Basketball squad 8-2 overall, 0-2 in Big Ten

CAGERS HOST
2 IN BIG TEN
PLAY

After being stung twice in conference openers, the Minnesota basketball team will try to even up its Big Ten ledger at home this week against Illinois (Thursday 1/8) and Iowa (Saturday 1/10) in Williams Arena. Both games have 8:05 p.m. CST starting times. Following a perfect 8-0 non-conference slate, Minnesota dropped a heart-breaking 111-110 double overtime decision at home to Purdue last Saturday, and then ran into a buzz saw in Ann Arbor Monday and lost to Michigan 95-72. Illinois is 0-1 and Iowa 1-1 in the Big Ten. Both clubs are rated, along with Minnesota, as having a good chance to crack the Big Ten's first division this season.

THOMPSON CONTINUES TORRID SCORE Sophomore center Mike Thompson (6-10) maintained his top scoring and rebounding pace in the last two Gopher outings and is presently among the top ten nationally in both catagories. In the first ten outings of the season Mike is averaging 25.8 points and 12 rebounds per game. However, he is not alone in helping the Gophers average 83.5 points per game as three other starters are also hitting in double figures. junior forward Ray Williams (16.2), sophomore guard Osborne Lockhart (15.6) and junior guard Flip Saunders (12.5). Thompson's top single game outputs were 34 points vs. Stanford, and 19 rebounds vs. Chicago Loyola.

DUTCHER ON THE GOPHERS "After losing to Purdue in a game we could have won in regulation time, says Gopher basketball coach Jim Dutcher, "I was afraid of some kind of letdown at Michigan Monday. But in all fairness Michigan was simply too swift and too strong on the boards for us. We can, however, put it all back together this week providing we pull up our boots and concentrate on better defensive play. We may have to resort to more zone work on defense as we simply do not have enough team speed to go man to man the entire game. But we are in no way panicking. We will come to play against Illinois and Iowa."

ICERS GAIN KEY SPLIT, HEAD FOR NOTRE DAME

Minnesota maintained its second place tie in the WCHA last weekend by gaining a strange split with defending NCAA champion Michigan Tech at home. The Gophers won 10-5 in the first game, but lost the second 8-2. The Gophers, Huskies and Colorado College are now in a three-way tie for second with 9-5 records (18 points) behind the leader, Michigan State, who is 10-4 (20 points). This weekend Minnesota will attempt to maintain its pace when the Gophers visit Notre Dame for games Friday and Saturday evenings. The Fighting Irish swept two from North Dakota last week and are presently sixth at 7-6-1 (15 points). For the Gophers to stay in the race at least a split at South Bend is

MAT TEAM SUFFERS KEY LOSS

Larry Zilverberg, senior wrestler from Hopkins (Lindberg), Minnesota, suffered a knee injury in practice last Saturday and was operated on for torn ligaments Tuesday which will, in all probability, end his career at Minnesota. Rated the odds on favorite to win an NCAA championship at 167-pounds next March, Zilverberg was on the verge of compiling the best record in Minnesota wrestling history. career mark in bouts stands at 85 wins, two losses and one draw. Over the Christmas break Zilverberg won his second straight individual title at the rugged Midlands Tournament in Evanston, Illinois and was named the outstanding wrestler in the meet. Larry is also a defending Big Ten champion, and finished runner-up and third at the last two NCAA championship meets. "Not only was Larry a superior competitor, he was also our team leader," says Gopher coach Wally Johnson. is no way you replace a man of his talents. I am certain he would have won both the Big Ten and NCAA championships this year, and could have had a shot at an Olympic berth, too. I only hope he fully recovers from surgery so he can return to international competition in the future. He is simply something else."

GYMNASTICS TEAM AT HOME SATURDAY

The Minnesota gymnastics squad plays host to Mankato State University and the University of Wisconsin-Osh Kosh on Saturday at 1:00 p.m. Coach Fred Roethlisberger sees Oshkosh as the more serious threat. "They are one of the best small college squads in the country", the coach stated. "If we're not sharp, we could be in for a long afternoon," Roethlisberger added. "Mankato's gymnastics program is

not in the best of shape right now," observed the coach, "but they have some good performers." Jay Lowinske is the only Gopher not completely healthy. His leg injury may keep him out of the floor exercises and vaulting, but he should be able to compete in the others. Jeff LaFleur continues to come on strong, and should be a force to be reckoned with at the Big Ten Meet in February. Roethlisberger called LaFleur "the backbone of our team for three years."

SWIM TEAM TRAVELS TO IOWA SATURDAY The University of Minnesota swim team travels to Iowa City Saturday to take on the Hawkeyes at 2 p.m. Coach Bud Ericksen is starting to think he's coaching a hospital team, as four Gopher swimmers have been sidelined with injuries. Herb Schoening (shoulder), Dan Meyers (fendonitis), Dave Borning (pneumonia) and Bill Freeman (mono) will not make the trip. "We've been doing well despite our injuries," said Ericksen, "and are looking forward to the dual meet portion of the season." "The team worked hard over Christmas break, and the work should start paying dividends now," Ericksen added.

The coach believes that Iowa will have a much stronger squad than the one which finished tenth last year. "They have a new coach and some new swimmers," Ericksen observed, "so we should be in for a real battle down there."

POINT OUT OF 1ST PLACE, DENVER HERE

ICERS 1

After gaining three points out of a possible four at Notre Dame last weekend, the Minnesota hockey Gophers return home to face Denver University Friday and Saturday evenings. The three points gained in a 6-3 win and a 4-4 tie places Minnesota just one point off the pace set by WCHA leader Michigan Tech. MTU is 11-5-0 for 22 points, the Gophers 10-5-1 for 21. Says head coach Herb Brooks, "The way this league is playing I'll gladly take another 10-5-1 mark the second half of the season."

DENVER COMES ALIVE After a slow start by past Denver standards, the Pioneers showed signs of the olden days by sweeping a pair from Michigan State on the road lass weekend knocking the Spartans out of first place in the WCHA. Denver is now 5-10-0 in the WCHA. The Gophers and Pioneers split a series at Denver back in November. Denver took the opening game 3-2 in overtime with Minnesota winning 5-1 the next night.

MILLER HAS HIS BEST SERIES Senior wing Warren Miller (South St. Paul) had his best series of the year at Notre Dame scoring a hat trick Friday and adding a goal and two assists Saturday giving him six points for the weekend. It was Miller's second career hat trick in a Gopher uniform. His first came in the dramatic 6-4 come from behind win over Harvard at the NCAA tournament last March. The scrappy right winger has moved into second place in the UM scoring derby with 12 goals and 19 assists for 31 points in 22 games.

BROOKS ON THE GOPHERS "Probably the key point in the Notre Dame series to me was that our squashowed a bit more composure, something we need badly when heading into the stretch drive of the WCHA," says Brooks. "For the most part we played well. There was a bit of a letdown Saturday when they scored three straight goals, but our men fought back to gain the tie. The Irish goalie kept us from winning that game with 30 saves in the final period and during the 10 minute overtime. He was simply fantastic. . . and he's only a freshman. "I reunited last year's great scoring line of captain Pat Phippen, Tom Vannelli and Tom Younghans. They were a threat every time on the ice. Now if we can come up with some solid performances from our other lines we could be all right. I mainly hope now we just stay healthy. Freshman Tom Gorence, who has six goals in our last nine games, suffered an ankle injury Saturday but should be CK by

the Denver series. "As for Denver, taking a pair at Michigan State is really an accomplishment. But as long as Murray Armstrong is head coach of the Pioneers his team will always be a threat. We'll have to get it all together again this weekend. Minnesota-Denver games are always close, tight checking affairs. I look for another great series."

CAGERS SEEK
TO EVEN
CONF •

After splitting a pair of Big Ten contests at home, the Minnesota basketball team goes on the road this weekend in hopes of evening its record to 3-3. The Gophers play at Northwestern Saturday afternoon, and then journey to Wisconsin for a Monday night clash. Minnesota beat Illinois 77-68 last Thursday, but lost to Iowa 71-68 Saturday. Minnesota is now 1-3 in conference play, but still a strong 9-3 on the entire season. Much, much less was predicted for the Gopher squad prior to the season.

DUTCHER ON GOPHERS

"Our loss to Iowa was certainly not due to a lack of effort," Gopher coach Jim Dutcher said over the weekend. "We simply did not function well the first half falling behind 40-29, but our kids really came after them and almost pulled it out in the final half. Several times we were just a basket or two away from taking command. But give credit to Iowa, they didn't fold and hung on to win.

"We have still not solved some problems facing us, but progress is evident every time out. For us to be any kind of factor in the Big Ten race we simply must win our next two games to at least pull our record even. . and then go from there. But I hope we don't have to play four games in eight days like we did last week. That's asking an awful lot of a team that lacks proven depth."

THOMPSON, WILLIAMS STILL HOT Sophomore center Mike Thompson and junior forward Ray Williams continued their hot scoring pace last weekend with Thompson hitting 29 against Iowa, and Williams canning 26 vs. Illinois and another 20 against the Hawkeyes. Through the first 12 games Thompson leads all Gopher scorers with a 24.9 average while Williams has climbed to 17.5 per game. Williams has scored better than 20 per game in the last five Gopher outings, while Thompson has hit the same pace four of the last five times out. In Big Ten games only, Thompson is scoring an even 25 points per game, Williams 23. Thompson also leads UM in rebounding at 11.5 per game.

EXCARTHUR TO WRESTLE IN ALL-STAR MEET

Wrestling coach Wally Johnson has announced that Mike McArthur, the Gopher's 183 pound scrapper from Osseo, has been selected for the NCAA Coaches All Star Meet to be held at Madison on February 2. Coach Johnson also stated that Evan Johnson (no relation), a 190 pounder, is being given strong consideration for the same tourney.

Gopher Basketball Team: 10-4 all games, 2-4 in Big Ten

CAGERS HOST #1 RANKED INDIANA SAT., THEN OSU MON. After splitting two Big Ten road games, the Minnesota basketball Gophers return home to host the top ranked team in the nation, the Indiana Hoosiers, Saturday afternoon at Williams Arena in the Big Ten TV Game of the Week. On Monday Ohio State invades Williams Arena for an 0:05 p.m. contest. "If you are going to play on a big TV hookup you might as well play the best," says Gopher coach Jim Dutcher. "I don't believe anyone will argue the point that we have picked the very best. Indiana has lost one game in the last two seasons, and I don't really remember the last time they lost in the Big Ten. But we will be conceeding nothing. We will approach this game just like any other. . .except possibly with a bit more intensity. Everyone loves to go up against a big winner, and we're no different. We are all looking to the challenge that both Indiana and Ohio State present. It should be a great weekend of basketball."

THOMPSON TO PLAY BOTH GAMES Minnesota center Mike Thompson, who missed his team's 05-77 loss at Northwestern last Saturday after being declared temporarily ineligible by the NGAA in a case involving the sale of complimentary tickets a year ago, returned to duty Monday at Wisconsin under a temporary court order pending a hearing on his case January 20. That means the high scoring 6-10 sophomore will also play this weekend against Indiana and Ohio State. Without Thompson the Gopher attack was hamperped at Northwestern. But Monday at Wisconsin Mike poured in 29 points and pulled down 17 rebounds as the Gophers prevailed 96-34. On the season Mike is averaging 25.2 points and 12 rebounds per game. In the Big Ten his figures are 25.0 and 10.4.

WILLIAMS TAKES UP THE SLACK With his towering center missing from the lineup last Saturday Minnesota's Ray Williams, a 6-2 junior forward, took up much of the offensive scoring punch by hitting for 27 at Northwestern. He came back with another 26 in the Wisconsin game and is now averaging better than 20 points a game in Big Ten competition. The smooth junior college transfer seems to be really hitting his full potential and has also become a solid team leader. Together this duo of Mike Thompson and Ray Williams could cause a lot of headaches for remaining Big Ten

opponents. Thompson ranks among the national leaders in both scoring and rebounding.

UM GUARDS FLYING, TOO

But Thompson and Williams are not alone in leading the Gopher attack. Minnesota's small but sharp guard pair of junior Phil "Flip" Saunders (5-11) and sophomore Osborne Lockhart (6-1), the latter like Thompson a native of the Bahamas, have been consistent in their scoring and leading the Gopher fast break. On the season Lockhart is averaging 15.4 points and 5.3 assists per game, while Saunders' figures read 12.4 and 4.3. Small by major college standards, especially in the Big Ten, this pair plays the game much, much taller and have also made some excellent defensive contributions.

For the first time since mid-December the Minnesota hockey Gophers swept a WCHA series and maintained its place just one point behind league-leading Michigan Tech. The Gophers took a home pair from Denver 3-1 and 6-4, but the latter game simply wasn't all that easy. Denver roared out to a 4-0 lead early in the second period against a faltering Gopher attack. But when junior defenseman Joe Micheletti finally found the enemy net on a power play shot at 14:35 of the same period, the race for Gopher goals was on. In the space of 3.43, starting with the Micheletti goal, Minnesota tied the score. Warren Miller, Don Madson and Ken Yackel scored their goals just one minute apart (17:19 to 13:19). Junior Tom Vannelli then decided the outcome scoring twice in the final period. Minnesota has now won 3 of its last 10 outings.

UM ON THE ROAD NEXT TWO WEEKS

But now comes problems, real problems. The next two weekends find Minnesota away from friendly Williams Arena playing WCHA series at Michigan (Jan. 23-24) and Minnesota-Duluth (Jan. 30-31). everyone agrees that man for man Michigan may have the best lineup in the league. However, Wolverine hopes were dealt a solid blow last Friday when ace center and team leader Angie Moretto suffered a freak accident cutting the ring finger on his left hand so badly it required It is questionable if he can return to action this season. The accident happened in the afternoon and was not related to hockey. Moretto had scored 20 goals and 13 assists in Michigan's 23 games this season. And in Duluth Gopher coach Herb Brooks believes the Bulldogs will play much better at home than in recent outings. The young UMD squad has found recent difficulty in consistency, but when the Gophers come to town the Bulldogs always play their very best.

ICERS HEAD FOR 2 AT DULUTH If ever there was a time to say "this has to be a key series", the WCHA pair at Duluth Friday and Saturday evenings has to be it for the Minnesota Gopher hockey team. Coach Herb Brooks and his squad face off against the Bulldogs on the road after dropping a pair last weekend at Michigan 3-7 and 3-5. However, Minnesota maintained its hold on second place in the WCHA just three points behind Michigan Tech. Michigan is now third, one point behind the Gophers.

ROAD GAMES

Saturday's trip to Duluth marks the third road series in the last four weeks for UM. What's worse, three of the final five WCHA series following the Duluth pair are also away from home. There was some really great body checking by both clubs. But Michigan converted their chances and we didn't. That was the difference. They controlled the puck m re than we did and deserved both wins. We simply ran into a fine hockey club playing up to its potential. The above clearly backs my earlier statements that man for man Michigan has one of the best college hockey clubs in the nation. But I'm not totally disappointed in our performance. We simply couldn't convert. That goalie of theirs, Robbie Moore, killed us again. He had 4ó saves Friday, many of them impossible. People in Ann Arbor said it was the most consistent two-game series Michigan had played this year. Now we have to pull it up and get back in the race."

BROOKS ON DULUTH

"Sure we won two against Duluth here earlier this season," Brooks continued, "but that doesn't mean a thing this weekend. Whenever we travel up there to play it's like a rebirth of the city. They would rather beat us than any other team. I'm certain their fine coach, Gus Hendrickson, will have his team sky high. We'll have to play our very best just to get out of town. It should be another great series in

the long tradition between our schools."

GORENCE MAY Freshman center Tom Gorence (St. Paul) could return to action this weekend after being out of the last two series with an ankle injury. Gorence skated with his teammates Monday and at that time coach Brooks stated it's about a 50-40 chance Gorence could return to full duty.

Although being peppered hard in the Michigan series, which included five power play goals by the Wolverines, Minnesota goalie Jeff Tscherne (Edina) still leads the league net minders with a solid 3.2 goals allowed average. On the entire season Tscherne has won 13 games and played in one tie out of 17 starts. He has held the Gopher in many a contest until his teammates uncorked late scoring binges to pull out a

After splitting two last weekend, the Gopher cagers are now 11-5 on the season and 3-5 in the Big Ten. Minnesota threw a scare into national leader Indiana before a regional TV audience Saturday afternoon in taking a 45-40 halftime lead. Many said it was the finest first half of basketball ever played in Williams Arena. But powerful IU took command early in the second hafl to score an 05-76 win. But the Gophers came back to bounce Ohio State at home Monday 32-69.

BIGGEST NIGHT

THOMPSON HAS Sophomore center Mike Thompson, Minnesota's scoring and rebound leader, had his biggest night of the season against Ohio State. There are just five weeks of play left for Western Collegiate Hockey Association (WCHA) teams in the torrid 1975-76 race. However, what happens this weekend could do more to determine this year's champion and playoff alignment than at any other time. The top four teams of the present standings all face each other keyed by the series at Williams Arena Friday and Saturday nights, Michigan State vs. host Minnesota. The Spartans are tied with Michigan for third place in the WCHA with 26 points, while Minnesota stands alone in second place with 29 points. In the other vital series Michigan (26) is at league leader Michigan Tech (32). Either thelog jam at the top will get tighter or there could be a definite separation among the challengers. Also, nothing may change if both series end in split decisions. Whatever, the word "pivotal" has to fit this weekend's action better than any other term.

MSU TOP SCORING CLUB

Michigan State, with a 13-9-0 WCHA record, brings one of the most explosive scoring machines in college hockey to Williams Arena Friday and Saturday. The Spartans, under head coach Amo Bessone who is in his 25th year at State, are averaging 4.7 goals per league contest, and boast the #1, #2, #6 and #9 scorers in the WCHA. Center Tom Ross, co-MVP last year with Minnesota's Mike Polich, is the defending scoring champion and again leads the league with 53 points (31-32) in 22 games. Second is center Steve Colp with 54 points (22-32); winger Daryl Rice is sixth with 43 points (12-31), and winger John Struges is ninth with 33 points (10-23). Minnesota does not have a single player in the top ten, but winger Warren Miller is closing fast with 30 points (13-17).

