CAGERS OPEN BIG TEN DEFENSE

After running its season record to a perfect 9-0 and presently ranked nationally, Minnesota's red hot basketball team begins what the whole season is really all about this weekend. . . defense of its 1971-72 Big Ten championship, the school's first unshared title in 53 years. The Gophers open in rugged fashion when they travel to darkhorse Iowa Saturday, January 6 for a 7:30 p.m. CST tipoff.

FAR WEST CHAMPS

Coach Bill Musselman's tall timber is fresh off becoming the first Big Ten team to ever capture the Far West Classic Tournament in Portland, Oregon. Minnesota took the title by beating Washington State (41-35), Oregon (59-49) and Oregon State (83-80). Senior forward Ron Behagen was named MVP of the tournament, and both he and senior forward Clyde Turner were named to the All-Tournament Team. Behagen topped UM scoring with 45 points in the three games followed closely by Turner with 44 and another senior frontliner, David Winfield, who bagged 43 points. Senior guard Bob Nix came up with his best day in a Gopher uniform scoring 19 against Oregon State in the title game. And, as usual, senior center Jim Brewer led all rebounders grabbing 33 in the tourney. Nix and Winfield both shot better than .600 percent from the floor in the three games.

MUSSELMAN ON UM AT THE FAR WEST

"There is no question in my mind that we finished 1972 playing some great basketball at the Far West Classic," says coach Musselman. "Our defense made great strides out there, particularly in the last two games. Also, our rebounding was something to see. Everyone went to the boards at both ends of the court. . .and that's what it takes to become a winner. The offense always seemed to get cranked up whenever needed, but the defense is what won it for us. Clyde Turner put on a defensive show even I didn't believe he could muster. And Bob Nix played his best game ever for Minnesota when we won the championship for our school. As you may have guessed I'm pretty proud of our men."

MUSSELMAN ON THE BIG TEN

"Right now we are facing four extremely critical games (at Iowa, Wisconsin, Marquette, at Indiana)," the coach says. "How we fare in the next two weeks should determine if we can successfully defend our Big Ten title. Iowa can be devastating at home. I do not believe people have given them fair ranking thus far. They have great talent and are bigger than us across the front line. We now

we are in for a very rugged battle Saturday. Then we come home to Wisconsin, a team that forced Marquette into two overtimes before losing. After Marquette, who I honestly believe has a better club than last year (heaven forbid), we travel to Indiana. I'm actually just hoping we survive."

BEHAGEN LEADS
SCORING, BREWER
REBOUNDS

Ron Behagen continues to lead the Gopher scoring parade averaging 19.9 after nine games. But also in double figures for UM are Clyde Turner, 17.2, David Winfield, 13.4 and caPtain Jim Brewer, 13.3. The other regular, guard Bob Nix who runs the Gopher offense is hitting at 7.7 points a game. Brewer leads in rebounds with 13.7 per game, Behagen is next a 9.9. Winfield remains red hot from the field shooting an amazing .620 field goal percentage (49 of 79), while Turner is tops at the free throw line hitting 23 of 29 (.793). As a team UM exhibits a scoring margin of 18.4 points (77.6 to 59.2) and an 13.7 rebound margin (49.1 to 30.4) over its nine opponents to date.

ICERS DROP
TOURNEY FINAL
TO WISC.

After edging host St. Louis University 6-5, the Minnesota hockey Gophers dropped the title game to Wisconsin 5-1 in St. Louis, Mo. over the holidays. But coach Herb Brooks can't dwell too long on that disappointment as Minnesota headsback into WCHA action this weekend with a two-game series at league leading Michigan State Friday and Saturday. Both games are 7:30 p.m. EST.

UM TIED FOR
FIFTH IN WCHA

By gaining a 4-4 tie, and then defeating Wisconsin 4-2 at Williams Arena Dec. 22-23 prior to the St. Louis excursion Dec. 28-29, Minnesota's young hockey team moved into a fifth place tie in the first division of the WCHA with Notre Dame. Each team has 10 points under the complicated WCHA scoring system. But the Gophers are far from challenging for high honors at this time as this week's opponent, Michigan State, is on top with 23 points. Wisconsin is next at 19 while Denver and North Dakota each have 13 points. Minnesota is 3-5-2 in the WCHA and 6-6-2 overall.

MSU WITHOUT
TOP STAR

One thing in Minnesota's favor this week is that the Spartans have lost their top player, center Gilles Gagnon, who has completed his eligibility. "Gagnon was their leader and was a player that really made things happen on the ice," says Brooks. "Maybe they will be a different team without him, maybe not. But State will still be battling to hold onto first place and we can't expect them to have any letdown."

BROOKS STILL
SEEKING MORE
CONSISTANCY

"What we have to do ourselves is come up with more consistant play. I've harped on that all season long because of our youth and inexperience, but we have played enough games (14) and are no longer that inexperienced. We have skated too many up and down series. . .hot one night and stand around the next. You can't afford that in the WCHA. We'll have to skate our tails off both nights just to stay with Michigan State. They say you can't hope for any more than a split on the road in this league. Well, even that won't be easy this time."

FEW LINEUP
CHANGES
EXPECTED

Brooks said he will carry both regular goalies - Doug Hastings and Brad Shelstad - but not make a decision who will play until Friday. No major line changes are expected and the defense should remain intact, too. However, one player, sophomore wing Robby Harris, is questionable due to an ankle injury, but senior wing Brad Buetow may be ready after a long recovery period from a fractured hand injury.

Minnesota swimming coach Bob Mowerson sends his 1972-73 varsity into its first dual competition of the season Saturday at 2 p.m. in Cooke Hall Pool against Southwest Minnesota State. However, Mowerson says Southwest is not back in school yet and may not be able to bring its full squad.

"I plan to use this meet as much for experimentation as any other means," Mowerson said Wednesday. "I'm not at all certain yet as to the potential of this squad as we have not been in enough competition. Thirteen of our swimmers and divers practiced for a week in Florida over the holidays and I'm certain that helped a great deal. Each boy paid his own way, too. But even cold weather down there hampered our workout time."

Mowerson believes three of his top swimmers could come to the front Saturday. He is speaking of Dick Stone and Steve Thompson in both the 1,000 and 500 yard freestyle events, and Dave Malban in the 50 and 100 freestyle dashes. However, Thompson has a slight shoulder injury and may not be up to full power.

DIVERS COMPETE

Craig Lincoln, Minnesota's All-American and Olympic diver the past three years, is now UM's diving coach and training the men to take his place. Lincoln said Wednesday that one man, senior co-captain Jim Turney from Berea, has the lead at this time, but is being pressed by three more divers: junior Craig Rettmer, junior Sheldon Peterson and senior Chris Hussman. All four will compete Saturday, says Lincoln.

GYM TEAM AT
HOME FRIDAY

Minnesota's fast improving gymnastics team faces a severe test in Cooke Hall Gym Friday at 7:30 p.m. when the Gophers host Illinois Chicago-Circle. The opposition, according to UM coach Fred Roethlisberger, is one of the nation's elite which finished third at this year's Big Ten Invitational meet in December. Minnesota ended eighth there. "Chicago is the hotbed of high school gymnastics and Chicago-Circle sits right on top of this prime area," says Roethlisberger. "They are strong in every event and present a tremendous challenge to our men."

However, Minnesota's varsity candidates, says their coach, "paid the price" during the holidays working out three or more hours each open day. "We have no excuses. We are ready," the coach offers. "Our men showed as much discipline as I could ever ask. They have worked themselves into excellent condition and now need a lot of foreign competition to sharpen their routines. I expect one of the best dual matches of the entire season Friday evening."

Roethlisberger said Wednesday that two of his key performers have licked injuries and will compete Friday for the first time this season. Back doing his crack sidehorse routines is senior Russ Fystrom while Barry Peterson will rejoin the floor exercise group. Fystrom was sidelined with a bad wrist and Peterson with a back injury.

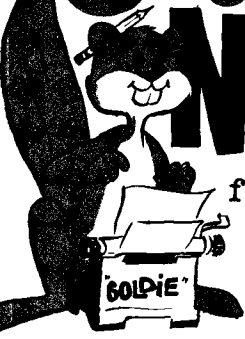

1973 FOOTBALL SCHEDULE

Minneapolis---A recent change made by the Big Ten office gives the University of Minnesota six home football games in 1973 instead of five as originally scheduled.

The only change made on the Minnesota schedule was moving the Indiana game of October 13 from Bloomington to Minneapolis.

Minnesota opens the 1973 season with a Conference game against defending champion Ohio State at Columbus, Ohio on September 15. The Gophers then meet three non-Conference opponents in a row.

University of North Dakota is Minnesota's first home opponent in 1973 as the teams meet in Memorial Stadium September 22. The Gophers then travel to Lawrence, Kansas and a date with Kansas University September 29, before returning home to host mighty Nebraska October 6.

Remaining home Big Ten games, besides Indiana, include Michigan October 27, Purdue November 10, and Wisconsin November 24.

Other road games see Minnesota at Iowa October 20, Northwestern November 3 and Illinois November 17.

HOCKEY TEAM RETURNS HOME

After playing five of its first seven WCHA series on the road, the University of Minnesota hockey team begins the "home" portion of its 1972-73 schedule this weekend when Colorado College invades Williams Arena for Friday and Saturday night games. Both games begin at @ p.m. Last week Minnesota dropped a 6-2 decision to high flying North Dakota on Friday, but battled back to gain a 2-2 tie the next night. Minnesota is now 3-8-3 in the WCHA and 6-9-3 for all games played.

