. In the last seven years, about 8,000 teachers have attended workshops funded by the program at colleges around the state.

Several of the workshops have turned into ongoing projects geared toward helping female, minority and economically disadvantaged students compete in their schools' math and science programs.

Hypocrisy rampant at GOP convention

The Republicans at last week's national convention in Houston tried to convey a few of their favorite themes to the American public. Two of the more prominent ones were: George Bush won the Cold War and the GOP has a monopoly on family values and patriotism. But while watching speeches by the party's heavy hitters last week, another theme came to mind: hypocrisy.

In perhaps the week's most hypocritical moment, closet racist and failed presidential candidate Patrick Buchanan chided Democratic nominee Bill Clinton for dodging the draft during the Vietnam War. But who was sitting just meters away from the podium during the America Firsters' speech? None other than Vice President J. Danforth Quayle, who of course has firsthand experience on how to dodge the draft.

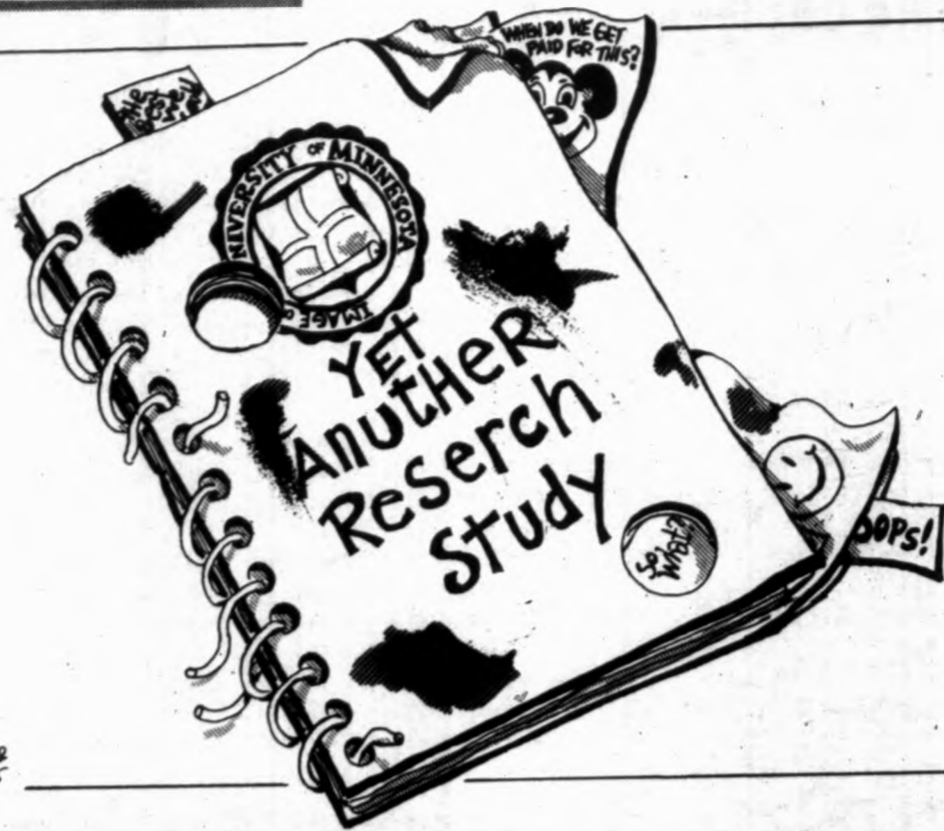
The second of many examples of hypocrisy was the repeated chanting of the phrase "family values" by a host of convention speakers. Disregard the inherent racism behind the Republican assertion that there is only one acceptable set of family values (white, patriarchal), and just look at the dismal record the GOP presidential nominee has on this issue. Immediately coming to mind is Bush's veto of the parental leave bill Congress passed in 1990. With this and Bush's other actions on legislation affecting the family, it is nothing less than absurd for him to say he's the champion of "family values." In fact, all it shows is that Bush is a champion practitioner of the art of doublespeak.