BROOKS ON UMD, MSU

"Last weekend was a strange one for us in the series sweep at Duluth," says Gopher coach Herb Brooks. "On Friday we did not play good, functional, position hockey, but were able to steal a late 5-3 win. Then on Saturday our men played possibly the best first half of any game this season. After gaining a 6-0 lead the club kind of coasted. Possibly that was a turning point for us. You have to win on the road to challenge in this league. After losing twice the week before at Michigan we really needed a pair at Duluth in the worst way. But possibly most important of all is that we are now the healthiest we have been since the opening week of the season. Several players are nursing the usual humps and hurts that come out of any series, but every man should be ready to go full speed this week. And that's exactly what (MORE)

we'll need to meet the challenge presented by Michigan State's offensive potential. They can fly and have numerous solid goal scorers If we don't check all over the ice, and that includes our forwards every bit as much as our defensemen, we will be in trouble. We were fortunate to gain a split with State earlier in the season, but that won't be good enough now. If we expect to stay near the top we must sweep at home. We only have one more home series (Michigan Feb. 27-26) plus three road series remaining. That further points out the importance of this series."

MILLER ON A TEAR Senior right wing Warren Miller (South St. Paul) has been scoring at a wild pace in recent weeks for the Gopher hockey team. On the season he is second only to junior center Tom Vannelli (St. Paul) in the scoring race. Vannelli has 42 points and Miller 39. In the WCHA Miller leads all Gopher teammates with 30 points. Vannelli and captain Pat Phippen (Roseville) are next with 26. In the last 12 UM games Miller has bange home 10 goals and 16 assists for 26 points. He has scored at least one point in 11 of those 12 games. He presently leads his teammates in career total points with 111. Last weekend at Duluth Miller scored three goals and one assist in the twin wins. On top of that he is ranked as one of the best checking forwards on the Gopher varsity.

DUTCHER ON **GOPHERS** 

"We played pretty good ball and played very hard at Illinois after being embarrassed at Michigan State," says Dutcher. We kept them from getting inside and they couldn't hit from outside. We must continue this style of play if we hope to keep winning. Ray Williams turned in a very fine performance in his first game at guard. He hit several key baskets when the game was close. And Mike Thompson. ... well, if he isn't one of the finest young ball players in the country, then I'm not a basketball coach. He has totally dominated our last two wins over Ohio State and Illinois, and that goes for both ends of the court. Gus Johnson who came off the bench to start was another key factor in the Illinois win. He didn't score much, but played solid defense, rebounded hard and had four great assists. Dave Winey is a whole new ball player for us. He has gained the confidence he needed and is now beginning to reach his potential. But all the above will have to come together Saturday if we hope to defeat Iowa. It's been a long time since Minnesota has won in Iowa City (not since the 1971-72 season). I would like to see that streak ended this Saturday."

THOMPSON NOW 19TH ON SCORING LIST

In his quest to rewrite some Gopher scoring records, Minnesota's 6-foot-10 sophomore center Mike Thompson is now 19th among UNI's all-time single season scorers. Through his first 17 games Mike has scored 434 points, one shy of the 435 totals scored by George Kline in 1953 and tied by Lou Hudson in 1964. The single season UN record is 597 points in a single season set by Tom Kondla in 1967. Thompson is averaging 25.5 points per outing, and has six games remaining this season.

Basketball Team Now 12-7 overall, 4-7 in the Big Ten.

CAGERS FINALLY BACK HOME

For the first time since Monday, January 26, the University of Minnesota basketball team gets to play a Big Ten game in its home arena. After dropping two of three road games, the Gophers host Northwestern Saturday and Wisconsin Monday. Both games have 0:05 p.m. CST starting times. After losing at Michigan State and defeating Illinois a week ago, the Gophers recorded their lowest shooting performance of the season in dropping a 58-65 decision at Iowa last Saturday. A usually potent UM attack could only produce 19 first half points and trailed by seven. Although three times closing the gap to four points in the second half, Minnesota could never come up with another key bucket to press the Hawkeyes. Sophomore center Mike Thompson was the only Gopher on target converting nine of 17 attempts and scoring a game high of 21 points. Minnesota, as a team, is shooting .512 percent from the floor in all games this season, and .509 percent in Big Ten play only.

THOMPSON CONTINUES RECORD PACE

Minnesota's Mike Thompson, a 6-foot-10 sophomore center, has remained on target in his attempts to become the top single season scorer in his school's history. Through the Iowa game last weekend, Minnesota's 19th and Thompson's 16th (he sat out one contest due to an NCAA ruling), Thompson has scored 455 points for a 25.3 average. He has now moved into 13th place on the single season scoring list, two points ahead of the 452 total scored by Eric Hill in the 1969-70 season. If Thompson can maintain his present per game average, he could wind up with better than 600 points for the year. Minnesota's single season record is 597 points scored by Tom Kondla in 1955-67. Thompson is second in the Big Ten scoring race with a 25.6 average. He trails only Terry Furlow of Michigan State who is ranked among the top five nationally scoring at better than 30 points a game.

UM. VS N'WEST &

Earlier this season Minnesota dropped a 77-55 decision at Northwestern, but won 96-04 at Wisconsin. In the first game the Gophers were forced to WISCONSIN play without their scoring and rebounding ace center Mike Thompson. Junior forward Ray Williams picked up much of the slack in that contest by (MORE)

scoring 27 points, but the Gophers were outrebounded 44-23. But two nights later Thompson returned to the lineup scoring 29 points and pulling down 17 rebounds in the Wisconsin win. Going into conference games tonight (Monday, Feb. 9), Northwestern owned a 4-7 Big Ten mark, 9-11 overall, and Wisconsin was 2-9 and 6-11. Both clubs mentioned played Monday while Minnesota took the day off.

DUTCHER ON "We had our worst, very worst shooting night of the season and it cost us dearly," says Gopher coach Jim Dutcher commenting on the Iowa loss.

GOPHERS "We just don't have the bench strength to call on additional men to come in and turn things around for us. But I guess no team in the country can shoot hot every time out. We are young and thin, but far from out of things. We can still salvage a respectable season record by winning two this weekend. It will not be easy, that's for certain, but it can be done. We would dearly like to finish above .500 this season and possibly reach the Big Ten's first division. It will take a lot for our men to accomplish this, but I still believe we can do it. We have seven games remaining, but four are at home. It's asking a lot of our men, but with concentrated effort and a few breaks, well. . .we'll hope for the best."

Hockey Team now 19-10-1 and 14-9-1 in the WCHA...

ICERS DROP Minnesota suffered a double setback at home last weekend to hard-charging 2, NOW AT Michigan State (2-4, 4-5 OT) and now faces the rugged task of playing six WISCONSIN of its last eight WCHA games on the road. Friday and Saturday the third place Gophers, behind leader Michigan Tech and second place MSU, travel to Wisconsin to meet the Badgers. And as everyone knows, playing in Madison presents one of the toughest road challenges in the WCHA. Even though the Badgers are on an off year and in last place, it means nothing when Minnesota comes to town. One of the keenest rivalries in the WCHA is on tap whenever these clubs meet and you can throw standings and records out the window. Earlier this season the schools split at Minneapolis with the Gophers winning 6-1 after the Badgers had taken the first one 4-2.

BROOKS ON "We lost out on a golden chance to pick up some solid points last weekend," said Gopher coach Herb Brooks Monday. "Michigan State just played a CHANCES whale of a series, but our men played well, too. It was just a case of us not converting our chances. And there were plenty of them, too. I believe we should have held that 4-2 lead in the third period Saturday to gain a split and remain in second place. But things just don't always work out the way you would like in this league. But that's in the past. Sure, we are on the road six of the last eight, but don't forget that we have played some of our best hockey away from home this season. I'm not about to say we must win two here or two there. But we still have our sights set on one of the top two places in the final standings. Both those slots are prestigious and also keys to the post season playoffs as far as home ice goes. The equality of teams in this year's race could easily produce

MEET HERE

The biggest indoor track and field extravaganza of the year unfolds Friday and Saturday when the annual Northwest Open is run off in the University of Minnesota fieldhouse. Gopher head coach Roy Griak, meet manager, said Tuesday he expects more than 500 college and open athletes, both men and women to compete in the two-day affair. The meet is co-sponsored by the UM and the Minnesota Track and Field Federation. No team scores are kept, only individual awards are given. Better than 60 college track teams are expected to send representatives.

PRELIMS FRI. FINALS SAT.

Only one event, the long jump, will be concluded Friday. The remaining events, 22 in all including separate heats for men and women, will run through their entirety Saturday. Starting time Friday is 2 p.m. for long jump preliminaries, with preliminary running events beginnings at 4 p.m. On Saturday field event finals begin at 10 a.m. with running finals starting at 1:15 p.m.

SEVERAL TOP NAMES IN FIELD

Numerous national and international competitors, including defending meet champions, are already entered in this year's Northwest Open Field. According to Griak one of the meet highlights will be the 3-mile run slated for 1:15 p.m. Saturday. "Two former Gopher All-Americans, Garry Bjorkland and Don Timm, plus former North Dakota State All-American Mike Stack, will run in this event," says Griak. Bjorkland and Stack were members of last year's Pan American Team and all three will try out for the U.S. Olympic Team this summer. should be some kind of race. Big Ten record holder Colin Anderson, also a former Gopher, will compete in the shot put. Several defending Northwest Open champions are also returning, including Glenn Bullick (UM) in the pole vault, and two former Gophers, Randy Bebe in the 1000yard run and Dave McDaniel in the 300-yard run. Other key members of this year's Gopher varsity expected to compete, says Griak, include freshman Cicero McGee in the 440-yard run, senior Jeff Wujek in the shot put, freshman Dave Gaither in both hurdles races, Bruce Beckel and John Bohan in the high jump, and Steve Plasencia in the 100-yard run. Plasencia usually runs the one, two or three-mile events.

KEY WOMEN EVENTS SLATED

Several of the best runners from the midwest and Canada will also compete in the Northwest Open. Griak believes the top events could see defending champion Lynn McCarty, Canadian Olympic hopeful from the U. of Manitoba, face the challenge of Gopher running star Kathy Twomey in the 330-yard run. Other key performers and their special events include defending champ Jane Oas in the 300-yard run, and CeCe Cox is the 440-yard run.

CAGERS AT IU, OSU

After scoring its second highest point total of the season in defeating Wisconsin 90-74 at home Monday, all the Minnesota basketball team has to look forward to is a rematch with the number one ranked Indiana Hoosiers at Bloomington, Saturday afternoon, and another game with Ohio State at Columbus Monday evening. In earlier games Minnesota threw a scare into Indiana by taking a 45-40 halftime lead, but wilted under a second half Hoosier bombardment in losing 65-76, and then bounced back to defeat the Buckeyes 32-69. Minnesots is now 13-7 on the season assuring the Gophers of no less than a .500 season, and is 5-8 in the Big Ten.

DUTCHER ON GOPHERS, IU and OSU

"The fact that our men have clinched a .500 season is a fitting tribute to their determination," says rookie head coach Jim Dutcher. men wouldn't let disappointment get them down. On several occasions during the Big Ten campaign we have lost close games that could have been wins for us, But on each occasion our players have bounced back to win the next game. This tells a lot about player pride. As for Indiana, we must play their basketball team, not their reputation. They are great, make no mistake about that. For us to win we'll have to have another super shooting day and again hold a rebound edge. time we shot .615 percent from the floor against Indiana, but they shot .619 percent. That's the only game I know of where both teams went over .500 percent from the floor. We outrebounded them 25-24, but will have to have a bigger margin down there. At Ohio State we must stop the scoring threats of their fine guards, Larry Bolden and Mark Bayless. And if center Craig Taylor returns to duty, we'll have an even bugher time. Chio State is always strong at home."

THOMPSON EDGES CLOSER TO RECORD Gopher sophomore center Mike Thompson scored 25 points in the loss to Northwestern and 33 more in the win over Wisconsin to run his season scoring total to 513 points in all games. That means with five games remaining Mike has to score 35 points to set a new school single season scoring mark of 590 points. The present record of 597 was set by Tom Kondla in 1966-67. With 63 more points he can also become the highest single season scorer in the Big Ten in Gopher history. Minnesota's record in conference play is 396 points by Kondla, also in 1966-67. Mike is averaging 25.6 a game right now, but only needs to average 17 in remaining games to set the new standards.

SURGE TO PLAYOFFS AT CC

ICERS CONTINUE Nothing changed at the top of the WCHA last weekend as all five leaders split league series. That means the Minnesota Gophers remained in third place one point behind Michigan State, and seven in back of Michigan Tech. Minnesota, in quest of a high spot in the final WCHA standings, heads back on the road after splitting at Wisconsin (5-4 OT and 3-9) to Colorado College for a league pair Friday and Saturday evenings. The Tigers are in sixth place fighting to reach a first division spot among the eight teams who enter the playoffs based on the final standings. Earlier this season Minnesota swept two at home from the Tigers 6-2 and 3-2 at Williams Arena.

TWO MORE UM PLAYERS OUT WITH INJURIES

However, coach Herb Brooks may be forced to head West minus two regulars this weekend. Definitely out is senior defenseman Brad Morrow who suffered a shoulder separation in the Wisconsin series. Jim Boo is expected to repalce Morrow. An even more crippling blow

Gopher road action finds coach Wally Johnson taking a battered Gopher wrestling team to Iowa City for the Big Ten meet Saturday and Sunday, while coach Fred Roethlisberger and his varsity gymnasts head for Madison. Wisconsin and a dual meet with the Badgers Saturday.

ICERS UNDER GUN AGAIN "At this time of the year and as close as the WCHA race for playoff positions is right now," says Gopher hockey coach Herb Brooks, "every series is the biggest of the year. Facing a potent Michigan team here is another giant must for us. They have great potential and are driving, just like us, for a high spot in the final standings. They whipped us twice down at Ann Arbor (3-7, 3-5) and will be out to do the same thing this weekend. If we expect to stay in the running for the coveted second place finish, well. . .I don't have to tell you what we must do this weekend. The loss last Saturday at Colorado College (3-4), after we led going into the final period, could come back to haunt us. We played well enough to gain a sweep out there (UM won 4-1 Friday) but couldn't pull it off. CAGERS SEEK HIGHER FINISH It would be possible for the Minnesota basketball team, by winning its three remaining games, to end with a first division finish in the Big Ten race. However, all the battling Gophers would have to do is defeat three clubs that already own wins against UM. Michigan State comes in Saturday afternoon. Michigan is here Monday evening. Then the Gophers close the campaign March 6 at Purdue. Michigan is in second place at 12-3, Michigan State third at 9-6, and Purdue fifth at 8-7 in the Big Ten. Minnesota is tied for seventh at 6-9.

WINNING SEASON ASSURED Whatever position Minnesota finishes in the Big Ten, the biggest story is that the Gophers are assured of ending the 1975-76 campaign with a winning season. Before the season, coach Jim Dutcher's first at Minnesota, the Gopher fortunes were considered at the best extremely slim. What with pro signings and players transferring out, it was believed Minnesota would be lucky to win more than a handful of games. But Dutcher led his thin squad to a sweep of all eight non-conference affairs, and has also brought home six Big Ten wins in 15 outings. That accomplishment alone has to rank Dutcher high when it comes to coach of the year balloting in the Big Ten. And every man who has seen extensive duty this season is an underclassmen. Only two reserve guards are seniors an this year's Gopher team.

THOMPSON, WILLIAMS CONTINUE SCORING ASSUALT After scoring 25 points against Indiana and throwing in another 30 vs. Ohio State, Minnesota sophomore center Mike Thompson is now just 36 point away from setting a new school single season scoring record. Thompson has accounted for 560 points in 22 games, an average of 25.5, and has three games remaining. He is presently in third place on the Gopher single season leader list. Thompson Monday evening passed the total of 550 scored by all-American Lou Hudson in 1965. Now the 6-foot-10 center (MORE)

is aiming at the record of 597 scored by Tom Kondla in 1967. Thompson is also just 35 points shy of the 396 scored by Kondla in Big Ten play only in 1967. Mike has 361 league points.

Junior guard-forward Ray Williams has also moved into select company wit a season total of 419 points. That places him 19th on the single scoring list, one ahead of Jed Dommeyer who hit for 410 during the 1955-56 seaso: In addition to his scoring prowess of 19.1 per game, Williams has hit on 11 assists in two of his last three outings. Some of his fast break passes in recent games have led to near disbelief among veteran observers. "If there is any better ball player leading the fast break in basketball I certainly haven't seen him," comments coach Dutcher.

MAT TEAM AT BIG TEN TITLE GO

Although Iowa is rated a prohibitive favorite to repeat as Big Ten wrestling champion Saturday and Sunday, Minnesota heads for the meet with high hopes of winning both team and individual honors. "We simply refuse to conceed the championship to the host school, or anyone else," says Gopher mat coach Wally Johnson. "Sure they (Iowa) are ranked number one in the nation and heavily favored, but that doesn't make them invinceable. Wisoonsin, Michigan, Michigan State and ourselves are going to Iowa City with just one thing in mind. . . to win it all. I'm certain this is going to be the best Big Ten meet ever."

THREE UM WRESTLERS

Three members of the Minnesota varsity are rated among the leaders heading into the championship meet. Juniors Mike McArthur and Evan Johnson are presently ranked number one at 110- and 190-pounds, respectively. Another key to UM hopes, defending champion Larry Zilverberg at 157pounds, could also break through. However, Zilverberg has just recently returned to action following five weeks off after knee surgery. "I'm not really certain if Larry has come far enough back physically," says coach Johnson, "but I do know he is more than 100 percent ready mentally. My major hope is that all three finish among the top four finalists and thereby qualify for the NCAA championship meet."

The 15 linemen and linebackers candidates average out to 6-foot-3 and 227-pounds per man, while the offensive and defensive backs, plus wide receivers, average out to 6-foot-1 and 192-pounds.

"This could also be one of the most mobile groups ever recruited at Minnesota," Stoll adds. One player, Roger Frazier, a receiver from Richmond, Indiana, is easily the fastest.

Frazier has been timed in 4.4 seconds for the 40-yard dash, and last spring in track ran a 6.1 in the 60-yard dahs. At time of the latter clockcing it was recognized as the fastest ever by a high school runner in that event.

Several other of the prospects are also rated as having above average speed.

According to Stoll, he and his staff will attempt to sign two more candidates for next year's varsity in the next few days. The limit is 30 tenders per year to incoming high school seniors or junior college transfers.

ICERS IN WCHA

With just one WCHA series remaining before post season playoffs begin next Wednesday, Minnesota faces more possible combinations in relation to the final standings than you average bank vault lock. The Gophers need one win at North Dakota Friday or Saturday to clinch third place and gain home ice for the first playoff round March 10-11. However, a twin killing matched with a twin loss by second place Michigan States would give UM second place. Then there is the dread that by losing twice and some other happenings around the league, Minnesota could fall all the way to fifth place and be on the road next Wednesday. All the above points to one item. . . the balance of the WCHA. "It's not an ideal situation for the coaches, that's for certain," says UM coach Herb Brooks. "There is only one man, Michigan Tech's John MacInnes, who goes into this weekend not sweating it out. He has already won the championship. The rest of us whill be biting Lails and grinding teeth. I know there must be an easier way to get through a Minnesota winter, but darned if I can figure out anything better than what I'm doing right now."