BROOKS SAYS UM MUST MAKE MOVE NOW

Coach Herb Brooks said Wednesday that if his young Gopher hockey squad has any hopes of moving up in the WCHA standings, they will have to start this weekend. "We have high hopes of gaining a solid berth in the post season playoffs," Brooks says, "but we can't wait any longer. The road has been very tough for us playing so many games on the road. We are home five of the next six weekends so if we don't take advantage of that we will have nobody to blame but ourselves. Our men have worked like mad and shown continual improvement. Now maybe we can get some breaks that go with playing at home. I hope our fans come out and give our young players the vocal support they need to start our drive up in the standings."

C.C. ALWAYS TOUGH FOR UM HERE

"Colorado College is always tough for Minnesota. They seem to come up with outstanding games every time we meet. In addition, they, like us, believe they are about to break out, too, so this series should be a great one. We both have a lot at stake."

BROOKS TO STAY WITH SAME LINES

Coach Brooks also said Wednesday he will keep his lineup intact, the same units that skated against North Dakota. So Minnesota's four lines should go this way: C-Jim Gambucci, LW-Dean Blais, RW-Cal Cossalter; C-Tom O'Brien, LW-Tobby Harris, RW-Warren Miller; C-John Harris, LW-Brad Buetow, RW-Tom Dahlheim. Buetow and Dahlheim double as UM's top penalty killing forwards. To date Minnesota has allowed its opponents only four power play goals in 127 chances.

Tech is just one point behind Minnesota in the WCHA with 18 points after splitting at home last week against Notre Dame. But as always when Tech and Minnesota get together in hockey, hot and fast action is expected. These schools began competition back in the 1920's and to date Minnesota owns a 86-48 margin in wins. There have been three ties. This series marks the first meeting between UM rookie coach Herb Brooks, and Tech's veteran mentor John MacInnes, now in his 17th season at MTU.

BROOKS SAYS LAST

Coach Brooks said that junior Brad Shelstad, who has only allowed six goals in his last three games, two in each outing, will be in goal Friday night against Michigan Tech. But Brooks also said he would wait until after Friday's game to decide if it will be Shelstad or senior Doug Hastings who will start Saturday afternoon. "I have been hoping one of our two regular goalies would come to the front and take charge, and maybe Shelstad has done just that," the coach offered. "We'll know more about that after Friday's game. As for the rest of our lineup, I may possibly make a change or two in the forward lines only for the reason of seeking more scoring punch. We are next to the bottom in the WCHA in average goals scored (3.6) and must come up with a better production than that if we hope to stay alive. Senior forward Clyde Turner moved ahead of teammate Ron Behagen in the Minnesota basketball scoring derby this week for the first time this season when he banged in a season team high of 30 points in the loss at Indiana. Turner has now scored 238 points in 13 games, an average of 18.3 per contest while Behagen, in somewhat of a scoring slump recently, saw his average drop to 17.4 as he only canned 10 points at Indiana. Center Jim Brewer moved up the ladder as he hit a personal season high of 23 last week and is now averaging 13.8. David Winfield is the only other Gopher averaging in double figures, 11.5 per game. Brewer continues with a wide margin in rebounds with 166, 12.8 per game.

MUSSELMAN SAYS
UM CAN PLAY
MAJOR ROLE IN
BIG TEN RACE

"People are already counting Minnesota out of this year's Big Ten race, the one we are trying to defend," says coach Bill Musselman, "But not me. Listen, we still play Purdue twice, plus Michigan and Indiana here. That means we have quite a voice left among the present leaders. And don't forget past history in this Conference. Anybody can win on a given day. Don't believe we aren't concerned about Michigan State. We went down to Iowa and got beat. They went down there and won. We have 11 more Big Ten games to go and a lot can happen before March 10, the final day of Conference play. So don't count us out, or anyone else for that matter. I believe Minnesota can be a pivotal force in deciding this year's champion. . . whether it's us or someone else. No sir. Minnesota is far from out of it at this point."

Last Friday night the Gopher wrestlers had a match at Cedar Falls, Iowa with Northern Iowa University. The Minnesota matmen came out on top 24-14. "Wessman, Panning and Simonson are the three that have really shown dedication and desire to win." Minnesota's wrestlers have the desire and their 12-0 record shows that they know how to win. GOPHER GYMNASTS WORKING HARD Coach Fred Roethlisberger's gymnasts have had two weeks off and they have been working hard on improving their routines. Everyone is healthy and when the Gophers meet Michigan this Saturday at Cooke Hall it should pit the Big Ten's top two teams. Minnesota has a 3-0 record in dual meets but the Gophers will have to perform better than they have all year to beat the Wolverines, according to Roethlisberger.

ROETHLISBERGER & LOKEN WANT GYMNASTS TO WORK ON COMPULSORIES A special feature of the Minnesota-Michigan meet on Saturday will be that both squads will also perform their compulsory exercises. Compulsories are normally performed only during tournaments such as the Conference meet. Both Newt Loken, Michigan coach and Roethlisberger want their gymnasts to work on compulsory routines so this will give the fans a good chance to look at all aspects of gymnastics work.

FYSTROM UNSELFISH PERFORMER According to Fred Roethlisberger, Co-Captain Russ Fystrom has performed very unselfishly this season. Russ had injured his wrists early in the year and missed a lot of valuable training time; and as a result was slow in improving his routines. Russ had been expected to be one of the Big Ten's best on the side horse this winter but his wrists kept him from developing as rapidly as he would have liked. Nevertheless Russ has shown quite well and helped the Gophers score high in the side horse competition. "Fystrom's unselfishness has given the entire team a boost. He could have just quit when he hurt himself and his chances for a personal championship, but he hung in there to help the team. Russ is an outstanding gymnast and a good leader as well," says Roethlisberger. Saturday is also gymnastics alumni day and a large representative group is expected.

GOPHER SWIMMERS REBOUND FROM LOSS AT NORTHWESTERN After absorbing a 70-53 loss at the hands of the Northwestern Wildcats the Gopher mermen pulled together and defeated the Iowa State Cyclones at Cooke Hall on Monday (1/22). The final score read 64-49 and the big difference for the Gophers between the Northwestern and Iowa State meets was the performances of the two relay squads. Against Iowa State the 400 yard medley relay team swam their fastest time of the year, (3:41.3), and the 400 yard freestyle relay team also recorded an excellent time in winning, (3:17.9). For the first time this season Minnesota's defending Big Ten basketball champions have surpassed the .500 mark in Conference play and now sport a 3-2 record (13-2 for all games). The Gophers polished off Wisconsin 81-64 Monday on the road and return home Saturday to host one of the surprise teams of this year's race, the Purdue Boilermakers. Purdue trails only undefeated Indiana in the Big Ten race with a 5-1 record. Purdue is 12-4 on the entire season.

WIN AT UW 1ST ON BIG TEN ROAD FOR UM

"Winning at Wisconsin actually meant a lot more than another figure in the 'W' column for us," said Minnesota coach Bill Musselman Tuesday. "It meant we had won our first Conference road game. Now that may not sound like a great big deal, but when we had already dropped decisions at Iowa and Indiana, well, one begins to wonder where the next road win is coming from. I believe our men played solid basketball at both ends of the court to defeat Wisconsin. At the same time I believe the Badgers were still a bit upset about losing at Northwestern last Saturday. I'm certain it affected their game against us. But our men were quick at both ends of the court. We ran the fast break effectively and even more important, came back hard on defense. There is no question that the latter is our key."

TURNER MOVES AHEAD IN SCORING

Senior forward-guard Clyde Turner is again at the top of the Minnesota basketball scoring race after running in 21 points against Wisconsin Monday. Turner is now averaging 13.4 points

per game, less than a point ahead of linemate Ron Behagen who is scoring at a 17.9 clip. Other Gophers in double figures are center Jim Brewer at 13.4 and forward David Winfield 11.3. Brewer and Behagen continued to lead the Gophers in rebounding with 12.5 and 10.3 averages, respectively.

Many people skipped right by Purdue in looking at the Big Ten race before the season started. But not Minnesota assistant coach Bill Klucas. "Purdue hired a great coach in Fred Schaus to replace George King, and Schaus inherited a fine string of ball players," Klucas says. "Although they lost some good ones in Bob Vord and Willie Granklin, Purdue has a solid nucleus of veterans back, and in 6-11 sophomore center John Garrett have one of the best young big men in the nation. He (Garrett) is averaging 18.4 points after staggering around with an injury in a couple of games that saw him only get a couple of points. And in Frank Kendrick, their 6-6 junior forward and leading scorer with a 19.6 average, Purdue has another young man who can break any game open. So I'm not at all surprised that Purdue is 5-1 at this time

Minneapolis--A heavy week of duty faces University of Minnesota winter sports teams this week, which began with Monday's basketball game at Illinois and finishes with the Big Ten wrestling meet at home Friday and Saturday.

Coach Wally Johnson will host the wrestling meet in the University's new Bierman Field Athletic Building. Extra bleachers will be installed for all three sessions: Friday at 1 and 7:30 p.m., and the championship bouts beginning at 2 p.m. Saturday. The award ceremony is scheduled for 5 p.m. Saturday.

Two dual meets are scheduled at home Saturday afternoon when coach Fred Roethlisberger's gymnasts take on Wisconsin, and coach Roy Griak's indoor track team hosts Iowa State. Both meets begin at 4 p.m. (CST) and are final tuneups for respective Big Ten meets the following week.

Coach Herb Brooks' hot hockey squad plays its final home series of the season against Minnesota-Duluth Friday and Saturday in Williams Arena. Both games are set for 8 p.m.

The final weekend event is Saturday afternoon at 1 p.m. when the basketball Gophers return to the Big Ten TV network against Michigan. There will not be any closed circuit telecast of Saturday's game.

Minneapolis--"With the addition of bleachers down on the gym floor, we will have the finest facility possible to host the Big Ten wrestling championships," says University of Minnesota coach Wally Johnson. The Conference meet is scheduled Friday and Saturday, February 23-24, in the new Bierman Field Athletic Building on Minnesota's main campus in Minneapolis. Sessions are set for 1 and 7:30 p.m. Friday, with consolation and championship bouts beginning at 2 p.m. Saturday. The awards ceremony is scheduled at 5 p.m. Saturday.