Finally, perhaps the most egregious lie the Republicans tried to foist on the American public was the repeated references to the supposed victors of the Cold War — Bush and former President Ronald Reagan. But Bush systematically ignored the democratic reforms being pushed by Boris Yeltsin until after Yeltsin finally succeeded Mikhail Gorbachev, who to this day remains committed to communism. And it took the combined efforts of a number of Democratic leaders to push Bush into reluctantly supplying economic assistance to new democracies in the former Soviet Union and elsewhere in Eastern Europe.

These are but a few of the most glaring examples of the doublespeak put forth by the Republican Party last week in Houston. We can only hope American voters are savvy enough not to fall for these lies.

If this last statement is true, then how do you explain the recent passage of the Americans with Disabilities Act, which protects the rights of the disabled? How do you explain the worldwide outrage over Serbian concentration camps?

If human life is so precious to you, why don't I ever hear about postnatal care plans for all the babies that would be born if abortion were illegal?

I've seen the pro-life commercials showing healthy, cute and happy looking children wearing new clothes and playing in front of clean, suburban houses with a voice saying that these kids are all here because of unwanted pregnancies. Why don't they show any minority children living in poverty in these commercials? Why don't we see teen mothers who drop out of high school to raise their kids without the father?

Is it really better to have a child who will suffer than to have an abortion? Until Crosby takes a step into the real world and deals with issues such as pregnancies resulting from rape and incest, postnatal care for women in poverty, and education to prevent pregnancies in the first place, I will stay firmly rooted in the pro-choice camp.

Unstable or unskilled parents raise children with more emotional and behavioral disorders and less adaptive social skills. Trust a woman to know whether or not she is willing or able to maintain proper prenatal care, raise a healthy child or be a healthy mother.

Abortion is not "such an easy way out." It is emotionally and physically painful. In response to the argument that it solves social problems, illegitimacy is not a stigma anymore. Abortion must not be so lucrative for those clinics that are picketed, harassed and

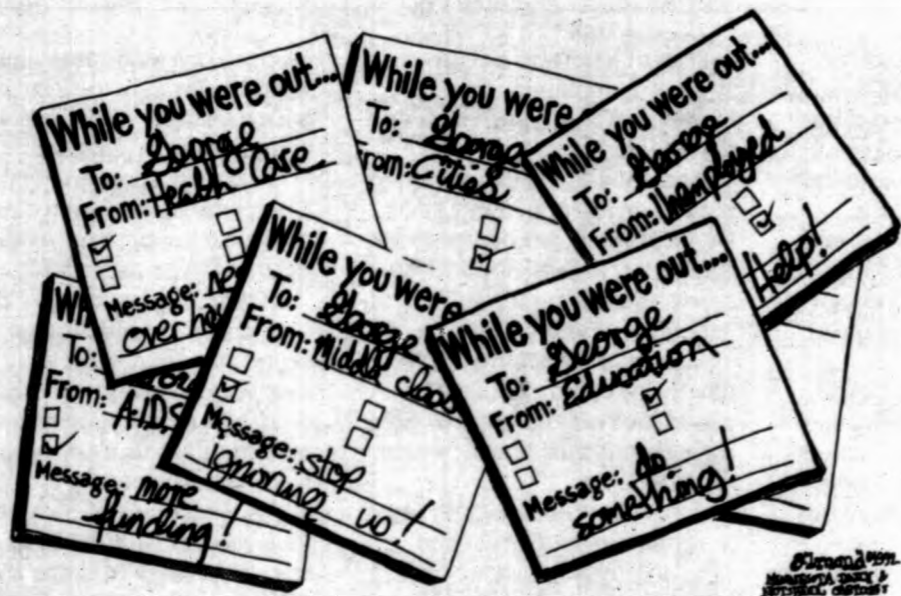

South Dakota native wins Northgate

Tschetter claims first LPGA tournament title

Kris Tschetter's first career win on the Ladies Professional Golf Association Tour couldn't have come at a better time.

Tschetter, who hails from Sioux Falls, South Dakota, fired a 1-over 73 Sunday afternoon at Edinburg USA in Brooklyn Park to claim the 1992 Northgate Computer Classic.

"It's great to get this first win out of the way," an excited Tschetter said. "Now I don't have the pressure to win my first tournament anymore."

Tschetter entered Sunday's final round with a one stroke lead over Deb Richard. Laura Baugh was three strokes back and a group of four golfers remained within striking distance just four shots off the pace.