DEFENDERS REED & ROB LARSON INJURED

Adding to Brooks' woas is the uncertain condition of premium defensemen Reed and Rob Larson (no relation). Both received injuries in the Michigan series last week and their status for North Dakota will not be decided until Thursday, the day of departure. Both received back injuries. However, good news came when it was learned Brad Morrow, another defenseman, has recovered from a shoulder injury and will be ready for duty. Several other Gopher regulars are hurting, but will be able to compete at North Dakota.

ONE MORE WIN 2ND BEST EVER

Having already recorded 22 victories on the season, one more Gopher hockey win would give this year's team the second highest total in Minnesota history. The record is 31 wins set last season. Three other squads recorded 22 wins in a season--1952-53, 1953-54 and 1973-74.

**GOPHERS** CLOSE SATURDAY

Coach Jim Dutcher's UN cagers conclude their 1975-76 season Saturday in a 4:05 p.m. EST Big Ten Conference assignment at Purdue. The Gophers take CAGE SEASON a 16-9 overall record and an 6-9 conference log into that finale. Purdue came into this week's action with al4-11 overall mark while the Boilermakers were 997 in the Big Ten. Minnesota dropped a heartbreaking 111-110 overtime loss to Purdue at Minneapolis in the conference opener early in January and hopes to avenge that setback Saturday. The Gophers (MORE)

lead in the series with Purdue by a 54-50 edge.

THOMPSON SEASON SCORING RECORD

Mike Thompson, Minnesota's talented sophomore center, tossed in 32 points SETS SINGLE Monday night while leading the Gophers to their 61-79 upset win over Michigan. Those efforts brought Thompson's 1975-76 scoring total to 612 and enabled the 6-10 cager to snap the record of 597 set by Tom Kondla during the 1956-67 campaign. With that Purdue game still in the future, Thompson will be sending his new standard higher every time he scores against the Boilermakers. Ray Williams, junior forward-guard for the Gophers, scored 25 Monday against the Wolverines which moved him into 12th place in the UM's all-time single-season scoring race. Williams has 464 points this year.

TWO GOFHERS Two University of Minnesota Gophers were honored by the Associated Press GAIN HONORS with berths on the 1976 10-man All-Big Ten team. Mike Thompson was IN BIG TEN placed on the first team while Ray Williams was named to the second unit.

MINNESOTA ON WIN STRING

Jim Dutcher, who winds up his first season as head coach of the Gophers at Purdue, takes a career mark of 247 wins against 129 losses into the finale. While his youthful squad reeled off eight straight non-conference victories in November and December, they were unable to get a string going in Big Ten play until this past week. Now they boast three straight triumphs. . . over Ohio State, Michigan State and Michigan . . and will be after number four against the Boilermakers.

GOPHER WRESTLERS GAIN 2ND TN CONFERENCE With Larry Zilverberg and Mike McArthur leading the way, Wally Johnson's grapplers fought to a second place finish in the Big Ten meet held Sat. and Sunday at the Iowa Fieldhouse. Gophers Pat Neu and Evan Johnson had second place finishes, while Bob Schandle took a third. All five qualified for the NCAA Tournament to be held at Arizona on March 11-13. The championship was the first for McArthur, who had finished second in last year's Big Ten Meet. His record in dual meets this season was 32-1, best on the squad. However, the biggest story for the Gophers had to be Larry Zilverberg. Only a few weeks ago Zilverberg wasn't sure he'd wrestle again this year. He had just undergone knee surgery, and chances for a comeback were slim and none. But little by little he worked himself Dack into shape and was able to compete in the last dual meet of the season. Coach Johnson was hoping Zilverberg could finish in the top four (thus earning an NCAA berth), but Larry had other ideas. Not only did he successfully defend his title by defeating Iowa's Dan Wagemann 9-6, he was selected the meet's most valuable wrestler.

GRIAK LOOKS "The squad has progressed rather well since the start of the season, but I expect to see some really fine times and distances at the league meet," IMPROVEMENT commented track coach Roy Griak. "Michigan, Illinois, Wisconsin and Indiana will probably field the strongest teams, but some of our individuals should show well. Glen Bullick (pole vault), Bruce Beckel and John Bohan (high jump), Dave Gaither (hurdles), Cicero McGee (quarter mile) Jeff Wujek (shot) and Steve Plesencia (mile) look to be our strongest contenders for individual honors." The meet will be held Friday and Saturday at Madison.

#### ROETHLISBERGER

PLEASED WITH GYM

"It wasn't our best performance of the year as a team, but a couple of Minnesota performers did a tremendous job," commented gymnastics coach Fred Roethlisberger. "Dan Jarosch hasn't missed a move in his last five PERFORMANCE meets. . . his 9.3 was a personal high for the season. Mike Wilbur also did a great job, scoring a 9.4 working the rings. Both of these guys should place the national tournament to be held next month in Philadelphia.'

ICERS END 3RD IN WCHA, HOST PLAYOFFS WED. THUR.

The Minnesota hockey Gophers clinched third place in the final WCHA regular season standings with a 5-3 win at North Dakota last Friday before losing Saturday 5-1. That means the Gophers qualified for home ice in the first round WCHA playoffs a third consecutive year. Minnesota plays host to 6th place Colorado College Wednesday and Thursday, March 10-11. The format calls for a two game, total goals series with both contests set for 7:30 p.m. faceoffs. Winner of the first round series goes on to the WCHA finals probably taking on second place finisher Michigan State at East Lansing, providing the Spartans win their series against Wisconsin at home March 10-11. However, should the Gophers win its game with C.C. and Michigan State loses to Wisconsin, then Minnesota would be at home to the Badgers Saturday and Sunday. The WCHA playoff finals are Saturday-Sunday, March 13-14. Eight of the 10 WCHA schools qualified for first round playoffs.

BROOKS ON PLAYOFFS

"I know it's a tried and true cliche, but every coach and player will be saying the same thing today: the WCHA playoffs present a whole new season," says Minnesota hockey coach Herb Brooks. "We have been extremely fortunate to win both playoff rounds the past two years. I just hope that string continues. However, we approach this series with Colorado College just like any other series during the season, or during any past playoffs. That we have beaten the Tigers three of four this season (6-2 and 3-2 here, 4-1 before losing 3-4 there) doesn't mean a single thing. Like I said, it's a whole new season.

"Colorado College plays a close to the vest, tight checking game. We will have to play extremely well without the puck in order to stay in the game. We haven't been scoring in big bunches, either, and we will be facing one of the best gaalies in the college game in Eddie Mio. Everything points to a great, great playoff series. I just hope Williams Arena is filled to the top and our fans give us the support we need so badly to gain that home ice edge."

Brooks said Monday he will probably stay with the same lines used at North Dakota last weekend, but insert Rob Larson back into his swing position as the 5th Gopher defenseman. In goal it will either be senior Tom Mohr or junior Jeff Tscherne (CHUR-knee). Brooks said he would not make the latter decision until Wednesday.

MORE FROM **BROOKS** 

"I simply have to pay a special tribute to this year's varsity team," Brooks continued. "The 1975-76 team has already recorded the second ... highest number of wins in a single season (23) in Minnesota hockey history. They have had to overtome numerous handicaps to accompaish this. With only four seniors playing regularly, and considering the unbelievable number of injuries this squad has gone through, I think their accomplishments are outstanding. These men could have given up more than once, but they kept battling back and ended in third place. They should be recognized everywhere for an excellent season, regardless of what happens in the playoffs. I'm more than just a little proud to be their coach."

GOPHERS WITH LOSS AT PURDUE

Although the University of Minnesota dropped its season finale 94-67 in END SEASON overtime at Purdue last Saturday, Coach Jim Dutcher's cagers posted a winning record in 1975-76. The Gophers wound up with an overall mark of 16-10 and a Big Ten Conference log of 6-10. By virtue of those league efforts, Minnesota finished in 6th place just a shade behind Iowa which was 9-9. The Gophers lost twice to potent Indiana which won the title with an 10-0 record but split with second-place Michigan which had a 14-4 mark. Minnesota also divided honors with Nichigan State which was third thanks to a 10-3 record.

THOMPSON SCORES 35 IN LAST 175-176

Mike Thompson, Minnesota's premier sophomore center who was named to the All-Big Ten Conference first team a week ago, tallied 35 points against the Boilermakers on Saturday to give him a total of 647 on the season. Thompson earlier had broken the record of 597 set by Tom Kondla during the 1966-67 ASSIGNMENT campaign and added even more luster to his new UM single season scoring mark. His 1975-76 average was 25.3 per game.

WILLIAMS GTH PLACE

Ray Williams, talented junior forward-guard for the Gophers, moved into MOVES INTO eighth place on the UM's single season individual scoring list by notching 33 in that finale at Purdue. Williams finished the campaign with 497 points. . .good for an average of 19.3 per assignment.

RECORDS FALL ON TEAM & LEVELS

It was a record breaking year in basketball at the University of Minnesota. Mike Thompson, in addition to setting that new single season scoring mark, also established a new standard for most field goals made. He tallied 254 INDIVIDUAL to top Tom Kondla's mark of 232 set in 1966-67. Thompson also set a new record for best field goal percentage as he hit 264 of 461 attempts for .572 and in the process surpass Ron Johnson's record of .530 set in 1959-60. As a team, the 1975-76 Gophers set new marks for best field goal percentage (350 of 1372 for .508), most field goals made (350) and most points in a single season (2063). The old standards were .470 in 1974-75, 795 in 1964-65, and 2012 in 1972-73. (MORE)

IN OVERTIME GAMES

CAGERS 1-2 When the Gophers dropped that 94-67 overtime loss at Purdue last Saturday, it marked the second time this season that the Boilermakers had copped extra-session verdicts from Minnesota. In the Big Ten opener last January, Purdue scored a 111-110 double overtime win at Williams Arena. In Minnesota's only other overtime game this season, the Gophers triumphed 77-73 at home in non-conference play against Marquette.

DUTCHER'S RECORD REMAINS

Coach Jim Dutcher came to Minnesota last fall with a reputation of being a winner and brought with him a winning record to prove it. By finishing with a 16-10 mark in his first campaign as the Gophers' boss, Dutcher upped IMPRESSIVE his career record as a head coach at the college level to 247 wins against only 130 setbacks. That's a .655 winning percentage.

COACH **PLEASED** WITH

CAMPAIGN

Minnesota was picked to finish minth in the conference this year, and as Coach Jim Dutcher looked back on the season, he admitted that he was pleased with the way his club finished. "I had no idea what would happen before the season started," he said. "There were a lot of quesion marks, but we were in every game this year except when we got beat at Michigan. The rest of them, including both games against Indiana, we were in them and even leading. Yes, I'd have to say we've done well."

FUTURE COULD BE UM CAGERS

Despite the cloud of pending NCAA sanctions against the University of Minnesota, Coach Dutcher feels the Gophers could have a bright future in BRIGHT FOR basketball. Michael Thompson, Dave Winey and Phil Saunders will combine with Osborne Lockhart and Ray Williams to give the Gophers a solid nucleus for the 1975-77 campaign. And if Dutcher is able to recruit the players he wants, Minnesota could be ranked with Michigan and Purdue as possible Big Ten title threats next season.

ERICKSEN SEES BIG TEN MEET

"Despite our last place finish, I can't help but be optimistic about next season," commented swim coach Bud Ericksen. "Most of our points were PROMISE AT scored by underclassmen who will only get better. In a meet like this one or two people can really make the difference. We were better overall than some of the teams which came in ahead of us, but they had the hotter individuals. Herb Schoening set a new varsity record in the 500 free at 4:46.02, and his brother Mark did the same in the 400 IM with a time of 4:15.76. I look for big things from both of them in the future."

TRACKMEN FINISH 9th IN LEAGUE MEET

"Although we didn't do well as a team, we had some fine individual performances," said track mentor Roy Griak. "Jeff Wujek put the shot 56'2, a personal high for him and good enough for a second place finish. Dave Gaither, Vibert Forsythe, Steve Plasencia and Glen Bullick also paced. The whole team is steadily improving. . . I think the outdoor meet will reflect that improvement."

#### GOPHERS TO NCAA HOCKEY TOURNAMENT 3RD STRAIGHT YEAR

from the University of Minnesota, Minneapolis, Minnesota 55455

Minneapolis--After surviving one of the most emotionally draining WCHA playoff series ever witnessed by Gopher fans, the Minnesota hockey team has earned the right to compete in a third consecutive NCAA tournament. Minnesota was invited to compete at Denver University March 25-26-27 for the national title. The Gophers play Boston University Friday, March 26, a day after regular season WCHA champion Michigan Tech takes on Brown University in the opening tourney match. The finals are set for Saturday, March 27.

Minnesota clawed its way to Denver by sweeping playoff series against Colorado College (7-4 and 5-1) at home, then taking the dramatic series at Michigan State. The Gophers and Spartans tied 2-2 in the first outing, then went deep into a third overtime Sunday afternoon before winning 7-6 on a dramatic goal by captain Pat Phipper

It was a thoroughly drained Gopher team that returned home Sunday evening, then sweated out two days of decision by the NCAA selection committee concerning another game to earn the right to qualify. But the decision selecting Minnesota came Tuesday and there was elation in the Gopher camp.

Next week's trip West marks the fourth time in the last six years Minnesota has been invited to the national tournament. In 1974 coach Herb Brooks, then in his second season at UM, took his squad all the way to Minnesota's first national hockey championship. Then last season after winning the regular season WCHA crown, the Gophers lost in the NCAA final. Maybe this year it's Minnesota's turn again.

In '74 Minnesota defeated Michigan Tech 4-2 at Boston in the championship game. Last March at St. Louis, Tech repaid the favor winning 6-1. The Huskies are heavily favored to take all the marbles again this year, but you can't convince Minnesota of that. However, the Gophers go up against the number one power in the East this season in the Boston University Terriers in the fist game. That, by itself, is challenge enough for any team.

But whatever the results in Denver, Minnesota has already accomplished more than expected. Beset by a stack of injuries to key players, the Gophers struggled but never quit. The injuries combined with so many rookie players in the lineup led to a mass juggling of lines and defensive combinations by coach Brooks. This caused a certain amount of inconsistency in Gopher play leading to a split of 10 regular season WCHA series.

However, this year's Gopher sextet has already won the second highest number of games in a single season in Minnesota hockey history. Only last year's team which rang up a 31-10-1 record has won more.

The Gophers finished regular season play with 18-13-1 WCHA record good for third place. The all-game mark now stands at 26-14-2.

No one player, in fact no one line, carried UM this season. Game after game a new player came to the front with sparkling performances. It may sound old and tired, but it comes out the way Brooks coaches. . .a team effort.

COACH "Each national tournament is unique by itself, a new thrill," says Gopher BROOKS ice coach Herb Brooks. 'We are far from being, in a sense, so sophisticated that we are not excited just because this is our third straight trip. ON GO PHERS Remember, about 10 members of this year's varsity have never been to an AT NCAA NCAA tournament, so for them it's a first time of magic. Really, it's a magic time for all of us. You can't really measure the full emotional impact, except to know it runs high through every one of us. You also can't fully measure the impact something this big has on our program and all amateur hockey in Minnesota. We are just proud to be representing our great University and State at the very top of all college hockey. We'll give it our full shot, too."

BROOKS "It's hard at this time for me to offer any opinions on either our first ON round opponent, Boston University, or Brown University as we have not seen OPPONENTSeither team play this season," says Brooks. "But I do know two things: that both eastern teams are strong and talented or they wouldn't be there and that Michigan Tech is the number one team in the nation. They walked through the WCHA and any time you win that championship you have to have it all together. But playing a team we haven't seen presents difficult problems, particularly for our defense. What it really comes down to is who owns the hot hand on two given nights. Any of the four teams could win it all. Two years ago it was our turn. Last year we were nailed in the finals by Michigan Tech. What happens this time around, well, who knows. again be a whale of a tournament, that's for certain. I know our men will be emotionally and psychologically ready, but not totally set physically. We still have several men hurting badly with a wide assortment of injuries. I hope the rest will help heal those hurts. I also hope their coach can last through one more weekend of action. Whatever, we'll be in Denver next week ready to play. Count on that."

GOPHER The official UM party leaves Wednesday (March 24) morning for Denver and will be quartered at the Writers Manor in the Mile High City. Following the tournament the team returns to the Twin Cities via Western Air Lines arriving at 2:30 p.m. Sunday, March 26.

Each of the three had an outstanding season for the Gophers. Johnson wrestled his way to a 35-3-0 mark and was Big Ten runnerup. He was an East All-Star and was ranked #1 in his weight class through most of the season. McArthur also had a fine season posting a 32-1-0 log in dual meets. Mike was Conference Champion and also an East All-Star. Though injured early in the season, Zilverberg worked himself

## BASEBALL SQUAD HEADS FOR TEXAS

Minneapolis--The University of Minnesota baseball team will head for Texas

Saturday to begin its annual spring trip meeting four schools in 14 games covering a

one week permed.

Dick "Chief" Siebert, epening his 20th exemption as head couch of the Minnesota Gophers, will send his squad against Texas Lytheran in two games Sunday, March 21.

The Cophers then play doubleheaders against the University of Texas Monday and Tuesday March 22-23, Texas A & M Wednesday and Thursday, March 24-25, and Sam Houston State March 26-27.

Minnesota then returns home to play its home openers April 2 and 3 at Bierman Field against three schools: single meetings with Augsburg, St. Thomas, and two games against St. Olaf. The Big Ten opener is April 16 against Michigan here.

Siebert said Monday he will carry a 23-man roster to Texas headed by senior co-captains Bobby Bolf (Keewatin) and Steve Comer (Excelsior). Bolf is a third baseman, Comer a pitcher.

"I believe we had a very fine indoor program and are right at the point where we should be," Siebert says. "All our pitching candidates have sound arms and the team as a whole appears in top condition. These men have worked hard and are ready for some outdoor competition.

"There have been a few pleasant surprises during winter drills, too. Junior Jeff Neutzling (Albany) who hit so well for us as a freshman seems to be making solid contact again, and the hitting of second baseman Ken Mauer (St. Paul Harding) also appears much stronger.

"A freshman pitcher, Gerald Ujdur (YOU-jur) (Duluth), has also been a surprise. He could be a real comer this ceasen. There have been other players who have also looked pretty good, but these three may have been the biggest surprises."

OUTLOOK - OFFENSE -- "This is a team where we first must have good weather to improve and become a solid unit," Siebert continued. "Last season proved that when once we got outdoors with good weather, our 1975 club really took off. But by then it was too late.