Johnson says coaches from each school plus meet officials will gather at Bierman Building Thursday evening to draw up seeds and pairings. Each school may enter one man at each of the 10 competitive weights, a total of 200 competitors.

"Based on what I have seen this year, I have to believe Michigan is a slight favorite to capture this year's championship," Johnson added. "However, there is no open door. I also expect to see the closest meet in the last seven years. Iowa must be considered strongly for Conference honors, and don't count out Minnesota, Northwestern or Wisconsin. The latter three are darkhorses who could come through." Michigan State is the defending champion.

Three returning champions from the 1972 meet will compete this week, including Tom Milkovich, Michigan State (142-pounds); Jarrett Hubbard, Michigan (150); and Mitch Mendrygal, Michigan (158).

For Minnesota, Johnson says John Panning at 177-pounds may have the clearest shot at winning a championship. Panning was third at the Big Ten meet last year, and later runner-up at the NCAA meet. Others given a good shot at winning a title for UM are Steve Wessman (134-pounds) and Jeff Lamphere (126). Both the latter were Big Ten runners-up last year. Also, heavyweight Dave Simonson, says Johnson, could be the darkhorse in his division.

PANNING FAVORED AT 177

With the Big Ten Wrestling championships coming up this weekend one member of the Minnesota squad, co-captain John Panning, (Canby, Minn.), has to be a little apprehensive. Last year John, a Williams Scholar, was seeded first in the 177-pound division, but was upset by Jim Clary of Indiana in the opening round 5-4. John was able to wrestle back through the consolation rounds and ultimately end up third in the

division. This year John will again be the number one seed in the 177-pound weight class. Clary is back, too, but not with any new confidence about beating Panning. In a dual meet between Indiana and Minnesota at Minneapolis this year, Panning pinned Jim Clary in 1:31. Panning plans on being anything but over-confident this time around. You see, while he finished only third in the Big Ten last year, he did qualify for the NCAA championships where he finished second to Bill Murdock (University of Washington).

According to Gopher head coach Wally Johnson, Panning will again be seeded first in the 177-pound weight class. This time Johnson feels he will win the Big Ten title and then challenge for the national title. "In dual meets John was 18-2 this year, and I believe that he may be able to go all the way to the NCAA title this time," Johnson said. Crumley pinned Panning but the match was close at the time (8-6), and Panning got caught gambling a little enabling Crumley to pin him. If Panning is able to win the Big Ten 177-pound title and advance to the NCAA's, he may get the opportunity to wrestle Crumley again. Don't bet against Minnesota's Panning this time out.

Howie Sundberg in the 300 (31.0), Dan Humes (1:11.9) and Jim Heidlberger (1:12.4) in the 500, Tim Oliver (14:21.3) in the three-mile and Glenn Bullick (15'7½") in the pole vault all had personal bests on Saturday. Greg Lewis (49.1) and Vince Fuller (49.4), a freshman record also had their top times in the 440 as did Chuck Miller in both the 70 high and low hurdles, 8.6 and 8.1 respectively. All in all it was the "quality performances" that made the meet as successful as it was according to Griak.

ANDERSON AND BULLICK SET MEET RECORDS Gophers Colin Anderson (59'3 3/4" in shot put) and Glenn Bullick (15'7½" in pole vault) both set Northwest Open records last weekend. As impressive as these records are, coach Griak feels his entire squad has performed like record breakers over the past month. He states, "on January 1 we were a mediocre team on paper, now we have some of the Big Ten's best times of the indoor season." There were 350 entries in the Northwest Open and the Gophers captured all but five of the sixteen events to show their superiority. The Gophers already hold victories over Drake and the University of Iowa and would like to defeat ISU for a clean sweep of the Iowa schools. ISU's all-american quarterback George Amundson leads the Cyclones in the shotput but Amundson especially and the whole ISU team will have their hands full this weekend against the fast improving Gopher track team.

ALL UM TEAMS ON ROAD THIS WEEK

Five of Minnesota's six winter sports teams are on the road this week with none playing at home. The only squad idle is gymnastics. Action starts Thursday (3/1) when the swim team heads for Ann Arbor, Mich. and the Big Ten meet, which runs through Saturday. Also in Conference championship action is the indoor track squad which competes at Lafayette, Indiana. Purdue is the host here. Hockey wraps up regular WCHA play with a pair of 2-point games at Wisconsin, while the basketball team hopes to continue its surge to a second straight Big Ten title and plays Saturday afternoon (4:05 p.m. EST) at Purdue.

CAGERS INCHES AWAY FROM 2ND TITLE

With three games left to play in regular season action, coach Bill Musselman's Minnesota basketball team, if it wins them all, can lay claim to a second consecutive Big Ten championship. The Gophers, now 9-2 in the Conference and 19-2 overall, play at Purdue Saturday, return home to host Iowa Monday (3/5), and then close out at Northwestern (3/10). A win Saturday would all but knock Purdue (8-4 in Big Ten) out of the Conference race and leave the final decision between Minnesota and Indiana, the latter club 9-3 in the league.

ONE MORE WIN IS NEW RECORD FOR UM CAGERS

Should Minnesota win one more game this season, it would mark an all-time high in wins at the school. The Gophers are presently 19-2 on the season while the best previous record stands at 19-5, as far as wins go. That was in 1964-65. The best previous single season record based on percentage was in 1948-49 when the Gophers went 18-3, a mark of .857 percent. There were better percentage marks back in the early days of Big Ten basketball, but the above is based on 1939-40 serving as the first year of the modern basketball era.

Minneapolis--"About the only thing I can say now is that I'm glad we don't have to play Iowa again this season," says Minnesota basketball coach Bill Musselman.

With a possibility of closing out their second straight Big Ten title a reality, the Gophers stumbled before a torrid Iowa second half Tuesday (3/5) and fell 79-77 at Williams Arena. It marked the second time this season that Iowa knocked off the highly ranked Gophers. The Hawks won a 65-62 overtime decision at Iowa City January 6 in the Conference opener for both schools.

Now Minnesota must win Saturday (3/10) at Northwestern if it hopes to remain in the title chase. The Gophers, along with Indiana, are 10-3 in the Big Ten standings. Indiana closes its regular season schedule at home Saturday against Purdue.

Should both Minnesota and Indiana win, a title tie develops necessitating a playoff Monday or Tuesday (3/12-13) at a mutually agreeable site to determine who will represent the Conference in the NCAA Mideast Regional Tournament March 15-17 at Nashville, Tennessee.

It is also probable that whichever team does not go to the NCAA tourney will receive an invitation to play in the NIT Tournament at New York City.

Even in losing to Iowa, Minnesota's season record of 20 wins against only three losses is still the best in the school's history. The highest previous season win total was set by the great Lou Hudson-Archie Clark-Don Yates club of 1964-65 which posted a 19-5 season record.

All but lost in the shuffle Tuesday were some impressive ceremonies honoring Minnesota senior center and captain Jim Brewer. At halftime of the Iowa game athletic director Paul Giel presented Jim with an appropriately inscribed gold basketball depicting his great three-year career at Minnesota and honoring his new school rebound record which has now reached 870.

Giel then, to the surprise of everyone, announced that Brewer's jersey and number, 52, has been permanently retired to honor this young man's accomplishments. "Brew", as Jim is called by his thousands of fans in Williams Arena, is expected to make several All-American teams when the season is finished. He was a key member of the 1972 U.S. Olympic team after being named MVP of the Big Ten last season.

"There simply aren't words to express my complete feelings about this young gentleman," says Musselman. "I gain more respect for him every day. He takes on more responsibility and leadership than I could ever ask of a player. He is the finest captain and leader I have ever coached. I hope my son grows up to be exactly like him, whether he is a basketball player or not."

This season Brewer has scored 324 points, a 14.0 average, and grabbed 270 rebounds, 11.7 per game. He leads the Gophers in rebounds and is third behind forward Ron Behagen (435, 13.9) and guard Clyde Turner (417, 13.1) in scoring.

But now comes the Northwestern battle, a team Minnesota defeated 90-74 on February 26 at home. But when going on the road in the Big Ten, past performances are thrown out the window.

"We simply have to put it all back together," Musselman added. "We cannot take anyone lightly. We may have done that Monday after gaining a 46-33 halftime lead. But Iowa came back and we lost our touch. We still could have won, but it simply wasn't our turn. This team has weathered many, many storms and I believe they can come back once again. We'll know soon enough."

Mark Johnson (Wayzata) also broke a Gopher freshman record in the 200-yard breaststroke.

Steve Eklund finished fourth in the 880 (1:52.6) and Randy Beebe ran his best time of the year in the 1000 (2:11.6) to finish fourth. The Gophers mile relay team of Greg Lewis, Vince Fuller, Mark Gilmore and Sundberg ran 3:16.8 (their best of the season) to finish fifth. Head coach Roy Griak thought his squad performed "quite well" overall despite a few sub par performances.

When the 1973 Big Ten wrestling championships begin March 23 at the University of Minnesota there will be a lot of talk centering around an elite group of wrestlers.

One of the nation's best and one of the top wrestlers in the world is Michigan State's Tom Milkovich. Tom has won three Big Ten titles (two at 134 and one at 142). Last winter Tom also captured the NCAA crown at 142. He has yet to be defeated in Big Ten competition and has gone undefeated in collegiate wrestling since the beginning of the 1971-72 season. Tom has a strong chance of becoming the first four-time Big Ten wrestling champion since 1950 and the first in Michigan State history. Tom's brother Pat who won the Big Ten's 126 pound title last year is hurt and will not compete this year.