But on this particular Sunday afternoon, the competition would be between two golfers: Tschetter and Richard.

Both golfers started off slow with bogeys on two of the first three holes. Richard fell another stroke off the pace with a bogey on the fourth hole. Richard gained a stroke on the fifth hole and then Tschetter went to work.

Tschetter said she simply hit a fantastic shot on the par 3, 166-yard sixth hole.

"I hit a low 5-iron right at the pin. It (the ball) landed about 10 feet short and rolled to within six inches of the cup. How it went in, I don't know," the first-time winner said.

Nevertheless, she tapped in for a birdie, while Richard settled for par. Tschetter struggled on the next hole and finished with a bogey, but Richard could not capitalize. She carded a double-bogey six on the hole and fell three strokes back.

"No. 7 probably was the tournament for me," Richard said.

The three-stroke margin remained just that when the golfers made the turn. Richard managed to cut the deficit to two strokes with a birdie on No. 10 and also birdied No. 12. However, Tschetter eagled No. 12 to put the margin back at three.

"I hit a good drive and a really good 3-wood to within 10 feet and made the putt," Tschetter said of the eagle. "It really got my confidence going again."

Both golfers played even-par golf the rest of the way. Richard finished with a birdie and bogey, while Tschetter carded two birdies and two bogeys.

"I'm just glad I survived the week," Tschetter said. "Even when I was three-over after four holes, I kept telling myself to stay in there and to keep my cool. There were a few tense moments out there but I survived."

Tschetter admitted to a little scoreboard watching down the stretch.

"I didn't look at the scoreboard very much, but when I did, I noticed that it pretty much was between me and Deb," she explained. "I knew that I had been struggling, but that I was still in good shape."

Ex-Gopher Hughes ties for 59th

For three golfers with Minnesota ties, the Northgate Computer Classic at Edinburg USA this weekend was not exactly what the three had in mind.

Cindy Rarick, a native of Glenwood, Minn., finished ninth and netted \$9,516. She took first-place honors in the 1991 event and was one of the favorites entering this year's play.

In last year's tournament, Rarick made a remarkable comeback after a 75 on the first day. She defeated Beth Daniel on the third sudden death playoff hole to claim the title.

Edina's Jody Anschutz carded a three-day total of 224 and finished in a tie for 49th place with five others. She collected \$1,318 for three days of work. Last year, one bad swing cost her the title.

She was leading the tournament after 52 holes but hit her tee shot into the water on No. 17. She ended up getting a double bogey and missed a birdie putt on 18 to finish in a three-way tie for first. On the first playoff hole, another double bogey greeted Anschutz and cost her a chance at the tournament title.

Former Gopher All-American Kate Hughes won \$3,500 and the title in the Trident Shootout Tuesday afternoon, but she would not do nearly as well in the tournament. She finished 15 strokes off the lead with a three-day total of 226.

"The University needs something akin to an office of inspector general... an office that doesn't report to the head of an agency, like the president of the University, but would report to an outside agency like an auditor," Heffelfinger said.

When medical researchers want to participate in an industry-sponsored study, they must first seek approval from the University's industry review committee, said Tony Potami, director of ORTTA. The committee consists of about 11 University doctors and researchers.

If participation is approved, but the sponsoring company puts conditions on its funds, the researcher also must obtain ORTTA's approval before accepting funding. Typically, the industry sponsor — often a drug company — sends the funds to the researcher's department, Potami said.

"A lot of drug studies go through my office," Potami said. But the drug study done by Dr. Barry Garfinkel, the psychiatrist under threat of federal prosecution for allegedly falsifying research, was not reviewed by ORTTA, he said.

That was because the drug company, Ciba-Geigy, did not place restrictions on use of its funds, Potami said.

Neither the Garfinkel study nor the ALG anti-rejection drug study, also under investigation, was approved by the industry review committee, either.

That's because both studies began before the 5-year-old committee was formed, said James White, the review committee's director.

The committee does not routinely review studies while they're in progress, he said, but occasionally conducts short-term monitoring if problems arise.

White did not say whether the

committee reviewed either the Garfinkel study or the ALG study while they were in progress, but news reports indicate that problems with them first came to light by other means — a whistle blower, in Garfinkel's case, and an auditor in the case of ALG.