"I consider this year's club to have average power, speed and overall hitting potential. However, I base this estimate on the fact that we have several players of unproven quality. We simply don't know what they'll do under game conditions.

"As for improvement, we expect to see a lot of it in several areas. Right fielder Jeff Kendall (Richfield) has to produce much more with his power hitting, plus several others are also expected to hit for better averages with some increase in power.

"One thing I am certain of is the performance of Paul Molitor (St. Paul Cretin). As a freshman he became possibly the most exciting player to ever don a Minnesota uniform. As a sophomore I honestly believe he can become one of the most, if not THE most, exciting college baseball player in the nation.

"He can do it all, and with a flair. He has speed, power, a strong arm and hits the ball all over the place. Although he has been moved from second base to short-stop, I believe he will handle his new spot effectively. He has all the tools to become a great one."

DEFENSE -- "The left side of our infield looks sound with Bolf at third and Molitor at short. The right side is still questionable with several players in the running at second base and first base. The outfield appears good with three lettermen returning. It may not be the strongest group I have ever had defensively out there, but I believe they can more than get the job done.

The catching appears adaquate to good. Junior Mike Bruss (Bloomington-Richfield) has the inside track right now, but the position is far from set."

PITCHING: -- "This should be the strong point of our team," says Siebert. "We have three returning starters in Comer, junior Perry Bauer (Red Wing) and sophomore submariner Dan Morgan (Superior, Wis.). The fourth spot is still wide, wide open with about five men in the battle.

"However, if we can come up with a solid fourth starter and receive consistent performance from the top three, we will be all right in pitching this season.

"As for relief pitching, I believe we are deep enough where we can call on one of several men to step in and become a stopper. At least I hope we can do that. But overall I'm pretty sure pitching will be OK."

#### GOPHERS WIN 2ND NCAA ICE CROWN IN 3 YEARS

from the University of Minnesota, Minneapolis, Minnesota 55455

Minneapolis--"There are so many emotional highs in the career of a coach that it's hard to place one above the other, but I have to believe what our 1975-76 Minnesota hockey team accomplished rates alongside anything I have experienced in all my association with the game," says Gopher head coach Herb Brooks.

Last weekend in Denver, Colorado, Minnesota took Boston University, called the "best ever in the East", 4-2 in the first round and came back to defeat old-time nemisis Michigan Tech 6-4 in the finals to win its second NCAA hockey championship in the past three years.

Not only was Minnesota considered the underdog in both games, to many it was a genuine surprise the Gophers even made it to the final four.

A season filled with crippling injuries that sidelined one starter after another, coupled with 10 new faces on the club led to periods of inconsistent results.

However, determined, gutsy play by every man on the squad and some unbelievable juggling of lines and defense combinations by Brooks led the Gophers to a third place finish in the WCHA.

Then came a pair of playoff struggles against Colorado College and Michigan State, the latter one of the most dramatic series ever seen by Minnesota fans via television from East Lansing.

The Gophers took C.C. 7-4 and 5-1 before edging Michigan State 7-6 in three overtimes following a 2-2 standoff in the first game. Both series were run under a two game, total goal format.

In the first game at Denver UM fell behind 2-1 as the Terriers scored a pair of power play tallies in the second period to overcome a 1-0 deficit. But the third period belonged to Minnesota as first Tom Vannelli tied the score, then Mark Lambert won it and Tom Younghans put it away with three straight Gopher goals.

The next night saw Minnesota fall behind 3-0 in the first 11 minutes and the Huskies appeared intent on repeating its 6-1 decision in the NCAA final at St. Louis in 1975.

But back stormed UM with four straight goals by Vannelli, Joe Micheletti, Bill Baker and Tom Gorence before Tech scored again and the teams were tied 4-4 after two periods.

The final session saw Minnesota checking closer and closer until the big break came. Vannelli dug out the puck and captain Pat Phippen powered in a shot from the left side and Minnesota was on top to stay.

That marked the third straight series in which Phippen scored the eventual winning goal for the Gophers.

Warren Miller added an open net score in the final 30 seconds to seal the verdict and give Minnesota its second national ice championship ever.

#### STARS APLENTY

Junior center Tom Vannelli was accorded the highest honor of the tournament when media representatives covering the tourney named him most valuable player of the 1976 NCAA Championships. Vannelli scored seven points in the two games, two goals and five assists, with five points (1-4) coming in the title match.

The entire Gopher defense and forward line combinations also shined limiting opponents to few good shots on goal.

And the play in goal was also something else. Senior Tom Mohr, who did not see any action his first three years at Minnesota, won the Friday battle against Boston University, then came back for the last two periods Saturday after starter Jeff Tscherne was forced from the game by illness.

Tech was held to three shots on goal in the second period of the title game while the Gophers were storming back. It led one MTU official to say he had never seen a Michigan Tech team get closed down so completely on offense for two periods.

Minnesota's checking game by all hands was at its peak.

#### WCHA HONORS

Prior to the national tournament it was learned that sophomore defenseman Reed Larson had been named Minnesota's lone representative on the official All-WCHA first team as tabulated by the Denver Post.

Receiving honorable mention from the voters were goalie Jeff Tscherne, defensemen Joe Micheletti, Bill Baker and Russ Anderson, plus forwards Warren Miller and Tom Vannelli.

#### RECORDS & WRAPUP

For the entire season Minnesota finished with a record of 28 wins, the second highest ever recorded at UM only to the 31 victories rung up last year, against 14 losses and two ties. In the WCHA the Gophers posted an 13-13-1 mark.

New team records set this season include the most games played (44), most goals scored (190), most assists (307), most total points (497), most penalties (4-1), and most penalty minutes (929).

Mohr and Tscherne posted the best goals allowed average in the WCHA, 3.0 and 3.5, respectively, but Tscherne was accorded top honors as Mohr did not play in at least half the league games. Mohr made seven WCHA appearances while Tscherne played in 23.7 games.

Vannelli captured the 1975-76 team scoring honors with 69 points on 26 goals and 43 assists for the third highest point total ever in a single season in UM hockey history. The record is 30 points scored by John Mayasich in 1954-55.

Vannelli's 43 assists is the second best ever in a Minnesota season to the 49 scored by Mayasich in 1953-54. Tommy's career point total now stands at 124 in 102 games on 43 goals and 31 assists.

Reed Larson's 29 assists ties him with Lou Nanne for the most helpers ever recorded by a defenseman in a single season. Nanne racked up his total in 1962-63. Larson added 13 goals for 42 season points, one shy of Nanne's school record when he won the 1962-63 WCHA scoring title.

Captain Phippen ended his career with 131 points on 46 goals and 85 assists in 126 games. The assist total ranks in a tie with all-American defenseman Les Auge (1971-75) as the third highest in UM history.

Miller, with 26 goals this season, same as Vannelli, ended his career with 129 points on 56 goals and 71 assists. His goal output is the fourth best ever for career totals at UM.

Defenseman Russ Anderson also set a pair of records: most penalties (52) and most penalty minutes (111) for one year.

All in all it was a season of mixed results and emotions. Highs and lows were weekly happenings. But when the chips were down, Minnesota's 1975-76 varsity let out the shaft and won it all down the stretch.

In four seasons coach Brooks has seen his teams win two NCAA championships, finish second another year, and win the coveted MacNaughton Cup, symbol of supremacy in the WCHA, once. His career coaching record, all at UM, now stands at 96 wins, 52 losses and 12 ties in 160 games for a winning mark of .638 percent. ---twg---

BASEBALL TEAM OPENS HOME

SEASON

After completing his most successful spring trip to Texas in his 29 years as head baseball coach at Minnesota, Dick "Chief" Siebert sends his 1976 Gopher squad onto Bierman Field Friday and Saturday for the home openers. Minnesota plays single games Friday against Augsburg and St. Thomas beginning at 2 p.m. On Saturday the Gophers host St. Olaf in two games starting at 1 p.m.

UM 8-3 ON TEXAS TOUR

The Gophers posted an amazing 8-3 record against four Texas opponents with the highlight coming when Minnesota took three of four from defending national champion Texas University. Minnesota split additional series with Texas Lutheran, Texas A & M and Sam Houston State. Siebert calls it the most successful, yet most puzzling trip he has experienced in his long Gopher career.

INJURIES MOUNT UP "It's hard for me to understand why we had so many key injuries on this year's spring trip," says Sibert. "We spent five weeks indoors in rigorous training that included plenty of stretching, running and full body exercising. Plenty of controlled throwing was included, too. But it seems we had a different player go down in just about every game. Pitchers Perry Bauer (elbow) and Dan Morgan (back) are out for an undetermined period. Add to that a knee injury suffered by outfielder Jeff Kendall which will sideline him for some time, shoulder and back hurts to our leading hitters, Paul Molitor and Bobby Bolf, a groin pull to outfielder Tom Mee and an ankle turn to both shortstop Bill Deblon and first baseman Brian Denman and you can see why I'm suddenly concerned about the well being of this ball club."

TEXAS TRIP

SIEBERT ON "Overall it was a great production as far as the won-lost column goes. We hit the ball very well, much better than our opposition, but at the same time our baserunning and overall execution on defense was not up to what was expected. We simply did not execute the way we practiced. Maybe it's because it's still early in the year. At least I hope that's the

pitched. He allowed just eight hits and struck out 10. Morgan also pitched well during the five innings worked before he hurt his back by pulling a muscle. Bauer also turned in a good performance for five innings before his elbow began giving him trouble. "On offense Molitor and Bauer really stroked the ball and batted .429 and .415, respectively. Molitor drove in 10 runs while Bolf knocked in 14 with four home runs. But remember, people had to get on base for this pair to drive them in, so we must have had some other hitting well, too."

PITCHERS FOR THIS WEEKEND Siebert said this week he will use co-captain Steve Comer and Chuck Viskocil on the mound Friday, and come back with possibly Morgan in the first game Saturday if his pulled back muscle responds, plus freshman Gary Ujdur (YOU-jur) who has shown signs of becoming an important factor in Minnesota's plans this spring.

#### GOPHERS UPSET MICHIGAN FOR CONFERENCE GYM CROWN

The 1976 Big Ten Gymnastics Championships held this past weekend at E. Lansing were expected by many to be a re-run of last year's meet, when Michigan withstood strong challenges from Minnesota and Illinois to capture the crown. Someone must have forgotten to furnish the Gophers with a script, as they went on to defeat the defending champs 220.45 to 218.05. Minnesota last won the championship in 1948.

Leading the Gophers were Tim and Jeff LaFleur, who garnered first and second in the All-Around competition. Jeff also won an individual title on the parallel bars. Other individual titlists included Mike Wilbur (rings) and Dan Jarosch (horse). All qualified for the NCAA Tourney this weekend in Philadelphia.

"They were a determined bunch," said a happy Fred Roethlisberger. "The concentration was tremendous. In gymnastics scoring, the third and fourth guys are as important as the top finishers. A good routine by everyone is needed in a tough meet such as the Big Ten. I knew we'd get high scores from our 'big guns', but it was up to guys like Shawn Hayth, Jeff Stockwell and Jim McHattie to put as over the top. A coach can't help but be satisfied when everyone comes through the way they did."

Tim LaFleur sprained a knee in his last routine of the competition and is doubtful for the NCAA meet. If he can compete, the Gopher contingent should be in a strong position for national honors.

#### NOYCE PLEASED WITH SPRING TRIP

"I could see genuine improvement from our first match to our last," observed tennis mentor Jerry Noyce. "That's what the spring trip is all about. . .improvement!" The squad split four matches, but the most telling score was a 6-3 decision over Ohio State. "State is a fine team. . . I was pleased to do well against them. I hope that match is an indication of how well we'll do against the rest of the conference."

"Mark Nammacher won three out of four for us," said the coach. "He's going to be a great player before he leaves Minnesota. And Bob Amis played as well as I expected. He has yet to lose a dual match."

Only twice in coach Dick "Chief" Siebert's 26 previous seasons at Minnesota have any of his teams won 12 of their first 15 games matching the record posted by his 1976 club. In both 1958 and 1959 Minnesota was 12-3 at this point en route to a Big Ten championship. However, both those teams were quickly eliminated in the NCAA District IV playoffs. It is clear, however, that the 3-3 record posted during the swing through Texas this year is the best ever by a Siebert-coached UM team.

4 AT IOWA ST. SAT-SUN

With six non-conference games remaining before the Big Ten opening weekend against Michigan and Michigan State here April 16-17, the Gophers "could" go into league play with some kind of mark. It all begins this weekend when Minnesota plays double headers Saturday and Sunday at Ames, Iowa against Iowa State. The biggest problem with this series is getting the games in. Approximately the last 12 consecutive meetings have either been rained out or snowed out. The Cyclones, going into games earlier this week, were 11-15 and included opponents in Hawaii and some rugged Southwest Conference powers. "Although our series record stands at 33-6 against Iowa State," says Siebert. "I know little if anything about their 1976 club. Except that they are traditionally strong and will give us all we want."

INJURIES CONTINUE TO MOUNT AT UM Siebert's biggest problem about this weekend is who will be in the pitching rotation. Certain starters include senior co-captain Steve Comer and sophomore submariner Dan Morgan. Freshman Jerry Ujdur (YOU-jur) will get another shot, but the fourth slot is up for grabs. Junior Chuck Viscocil may miss the trip with a sprained ankle, while junior Perry Bauer is still coming off a sore elbow and may not go, either. In addition, catcher Tom Jagiela (ja-GEE-la) is down with strep throat, outfielder Jeff Kendall slowed by a bad knee, and several other players hampered by either sore arms or an assortment of pulled muscles.

"I've never seen so many injuries hit one of my teams," says Siebert.
"What makes it worse is that we worked harder on winter conditioning than ever before."

MOLITOR, BOLF STILL ON HOT BAT PACE

Sophomore shortstop Paul Molitor and senior co-captain and second baseman Bobby Bolf continue to lead the Gopher attack at the plate with .444 and .412 batting averages, respectively. Each has delivered key hits through the first 15 games and have also become a solid defensive combination. Another player coming to the front fast is senior outfielder Mike Shultz who is now hitting .341. Shultz leads UM with five doubles while Bolf is tops in home runs with four and runs batted in with 19.

In the pitching department Viscocil and Morgan lead the mounds corps with 3-0 and 2-0 records. Viskocil owns a stingy 0.43 earned runs average while Morgan is next at 1.59. What's amazing for Viskocil, who transfered to UM from St. Johns College two years ago, is that he has completed all three of his starts this early in the season. The Gopher staff owns a combined 3.15 ERA against a 6.44 mark for opposing hurlers.

WINONA ST. HERE FOR 2

Following the weekend games at Iowa State Minnesota returns to Bierman Field for a pair of games against Winona State Tuesday, April 13 as a final tuneup prior to the Big Ten openers with Michigan and Michigan State here that weekend, April 16-17.

GYMNASTS PLACE 5TH AT NCAA TOURNEY Minnesota's gymnastics squad followed up their Big Ten Champion-ship with a strong showing at the NCAA Championships in Philadelphi. Despite the loss of Tim LaFleur (leg injury), the Gophers had excellent performances by Jeff LaFleur (3rd on parallel bars), Mike Wilbur (7th on rings) and Dan Jarosch (7th on pommel horse).

Coach Fred Roethlisberger was pleased by his charges success. "I knew we'd have a good showing after beating Michigan in the Big Ten," said the coach. "We peaked at the right time. It's too bad Tim couldn't compete ... he might have been the difference for an even better finish in the team standings.

GOPHER RUNNERS SET NEW MARKS IN TEXAS RELAYS It's said things are done in a big way in Texas. The Gopher track contingent at the Texas Relays did just that as they broke two UM records. Four Mile Relay runners Dave Johnson, Al Tappe, Larry Berkner and Steve Plasencia set a new mark of 16:39.5, besting the old time by .3 of a second. The Distance Medley team of Berkner, Plasencia, Andy Bunge and Tom Wichelman turned in a 9:50.3 performance to shatter the old standard by 1.9 seconds.

Minnesota Coach Roy Griak was understandably pleased by the squad's record setting performance. "They came through very well," commented Griak. "Plasencia's split (4:05.5) was especially good ... he's one heck of a runner. John Bohan also had had a fine meet in the High Jump. His 6-9 leap qualified him for the finals."

The Gophers travel to Evanston Saturday for a dual meet with Northwestern.

"We seem to get better with each passing week." said tennis mentor Jerry Noyce. "Some of the younger players are coming along well, and that's made a big difference for us. A BIG GOLD Nebraska in football, U of Louisville in basketball, and the Cincinnati Reds in pro baseball are billed individually as "Big Red Machines". The question now is, has Minnesota's Dick "Chief" Siebert built himself a "Big Gold Machine" in his 1976 Gopher baseball team? The answer to that question comes this weekend when Minnesota plays host to a pair of annual Big Ten powers. . . Michigan at 1 p.m. Friday and Michigan State at noon Saturday. Doubleheaders are scheduled both days. Minnesota goes into its conference openers with an amazing 16-3 record, the best start ever for a Siebert-coached Gopher nine. . . and that accounts for 29 straight years.

(EDITORS NOTE: UM played Winona State today, Tuesday 4/13, when this was written, so please update UM's record accordingly, and also that of Michigan and MSU).

Michigan which played two against powerful Western Michigan Tuesday, had an 3-6-1 record and is living mainly on the strength of two strong starting pitchers and a good hitting attack. Michigan State went down to a rugged spring schedule which included six losses to the U. of Miami and carried a surprising 4-15-1 mark into games Tuesday against Albion. State has been the victim of some wild pitching. But knowing the rivalries coming up Friday and Saturday at Bierman Field, expect four close, hard fought games, possibly the best college baseball of the season seen in this area.

BOLF MOVES TO THE TOP IN ISU **SERIES** 

Co-captain and second baseman Bobby Bolf enjoyed, along with his teammates, a highly productive weekend at Iowa State when the Cophers scored 51 runs in sweeping four straight (8-0), 12-6, 8-5, 23-4). Bolf now leads all UM hitters with a blistering .433 average. However, two more players, outfielder Mike Schultz and catcher Tom Jagiela (ja-GEE-la) moved up fast and are now hitting .386 and .385, respectively. As a team Minnesota is batting a healthy .306 while its opponents are only Litting .235. The latter points to some strong pitching by the Gopher mound corps.