Another strong wrestler is Northwestern's Andre Allen who will wrestle in the 134 pound division during the Big Ten championships. Wrestling during the season at 142 Andre has compiled a record of 2-1. His lone loss was at the hands of Tom Milkovich, the Michigan State marvel. Allen, a history major with plans for a career in law, is also quite active in the Fellowship of Christian Athletes. Andre states, "My religion is the most important thing in my life, I don't consider myself a wrestler who happens to be a Christian. I consider myself a Christian who happens to be a wrestler."

So the difference this Saturday when Indiana visits Williams Arena (8 p.m. CST), if Minnesota hopes to win, lies with coach Bill Musselman's matchup zone defense. It will have to be better than last week when the Gophers gave up 73 points to Ohio State, even though Um scored a game-winning 80. Minnesota is giving up an average of 62.3 points per game, a far cry from 83 and 73. But when Minnesota's defense is tight, the Gophers can be awesome. Consistency is needed now as the stretch drive begins.

A year ago at this time Minnesota's surprising basketball team under first year coach Bill Musselman had won 13 games and 1st five. The Gophers were 7-2 in the Big Ten. This season the figures read 15-2 and 5-2. Last year the Gophers, playing a much more conservative control game, were averaging 64.7 points on offense and giving up a defensive yield of 56.6. This year the Gophers are scoring at a 76.3 clip and yielding 62.3. Another important comparison comes in shooting percentages. Last year the Gophers were hitting at a .401 percent clip from the floor and .633 at the F.T. line. This year's improved figures are at .465 (F.G.) and .663 (F.T.). So all in all Minnesota shows improvement in just about every category, but that means little when a rugged team like Indiana comes to town.

HUGE WIN OVER
ILL.

After dropping two straight to Ohio State (70-69) and Purdue (72-69), both road games, Indiana returned home Monday (2/12) and bombed Big Ten challenger Illinois 87-66. Senior IU center Steve Downing (6-8) scored a season high 41 points while senior forward John Ritter (6-5) cashed in with 22. For the season Downing is averaging 19 points a game and Ritter 16. Other IU starters, with scoring averages included, are: 6-7 sophomore forward Steve Green (9.8); 6-4½ freshman guard Jim Crews (4.8); and 6-2½ freshman guard Quinn Buckner (11.7). But IU also has a player the call "super sub" in 6-5 sophomore guard-forward John Laskowski (9.9) who has come off the bench all season long to spark numerous rallies. Against Minnesota he scored 17 points, 13 in the last half. For the season IU is 15-4 and still leads the Big Ten with a 7-2 record. In Big Ten games Indiana is averaging 80.7 on offense and giving up 70.2 points per games. Minnesota's figures in the Conference are 76.4 and 67.7.

"I suppose I shouldn't complain about a 6-2-1 record for our last ten games," says Minnesota hockey coach Herb Brooks. "We started the season slower than soft ice, but have come on well as of late. The reason is simple. . .hard work and willingness to skate both ways, plus some outstanding goal tending. But defense won't do it all, particularly as teams head into the stretch drive seeking home ice for the playoffs. Every WCHA team seems to have cranked up its scoring punch, except us. Just once I would love to see us get a stack of goals so I could lean back and relax awhile. I'm wearing out all my shoes pacing back and forth in the players' box. Just one series, that's all I ask. Our men have given their all, more than I have asked. Maybe we're just not built for high scoring, so we'll just keep on skating our tails off and hope to continue forcing the breaks.

Although Michigan presently owns last place in the rugged WCHA standings, neither coach Herb Brooks or his Minnesota players are taking the Wolverines lightly. The teams clash Friday (8 p.m.) and Saturday (2 p.m.) in Williams Arena. What the Gophers are keenly aware of is Michigan's scoring potential. Michigan is averaging

4.1 goals per game to only 3.6 per outing for the sixth place Gophers. However, defense is a different story where Minnesota is giving up 3.6 goals in each WCHA outing and Michigan's average yield is 6.4. Earlier this season the teams split at Ann Arbor with Michigan taking the first game 7-5 and Minnesota the next 7-3.

Only seventh place North Dakota has as few points remaining. Teams immediately ahead of Minnesota in the WCHA standings, Notre Dame (5th) and Michigan State (4th), have the chance of winning 16 and 22 more points, respectively. So each game is exceptionally critical for Minnesota if the Gophers have any plans of reaching at least fourth place to gain home ice for the WCHA playoffs. GOPHERS AND THE NIT

from the University of Minnesota, Minneapolis, Minnesota 55455

Minneapolis--The University of Minnesota basketball team now has a new set of goals after completing the regular season portion of its schedule with a 20-4 record.

The new goals are concerned with the 36th edition of the National Invitational Tournament (NIT) March 17-25 in New York City's famed Madison Square Garden.

These goals replace an earlier set which faded from view last Saturday when Minnesota lost out in a bid to repeat as Big Ten Champions and represent the Conference at the NCAA Tournament. By losing at Northwestern Minnesota ended up second in the Big Ten (10-4) to Indiana (11-3).

Now the Gophers are scheduled to meet Rutgers University (15-10) in the first round of the NIT Monday, March 17 at 6 p.m. CST. Should Minnesota win, the Gophers will probably meet the Alabama (20-6)-Manhattan (16-9) winner Thursday evening, March 19.

The semi-final tournament round is scheduled Saturday afternoon, March 24, with the finals Sunday afternoon, March 25.

"Naturally we are very disappointed in not winning our Conference championship," said UM coach Bill Musselman Tuesday. "That was our first and foremost goal when we opened the 1972-73 season. But we can't dwell on what's past. We had our chance but didn't make it. It's just that simple. So we have to move on and simply forget about what could have been.

"The players and I see the NIT as another great challenge. Just look at the field! It's loaded. We feel quite honored to be listed as co-favorites along with North Carolina. But then, we were favored to win the Big Ten, too.

"There are nine teams who have won 20 or more games in the NIT, so being listed as pre-tourney favorite doesn't mean all that much. Every team going into the NIT believes it can win it all. We will have to play super basketball just to stay alive, much less win it all. But don't get me wrong. I'm not laying a negative trail. To be honest I believe Minnesota, with the talent we have on our squad, stands as good a chance as the other 15 teams to come out on top. . .providing we play the kind of basketball we exhibited most of the season.

"Maybe we went stale, maybe we were looking too far ahead. I don't really know. But we're back in harness now. Maybe we all feel we have something new to prove.

"But whatever, you can bet we'll come to play basketball in New York City. We have a great Conference and a great University to represent. So we're not just going

East for the trip.

"We have some things to put back together, things we'll work hard on in practice this week. I'm confident our players know what they face and will be as ready as possible. We are not taking any part of this tournament lightly."

Musselman said he will stay with the same lineup that took this year's Minnesota team to the school's first season of 20 wins. The previous high was 19 wins set in 1964-65 by the team that featured All-American Lou Hudson, Archie Clark and Don Yates. That club lost just five games and also finished second in the Big Ten.

So Minnesota should lineup this way: (hgt. & score avg. included) F-Ron Behagen (6-10, 18.8); F-David Winfield (6-6, 10.8); C-Jim Brewer (6-9, 14.1); G-Clyde Turner (6-7, 17.9); G-Bob Nix (6-3, 8.8); All are seniors.

However, Musselman may have to make a switch in his starting unit. Winfield, who came to Minnesota on a baseball scholarship but was recruited for basketball out of the intramural ranks, is undecided at this time whether he will travel to New York City with the basketball team, or head for Texas and the annual spring trip with the varsity baseball team. Winfield is an exceptional pitcher and believes his future lies with baseball, although he has already been drafted by the NFL Minnesota Vikings, and is certain to be drafted by both the NBA and ABA professional leagues. Winfield says he will make his decision later in the week. If Winfield decides not to go to the NIT, Musselman would probably insert junior Keith Young (6-5, 4.4) into the lineup at guard moving Turner to forward.

For Behagen the trip to the NIT brings him back to his hometown. As a high school player for New York's De Witt Clinton High, he was twice named to the All-City honor team, a feat accomplished by only a handful of men before him. Before coming to Minnesota Behagen played two seasons for the College of Southern Idaho. He earned JUCO All-America honors there, and was recently named to the Sporting News All-America first team for the 1972-73 season. He was also named to some All-American high school teams while playing for De Witt Clinton.

The Gopher basketball team will fly to New York City Sunday afternoon and stay at the Hotel Statler-Hilton across the street from Madison Square Garden.

CAGE SEASON ENDS AT 21.5

Minneapolis--"When you end your season on a loss, sometimes it's hard to go back and remember all the good things that happened," says Minnesota basketball coach Bill Musselman.

"But I have to be awfully proud of what the men on our varsity accomplished the past two seasons. We didn't finish as we had hoped either year. . .winning a national title. But we did come to the top in 1971-72 by winning Minnesota's first unshared Big Ten championship in 53 years, and then were terribly disappointed in not repeating as champions this past season.

"There are only three or four teams who end the season with a win, and unfortunately we were not one of them. But in looking at what the men on our team accomplished, well. . .suddenly I feel a lot better knowing their deeds will not soon be forgotten at Minnesota."

Minnesota's total record the past two years under Musselman comes out to 39 wins and 12 losses. Included are a record-setting 21 wins this season, against five losses, the highest number of wins in a season in Minnesota basketball history. The previous high was 19 in 1964-65.

That brings Musselman's career won-lost record to 167 wins against 43 losses, a winning percentage of .795 covering eight years. He was head coach at Ashland (Ohio) College six seasons before moving to Minnesota.

This year's Gopher team won its first nine non-Conference games, including three straight to win the Far West Classic at Portland, Oregon, and became the first Big Ten team to ever take that title. Forward Ron Behagen was named the most valuable player of the tournament, and he along with then forward Clyde Turner made the All-Tournament team.

Minnesota opened defense of its Big Ten title by dropping two of its first three, but then roared back with nine straight wins after Musselman moved Turner to guard and inserted David Winfield at forward.