In both, the Food and Drug Administration ultimately stepped in.

Both cases show that the review committee isn't doing its job, according to another University researcher who last year invoked the state whistle-blowing statute by filing allegations of misconduct against Dr. David Knighton and his superiors.

Knighton, a University researcher, came under fire after a news story this spring revealed he owned shares in a company that marketed a wound-healing drug he invented, a drug that has not received FDA approval.

The whistle blower, microbiology professor James Zissler, sent

a series of letters to the University attorney complaining that Knighton was involved in a conflict of interest.

In response, the University appointed an internal investigator, Dr. Neal Gault, who stated in an April letter to Zissler that his inquiry indicated no formal investigation was warranted.

Zissler, a former member of the review committee, said he was kicked off the committee last spring around the time he wrote the letters.

Under the University's current procedure, complaints about scholarly misconduct are first brought to the dean of the college performing the study, said Jim Infante, vice president for academic affairs. If the person who files the complaint feels uncomfortable contacting the dean, Infante said, he or she can bring complaints to his office.

The University is changing its procedures, Infante said. Under a

proposed system, complaints would be brought to a University-wide panel that would appoint a committee to investigate.

That plan, approved by the University Senate this spring, now must be approved by the Board of Regents, he said.

Arthur Caplan, director of the University's biomedical ethics center, said that while there's no easy way to monitor research adequately, a random auditing system should be used periodically to check up on projects.

"A weakness of a lot of the review mechanisms (at the University) is that they're not really constructed to do long-term or continuous follow-ups," Caplan said.

"Right now the protection of the public and the subjects depends on the integrity of the researchers."

Report says 'no evidence' studies were properly monitored

yet because of mechanical problems.

Meanwhile, the Star Tribune also alleged the University's investigation of Garfinkel's research failed to follow standard guidelines and, in effect, protected both Garfinkel and the investment of Ciba-Geigy, the drug's manufacturer.

And Michelle Rennie, the research assistant who first brought the study's flaws to the attention of University officials, was strongly criticized for doing so by

officials from both the University and Ciba-Geigy. She eventually lost her job in the psychiatry department, at the insistence of Ciba-Geigy.

Rennie's job loss would appear to be in direct violation of a Minnesota law that prevents employers from firing or disciplining an employee for reporting a possible crime.

In 1989 David Brown, dean of the Medical School, appointed a panel of Garfinkel's colleagues to investigate the charges. Although the University and professional associations call for investiga-

tions to be free of conflicts of interest, no one from outside the medical school was on the panel.

"I thought the University had an obvious conflict of interest in conducting an internal investigation into this situation," said Thomas Heffelfinger, the attorney who represented Rennie. "They were unwilling to accept that and the result of that investigation was a foregone conclusion."

Heffelfinger is now a U.S. attorney and his office is in charge of the Garfinkel investigation.

"I've done enough talking."

said Rennie when reached at her home in California. "I just need a break."

The University's Medical School failed to acknowledge until Friday that it had taken any action against Garfinkel for what the University has called his "significant negligence" in directing the study. Garfinkel was fined one month's salary, required to submit his research to a panel of three professors and barred from new clinical drug studies after the school completed its investigation.

If Garfinkel had been offi-

cially disciplined for his role in falsifying research, by law the University would have had to make public its findings.

The Justice Department probe is in response to a Food and Drug Administration request after its own investigation into the allegations.

Garfinkel, contacted Saturday at his home, declined to comment.

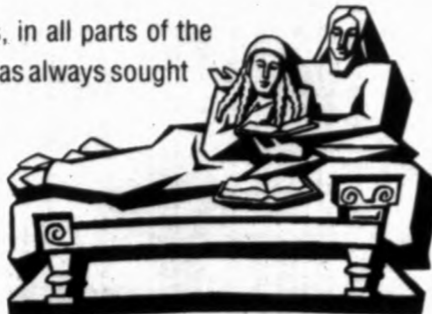

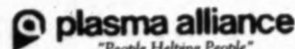

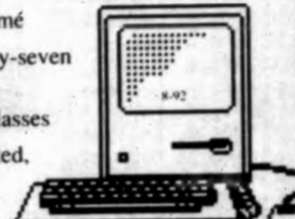