MOUND CORPS A BIT

Even though the word is still out on pitcher Perry Bauer's tender elbow, the rest of the Minnesota pitching staff is coming around and getting healthier. A decision as to whether Bauer may have to sit out the entire HEALTHIER season may come this week because of a possible bone spur on his left elbow If that's the case, then Siebert will have to reach into an apparently strong group and come up with a fourth starter to join senior co-captain Steve Comer, junior Chuck Viskocil and sophomore Dan Morgan. The next man up could be freshman Jerry Ujdur (YOU-jur) who last weekend won his second game of the season. Viskocil leads the gang with a perfect 4-0 record and a strong 0.96 earned run average (ERA). Records and ERA's for the other three read: Comer (3-1, 3.24), Morgan (3-0, 3.31), and Ujdur (2-0, 3.18). Bauer has only pitched seven innings this season but has a 1-0 record and a 2.57 ERA. Comer and Morgan are expected to face Michigan Friday, with possibly Ujdur joining Viskocil against State Saturday. Michigan is the defending Big Ten champion while State finished fourth in 1975.

SIEBERT ON COMING SERIES

"There is little question we cannot remain a challenger for championship honors without scoring more runs than we have," comments Siebert now in his 29th year as boss of the Gopher diamond program. "Oh, it's not that our men aren't trying or that they don't have the potential at the plate, but maybe they were trying a little too hard to impress a pair of fine home crowds (1,600, 1,225). I believe we'll see a higher run production, but we'll still have to receive the same kind of steady pitching to stay alive. Both Purdue and Illinois are off to good starts and will be primed to knock us off. I expect we will face their very best pitchers, but that's nothing new. At the same time we can't afford to lose many more games and stay in the race. This could be a pivital weekend for our hopes in the 1976 race. Advance three-day passes are on sale at Bierman Building ticket offices for \$4 to the general public and \$1.50 for students. Daily tickets will be sold only at the Northwest Tennis and Swim Club at \$2 public and 75 cents students.

AMIS AMONG TOP SEEDS Junior ace Bob Amis of Minnesota will gain either the number one, two or three seed when the pairings are made Thursday evening. Amis, Francis Gonzalez of Ohio State and Eric Friedler of Michigan own identical 6-1 records in Big Ten competition as number one singles players. A coin toss will be made to determine the seeds. Amis defeated Gonzalez but lost to Friedler, while Gonzalez defeated Friedler. Gonzalez is the defending Big Ten singles champion.

Amis and teammate Mark Brandenberg, a sophomore, will be seeded second in doubles behind Michigan's Friedler and Jeff Etterbeek. Amis and Brandenberg are 8-1 with their only Big Ten loss coming at the hands of the Michigan pair.

COACH NOYCE ON THE CHAMP MEET "For the first time in many seasons the Big Ten meet has been thrown wide open," says Minnesota coach Jerry Noyce, host for the championship session. "Michigan has dropped two dual meets to Illinois (5-4) and Ohio State (7-2) in the last two weeks. So it now appears that for the first time in nine years Michigan could be dethroned. The last time Michigan lost the Big Ten championship was in 1967 when Michigan State took the title at East Lansing. Now don't get me wrong. . Michigan, along with Ohio State, is still favored. But the Buckeyes appear very strong, plus Illinois, Wisconsin and ourselves may have quite a bit to say about who finishes on top, too. I personally believe this field may be the Big Ten's strongest in the last ten years. Minnesota tennis fans are in for some kind of treat when it comes to viewing top flight play. We are expecting excellent crowds and have made arrangements for additional seating areas by installing bleachers at the courts.""

BSB TEAM SWEEPS FOUR BACK TO BIG TEN

After sweeping four games out of the conference at home against Augsburg (2-0, 10-0) and Wisconsin-LaCrosse (6-3, 6-3) the University of Minnesota baseball team heads back to Big Ten play this weekend. The Gophers travel to Indiana Saturday, May 15, and Ohio State Sunday, May 16, for doubleheaders both days. Now 7-5 in conference play, and 31-8 overall, hopes of catching the leader, Michigan (7-2), appear remote. However, the Gophers hold their fate in their own hands in terms of a second place finish (and maybe higher should Michigan falter). Iowa, now in second place with an 3-4 record, plays here May 22 in the season final, while Ohio State is one notch behind the Gophers at 5-5 in the Big Ten. The Gophers call all but clinch second place by winning its final six league outings. But that's a mighty tall order.

SIEBERT ON THE GOPHER CHANCES

"Asking any team in baseball to win its final six games is bad enough," says veteran Gopher baseball coach Dick Siebert, "but it's twice as bad when four of the games are on the road and two double headers are against contending teams. But we have faced similar situations before and somehow come through. I'm not making any predictions or putting any additional pressure on our men. I'll simply say we'll show up and give it our best shot. We are healthy and coming off four good wins. Maybe momentum means something, maybe not. But we're not going into any contest thinking we can't win. This is a darned good Minnesota team. We have lost some peculiar games, all by close margins. Maybe it's our turn to win some of those tight ones likes the ones that got away. Michigan should somehow falter, which I doubt, there are four or five of us who could come on like mad the last weekend. It's another great Big Ten race."

COULD MEAN POST SEASON PLAY

SECOND PLACE Beginning last year the NCAA changed its baseball format to the same styl used in basketball. That means there is a very good chance the second place finisher in the Big Ten could gain an invitation to a district tournament in hopes of winning its way to the national finals at Omaha, Nebraska in June. Last year Michigan won the conference title and was an automatic representative to District IV. Then Iowa was selected to play in District V as the Big Ten runner-up. So a second place finish could mean a lot to the Gophers.

MOLITOR, BOLF, DENMAN HOT HITTERS Paul Molitor, Bobby Bolf and Brian Denman carried the heavy bats for Minnesota last weekend. Molitor cracked two home runs giving him eight on the season, tops for the Gophers. Bolf ran his season RBI total to 42 which is just six shy of the record 48 set by Mike Walseth in 1969. Bolf has six games remaining (not counting the possibility of post season play) to try and shatter the school standard. Denman continued his slugging, too, by knocking in five runs on six hits including his seventh homer of the season. Mike Bruss added a lusty clout against LaCrosse, a grand slam homer to complete an eight-run inning Sunday. (9-2) and Dan Morgan (8-2), leading Gopher hurlers, took the wins Sunday while freshman Jerry Ujdur (5-0) threw a one-hitter vs. Augsburg before Chuck Viskocil (5-2) handled a five hit shutout in the nightcap. four should get the starting nods for the Indiana and Ohio State games.

ENTER BIG TEN MEET

THINCLADS TO Coach Roy Griak will take his University of Minnesota thinclads to Champaign-Urbana, Ill., Friday and Saturday for the 1975 Big Ten outdoor track and field championships. "We'll be shooting for our best effort of the season," Griak said, "and if we can get that effort, both on an individual and team basis, then we have a shot at finishing in the first (MORE) division."

BULLICK RATES AS SOLID ENTRY FOR GOPHERS

Glenn Bullick, 1976 gopher track captain, ranks as Minnesota's best bet for a top finish in the Big Ten race for individual honors this spring. Bullick is the defending conference pole vault champ and will be shooting for his second straight individual title. Other threats for top honors are Steve Plasencia in the 5,000 meter event, Dave Gaither in the high hurdles, Ande Bunge in the intermediate hurdles, Tim Oliver in the six mile, Jeff Wujek in the shot put, John Bohan in the high jump and Vibert Forsythe in the triple jump.

BRUSS, BOLF, KENDALL, SCHULTZ LEAD 4-GAME SWEEP A set of hot bats led the Gophers to a sweep of four games last weekend at Indiana (4-3, 11-4) and Ohio State (5-0, 6-5). Junior third baseman Mike Bruss (Richfield) slammed out nine hits in 14 at bats, including two doubles and a home run, knocking in four runs. He raised his Big Ten average from .333 to .415, second only to soph shortstop Paul Molitor's (St. Paul) team leading .439 league mark. Senior designated hitter Jeff Kendall (Richfield) went five for eight and plated four runs with a double and a homer. His Big Ten bat mark went from .294 to .342. Senior right fielder Mike Schultz (Wells-Easton) was also hot getting six hits in 14 trips and also included a double and a homer for four RBI's. Senior co-captain and second baseman Bobby Bolf (Keewatin) drove in three runs to give him a season total of 45, just three shirt of the school record 48 knocked in by Mike Walseth in 1969. As a team Minnesota is hitting .309 in Big Ten competition.

COMER, MORGAN EACH GAIN WINS

Senior co-captain Steve Comer (Minnetonka) and sophomore Dan Morgan (Superior, Wis.), both right handed pitchers, continued their winning ways for the Gophers last weekend. Comer beat Indiana 4-3 allowing five hits, and then gained a save in relief Sunday in the 6-5 win at Ohio State. Morgan threw a four hits shutout against the Buckeyes winning the opener there 5-0. Comer is now 10-2 on the season, one win short of tying the school record of 11 wins by Joe Pollack in 1964, while Morgan is 9-2. This duo should gain the starting nods against Iowa Saturday.

IOWA LEADERS Iowa, with a 20-15 overall record going into a pair of games Wednesday (5/19) vs. Iowa State, brings some impressive team and individual statistics into Saturday's key double header. As a team the Hawkeyes are batting a healthy .272 led by first baseman Steve Stumpff at .380, with 27 runs batted in, and designated hitter Mike Narducci at .364. Narducci is hitting a torrid .455 in the Big Ten. Two of three Iowa pitchers are expected to gain the starting call Saturday. It will be either right handers Bob Stepp (6-3, 2.78 ERA) or Tom Steen (5-4, 4.25 ERA), or possibly lefty Craig Van Syoc (3-2, 3.89 ERA).

UM ONE AWAY FROM NEW RECORD

Should the Gophers pick up one victory Saturday in its two games vs. Iowa, the 1976 club will tie the all-time school win mark of 36 victories in a single season set when the 1969 UM squad posted a 36-12 mark. The latter record included three games in post season play.

SIEBERT ON THE GOPHERS "Last weekend our men really reacted well to win four at Indiana and Ohio State," says Gopher coach Dick Siebert. "They went down there to win four games and there was no way they would be denied. The team attitude was simply great. The players battled every inch of the way. This club has an awful lot of guts and determination, and I'm proud to be the coach.

"Now all we have to do is figure out how to win at home. One of the greatest things about this team is that we are 7-1 on the road in the Big Ten. That's some kind of accomplishment, brother. This is a mighty tough conference. But the big problem has been right here at Bierman Field. We are only 4-4 in Big Ten games. However, we have lost some awfully tough, close battles. Maybe some breaks will come our way Saturday. I hope they do because we need every break we can get. "I want to praise one man's performance last week: pitcher Dan Forsythe for his relief job Sunday at Ohio State. He came in when we were down 4-1 and held the Buckeyes at bay until we went ahead. He came in cold from the bullpen and did the job. He made the difference in our 6-5 win. Steve Comer mopped up in the last inning, but I have to salute the job done by Forsythe. It was an excellent contribution."

"It was a super show," Stoll said of the White team's 21-18 victory over the Gold. "We were pleased with the fan turnout and reaction, and we hope to take a spring scrimmage out of the Twin Cities again next year."

NO LINEUP CHANGES PLANNED No changes are anticipated in the makeup of the two squads for Saturday's finale at Memorial Stadium. Gopher coaches "drafted" players for the Rochester event, and Stoll did not expect to "make any trades" at this stage of the game.

DUNGY LEADS WHITE TEAM If Saturday is a repeat from a week ago, Tony Dungy will lead the White squad and Bubby Holmes will be the pace setter for the Golds. Although Dungy hit only three passes for 31 yards, one of them went to Jeff Anhorn for a touchdown. Minnesota's All-America quarterback candidate also rushed seven times for 33 yards and scored on five and two yard efforts. "I'm more impressed with Dungy every time I see him," Stoll said. "He's an outstanding quarterback." Holmes did the same kind of thing for the Golds. He carried 19 times for 116 yards and scored once on a 24-yard scamper.

BREAULT DRAWS RAVES Other offensive standouts at Rochester were Steve Breault of the whites who rushed for 64 yards in 16 carries and Kent Kitzmann who delighted home town fans with 40 yards in eight rushes. Wendell Avery and Marc Trestman continued their heated battle for the number two quarterback spot while sharing signal calling for the gold team. Avery hit four of nine passing attempts for 110 yards. . . one a 44 yarder to Mike Jones. All of those gridders again will be on display this weekend at Memorial Stadium.

KICKING NEEDS MORE WORK Only one part of the scrimmage seemed to concern Stoll...the kicking game. "We didn't spend much time on it," Stoll analyzed, "and you get what you practice. But the kicking game was not good....from the center snap down. It all needs work." That seemed especially true on the PAT part of things, but Steve Tobin did record a couple of solid punts including one 54-yard boomer.

Minneapolis--After missing out on first place in the Big Ten baseball race by a few percentage points, the University of Minnesota will continue its season this weekend after accepting a post season bid to the NCAA playoffs.

Coach Dick "Chief" Siebert and his 1976 Gopher varsity head for Tempe, Arizona and the Rocky Mountain Regional on Thursday. Minnesota meets Memphis State in the opening tournament game Friday while number one ranked Arizona State, the host school, takes on Gonzaga University from Spokane, Washington in the second battle.

A double elimination format is scheduled with the eventual Regional winner qualifying for the College World Series June 11-18 at Omaha, Nebraska.

Minnesota carries an all-season record of 36-9 into post season play equalling the highest number of wins ever recorded by a Gopher team. The 1969 UM nine racked up a 36-12 mark, including post season play. The 36 wins in regular season is a new school record.

The final Big Ten log showed Minnesota second only to Michigan, a repeat conference titlist. The Gophers ended 12-6 (.667) while Michigan totaled 9 wins and four losses (.692). The Big Ten champion is decided each year by percentage points.

After an up and down season which saw Siebert's 29th edition of Gopher baseball get off to a blazing start with an 8-3 record in Texas during the spring trip, Minnesota can only look back on what could have been.

The Gophers split even in 10 home games during Big Ten action with the margin of runs in the five losses totaling seven. But on the road the Gophers recorded a hot 7-1 margin in wins.

"I can't remember when one of our better teams found so much trouble in winning at home," says Siebert. "But this is not a criticism.

"Our men battled every inch of the way and lost some awfully tough decisions at home. I'll not fault anyone for us not winning the Big Ten championship. . .unless I fault myself. Maybe I made a wrong decision here or there, but my players went all out to win.

"But there is one delicious part to our comingtrip. For the first time we are not the favorites going into either regional or NCAA championship play. Somebody else can carry the pressure this year.

"Our 1976 team earned the right to extra play. They never gave up when at times it looked like we were out of it. So now maybe we can go down to Arizona relaxed and have some fun.

"Oh, we are not about to concede anything to anyone, not even the number one team in the nation. But they have the burden to carry. Not us. There is no way this team of ours will stop battling, but at least now they can go in easy and let the hits fall where they may."

Sunday night coach Siebert was not certain he would accept the bid to play extra games because of the poor physical condition of his pitching staff. But after gathering all reports from his training staff, the Chief said let's give it a go. So it's on to Arizona Thursday for the Gophers. This trip marks the 11th time in Siebert's 29 years at the Gopher helm his teams have qualified for post season play.

Minnesota packed away its football gear this week after winding up spring drills with a festive intra-squad game at Memorial Stadium last Saturday. The White team, led by quarterback Tony Dungy, posted a 19-8 triumph in that finale to complete a sweep of this spring's two-game series. Dungy's contingent had eked out a 21-18 verdict a week earlier at Rochester.

Although Dungy completed five of eight passing attempts for 101 yards, including three for 55 to Ron Kullas, it was the ground game which drew most of the raves from Gopher fans last weekend. Steve Breault led the Whites with 62 yards while Sam Brady netted 54, Jim Perkins 46 and John Mathews 33. Ken Kitzman had 74 for the Maroon squad and he got help from Greg Barlow with 55, Bubby Holmes with 45 and Mike Laueson with 44.

STOLL PLEASED WITH SPRING SESSION Cal Stoll, who is anxiously looking forward to the start of his fifth season at Minnesota next fall, felt the Gophers had a good spring. "We got a lot of individual work done," he said, "and we were able to show a lot of things in the spring game. We were able to show some people who can throw and catch the ball, we were able to show some backs who can run, and we were able to show a defense that likes to hit. Dungy is the ace. . a whole lot of the offensive show. Breault and Kitzman are going to be good Big Ten backs. And George Adzick is the best strong safety in the Big Ten."

TWELVE GOPHERS MISS FINALE While the final grid show was impressive, Coach Stoll felt it could have been even more so if 12 gridders had not been sidelined. "We were missing a dozen pretty good football players," he said. "In fact five of them were starters. Their presence would have made a difference in that game." Among the sidelined were Greg Cardelli Steve Haney, John Jones, Mike Jones, Tom Luckemeyer, Mark Merrill, Steve Midboe, Tom Murphy, Greg Murtha, Kevin Naddy and George Washington. Stoll hopes to have all of them back in harness when the Gophers open fall practice in August.

DUTCHER COMPLETES CAGE

University of Minnesota basketball coach Jim Dutcher announced he has completed his recruiting for the 1976-77 season. Dutcher said that Tommy Lewis, a 6-foot-6 forward from Springfield, Mass. has signed a RECRUITING national letter of intent and will enroll at Minnesota next fall. Lewis graduated from Commerce high school in Springfield in 1974 and has spent the last two years working and playing amateur basketball. Coach Dutcher first saw Lewis play in the National Amateur tournament held this spring in St. Paul, Minn. Lewis was named to the all-tournament team and was called one of the outstanding all-around performers in the tournament. He was an all-state selection as a senior in high school.

DUTCHER ON "We are not only pleased that Tommy Lewis chose Minnesota, but also that LEWIS AND he has decided to begin his academic career after two years out of school; says Dutcher. "He is an exceptional leaper with great quickness and a good scoring touch. I believe he can step right in and help us next winter.

> "That gives us a forward, guard and center who have signed national letters of intent this spring. The others are 6-foot-11 center Kevin McHale from Hibbing, Minnesota, and 6-foot-2 guard Ricky Wallace who is also from Springfield, Mass. but attended Tech high school. They are both high school seniors this spring. In addition, three additional young men have also chosen Minnesota. Pat Foshi, a 6-foot-5 guard from Virginia, Minnesota, transferred here last December from Kentucky and will be eligible to play for us in January. John Retica, a senior at Hibbing high school and a teammate of McHale, is coming to our school on an Evans Golf Scholarship. Retica is a 6-foot-5 guard. The other is Steve Lingenfelter, a 6-foot-8 forward who played for the Bloomington Jefferson Minnesota state champions this winter. Steve elected to come to our school on his own without any scholarship aid, a point that makes all of us very, very proud."

Minnesota winner: Jeff LaFleur, gymnastics senior from Greenfield, Wisconsin. #### MOLITOR NAMED ALL-AMERICA

from the University of Minnesota, Minneapolis, Minnesota 55455

Minneapolis--Paul Molitor, Minnesota's "Super Soph", was named Wednesday as shortstop on the 1976 All-America first team in balloting by the American Association of College Baseball Coaches (AACBC).