Then came the shattering pair of losses to Iowa and Northwestern to end any hopes of taking the Big Ten title. Minnesota posted a Conference record of 10-4 finishing second to Indiana (11-3).

Turner, Behagen and All-America captain and center Jim Brewer were each named to several All-Big Ten honor teams. This same trio, with Brewer receiving the lion's share, were also named to several post-season all-america teams.

By not winning the Big Ten crown, Minnesota missed out on a second chance to play at the NCAA Mideast Regional Tournament, where it finished third the year before. But the team accepted an invitation to compete in the National Invitation Tournament in New York City. The Gophers took Rutgers in the first round 68-59, but were upset by Alabama the next time out 69-65 after leading by 12 points at halftime (43-31).

This year's team set a stack of new school and individual records. The biggest individual career mark belongs to Brewer who in three years hauled down 907 rebounds to erase the old mark of 841 set by Mel Northway in 1962 thru 1965.

Winfield set the other career mark by shooting a fine .503 percent in field goal accuracy over two seasons making 153 of 302 attempts. The old record was .488 percent by Larry Overskei who played from 1967 thru 1970.

A new batch of team single season records were also set. Included are: Most Points, 2012 (old record 2007 in 1964-65); Most F.G. Made, 842 (old record 795 in 1964-65); Best F.G. .Pct., .466 (old record .451 in 1964-65); Most Rebounds, 1273 (old record 1085 in 1964-65); and Best Rebound Average, 48.9 (old record 45.3 in 1964-65).

5 GYMNASTS TO NCAA

Minneapolis--Five members of the University of Minnesota gymnastics team will compete in the NCAA Championships April 5-7 at Eugene, Oregon, says coach Fred Roethlisberger (ROTH-lis-berger).

Making the trip West, with their respective events included, are: co-captain Jeff Rock (all-around and high bar); co-captain Russ Fystrom (side horse); Craig Carlson (floor exercise); Jeff LaFleur (vaulting); and Bill Kerchner (high bar).

The above five, along with their teammates, came within .8 of a point of winning the Big Ten championship last weekend at Bloomington, Indiana. Minnesota tied for second with Iowa just inches behind Michigan.

"As a team we failed to score any place near as well as we should have on the parallel bars and this may have cost us the championship," Roethlisberger said Thursday. "That had to be the biggest disappointment of the season for all of us.

"The men on our team more than paid the price this year. They made the commitment to excellence with hard, hard work, and to come so close and then miss the title heightens the disappointment. But we still had a very good year winning seven of nine dual meets and all in all I'm very proud of our team. Now I hope the five men going to Eugene can pick up some more prestige for themselves."

Roethlisberger said Minnesota will not compete as a team, but rather as five individuals. Only the Big Ten champion goes to the NCAA as a team.

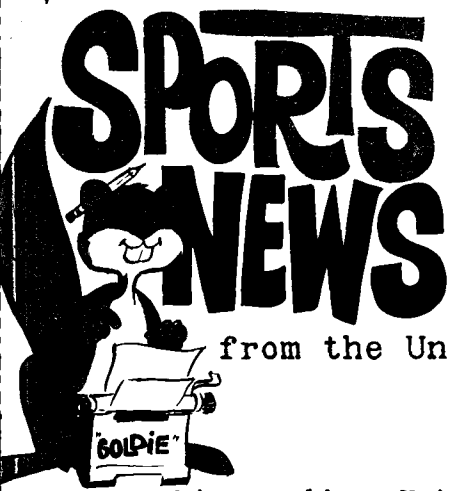
Asked which of his men have the best chance of placing among the top three, Roethlisberger said: "I believe (Russ) Fystrom and (Craig) Carlson may have the most ability in their respective events and could gain the highest finish. But Rock is certainly their equal as a competitor, but will be facing no less than four Olympians in both all-around and the high bar. The total talent at this meet is unmatched anywhere."

BASEBALL IN HOME OPENERS THIS WEEK

University of Minnesota coach Richard "Chief" Siebert unveils his 26th edition of Gopher baseball this week when Augsburg and St. Cloud State invade Bierman Field for doubleheaders Thursday (2 p.m.) and Saturday (1 p.m.), respectively. The Gophers are 3-9 on the season following their spring trip to Texas and hope to get their record closer to the .500 mark this week. However, both Augsburg and St. Cloud present solid teams and will give Siebert's charges all they want.

MINNESOTA RANKED 15th NATIONALLY

COLLEGIATE BASEBALL, the official national newspaper of the sport, has, much to the surprise of Siebert, ranked his 1973 Gopher team 15th nationally in their March 23 edition. "I'm not certain what they are basing this ranking on," says Siebert, "but it wasn't from what we did in Texas. I'm pleased to see it, though, as I believe it is a positive reflection on what we have accomplished in the past with our Minnesota program. At the same time I can't very well take it seriously unless our present ball club shows some instant improvement. . .and a lot of it at that, too. We have a mighty long road to travel before we can justify that ranking."

PITCHING HAS COACH WORRIED

Siebert said Tuesday he is more than just a little concerned about his varsity pitching. "I was extremely disappointed by most of our pitchers in Texas," Siebert Says. "That can be a bit tempered considering the excellent opposition we faced, but it was still evident we are far from ready on the mound. For instance, the man we are counting on more than anyone else, senior captain David Winfield (R), is not anywhere near good baseball condition was bombed twice. Another veteran, junior Bob Turnbull (R), was also hit hard. He is a sinker ball pitcher but kept the ball up around the letters every time out. He, too, was hit very hard. However, veteran Dennis Allar (R) pitched a fine game against Texas even in losing 3-2. Two rookies also showed some promise: freshman Steve Comer (R) and sophomore Gordy Peterson (R). Sophomore Ken Herbst (R) also could come to the front, but he is troubled by a sore arm.

PITCHING CHOICES THIS WEEK

Siebert said he is far from ready to name pitchers for the Augsburg games Thursday, but may go with two veterans and two rookies Saturday against St. Cloud. "As it stands now I plan to divide the St. Cloud games between Winfield, Allar, Peterson and Herbst with each working a half a game," says the coach. "I'll simply have to see who else is ready in practice today (Tuesday) and Wednesday to work against Augsburg.

The games in Texas gave Siebert a pretty good line on who will man the Gopher defensive positions this spring. . .at least for now. The infield could open this way Thursday against Augsburg: 1B-senior Chris Brown (R); 2B-senior Bruce Nordquist (R); SS-Sophomore Joe Kordosky (R); 3B-senior Tim Grice (R). Grice is a converted catcher who was very impressive at third base in Texas. He is also one of UM's top hitters. Others to see duty in the infield could be: 2B-senior Jon Walseth (L); SS-sophomore Steve Shimek (L); and 3B-junior Mike Fitzenberger (R). Junior Lindaay Hoyer (R) and senior Tom Buettner (R) will share the catching duties, along with Grice.

When not pitching, Winfield (R) will probably get the call in left field to take advantage of his hitting potential. The 6-5, 221 senior is presently hitting..294. A pair of speedsters in seniors John Holm (R) and Joe Comer (L) appear set in center and right field, respectively. Holm presently leads the Gopher hitters with a .357 average, including four doubles and one home run in his eight hits, while Comer is fourth in hitting behind Holm, Nordquist (.353) and Brown (.344) at .321. Siebert also said that when Winfield is pitching, Hoyer (.229) will probably go into left field.

"We simply must have every second we can get on the practice field the next two weeks," Siebert says. "Our hitting may just be coming around and I don't want to see our men lose their timing to bad weather. Our defense needs an awful lot of work, too, just like our pitching staff. So the way it stands now we are going to have to do an awful lot of hitting and score a batch of runs if we expect to become a winner. I have a feeling we are going to be in a lot of high scoring games this spring."

The Gopher tennis team and coach John Santrock recently returned from a week in Florida playing the likes of Florida State, the University of South Florida, Miami Dade Junior College South and the University of Miami. The Minnesota squad was able to defeat only Miami Dade (9-0) but they played exceptionally well against the others in some matches but fell down in a few others. "That was our problem during the trip, we were terribly inconsistent," Santrock said. "For example, Carter DeLaittre played fantastically against Florida State's number one player, Richard LeGendre (a member of the Canadian Davis Cup Team) but he lost 4-6, 6-3, 4-6," Santrock added. The Gophers will leave Northwestern immediately following their match and head for Madison, Wisconsin where they will go against the Badgers on Saturday, April 14.

The Minnesota track team performed in two competitions during its annual trip to Louisiana this past week (March 23-31) and coach Roy Griak was extremely proud of the way his squad competed. In the Louisiana State Invitational on March 25th the Gophers finished sixth

in the ten team meet and got outstanding performances from Colin Anderson who set a meet record in the shot put at 59' 8½" and half milers Dan Humes and Steve Eklund who finished 2nd and 3rd respectively. Minneapolis--Coach Cal Stoll (STALL) and his staff will greet a relatively small group of 74 candidates Saturday, April 14, when the Gopher football team opens spring practice at 2 p.m.

The squad will work Tuesdays, Wednesdays, Thursday's and Saturday's each week leading up to the annual spring game Saturday, May 19 in Memorial Stadium.

Included in the spring roster are 26 lettermen, 25 of them from last year's team. One player, senior guard Paul Tollefson (Green Bay, Wis.), did not play last year due to injuries but earned letters in 1970 and 1971.

"We did not have all that big an incoming freshman class last year and have only one junior college transfer joining our squad this spring," says Stoll. "That for the most part, accounts for our rather small spring roster.

"However, I believe my staff and I will be able to get a lot more done, including more individual work, with a smaller squad. As usual, we'll be shifting a lot of people around in hopes of filling out the holes created by graduation."