"Molly", as he is better known to his teammates and Minnesota fans, becomes the seventh Golden Gopher star under head coach Richard "Chief" Siebert to receive first team All-America honors.

Earlier Minnesota selections include Gopher athletic director Paul Giel (1953), Jerry Thomas and Jerry Kindall (1956), the latter now head coach at Arizona University, Wayne Knapp (1960), Jon Andresen (1963) and Mike Walseth (1969). Giel was also a second team selection in 1952 and 1954.

Molitor completed a second sensational year for Minnesota this spring by setting four new school single season records. Included were most at bats (136), most runs scored (47), most hits (70) and most total bases (113).

In addition, Molitor led his teammates in home runs with 10, was second in doubles (7) and runs batted in (40), and tied for top honors with nine stolen bases.

Despite a pulled leg muscle suffered during the spring trip to Texas, Molitor played in all 49 games this season ending atop the list with a batting average of . 376.

He was a unanimous All-Big Ten first team selection when he batted .406 and led several offensive catagories in conference play.

In 1975, as a freshman second baseman, Molitor missed an All-Big Ten first team berth by just one vote. He batted .343 for UM that year.

His output was a key factor in Minnesota's '76 team setting a new school record with 38 wins while losing just 11, a second place finish in the Big Ten (12-6), and a trip to the NCAA Rockey Mountain Regional tournament.

At the latter Minnesota lost to host Arizona State University, the top ranked team in the nation.

In four games at the NCAA regional (the Gophers ended 2-2), Molitor batted .339 with seven hits in 13 trips, scored four runs, drove in another four and hit two home runs.

#### Molitor - 2

In two seasons at Minnesota Molitor owns a career batting mark of .365. Before his junior year is completed in 1977, "Molly" is expected to own just about every offensive career mark in the Gopher record book.

He is also expected to be an extremely high draft choice next spring when he again becomes eligible under professional rules. Molitor was drafted upon graduation from St. Paul Cretin high school by the St. Louis Cardinals, but opted for a college career at Minnesota.

He has already been called the most exciting player ever to don a Minnesota uniform by coach Siebert who recently completed his 29th year in college baseball, all at UM, and is just 10 shy of recording his 700th win.

BSB TEAM FINAL 36-11 MARK MOST WINS EVER AFTER NCAA PLAY

Minnesota's baseball team completed a most successful season at Tempe, Arizona Sunday ending its 1976 campaign with the most wins in the school's history, 36, while losing just 11. The previous high was 36 wins in 1969. Minnesota dropped a 12-5 decision to number one ranked Arizona State in the Rocky Mountain Regional at Tempe. The Gophers dropped a 6-0 series opener to Memphis State getting only two hits, but came back to eliminate Gonzaga University 6-0 and Memphis State 17-4, the latter win on 25 hits, to gain a crack at the Sun Devils. But the latter club was called "the finest hitting college team I have seen in my 29 years at Minnesota" by Gopher coach Dick "Chief" Siebert. "But I'm more than just a little proud of our men. They went down swinging from the heels. Arizona State is simply too powerful and deep to beat. I'll be surprised if they don't go all the way in the College World Series."

BOLF NAMED

Bobby Bolf, senior co-captain from Keewatin, was voted the most valuable player award by his teammates after the Gophers completed action in the NCAA playoffs at Tempe. Bolf completed the 1976 season with a .361 batting average, third highest among the regulars, and tied the school single season record with 40 runs batted in. In four seasons at Minnesota Bolf ended with a career batting average of .318 while playing in 100 games. He was a third teseman in 1975 but played second base this past season. As a final tribute Bolf was named second baseman on the All-Big Ten second team Wednesday in a vote by the conference coaches. Bolf was second in the Big Ten this season with 15 RBI's while batting .288.

Super-sophs Paul Molitor, at shortstop, and submarine pitcher Dan Morgan were named to the 1976 All-Big Ten first team announced Wednesday in a vote by the conference coaches. Molitor ended third in Big Ten batting at .406 while Morgan had a 3-2 won-lost record but was second in the conference with a 1.61 earned run average. On the entire season Molitor hit .376 and set a stack of new single season records, while Morgan was 10-2 with a 1.70 ERA. Both were outstanding performers at the NCAA regional tournament in Tempe, Arizona for the Gophers last weekend. Molitor was one of three unanimous choices named to the All-Big Ten team.

OTHERS NAMED TO BIG TEN TEAM

Three more Gopher stars were named to the All-Big Ten second team, including co-captain and second baseman Bobby Bolf, a senior, junior third baseman Mike Bruss and sophomore first baseman Brian Denman. Bruss hit .372 in conference play and Denman .333 to rank second and third for the Gophers behind team leader Paul Molitor's torrid .406 mark. Bolf batted .200 but was second in the Big Ten with 15 runs batted in. Two more Gopher standouts were named to the third team, including junior designated hitter Jeff Kendall and freshman pitcher Jerry Ujdur (YOU-jer). Kendall batted .239 in conference action while Ujdur went undefeated with a 4-0 record and a fine 2.69 ERA. He ended the entire season with a sparkling 7-1 record with his only loss coming at the hands of number one ranked Arizona State in the season finale. It's interesting to note that Minnesota's entire infield (Denman, Bolf, Molitor, Bruss) was singled out for post season recognition. It's even nicer for coach Dick Siebert to know that Bolf is the only senior in this group.

- . . .By seeing his 1976 Gopher baseball team win a school record 36 games while only losing 11 times, coach Dick Siebert is now within 10 victories of joining an extremely select group. . .active coaches with 700 career wins. In 29 seasons at Minnesota Siebert's teams have won a whopping 690 times while losing 332 for a plus percentage of .675. Only Rod Dedeaux of Southern Cal and John Scolinos of Cal Poly at Pamona have reached the 700 win plateau and are still active.

Minneapolis---Men's Athletic Director Paul Giel has recommended the appointment of Rick Ehrmanntraut (UHR-man-trout) to replace recently retired Les Bolstad as head golf coach at the University of Minnesota. The recommendation is subject to approval by the University Board of Regents.

If approved Ehrmanntraut will begin his duties in September.

A four-year member of the varsity golf team Ehrmanntraut lettered twice and was a key member of the 1972 squad which captured the Big Ten championship. He was captain of the 1973 squad.

Rick graduated from the U. of M. in 1973 with a BA in economics, and then took a year off from the classroom. He enrolled in the U. of M. Dental School in the fall of 1974 and has two years remaining before earning his professional degree.

In 1972 Ehrmanntraut enjoyed his most productive golf season when he qualified for the U.S. Open at Pebble Beach, California, ended fourth in the National Publinks and 12th in the National Amateur.

During summer months he works as an assistant professional at the Southview Country Club in West St. Paul.

Rick graduated from Cretin High School where he was co-medalist in the independent state tournament his senior year, but lost in a playoff.

"I did not become serious about golf until I quit playing baseball at age 14," Rick tells us. "But seeing the opportunities that decision has opened for me, I believe today I made the right decision."

Asked about replacing Bolstad, who is a Minnesota legend and coached Gopher teams the last 30 years, Rick replied: "It's a tremendous responsibility to replace a man like coach Bolstad. But I'm taking the position of not having to go out and make winning a must, or even trying to replace coach Bolstad for that matter.

"My aim is to seek out and help develop the exciting young players coming out of high school today. Having had the opportunity to give lessons at Southview has aided me greatly.

'Without the latter I'm not certain I would have been qualified to become a college coach. But I now feel confident, and am also most grateful to Mr. Giel (OVER)

for giving me the opportunity to coach in the best conference in the nation, the Big Ten.

"I competed in that league, and getting the chance to coach, well, just say I'm more than a bit excited. Indiana, Ohio State and Michigan recruit hard and are the Big Ten powers. I plan to challenge that strength.

"With the squad I inherit next spring, and with hopes of gaining one or two more good players, we can challenge for a first division finish in 1977, and hope to go up from there."

Giel is evidentaly pleased, too, with his new coach. "Gaining a man of his ability and attitude does nothing less than enhance what I already believe is the best coaching staff in the Big Ten.

"I interviewed several candidates which made our final decision extremely difficult. But I believe our final choice was a wise one. Being an M man and now enrolled in our excellent dental school were contributing factors to our decision. We are most pleased that Rick accepted our offer."

Ehrmanntraut, 25, was married June 10 to the former Kerry Ryan of St. Paul. They presently reside in Inver Grove Heights.

Paul Molitor, All-American shortstop for the University of Minnesota this spring, has returned home to St. Paul from Colorado to convalesce from a serious injury.

Playing in a summer collegiate league for Grand Junction, Col., Molitor suffered a severly fractured jaw during a rundown play. He will not compete anymore this season but is expected to be healed when fall practice starts at the University.

At time of his injury, Molitor was batting well over .400, had two home runs, and was called by his coach easily the best player on his team.

The latter compliment becomes more glowing when it was learned that several of his teammates p ayed this past season for Arizona University, NCAA champions, and Arizona State University, another national collegiate power.

STOLL INVITES 106 CANDIDATES TO FALL DRILLS

Minneapolis --- Head coach Cal Stoll (STALL), heading into his fifth year at Minnesota, announced today he has invited 106 candidates to report for the opening of fall practice.

GRIDDERS FINISH FIRST WEEK OF DRILLS

Minneapolis--"One week hasn't revealed all the answers we are seeking, but both players and coaches learned an awful lot. . .mostly that Minnesota will play contact football in 1976," says Gopher head coach Cal Stoll (STALL).

After just one scrimmage (Saturday) and three days in pads following three days of conditioning, it's simply too early to sort out the full Gopher potential. But as Stoll said, hitting has been evident.

"The first day we put on pads our freshmen seemed to gain a rebirth," Stoll continued. "They really went after each other. I believe that early desire spread to our veterans, too, and the week ended among some real collision football.

"Saturday's scrimmage, as usual, was dominated by the defense. This is always the case until the offense get its timing down pat.

"Offense is act. . .defense is react. In one respect our defensive play so far confirms our belief that we are going to be much better on this side of the line in 1976!"

Junior linebacker Steve Stewart is already in midseason form and could be the team leader on defense. However, his sidekick, junior Michael Hunt, went out early with an injury but could be ready later this week. Several other candidates are battling in Hunt's slot.

There appears to be little if any problem at end. Senior, junior and sophomore lettermen.—Ron Wrobel, Mark Merrill and Steve Tobin, respectively—plus sophomores Stan Sytsma and Bob House should give opponents fits. All are more than qualified to guard the flanks.

Like the man once said, the offense sells tickets, the defense wins games. Whatever, the Gopher defense, at least thus far, appears solid throughout.

The offense? Well, it takes more than one week to tell. But one thing is for certain. . .senior captain and quarterback looks better than ever.

"I've been in this business for 25 years and Tony Dungy is the best I've coached," says Stoll, "not only as a player but also as a leader. He's got it all.

"Even though he led the Big Ten in both passing and total offense last season and also set all kinds of passing records, he worked on his throwing almost every day this summer. He is a definite all-America candidate."

#### UM-IU Football - 3

THE BIG OPENER SAT. AT 1:30 P.M. Hopeful may not be a strong enough term, but it best sums up the feelings of coach Cal Stoll, his staff and players as Minnesota looks toward Saturday, September 11. At 1:30 p.m. that day the 1976 Golden Gophers host the Indiana Hoosiers in the season opener for both clubs. Much more than just a season opener, this meeting carries heavy meanings for both clubs. To move up, to be successful, you have to get off on the right foot. So a win in a Big Ten curtain raiser is an absolute must for both programs. With that much at stake each team will pull out all the stops Saturday before a crowd expected to number between 35,000 and 40,000

STOLL PICKS STARTERS Led by captain and All-America candidate Tony Dungy at quarterback, the Gophers present a mostly veteran lineup Saturday with the possibility of more depth than at any time in the past four years. Vets Bubby Holmes (TB) and Ron Kullas (WR) join Dungy and soph Kent Kitzmann (FB) in the Gopher backfield. Up front only two returning starters are found in Brien Harvey (LG) and Jeff Morrow (RT). New starters include Mark Slater, a defensive performer who sat out last season, at center, junior Gary Acromite, coming off a bout with pneumonia, at right guard, and senior Terry Matula at LT with sophs Greg Murtha (TE) and Jeff Anhorn (WR) completing the front wall.

The defense offers more returnees including four vets---Mark Merrill (LE), Steve Midboe (LT), Ron Wrobel (RE) and Bicentennial nose guard George Washington---teaming with soph Jim Ronan at right tackle in the line. A solid duo of Steve Stewart and Michael Hunt finished the 1975 season as regular linebackers playing in front of an equally solid secondary. Leader of the latter gang is senior George Adzick (SS), who Stoll calls the best at his position in the Big Ten. Two more starters return here in cornerbacks Bobby Weber and Tom Luckemeyer, with promising soph Brian Snyder at free safety. But, as always, the above lineups are subject to change.

GOPHERS POLISH AT LODGE The final polishing and priming of the UN team this week takes place at Arrowwood Lodge near Alexandria, Minnesota, northwest of the Twin Cities. For the third straight year Stoll has taken his squad away from campus to eliminate distraction and gain total concentration for the task at hand: smoothing off the rough edges and bringing the team to its highest peak for the opener. Little if any contact drills are scheduled, and a lot of rest will be included. The squad will bus back to campus Friday noon and then begin its normal pre-game procedure.

HEALTH?

There are still a lot of questions to be resolved as to the physical well being of the Gopher team. Several starters (Midboe, Washington, Ronan, Kullas, Kitzmann) were held out of last Saturday's final pre-fall scrimmage However, as noted in Stoll's opening lineups, all are expected to be ready. A series of nuisance injuries have held these men, and others back. But overall the squad should be in prime shape following a week in new surroundings, a new atmosphere and plenty of rest.

One way or another Minnesota will be ready to play football this Saturday.

IU CWNS RECENT EDGE Although Indiana has won three of the last four meetings between the schools, the most recent Hoosier victory in Memorial Stadium was back in 1963, a 24-6 decision. The last time IU played in Minnesota (1973), the Stoll-coached Gophers prevailed 24-3. The other three meetings since Stoll took over at UM were held in Bloomington, Indiana, and resulted in 27-23 ('72), 34-3 ('74) and 20-14 ('75) decisions for the cream and crimson. In games between the present head coaches, IU's Lee Corso owns a 2-1 win margin against Stoll. Cal and Co. are more than just hopeful of evening the score in that column.

IU OFFENSE FEATURES SNYDER. AND OTHERS

This past summer the names Snyder, Enis and Jones were firmly implanted in the memories of Gopher football players. This trio of backs has had ENIS, JONES as much if not more to do with the last two Gopher defeats at the hands of Indiana as any other players. Courtney Snyder, a brilliant halfback, is the greatest rusher in IU history having already accumulated a career total of 2,781 rushing yards. In 1974 against the Gophers he gained 160 yards on 28 carries, and added 174 yards on 34 tries last fall. figures out to an average of 5.4 yards per carry for both seasons. Another touch ball carrier is fullback Ric Enis who last fall bolted 42 yards to put IU into a 13-7 lead in the second quarter. Speed is his middle name. And in quarterback Terry Jones the Hoosiers have another mean weapon. "I can't put it out of my mind that Jones is 2-0 against Minnesota," says coach Lee Corso. In 1974 Jones hit nine of 14 passes for 168 yards and two TD's. Last fall he was six of 16 for another 63 yards. Although he may not start Saturday, expect to see this hard thrower in the lineup if the IU attack falters.

STOLL ON THE GOPHERS

"Guarded optimism is the term we have used starting last spring and are still using when talking about our 1976 team," says Gopher head coach Cal Stoll. "At times I may have been a bit too exuberant about our chances, but all in all I still believe we are on the positive side of the ledger. We have had a fine fall camp thus far. This team turned out in the best physical condition of any of my past clubs and their attitude and desire is almost unmatched. All I believe we have to do now is stay super healthy and hope everything falls into place.

"In Tony Dungy we not only have the best quarterback in the Big Ten, but one of the most exceptional leaders I have ever coached. He runs the club both on and off the field. I'm not certain I have ever known a finer young man. Oh sure, we still have some questions to be answered about this club, but overall I'm more than pleased with our progress. Now if we can put it all together Saturday and stay error free, we've got a chance to get off on the right foot. I look for an extremely emotional game from both teams Saturday. The difference may lie with how many vocal fans are in the stands. I hope it's a bundle."

#### Gopher-Cougar Football - 3

UM-WSU MEET 3RD TIME, 1:30 P.M. SAT. For the third time Minnesota will attempt to defeat a visiting Washington State University football team when the schools collide for an intersectional battle Saturday, Sept. 13 at 1:30 p.m. CDT in the Twin Cities. On two previous occasions WSU teams have defeated Gopher elevens: 14-13 in 1965 and 31-20 in 1971. Both games were played at Memorial. Hopefully, Minnesota can turn things around and make it 2-0 on the season. Last week UN topped visiting Indiana 32-13 while the Cougars were losing their opener 35-16 on the road to Kansas University. Minnesota will be a slight favorite Saturday.

STOLL ON INDIANA GAME

"I hones tly cannot remember so much pressure on an opening game in my previous 25 years of coaching," says Minnesota head coach Cal Stoll. "We needed that win badly (over Indiana 32-13) for our team, our program and our fans. Possibly the biggest plus for us was zero turnovers. Our kicking game was also superb, which is somewhat a surprise as our placekicker, freshman Paul Rogind (ROW-gen), and punter, sophomore Steve Tobin, had never before kicked a ball in a college game. And it's ironic. Last year we lost to Indiana because of a poor kicking game. Saturday we won because of an excellent kicking game. "We defeated what I call a darned good football team while not at full strength, too. Both our starting tackles on defense went out early and we also ended up with our fourth string tailback, freshman Ray Dilulo (dih-LOU-low), who played most of the last quarter due to injuries to the first three men. That has to be another giant plus for us, winning when not at full strength. But Indiana is going to do some winning this year, you can bet on that."

INJURY REPORT Lost for Saturday's game are starting senior tailback Bubby Holmes and starting sophomore defensive tackle Jim Ronan. Holmes suffered a dislocated elbow in the first quarter Saturday which could sideline him for three or more weeks. Ronan suffered a strained lower back, the same injury that has slowed him during pre-fall practice. The rest of the men who played should be ready Saturday.

NEW STARTERS As of Monday sophomore Steve Breault, who led all rushers in the Indiana game with 71 yards on 13 carries, was set to start at tailback with another soph, Kent Kitzmann, moved to the number two spot here. Kitzmann played fullback last week. Also on offense, soph Glenn Bourquin has moved into the top tight end position based on a fine performance against Indiana. On defense another soph, Doug Friberg (FREE-berg), will start at right tackle in place of Ronan. The rest of the lineup should remain the same with second stringer John Mathews moving up to the number one fullback slot in place of Kitzmann.