Minnesota's biggest loss in terms of numbers is in the defensive secondary where six of eight lettermen are gone. The only returnees here are junior Greg Engebos (Green, Wis.) and senior Todd Randall (Middleton, Wis.).

Other losses on defense include Tom MacLeod at end and Clayton Scheuer at tackle. But returning are ends Steve Neils (St. Peter), Gregg Wilson (Pittsfield, Mass.), and Dan Christensen (Rochester); tackles Jeff Gunderson (Minneapolis), and Keith Simons (Belleville, Mich.), who started every game last year as a freshman, Dan Adams (Fond du Lac, Wis.), and Scott Irwin (Duluth).

Also back intact are the trio of linebackers who ended last year's campaign: Ollie Bakken (St. Paul), Mike Steidl (Alexandria), and Paul Glanton (Northfield).

A trio of backs are expectee to key spring drills with the offensive unit. Included are All-Big Ten fullback John King (Harvest, Ala.), who set all kinds of rushing records last fall, running back Doug Beaudoin (Jamestown, N.D.), who gained 513 yards as a freshman in 1972, and quarterback John Lawing (Lincolnton, N.C.), the latter a freshman who started one Big Ten game last season.

One player, J.C. transfer Rick Upchurch (Holland, Ohio), is expected to push Beaudoin at running back. Upchurch is the fastest man on the roster having been timed in 4.3 over 40-yards. He scored 25 touchdowns last year in junior college ball.

Three holes appear in the offensive line via the graduation of end Doug Kingsriter, center Bob Veldman and tackle Dennis Maloney. However, Stoll has a great nucleus returning in end Keith Fahnhorst (St. Cloud), tackle Matt Herkenhoff (St. Rose), and guards Tollefson, Darrel Bu ge (Caledonia) and Dale Hegland (Peterson). Center Jeff Selleck (Arlington Heights, Ill.), who handles all snaps on punts and placekicks, may be heir apparent to Veldman's job. Selleck letter in 1972.

"It is entirely possibly we may field a younger team in 1973 than we did in 1972," says Stoll. "Most of the men we are looking at right now to possibly step into starting roles next season will be sophomores or juniors, not counting a few of our freshman recruits who could help us out in their first year at Minnesota. But that's another matter.

"There is one thing I am certain about. . .we will be doing an awful lot of work between Saturday and May 19. Count on it."

SIEBERT SEEKS START STARTING PITCHER

After splitting its Big Ten opening series at Iowa last week winning 14-4 and dropping a 4-3 decision, Minnesota baseball coach Dick Siebert is still searching for a fourth starter. What compounds his frantic search is that Minnesota this week travels on its toughest road trip of the season with doubleheaders Friday at Michigan and Saturday at Michigan State. This duo has been made co-favorites for the 1973 Big Ten crown.

WINFIELD- ALLAR SET TO THROW

Siebert said Monday that senior David Winfield and junior Dennis Allar will hurl against Michigan Friday. Junior Bob Turnbull, says Siebert, will probably throw the opener at Michigan State Saturday, but the coach could not come up with another name at this time as to who will pitch the nightcap. Even Winfield and Allar were not all that impressive against Iowa. "Our entire pitching corps has, for the most part, been inconsistent," Siebert adds. "If we expect to challenge we must resolve this position. I said earlier we will go as far as our pitching takes us and I haven't changed my feelings on this point. We need four men to come to the front quickly or we're in deep trouble."

MICHIGAN- MSU RATED TOPS BY SIEBERT

Siebert says both Michigan and Michigan State have impressive teams this season. "Michigan is loaded with veterans and should be very solid in both hitting and defense," the coach offers. "And State has a great pitching staff to go along with a good hitting team, so if we get through this weekend alive I'll think our men have done a very good job. We must gain at least two wins if we expect to stay in the race. We can't let either of these two clubs get too far ahead of us at this point in the season."

WINFIELD, BROWN, COMER LEAD OFFENSE

David Winfield, Chris Brown and Joe Comer lead the Gopher attack at the plate so far this season. Winfield, who plays left field when not pitching, tops the team in batting average (.409) and includes three home runs, two triples and two doubles in his 18 hits. He has appeared in 14 games. Brown, a senior first baseman, leads the team in home runs (5), triples (3), runs batted in (20), hits (22), runs (18) and total bases (45). He also has a pair of doubles. Comer, a junior outfielder,

is hitting .340 and has four doubles, nine runs batted in, and is tied for leadership in stolen bases with four. Ordinarily the right fielder, Joe is now in center field replacing John Holm who is out with a pulled thigh muscle. Holm's availability for this weekend is still uncertain. He has not played in Minnesota's last five games.

SIEBERT SAYS RACE GOING AS EXPECTED

Minnesota baseball coach Dick "Chief" Siebert said Tuesday the Big Ten race is right on cue, going exactly as he expected. "We have excellent balance in the Conference this year and the present log jam standings tend to bear this out," the Chief says. "But at the same time I hope we get out of our rut . . . that of splitting every series we play. But I guess I can't really complain too much considering we played three tough contenders all on the road." Minnesota has split doubleheaders at Iowa, Michigan and Michigan State.

INDIANA, OSU RATED IMPROVED

Siebert added that both Indiana and Ohio State show improved teams this season. "I have to say they are about equal in ability with possibly Indiana having the edge in power hitters," Siebert says. "They will both give us a tough go. This weekend could result in some of the best baseball played at Bierman Field this season. We will have to play much improved ball if we hope to make a run for the top."

PITCHERS NAMED FOR SERIES

David Winfield and Dennis Allar, Minnesota's one-two mound punch, have been named to pitch against Indiana Friday at Bierman Field. Coach Dick Siebert added that Ken Herbst, a sophomore, and possibly Steve Comer, a freshman, may gain the starting assignments Saturday against Ohio State. Herbst defeated MSU 7-1 last Saturday while Comer was effective in relief against the same team in the first game, a 1-5 UM loss.

73RD BIG TEN TRACK MEET AT MINNESOTA 5/18-19

Minneapolis--Final plans have been completed for the hosting of the 73rd annual Big Ten Outdoor Track and Field Meet scheduled May 18-19 at the University of Minnesota in Minneapolis, says UM coach Roy Griak.

"I believe we have gone as far as physically possible in preparing our Bierman Field track layout for this giant event," Griak says. "Every possible feature has been included and I believe the track fans who attend will gain the largest benefit.

"Our layout is set up so that every field and running event may be seen easily from the viewing stands. We also feature an electronic timer which records to the one-hundredth of a second for the fans the running time of every race.

"We have at Bierman Field a communications system which connects our chief scorers and umpires table with six areas of the track, including all field event areas, so that work crews are in continual contact with each other, and also may be tied directly into the public address system. I believe it to be a track communications system second to none.

"In other words, we are ready to run off an excellent Big Ten track meet with the viewing comfort and convenience of the fan first in mind. I just don't see where we have missed a single trick."

In addition to the physical excellence, Griak sees the meet itself as one of record-setting proportions. "This is only the third year of our track, so I expect every event run off to set a new Bierman Field record," he says. "The overall Big Ten strength may possibly be a shade below that of last year with so many great individuals graduated, but I still believe our across-the-board power to be on level with any other conference.

"Indiana could be a dominating team with great strength in the dashes, but there is still very good balance in the Conference. Michigan appears ready to challenge for the top prize and a few other teams, with the right breaks, could move to the front, too. All in all it appears to be an exciting two days of track and field for Minnesota fans. I hope they take advantage of this spectacular event."

BASEBALL TEAM NOW 1ST IN BIG TEN

Coach Dick Siebert's baseball team reached first place in the Big Ten race last weekend after getting off to one of the slowest starts in recent years. After its first four Conference double headers, Minnesota was 4-4 and given little if any chance of staying in the title race. But since then Minnesota has racked up three straight double wins against Ohio State, Northwestern and Wisconsin, the latter two coming on the road last weekend. A combination of stingy pitching and streak hitting, much of the latter for power, gave UM the sweeps at NW and UW. Michigan State, season-long Conference leader, was dropped twice by Michigan 7-0 and 2-0, and now both the Wolverine State clubs are in second place with 6-4 records. Minnesota is 10-4.

SIEBERT CAUTIONS FANS AND PLAYERS

Coach Siebert was quick to point out that Minnesota only leads in the win column, not in the loss column. "Don't think for a second Michigan and Michigan State aren't aware of that point," the coach offers. "They are going all out the next two weekends to make it just as tough as possible for us. Even though we have only four games remaining in the Big Ten, against Purdue (5/18) and Illinois (5/19), we are far from home free. What we have to do now is maintain our momentum. We face non-Conference teams this weekend, but there is no way we are taking Mankato State (Fri.) or LaCrosse State (Sat.) lightly. Both schools present fine ball teams and will give us all the competition we want. How we play against this pair could go a long way to determine how we finish the season in the Big Ten."

PETERSON MAY ELEVATE TO STARTER

According to coach Siebert it was sophomore pitcher Gordon Peterson (L) from St. Paul Harding who really saved the Gophers last weekend at Northwestern. "We fell behind right off the bat," Siebert says, "but Gordon came in and allowed only two hits and two runs over seven innings of relief. We finally won the game 8-6 on a two-run homer by David Winfield in the second extra inning, the ninth.

So based on his recent performances, I expect to give Peterson a start this weekend. If he proves out as a starter, we may go the same route next week in the Big Ten closer." Siebert said his other three starters will be Winfield, Ken Herbst and Steve Comer Friday and Saturday.

TEAM ATTITUDE
VERY TOPS SAYS

Minnesota won the first game last Friday 7-3 behind Winfield's four-hit pitching, but fell behind 5-0 and 6-1 early in the second game. "Right then the whole bench came alive," Siebert says. "You could feel it in our players. . .the desire to come back. There was just no way in the world they were going to lose that game. Much of this may have come from my berating the team earlier this season for some very sloppy performances. They have taken the cue, begun to retrench and work their tails off to improve as a team. I have to give a pat on the back to every man on this club. We could have died a couple weeks ago, but our players simply have too much team and individual pride to let that happen. We are not all the way there as yet, but it certainly isn't from lack of trying."

HERBST, STEVE
COMER PRAISED

When the 1973 Gopher baseball season opened, coach Siebert said: "We will only go as far as our pitching will take us". His pitching has certainly been a high point as of late. Much of the load has been carried by two men Siebert believed had future potential when the year began, but did not expect too much of them this season. The men in question are sophomore Ken Herbst (R) from Brooklyn Center, and freshman Steve Comer (R) from Excelsior. "They have literally been the salvation of this team," Siebert says. "I can't really praise them enough. We certainly didn't expect them to become such key staff members. Why, even in Texas (Ken) Herbst was suffering from a sore arm. But it has healed and he is throwing like a seasoned vet. And so is Comer. If they keep it up we could be in great shape. But I still must caution everyone against a letdown. I've seen it happen before and don't like it at all."

Last Friday, May 4 the University of Minnesota tennis team entertained Michigan at the Bierman courts and the Wolverines proved why they are the favorite to win their sixth consecutive Big Ten title in 1973. MINNEAPOLIS--As host coach Roy Griak sees it, Indiana is a solid favorite to retain its Big Ten track and field championship in the Conference meet on the new University of Minnesota Bierman Field May 18-19.

"Not in my nine years at Minnesota have I seen a Conference track and field squad with the depth and balance Indiana is showing this season," says Griak.

"The Hoosiers coached by Sam Bell are two and three deep in every event. They have someone who can score in every event."

In addition to its depth, Indiana has six potential blue ribbon winners in William Wallace in the 440 (47.2 and second last in Big Ten this spring); Pat Mandera whose 13:33.6 is the best 3-mile time recorded so far; Dennis Adams who has the best high jump mark at 7'½"; Doug Vine with a Conference best of 50' 1 3/4" in the triple jump; Stew O'Dell whose 167'9" is the third best toss in the discus; and Charlie Jackson who has skimmed the 120 yard high hurdles in :13.9 to tie him for the second best performance in this event. O'Dell is almost a certain point winner in the shot put also.

Griak sees Michigan as the only team with a possibility of topping Indiana. "After these two," says the Gopher coach, "it's a battle for third - fourth - fifth between Wisconsin, Michigan State, and Illinois." He sees Minnesota and Purdue as possible finishers in the top five.

The meet opens on Friday at 4:00 p.m. with trials and finals in the long jump, discus, and six-mile run. Finals start at 1:00 p.m. Saturday.

Tickets will be on sale at the gate. They are priced at \$2.00 for adults both days and \$1.00 for children under 18. University students with athletic cards may purchase tickets for \$1.00.

Michigan's Kim Rowe has been destroying opponents on the track for two seasons but the junior from Jamaica is more interested in reclamation when his racing is through.

His plans don't involve the runners he has left behind but rather his native land. Rowe majors in resource ecology in Michigan's School of Natural Resources and hopes to apply his degree toward helping Jamaica in its economic problems.

"We have a lot of problems in the economy because of abuse of the land", the personable 440-yard dash man explains. "Some is because of the bauxite mines and some because of our own carelessness. I want to do something for Jamaica so I went into resource ecology so I could help to bring an awareness about pollution to the people".

Rowe can speak first hand about the Jamaican land as he comes from Siloah (Sy-low) which is a large bauxite mining area and sugar cane growing section. In conjunction with the sugar cane there is also a distillery, at which his father is employed.

The ecology will have to wait a little while, though, as Rowe plans to run track through the 1976 Olympics. He was a member of Jamaica's 1600-meter relay team in Munich and is really only approaching his peak.

He has run a 46.7 in the 440 this year but has mostly concentrated on relays and the 220 for Michigan. He anchors the Wolverines mile-relay which won both the Dogwood and Penn Relays this year and is also a member of the sprint medley team that won at Penn and Kansas and part of the 440-relay squad. He also has done 20.8 in the 220-yard dash.

Such times are impressive but they are expected from the man who is the defending Big Ten champ in both the indoor and outdoor 440. But Rowe warns, "I really don't expect to hit my peak until 1976 because I started to develop late. I feel I'm only halfway at this point.

If that is so, Big Ten opponents had better hope that he doesn't hit even three-quarters at the Conference meet or Rowe will create even more reclamation projects.

SPRING SPORTS DAY ON TAP SATURDAY, MAY 19

Minneapolis--Home action for University of Minnesota athletic teams comes to a halt this weekend with the annual spring sports day on tap Saturday.

The weekend begins Friday with the baseball team hosting Purdue in a double header at 2 p.m. on Bierman Field. Coach Dick Siebert's club is in first place in the Big Ten and can clinch the pennant, the school's 11th and Siebert's 9th, with twin wins Friday and another pair against Illinois Saturday. The latter games begin at 11 a.m.

At 4 p.m. Friday, preliminaries with finals in three events key the first session of the 73rd annual Big Ten Track and Field Meet scheduled for Bierman Field. The finals in all other events begin at 1 p.m. Saturday.

Then at 3 p.m. the same day coach Cal Stoll puts his preview edition of 1973 Golden Gopher football on view in Memorial Stadium, site of the annual spring game. Kickoff is slated for 3 p.m.

Athletic Director, Paul Giel, said Tuesday that a special autograph and picture session featuring both amateur and professional athletes will be held on the field at Memorial Stadium following the football game. Players from numerous Gopher teams plus stars of the Minnesota Vikings, North Stars, and Minnesota Fighting Saints will be on hand to greet the fans following the football game.

A special ticket package is ready for those wishing to attend both the baseball and football games Saturday. Advance sales goes for \$1.50 adults and 75 cents UM students, staff and those under 18. Gate sale for the same ticket which gets you into both baseball and football is \$2 adults, \$1 students, staff and those under 18.

Track tickets will be sold separately and are good only for that event. Admission to the track meet is \$2 adults and \$1 University students and staff and those under 18 EACH DAY.

MINNEAPOLIS. Collegiate track and field at its best will be on display at the Bierman Field track Friday and Saturday of this week as the University of Minnesota hosts the 73rd annual Big Ten track and field championships.

Gopher coach Roy Griak sees the field as the "fastest ever" based on the many brilliant performances of Conference track and field athletes to date. Many new records are in prospect. He calculates that Indiana should be a slight favorite to repeat for the team championship, with Michigan, Illinois, Wisconsin, Michigan State and possible Minnesota capable of finishing in the first division.

Individually Griak sees a number of hotly contested events. "There will be tough competition in every event, especially in the three-mile run, shot put, discus, mile-relay, 120 high hurdles and in the six-mile run," Griak said. He predicts a real battle in the shot put between Minnesota's Colin Anderson (60-7½) and Steve Adams of Michigan who won the 1973 indoor meet and has thrown 56-9 outdoors.

Of all the events in the meet, Roy sees the 880-yard run as the closest. Seven or eight men have gone 1:51.5 or better so far," Griak stated. "I wouldn't bet on any one in the 880, but I have two possible winners in Steve Eklund (1:51.1) and Dan Humes (1:51.5)," Griak added.

For the public this meet will offer the finest communication facilities possible. An electronic scoreboard will flash the winning time immediately after an event has been completed. The public address system will have constant communication with all track and field events.

The action on the new super modern Gopher track and field facilities including Tartan track and runways starts at 4:00 p.m. Friday with trials or semifinals scheduled in 14 events and finals in the long jump, discus, and six mile run. Finals start at 1:00 p.m. Saturday.

Tickets on sale at the gate will be priced at \$2.00 for adults and \$1.00 for students with athletic cards and children under 18. Spectators attending the meet are urged to park in University lots along 4th Street S.E. and Sixteenth and Eighteenth Avenues. They should approach the Bierman Field track complex via the footbridge over the railroad tracks. The main admission gate is located near the north steps of the bridge.

"Because of our youth we may not be a factor in the team championship, but I do believe that captain Rick Ehrmantraut (EHR-mann-trout), providing he plays his game, can make a run for individual honors," says Minnesota golf coach Les Bolstad. "Should Rick do it, that would make two years in a row for Minnesota." Last year the Gophers won both the team title with a record score of 1,440 strokes and the individual title taken by Jim Bergeson with a record-tying score of 281. However, Bolstad says Indiana is a prohibitive team favorite having four men "yards in front of everyone else." As a team unit I just don't see how they can be beat. But on an individual basis if Rick or some other top shooter begins dropping putts, he can take the title with ease. The Purdue course is long and flat, so if the big hitters are on with their long irons, all they need is a hot putter and it's all over."

Ehrmantraut's low single round of the campaign was a 71.

BASEBALL GOPHERS WIN BIG TEN

Minneapolis--For the ninth time since he took over as baseball coach at the University of Minnesota 26 years ago, coach Richard "Chief" Siebert has seen another of his teams march to the top of the Big Ten standings.

The 1973 baseball Gophers clinched the school's eleventh Conference title in dramatic fashion last weekend gaining twin wins over Purdue (7-0 and 15-4) and Illinois (7-6 and 10-3).

The clincher came in the first game against Illinois when the Gophers trailed 6-3 heading into the final inning. But before the Illini could get any outs, Minnesota scored four runs to win and, coupled with Michigan's 3-2 loss to Northwestern, clinched the title. The nightcap win against Illinois was UM's tenth straight in Big Ten play and gave UM a final 14-4 record.

The Gophers now take a 26-14-2 season record to Carbondale, Illinois for the NCAA District IV Regional Playoffs May 31, and June 1-2. Minnesota plays the winner of the Mid-American Conference, to be decided this weekend between Ohio University and Miami of Ohio. Other teams in the double elimination tourney include host Southern Illinois University and Marshall University, both selected as at-large teams.