STOLL ON DUNGY

"What can I say?", Stoll offered. "He was just, well, Dungy. He did it all again. He rushed for two touchdowns and passed for two more. When Indiana began jumping around changing their sets on defense, Tony requested we go to no huddle on offense so he could have the last word. He is simply something else. When we needed a score badly at the end of the first half, he directed the squad 61 yards on eight plays in less than two minutes, then ran in the final six yards himself. Like I said, he is something else." For the day Dungy rushed for 43 yards and completed nine of 17 pass attempts for another 110 yards, He was not intercepted.

STOLL ON OFFENSIVE LINE

"We were a bit concerned before the season about this unit," Stoll continued. "Not any more. Because of their inexperience as a group we didn't know how they would react the first time out. But the offensive line turned in a helluva job against Indiana. They controlled the trenches and that's where it's won or lost, friend.

GOPHER HONORS Each week, after viewing game films, members of the Minnesota coaching staff grade each player's performance and single out top men for outstanding efforts. Named the "Best of the Gophers" for key jobs vs. Indiana were: OFFENSIVE LINEMAN--senior tackle Terry Matula, Hastings, MN; OFFENSIVE BACK--senior quarterback Tony Dungy, Jackson, MI; TOP TACKLER--senior nose guard George Washington, Flint, MI; BIG PLAYMAKER ON DEFENSE--junior linebacker Steve Stewart, Richfield, MN. Named Champions of the week for best performances from members of the scouting teams were freshman quarterback Mark Carlson, Deerfield, Ill. and freshman linebacker Scott Harms, Rice Lake, WI.

STOLL ON WASH. ST.

"We know very little about their 1976 football team," Stoll says.
"Besides their having a new head coach in Jackie Sherrill, the NCAA has eliminated any game scouting this year. So we'll have to wait until their game film comes in and try to learn all we can from that alone. But I do know one thing: coach Sherrill has a fine, fine background in coaching and that he loves to see the ball put in the air. We could see one of the wildest aerial games ever on exhibit in Memorial Stadium. They (WSU) have a lot to prove and are on the way up. We'll have to be a lot sharper than last week in several phases of our total game. I expect to see another exciting contest against a member of the proud Pacific-3 Conference."

#### OFFENSIVE TACKLE TERRY MATULA GAINS FIRST START

For the past two seasons, senior left tackle Terry Matula has been a reserve, but the days of waiting for someone to go down before he goes in are over. Last Saturday's Indiana game was Matula's first collegiate start and following the game, he hopes there will be many more.

"I wasn't really scared or worried about starting the Indiana game, just excited," Matula said. "I felt responsible to do a good job for the coaches, my teammates and my friends. I didn't want to let anybody down."

When asked what went through his mind before the game and during the course of the game, Matula said he just wanted to "do what I had to do."

"My goal each game is to do what is expected of me and not make any mistakes," Matula said. "I try not to make mental mistakes like forgetting blocking assignments or being offsides or caught holding. Thoughts like who I'm supposed to block and what position to get in to make that block are inside my head. Usually I don't even think of who is carrying the ball on a particular play."

How did Matula feel he did his first outing?

"It was a rewarding feeling, especially with the victory," Matula said. "I thought I did a fairly good job for my first start. I made mistakes on a few assignments, but I feel I can correct them."

"It was rewarding to have the backs give you a hug and the comradeship was there," Matula continued. "The team really came together."

Many thoughts will stay with Matula about his first start, but one in particular, the singing of the Rouser in the lockerroom following the game, sticks out.

ON WIN OVER WSU, 1ST 2-0 SINCE 1960

Last Saturday Minnesota did something no other Gopher squad has accomplished since 1950. . .win its first two games. After tripping conference opponent Indiana 32-13 in the opener, Minnesota scored 10 point in the first quarter against Washington State, and added a quick 15 in the third period to capture a 28-14 decision. A powerful ground attack that churned out 293 yards and three TD's made the difference for UM. As expected, the Cougars came out throwing and hit on 10 of 30 attempts for their two scores. But a stingy Gopher defense bottled up the WSU running attack and that, alongside UM's rushing game, made the difference. Back in 1960 Minnesota won its first seven games en route to a national championship, so the 1975 Gophers have a lot of work to do.

STOLL ON THE COPHERS "Besides the main fact being that we were victorious," says Minnesota head coach Cal Stoll, "the next important factor is that we showed improvement. That is an absolute must for this football team. If we do not continue in the same vein, we could be in for big trouble when we return to conference play October 9 against Illinois here. After what Illinois did to Missouri last Saturday (the Illini won 31-6), we are in for some kind of challenge. But that doesn't mean for one second we are looking past this weekend against Western Michigan, or next week's game at the University of Washington. Both clubs feature good, solid football and are not about to lay down for us. We'll have to be sharp and continue to improve. We're not concerned about any ratings or running up points or establishing statistical leaders, either team or individual. We are at this point vitally concerned with but one fact. . .improvement. If that comes everything else should fall into place."

STOLL ON WSU WIN

"Our men played well enough to win and that's the name of the game. We took a lot of things away from Washington State and that hurt them. They are a young, aggressive football team, one that will get a lot better as the season goes on. Our men responded to the challenge when they closed the score to 10-3 early in the third quarter. I was more than pleased with that point. Oh sure, we made some mistakes, but overall we showed a lot of good things, too. And I'm really happy that in our first two games we were able to play so many men. We were able to get 59 men into the Indiana game and 60 last Saturday. There is nothing like game experience, no matter how brief, to help our younger men gain confidence."

STOLL ON WAU

"Last year we went into our game with Western Michigan without the intensity and desire needed for a peak performance in college football. We will do everything in our power to keep that from happening this fall. Caoch Elliot Uzelac was one of the top assistant coaches at the University of Michigan before leaving for Western last fall. He has already turned their program around and has won his last three games. They would dearly love to make us their fourth straight victim. We've got to guard against a vastly improved Western Michigan team over the club we faced last fall. I'm not kidding when I say we are in for a tough afternoon unless we are mentally prepared. I expect a very fine football game Saturday and hope our men come to play football. I'm certain they will, too."

ABOUT THE BRONCOS After losing his first 10 games as a rookie head coach last fall, Western Michigan's Elliot Uzelac has put a new spark into the Bronco grid program. His 1975 club won its season final against Eastern Michigan 24-14, then defeated the same school 31-13 in this year's opener. Last Saturday the

Broncos went on the road for a night game and whipped Northern Illinois 37-6. The latter point total was the highest for a WMU team in its last 49 games. The biggest plus for Western thus far is that they are healthy Last season a total of 11 starters underwent surgery for all kinds of injuries. Another big factor is the play of tailback Jerome Persell, a 5-foot-9, 180-pound sophomore. In the first game he rushed for 241 yards on 29 carries, and last week gained another 114 yards in 21 trips. He has scored three touchdowns and is averaging 7.1 yards per carry. The Broncos have only passed 11 times in two games, but are averaging 5.7 yards per carry and 372 yards per game on the ground. In simple terms, Western is a helluva lot better football team than the squad Gopher fans saw last fall. And they will come to play football, count on that.

GOPHER INJURY REPORT Three UM starters--junior linebacker Michael Hunt, junior cornerback
Tom Luckemeyer and sophomore defensive tackle Jim Ronan--are questionable
due to injuries for Saturday. Hunt and Luckemeyer went out of the
Washington St. game with shoulder and leg hurts, respectively, while
Ronan, troubled with a bad back, did not play at all. The rest of the
squad appears healthy and ready for action.

VARSITY RESERVE TO PLAY The Gopher varsity reserve team plays its first of three scheduled footbal games next Monday, September 27, when it meets the St. Olaf varsity reserve team at Memorial Stadium. Game time is set for 2:30 p.m. Other battles this fall include games against V.R. teams from Gustavus Adolphus at St. Peter October 3, and at home against St. Thomas October 17. Graduate assistant coaches on the Gopher staff will handle sideline duties for the Gopher varsity reserve team.

GOPHER AWARD WINNERS Winners of this week's awards as outstanding Gopher players against Washington State, as selected by the coaches after film grading, are: Brien Harvey (Des Moines, Ia.), offensive lineman; Kent Kitzmann (Rochester, MN), offensive back; George Washington (Flint, MI), top tackler and big playmaker on defense; plus Alan Blanshan (Mankato, MN) and Bob Ziegler (Chaska, MN) as scout team standouts.

KITZMANN, DUNGY YARDSTICK LEADERS

Last Saturday in Minnesota's 20-14 win over Washington State a lot of questions were answered about one Gopher rookie. . . runningback Kent Kitzmann from Rochester Mayo high school. Highly recruited two years ago after a brilliant prep career, Kent was injured before the 1975 season and sat out the entire year. Last week he gained his first start at tailback against WSU and responded with 111 yards on 22 carries for an even 5 yard average. The rugged 6-foot-2½, 202 runner broke open a 33-yd scamper to set up Minnesota's first score, and added several key carries on short yardage situations for first downs. And he has just started. Captain Tony Dungy had another outstanding day against the Cougars gaining 190 yards total offense. He raced for a 51-yard score in the first period, his longest career rush from scrimmage, and passed for 144 yards. To date he has accounted for 351 yards total offense in two outings. Going into Saturday's game against Western Michigan, and with nine games left this season, Dungy needs just 634 yards total offense to break Paul Giel's Gopher record 4,117 career yardage mark set in 1951.52-53.

BAND DAY SATURDAY -- More than 55 high school bands are expected at Memorial Stadium when the Gophers host Western Michigan Saturday. The annual Band Day has a total of more than 5,000 high school band members joining the University marching band to present a varied music program at halftime.

DRAKE IN FOR X-COUNTRY MEET SATURDAY -- The University of Minnesota cross-country team, fresh off its season opening victory in the Gopher Invitational meet last week, plays host to Drake University in a dual meet Saturday, September 25. The race is set for 10:30 a.m. on a 5-mile track at the golf course. The Gophers scored a winning low total of 21 points to defeat seven clubs last Saturday with co-captain Steve Plascencia taking individual honors with a time of 20:25 on a 4-mile jaunt. # Adzick Hits Mental Peak in '76

"The ultimate goal for this season is to reach a bowl game, but if we don't, then we have at least reached some other things. I don't think the entire season would be a loss or a let down," Adzick concluded.

UM WINS 3RD Minnesota will be out to match something Saturday not accomplished by HEADS FOR WASHINGTON a Gopher football team since 1960; win its first four games. The task, however, presents a giant hurdle when UM takes on the Huskies from the University of Washington. The schools meet for the 16th time in a series dating back to 1936 with the kickoff set for 1:30 p.m. PDT (3:30 Minn. time) at Husky Stadium in Seattle, Wash. The Gophers are 3-0 after their come from behind 21-10 win at home against Western Michigan, while Washington is now 1-2 after having dropped a 20-13 decision at home to Indiana when the Hoosiers scored in the final moments breaking a 13-13 tie. But records can be deceiving when intersectional battles are played. Minnesota, going on the road for the first time this season, expects nothing less than an all-out battle in its attempt to make it 4-0. The Huskies have also played all three 1976 games at home.

UM IEADS In 1936 Minnesota took the inaugural meeting 14-7 at Seattle.

SERIES
9-6 Minnesota won the first seven games until Washington won 28-13 in
1950, also at Seattle. UW reeled off three more wins before Minnesota
won 34-14 in 1956 and 46-7 in 1957. Huskie teams have captured the last two battles,
24-21 in 1953, and a 17-7 decision in the 1961 Rose Bowl following the season (1960)
which saw Minnesota win the national championship.

WMU WIN mistakes," says UM coach Cal Stoll, "but we played well when we had to and we won. That's what it's all about, right? We, the coaching staff, knew Western Michigan was a vastly improved team. But nobody else would believe us. Western showed it, too. They played a very hard game and their stunting defenses dictated what we could and couldn't do on offense. We didn't really plan for Kent Kitzmann to make so many carries (a school record 42), but again it was their defense which made our decision. Kent did some kind of job to gain 103 yards rushing. I would like to know just how many tackles he broke in the game.

Quarterback Tony Dungy did not have his usual brilliant game, but when we fell behind he took over, dominated the rest of the game and led us 90 and 70 yards to score and win. He showed everyone in the stadium why he is an all-American college football player. He never panicked, engineered both drives with flawless play calling and then scored the winning touchdown himself from eight yards out." The win Saturday was paid at a heavy price as no less than four INJURY REPORT ON GOPHERS defensive starters were forced from the game with an assortment of injuries. UM's Bicentennial nose guard, George Washington, went out early with a knee injury and is out two to three weeks. Tackles Steve Midboe and Steve Cunningham both received ankle injuries and are questionable for Saturday. Cunningham had moved into Washington's spot after the latter was hurt. Also going down were linebacker Desi Williamson and specialty team player Ken Foxworth, a defensive back. be a patchwork defense that lines up against the Huskies Saturday. However

not all is glum. Expected back for starting duty, HOPEFULLY BUT NOT FOR CERTAIN, are linebacker Michael Hunt, tackle Jim Ronan and cornerback Tom Luckemeyer. The latter two are real question marks saddling Minnesota's defensive coaches with more questions than your average game show contestant. Whatever, says Stoll, "I firmly believe that some new players may just come to the top this week. We have some good but untried young men waiting to get their chance. Saturday might be their day. We'll just have to wait and see who comes to the front in practice this week."

STOLL ON "I'll tell you one thing, they (Washington) have to be in a mighty bad WASHINGTON mood. They have lost two of three at home and will be after us to even things out. They have been ranked as one of the top three teams in the Pacific-G Conference. Last season, the first for coach Don James, they knocked off UCLA and USC. That means nothing but trouble for us. But we are not going all that distance just to show up. We'll come to play football, count on that."

What Minnesota's patched up defense will have the most to contend with EARL. ROWLAND Saturday are a pair of talented runningbacks in fullback Robin Earl LEAD UW GROUND GAIÆ and tailback Ronnie Rowland of Washington. Earl is already the alltime second leading ground gainer in UW history. This season he has gained 278 yards for a 5.5 average and has a mark of 1,666 career rushing yards. Rowland leads the Huskie ground game in 1976 with 332 yards for a 5.5 average. Both have scored three touchdowns. QB Warren Moon is the Washington pass leader having hit on 27 of 50 attempts for 312 yards. The Huskies are averaging 350.7 yards total offense and giving up 200.7. Minnesota is averaging 391.3 on offense and giving up 299.7 per game. KITZMANN In only his second start for the Minnesota Gophers, soph Kent Kitzmann SET NEW pulled double duty Saturday against Western Michigan. In the Gophers RECORD 21-10 victory Kitzmann rushed a school-record 42 times to gain 183 yards and scored his first TD by rushing. The old single game mark for most carries was 36 set by Barry Mayer against Iowa in 1963. However, Mayer still owns the single game rushing mark of 216 yards set against Wisconsin in 1969. Kitzmann now leads UM with 327 ground yards in three games for a healthy 4.5 per carry average. Dungy is next with 169 yards rushing. That, combined with 294 yards passing, gives him 463 yards total offense.

STOLL NOW For the second time since becoming head coach at Minnesota, Gopher OVER .500

AT UN coach Cal Stoll has bettered the .500 mark. In four years plus, this is his fifth season at UM, Stoll's teams have won 24 and lost 23. His career record covering three additional years as head coach at Wake Forest stands at 39-40-0.

Considering that at both schools Stoll stepped into programs that called for an entire rebuilding process, his records today show excellent accomplishment. "No program was ever built overnight," Stoll has been quoted as saying. (MORE)

the opening day of practice for the 1976-77 UM hockey team. Brooks and Co. will be out to defend the 1976 NCAA championship, his second in three years, won last spring at Denver, Col. Fifteen lettermen grace the Gophers roster, plus what Brooks and others have called an excellent group of freshmen. Minnesota opens its season Oct. 16 in the annual Hall of Fame Game at Eveleth, Minn. against Minnesota-Duluth in an exhibition contest. The home opening series against St. Louis University on Oct. 22-23.

NEW COACH Jessie Evans, 25, new part-time assistant basketball coach at the BEGINS University of Minnesota, has begun his recruiting and other duties even though practice doesn't begin until Oct. 15. According to head coach Jim Dutcher, who coached Evans at Eastern Michigan U., Evans will spend a lot of time on the road for Minnesota thic winter both scouting and recruiting. Evans will also coach the junior varsity team. He lettered four years at EMU and signed as a free agent with the NBA Chicago Bulls. The past four seasons he has served as varsity assistant coach at Pontiac (Mich.) high school and saw teams there twice finish as state runners-up.

#### MORE CONTACT THE BETTER FOR GOPHER STEWART

If the stereotype of a linebacker includes quickness, leadership ability, and an extreme love of contact and lust for hard-hitting, then Steve Stewart must be a linebacker.

Doubling with teammate Mike Hunt, Stewart and Hunt together form one of the best linebacking tandems in the Big 10. What makes them so tough is that they both play the same type of aggressive game and compliment each other. Since Hunt has been bothered by a shoulder problem this year, Stewart has been asked to do more than his fair share and that's exactly what he has done.

Thus far into the season, Stewart is the leading Gopher tackler with 17 solo and 10 assists. He finished second to Big Ten leader George Washington in that department for the Gophers last year.

Using a technique learned from former teammate Cllie Bakken, Stewart likes to tackle high and use a lot of shoulder tackling.

"I like to hit high, hit people in the head," Stewart said. "It stuns them. If you get the big hit it spurs your teammates, too, and everybody gets excited."

Besides leading the team in interceptions with three last season, a big moment for Stewart was the Michigan game where he had 24 tackle points.

"We played great defensively," Stewart recalls. "We lost but it was my greatest game in personal satisfaction. We finally played with big time football down for down."

HOMECOMING FOR UM

Minnesota and Illinois, both undefeated in Big Ten games to date (1-0) clash in Minnesota's annual Homecoming battle Saturday in the Gopher State. Kickoff is slated for 1:30 p.m. CDT before a crowd

expected to break the 50,000 barrier for the first time since 1973 at Memorial Stadium. Illinois has posted an even 2-2 record on the season while Minnesota suffered its first loss of '76 last Saturday at Washington to lower its record to 3-1. For the first time in several years a full week of Homecoming activities culminating in a parade, queen coronation, pep fest, bonfire and dance on Friday will proceed Saturday's game. Much of the campus is already swept up in decorations and related events returning a gala celebration which has been missing in recent years. "With this kind of support and enthusiasm all we Want to do is reward our students with a great Homecoming victory," Gopher coach Cal Stoll said Sunday.