"One can never forget his first championship as a coach," Siebert said Monday, "and we have also been blessed several excellent championship teams since I have been at Minnesota. But I actually believe this year's team winning the Big Ten title may have brought more pure gratification to me than in any other season.

"We do not have what one would call a great team. It's a darned good team, make no mistake about that. But this group has as much desire and dedication as any club I have coached. The players have great belief in themselves and each other. It may be one of the closest knit teams I have coached. I honestly believe our season came together at Northwestern when we trailed late in the second game 6-1. We already had four losses and another would have killed our chances. But you could just feel it on the bench that there was no way these kids were going to lose. They all got up together and sure enough we came up an 8-6 winner.

"The same feeling was there last week against Illinois. Even though we hadn't been hitting the ball and Illinois was playing very well these kids remained positive and you felt something was going to break loose any minute. Well, they waited (MORE

pretty long (7th inning) to do it but they did come out on top and that's the mark of a real champion. . .to come from behind when all looks lost.

"Maybe I'm going a bit overboard about this group but that's just how I feel. They are a fine bunch of student-athletes and I'm proud to be their coach."

One of the strongest leaders of the 1973 Gopher team has to be senior captain David Winfield. Winfield, who also starred in basketball for Minnesota the past two seasons, came to UM as a pitcher, but this year blossomed into a slugging outfielder. Winfield ended the regular season leading Minnesota with a .390 batting average. Although his pitching credentials are a bit down from the previous two years, he still leads the team with a 7-1 record, but has seen his usually low earned run average go up to 3.56.

However, Winfield, along with freshman Steve Comer (5-1, 0.99) and sophomore Ken Herbst (5-0, 1.10) will probably be the men coach Siebert calls on at Carbondale to go to the mound in District IV competition.

WRESTLING CLINIC SLATED THIS WEEK

Wally Johnson, head wrestling coach for the University of Minnesota, announced today dates of the National Clinic for Integrated Wrestling (scholastic, freestyle, Greco-Roman) to be held at Bierman Field Athletic Building on the school's main campus.

The clinic is scheduled May 25 through 28 and features several outstanding wrestling figures who will combine lectures and demonstrations.

Included are: Gene Davis, 1972 U.S. Olympic Freestyle Team member and former NCAA champion at Oklahoma State; Keith Young, three-time NCAA champion at Iowa State, now a coach; Dale Bahr, NCAA All-American at Iowa State, now a coach; Jack Zindel, NCAA All-American from Michigan State and now assisting at Minnesota; Jack Gause, outstanding international wrestling official; and team members of the Minnesota Wrestling Club coached by Alan Rice, 1972 U.S. Olympic Greco-Roman coach.

Coach Johnson will act as host for the clinic.

Pre-Registration is \$20 with a \$25 fee when registering at the door. Several special events, including demonstration workshop sessions, equipment exhibits and a hospitality hour are included in the clinic program.

TENNIS TEAM FINISHES 9th

The University of Minnesota tennis team was the victim of bad luck in the draw at the Big Ten meet in Madison, Wisconsin, May 19-20. Every Gopher drew a Michigan opponent in the opening round of singles and all lost to the Big Ten champions. Carter deLaittre (No. 1) lost 6-4, 7-5 to the eventual winner Victor Amaya. Bob Van Hoef (No. 2) also lost a hard fought match to Eric Friedler of the Wolverines who won the number two singles title. The score for the losing Van Hoef was 6-4, 7-5. The Gophers had better luck in the consolation rounds where DeLaittre had one win, Van Hoef two, and Bill Keenan (No. 3) also won a match. The Gophers finished

ninth in the meet which was won for the sixth time in a row by Michigan.

DELAITRE MAKES ALL-CONFERENCE SQUAD

Although he didn't finish as high as he had hoped the Gophers number one singles player Carter DeLaitre was chosen by the Big Ten coaches on their twelve man All-Conference team selected following the Big Ten meet. Last year Jim Ebbitt the Gophers number one singles champ was selected to the team.

GOPHERS LOSE TO IOWA

On Friday, May 13 the Minnesota tennis squad took on Iowa in a dual match and lost 3-1, in Madison. The only point for the Gophers was scored by DeLaitre and Van Hoef at number one doubles where they beat Rod Kubat and Ian Phillips. Iowa who was to finish second in the Big Ten meet on Sunday (May 20) was too strong all down the line for the Minnesota netmen. Coach John Santrock felt that Iowa was a tough team and we were just not playing our best. Concerning the Big Ten meet Santrock said, "If we hadn't drawn all Michigan opponents in singles the first round we easily could have finished up a few more notches in the standings." The Gophers dual record for the 1973 season was a respectable 3-11.

GOPHER TRACKMEN FINISH FIFTH IN BIG TEN MEET

The University of Minnesota hosted the 73rd Annual Big Ten track and field championships last weekend (May 13-19) and the Gophers finished a respectable fifth in the team standings. Led by individual champions Colin Anderson (shot put) and freshman Dennis Fee (six-mile). Anderson threw the shot 60- 3/4 to completely outclass the field and win his second consecutive outdoor title. For coach Roy Griak the nicest surprise of the meet was Dennis Fee's victory in the six-mile run. "Dennis is an opportunist and he saw the opportunity to get out front and he grabbed it," Griak said. Both Colin and Dennis will be going to the NCAA meet in Baton Rouge, Louisiana on June 7-9.

GRIAK LAUDS SURPRISE POINT GETTERS

Of all his Gophers competing coach Roy Griak felt there were a number of outstanding performances by men who were not expected to do as well. Griak cited Steve Holl in the steeplechase (4th), co-captain Mike Lawless, three-mile (3rd), Tim Oliver, six-mile (4th) and there were others he mentioned whose performances were outstanding. Dan Humes ran 1:50.1 in the 300 but didn't place. Humes time puts him second on the all-time Minnesota 300 list. 1973 indoor pole vault champion, Glen Bullick (freshman) vaulted 15'0 but also failed to place. GOLFERS 6th AT BIG TEN MEET

Minnesota's golf team just missed a first division spot at the Big Ten meet held last weekend at Purdue University and ended up in sixth place. However, junior John Harris made a strong run for individual honors, only he, too, just missed.

"I believe both the above mentioned items fairly well typifies our 1973 season," says veteran UM coach Les Bolstad. "We started out with a very young club, one that was difficult to predict. But overall I believe our squad did better than hoped for. We did not set any worlds on fire but showed up very well in several meets.

"The fact that we only lose one man from this year's club, senior captain Rick Erhmantraut, makes me believe we could be a much stronger club in 1974. We played at Purdue with four of six men seeing their first Big Ten meet."

Harris made a strong run to become Minnesota's third consecutive individual champion, and fourth in the last six years, but saw his putter falter on the final nine. He missed out on eight birdie putts on that final nine and finished two strokes behind champion Steve Groves of Ohio State. Harris led all golfers the first three rounds of the 72-hole competition.

He now heads for the NCAA championships June 20-23 in Stillwater, Oklahoma.

SPRING FOOTBALL ENDS

from the University of Minnesota, Minneapolis, Minnesota 55455

Minneapolis--Spring football at the University of Minnesota ended on a high note when the annual spring game was played May 19.

Head coach Cal Stoll (STALL) decided to go with his top offensive and defensive units on the same team in the game and the result was a 57-0 victory for the regulars over the reserves.

"The way I see it our top units are the men who are going to play together when we open at Ohio State September 15, so why not play them together in the spring game," says Stoll. "Sooner or later they have to get used to each other. I prefer sooner."

A junior college transfer running back, Rick Upchurch from Holland, Ohio, was the star of the game rushing for five touchdowns and 214 yards on 19 carries. Upchurch has the main commodity Minnesota's coaching staff was seeking throughout its recruiting cycle this year. . .blazing speed.

"This young man may well be the most exciting player to ever put on a Minnesota uniform," says Stoll. "He may have the quickest acceleration of any player I have coached. Once in the open field he is awfully hard to find, much less tackle. He, like many others, has come a long way during spring practice."

Stoll expressed satisfaction with most results from spring drills. "This is the time for individual instruction as opposed to stressing team coaching," Stoll commented. "In this respect several squad members showed marked improvement, particularly in techniques.

"Of course, (Rick) Upchurch comes to mind first. He only joined us during winter quarter but picked up quickly on our style of ball. Both he and our Veer-T offense seem made for each other.

"Some others who showed a lot of improvement have to include junior offensive end Keith Fahnhorst (St. Cloud), freshman flanker Vince Fuller (Philadelphia, Pa.), junior offensive tackle Dave Simonson (Austin) and sophomore center Jeff Selleck (Arlington Heights, Ill.). That is only five men but I believe they typify most of our squad during spring drills. Each showed marked improvement in his speciality area, improvement that has to pay off for Minnesota football.

"To our way of thinking, my staff and myself, we saw good individual adjustments by each of the men we are counting on to play football for us next fall.

"But we certainly didn't solve every problem. We are again going to be short in the depth department, and again be an awfully young team, possibly younger than last year.

"As of right now I can see much of our second stringers made up of incoming freshmen. . . maybe even a few starters. Of course nothing is certain as of now, not until we see these rookies in uniform next fall. But we are very high on what appears to be an excellent group of incoming student-athletes. I am counting on several of these new men to step in and push our top men hard.

"We need competition badly for the top positions. In my way of thinking that is what keeps a team sharp, keeps it improving. And improve we will. It was apparent what one year under a new system can do. Our players had a much easier time of it this spring having had a year to become familiar with our system and coaching philosophy. I just hope we have done the right job in getting our men prepared."

In Stoll's first year at Minnesota (1972) the Gophers were 4-4 and in fifth place in the Big Ten, and 4-7 on the entire season. Minnesota presently owns the longest win streak in the Conference, three straight.