STOLL ON WASHINGTON LOSS

"Mistakes, fumbles, penalties, more injuries ... all these items hurt us against Washington," Stoll Says. "But Washington blocked and tackled harder so they won. Washington was the strongest where we were the weakest ... their inside power offense against our injury riddled

defensive interior. That really spelled the difference. It was one of those days we dread, a day where nothing goes right. The ball never seemed to bounce in our direction and we just couldn't get it together.

STOLL ON ILLINOIS GAME

"But we learned. That's one of the great things about football: to accept defeat and go right back at the next opponent. We'll be ready for Illinois. They are an improved team so the challenge to our men

is a big one. But it's a big week at Minnesota, too, with all the renewed Homecoming activities on tap. We want to end this week with a win in the worst way. I don't think we'll have any trouble getting our men up for Illinois. This is the Big Ten. The non-conference games are behind us. All is on the table now. I believe our squad remembers the 42-23 game we lost at Illinois last year. We were stung pretty bad and I'm certain our men want to atone for that day. Illinois is a strong, quick, powerful team with a mighty tough defense. We'll have to be at our very best just to stay with them. But one thing could really help us out a ton ... 50,000 or more fans in the seats. I don't think our players need any more urging to get up for this one."

2 GOPHERS Although nothing is certain, there is a possibility that senior tailback MAY BE Bubby Holmes and senior wide receiver Mike Jones could return to duty BACK

Saturday at Memorial Stadium against Illinois. Holmes has been out with an injured elbow since the season opener, while Jones underwent a knee operation in early August and has not played this season. However, several Gopher stars, including defensive linemen George Washington and his backup at nose guard, Steve Cunningham, are not scheduled to play.

ILLINI Minnesota. However, this season he has been moved out of his starting role by junior James Coleman who, since he took over in the season opener, has averaged 101 yards per game rushing. When not on the ground, Illinois relies on the passing of quarterback Kurt Steger. It was Steger who engineered the aerial bombardment that led to a whopping 31-6 win at Missouri. Steger has accounted for 512 yards total offense and thrown five touchdown passes. So it will be a sharp attack the Gophers must stop Saturday. But the toughest job of all may be trying to break through the stout Illini defense. Whatever, Gopher fans can expect another wild battle Saturday, the same type that has developed the past few years when Minnesota and Illinois square off.

at 1:30 p m. EDT (12:30 p.m. CDT Minn. time). Stoll served 10 seasons as an assistant coach to Hugh "Duffy" Daugherty at Michigan State handling defensive ends and heading up the recruiting program.

In 1972, Stoll's first year at Minnesota, he defeated Daugherty 14-10, but last season lost to State 30-15. Both games were played in Minnesota. So Saturday's Gopher trip is a first for Stoll taking a Gopher club into Spartan Stadium. Minnesota is fresh off a 29-14 win at home against Illinois and stands 4-1 on the season. State last week lost at arch rival Michigan 42-10 and stands 1-3-1. In Big Ten action the schools have reverse marks: Minnesota 2-0, MSU 0-2. Saturday's contest also marks the first meeting between Stoll and new MSU head coach Darryl Rogers who came to Spartanland after three successful years at San Jose State where his record was 22-9-3.

UM WINS The convincing 29-14 win against Illinois capped a huge homecoming week BIG HC at Minnesota. For the first time in several years the entire campus joined in festivities which included a homecoming queen, parade, bonfire, pep fests, dance, etc. Much of that activity was also given credit for 52,606 fans jamming Memorial Stadium for the first 50,000 plus crowd in three years. Minnesota stopped an early Illini drive on 4th and one at the Gopher two yard line. From that point on it was all Minnesota.

Led by the passing and running of senior QB Tony Dungy plus the power drives of senior FB Jim Perkins, who scored three times, and a rejuvinated interior defense, Minnesota closed out much of the Illini attack building a 29-0 lead early in the final quarter. The visitors pushed over two late scores after the outcome had been decided.

"I'm certain the physical pounding Illinois received a week earlier from UM WIN

a rugged Texas A&M team took its toll in our game Saturday," says UM coach Stoll. "However, we were keyed awfully high and turned in an almost flawless performance the first three quarters. It was strictly a team victory for us, but several individuals stood out, too. Tony Dungy was unreal. He checked off several times to turn plays into big gainers. He directed every scoring drive with almost perfect execution. Illinois coach Bob Blackman said it best after the game: "If there was an All-American on the field today it was Tony Fungy."

"Jim Perkins did exactly what we ask of him each week. . .gain that critical yardage. He plays in all our offensive short yardage formations, first down or inside the opponent 10 yard line, at fullback. He has now scored seven touchdowns

carries and picked up I don't know how many crucial first downs. That's

season. It was a mighty big plus for our side.

"The key to our defense was the interior: Mark Slater at nose guard plus linebackers Steve Stewart and Michael Hunt. Slater was moved from offensive center and shored up the middle. Together this trio was largely responsible for Illinois only gaining 35 ands rushing. Slater moved to nose guard from offensive center last week and picked up where he left off two years ago. He is some kind of athlete. In all both the defense and offense played with spirit, intensity and emotion. . and that's what it takes to win."

TWO SUBS Two men pressed into duty when starters went out injured had their best COME IN days, too. Offensive tackle Dennis Fitzpatrick, a 25-year-old service veteran called "Dad" by his teammates, and defensive end Stan Sytsma stood out among the first stringers. Fitzpatrick replaced Jeff Morrow at right tackle and many of Perkins' gains came over his side. Sytsma took over when Ron Wrobel turned an ankle and kept his side of the line in check. Morrow is questionable for Saturday but Wrobel is expected to start.

DUNGY CLOSING Minnesota senior quarterback and captain Tony Dungy, an all-America IN ON GIEL candidate in 1976, is fast closing in on one of the most cherished records in Gopher football history ... the career total offense mark of 4,117 yards set by Paul Giel in 1951-2-3. In last week's 29-14 win against Illinois, Dungy gained 165 yards rushing and passing bringing his career total to 3,349. With six games remaining this season he needs just 269 yards to break Giel's mark. Another record within Dungy's reach is the UM career pass completion mark of 226 set by Craig Curry in 1969-70-71. Dungy now has 213 and needs 14 more to break that record.

#### KULLAS "CATCHES ON" AT MINNESOTA

Each new football season brings questions and doubts, but Gopher wide-receiver Ron Kullas is neither questioning his choosing Minnesota nor doubting his moving from high school quarterback-defensive back to college wide receiver.

"I always wanted to play here, it's like a dream come true," Kullas says. "I never had thoughts about going anywhere else. I wanted to perform in front of people who knew me."

"Also by playing at Minnesota, I can develop contacts and get to know people," Kullas Continued. "Minnesota offers more in respects to business contacts than any other school would."

In regards to switching positions, again Kullas couldn't be happier.

"I love playing wide receiver," Kullas says. "Catching the ball is something that comes natural. I was recruited as a defensive back and played quarterback in high school, but I enjoy receiving more than anything."

How has Kullas adjusted to wide receiver? Great. Simple proof is that he set three Minnesota receiving records last year as a junior.

The records include most season receptions (42), most season receptions in Big 10 play (34), and total season yardage (545). He finished as the second leading receiver in the conference in 1975.

"Minnesota wasn't and has never been a passing school, so the records are not that good of an accomplishment," Kullas says. "Minnesota never threw so the records weren't that great."

After having such a successful personal season last year, what does Kullas feel will be a sucessful season this year?

"Going to a bowl game," Kullas answers. "It's my last shot and I don't want to let myself or the school down. Personally, I hope to do the things I did last year and improve on them, although it will be difficult to catch more passes."

Currently in that department, Kullas leads the team with 17 receptions, good for 186 yards and one touchdown.

Gopher-Hawkeye Football - 3

The first annual "Pigskin Pork Day" is a key feature of this week's UM HOSTS TA AWOI Big Ten battle between Iowa and Minnesota in the Twin Cities when these "PORK DAY" neighboring rivals square off at 1:30 p.m. CDT in Memorial Stadium. SAT. special designation is that the first 10,000 fans who enter the stadium with a reserved seat ticket receive free a hot pork sandwich. This promotion is under the co-sponsorship of the Minnesota Pork Producers Association, the U. of M. Athletic Department, and the St. Paul Union Stockyards. It is fitting this game was chosen as both Iowa and Minnesota are major pork producing states, and that the word "pork" is always featured when these state universities clash.

FLOYD OF The prize to the winning school each year is a  $15\frac{1}{2}$  inch trophy of a ROSEDALE champion hog named Floyd of Rosedale, a sculpture originated in 1935 UF FOR GRABS when the original "Floyd" was a bet between the governors of Iowa and Minnesota. Since that date the schools have vied for ownership of this trophy with Minnesota holding 27-12 margin in wins. The overall series dates back to 1891 when Minnesota won 42-4. In all games played UM leads the series 47-20-2. Gopher teams have retained possession of Floyd since 1969 even though there was a series tie (14-14) in 1970. Iowa's last win was a 35-28 decision in 1968.

UM MATCHES After scoring a key 14-10 road victory against an improved Michigan MARK SET IN State eleven at East Lansing last Saturday, coach Cal Stoll's 1976 1967

Gophers are now 5-1 on the season, 3-0 in the Big Ten, marking the first time since 1967 that Minnesota has won all but one of its first six outings. The '67 club went on to post an 8-2 season log and tied for the Big Ten title. The last previous mark better than this year's effort was in 1960 when the Gophers won their first seven games en route to the national championship.

DUNGY, KITZMANN JONES, SECONDARY HAILED

There were numerous heroes in the win over MSU Saturday, but names like QB Tony Dungy, TB Kent Kitzmann, WR Mike Jones, LB Steve Stewart and the entire Gopher secondary are heard the most. The latter group limited the Big Ten's leading passer, State QB Ed Smith, to just 96 yards gained on 11 completions in 19 attempts. Stewart grabbed off one interception which set up the winning Gopher score, and Stewart and his teammates knocked down several other Spartan passes. Although Michigan State was successful on the ground, the success was limited to just one TD and most of its yardage was gained in its own end of the

On offense Dungy again led the Gopher attack completing nine of 15 passes for 162 yards. Wide receivers Ron Kullas grabbed off five throws and Mike Jones, seeing his first extended duty of the season, caught four for 101 yards. His brilliant grab of a 49-yard toss from Dungy set up UM's first score at the Spartan four yard line. As usual, Minnesota's "designated scorer", senior fullback Jim Perkins, banged in both TD's from two and one yards out giving him rine for the season. Kitzmann again broke the 100-yard barrier as he rushed for 112 yards (MORE)

When the Gopher defense needed a big play, somebody always came through.

on 13 carries picking up several key gains in critical situations. He now has 530 rushing yards in six games, and has gone over the century mark three times.

DUNGY CAN The Gopher senior captain and quarterback is expected to erase one of SET NEW the most cherished records in the Minnesota grid history when he goes against the Iowa Hawkeyes. Dungy to date has recorded 4,031 career yards total offense (rushing/passing) and needs just 37 more yards Saturday to pass Paul Giel's mark of 4,117 gained in 1951-52-53. Another mark expected to be broken by the all-America candidate is career pass completions. He needs just five

Saturday to break the mark of 226 set by Craig Curry in 1969-70-71. Dungy can also set a new mark for career passing yardage if and when he accounts for 100 more through the air. Curry also owns that UM record with 3,060 yards. Dungy now has 2,961. In the Big Ten, Dungy is now ranked 9th among career total offense leaders in all games played. Saturday he moved five yards ahead of Iowa's Ed Podolak who totaled 4,026 career yards.

STOLL ON "We played with great emotion against a team playing at the same emotional MSU WIN AND IOWA level," says Stoll. "I said early in the week we were going to see an exciting game and that's exactly what happened. It was a fine, fine Big Ten football game. I'm naturally pleased with the job done by our men. We went into a tough situation and came away with a victory at Michigan State's homecoming game. That is an awfully big plus for our entire program and for this year's team. These

men are jelling and playing solid football. I just hope now it continues. Iowa will be sky high to beat us Saturday. They suffered a tough loss to Indiana (14-7) last week and will be out to prove themselves. Iowa is always extremely high when they play Minnesota, so I expect another tough, tough Big Ten football game this weekend. Going into last week's games Iowa was second in the Big Ten in total defense. True, they have had some trouble getting their offense untracked. But they got it far enough into gear to defeat Penn State on the road, and also whip Syracuse 41-3. So

just because our record is better, forget it. It will be a dog fight, just like all Minnesota-Iowa games. You can count on that!"

BAND LIFTS According to assistant coach Roger French, the Gopher marching band "gave GOPHERS AT us a huge aid in helping lift the team's spirit at Michigan State. When MSU we came off the field from our pre-game warmup and met the band, they started to chant and cheer for us. Knowing we were in a foreign stadium without our great home crowd, the band really gave us a lift. Knowing they were there helped us catch fire. They (the band) really deserve a pat-on-the-back not only from the team but from all Gopher fans."

A crippled but determined gang of Golden Gophers heads into the lair UM @ MICH. ON TV IN of the top ranked team in the nation Saturday when Minnesota and JUG BATTLE Michigan renew their long-time battle for the famed Little Brown Jug. Kickoff before more than 100.000 Big Ten fans is set for 1:30 p.m. EDT (12:30 CDT) with the game being regionally telecast by ABC-TV. Michigan is undefeated, 7-0, and has held the number one ranking the nation all season. The Gophers, victims of a crushing 22-12 upset at home to Iowa Saturday, fell to 5-2 which is still the best Gopher mark for this deep into the season since 1967. The talented Wolves rate a heavy favorite. INJURIES Just as Minnesota, which opened the season with a stack of injuries CAST A to key players, had reached its healthiest condition of 1976, members PALL of the maroon and gold fell like flys before the Hawkeyes. No less than 15 players reported to the training room Sunday morning with a wide assortment of hurts. Worst of the lot are senior offensive guard Brien Harvey (!:nee) and junior defensive end Stan Sytsma (shoulder). Both have been ruled out of action Saturday, and Harvey may have ended his college football career. Ouestionable this week are strong safety George Adzick (thigh) and defensive end Ron Wrobel (ankle). For the others. . . a lot of quick mending is needed.

GOPHERS

"We ran out of people and emition at the same time," says Gopher head coach Cal Stoll. "We became physically and emotionally bankrupt. Iowa showed why they are a vastly improved football team. They took it to us when our players went down in the second half with an extremely strong performance. We had our chances early but couldn't capitalize. This Minnesota team is a squad that must play healthy and with great emotion. But when that many regulars go out of a game play after play, well, it's hard for the remaining players to pick up all the slack. We are not supposed to win next Saturday at Ann Arbor. Michigan has an awesome team and richly deserves its number one rating. But we'll be ready. We're not traveling that far just to show up. I know our men have a lot of pride in themselves and their team. We'll put everything we have into this one and hope to stay in one piece. I just hope everyone gets healthy in a hurry."

DUNGY SETS Brightest happening for UM Saturday was the record-setting performance by senior QB and captain Tony Dungy. Dungy accounted for 172 yards total offense to break the mark of 4,117 set by present Minnesota A.D. Paul Giel back in 1951-2-3. Dungy has now amassed 4,203 yards, the fifth highest total ever in the Big Ten. He also set new records for most pass completions (227) and most passing yards (3,032), two more Minnesota marks.

Gopher-Bulldog Hockey - 4

After gaining a split against a strong St. Louis University team at ICERS OPEN WCHA AT home, the Minnesota Gopher hockey team opens action in the WCHA for HOME 1976-77 Friday and Saturday at Williams Arena against cross-state rival Minnesota-Duluth. Both games begin at 7:30 p.m. CDT. The Gophers faded in the third period against St. Louis Friday losing 7-3 after forging a 3-3 tie, but bounced back Saturday to take a 6-4 decision on a pair of late third period goals by Bob Fish and Bruce Lind. Captain Joe Micheletti led Minnesota to its second win of the season against the sole loss by notching two power play scores and adding two assists. Last season Minnesota finished a strong third in the rugged WCHA en route to its second NCAA championship in three years, the '76 title won at Denver, Colo. 2ND MEETING Minnesota and UMD have already squared off this season with the Gophers FOR UM-UMD taking a 9-5 decision in the Hall of Fame Game at Eveleth, Minn., October 16. That "battle" saw 30 penalties called with both teams using a high number of freshmen who apparently believed they had something to prove. However, now that league action is here, expect a normal, wide open skating affair that develops whenever these schools face off. The Gophers have won the last 12 meetings between the schools and UMD will go all out to break that string.

BROOKS ON "I was encouraged the way our team came back to win Saturday against ST. LOUIS a darned good hockey team," coach Herb Brooks said Monday. "I knew SERTES we had to be doing something right while skating without the puck as St. Louis only had 24 shots on goal Saturday. They bombed us with 43 shots Friday. I have to cite the consistent style of play by two forwards against St. Louis: center Tom Vannelli and right wing Tom Gorence. They both showed a lot of leadership, too. But one thing is still lacking ... we still don't know who will play for us this weekend. There are dog fights at almost every position. We changed all four lines Saturday after Friday's game. We still have a long way to go before all four lines are set. A lot of play and game experience will be the deciding factors. are young but eager. I believe the cream always comes to the top, but it will take a long time before this club can expect to jell. I'll not know what will be our lineup for the Duluth series until late in the week."

The final regular season meet is scheduled for Saturday at the U Golf course against St. Cloud State University. The 4 mile event is scheduled to begin at 10:30 a.m. and is the final tune-up before the Big Ten Championships to be held in Evanston, Illinois on November 6.

UNIVERSITY OF MINNESOTA GOPHER SPORTS SERVICE by Craig Thompson

It is only fitting that Gopher quarterback Tony Dungy's third and final game in his home state of Michigan will be the most important of the three and perhaps his career.

Going into Saturday's game against the University of Michigan, Michigan is 4-0 and tied for the conference lead with Ohio State, while Minnesota dropped to 3-1 after last week's upset.

Earlier this season, Dungy led the Gophers to a 14-10 victory over Michigan State, a stadium less than 35 miles from his home in Jackson, Michigan. How did that game compare to this?

"The Michigan game is the most important because of where they are in the polls," Dungy says. "It's my last chance to play at home and is the most important. You remember the 1st and last games and the first wasn't so good." (The Gophers lost 49-0 at Ann Arbor Dungy's sophomore year).

Many critics feel that Dungy made a mistake in chosing Minnesota over Michigan. Dungy isn't a member of that group.

"I have nothing to prove against Michigan," Dungy said. "I'll let my record speak for itself."

That record does indeed speak for itself. In 1975, Dungy set seven Minnesota offense records, a combination of single game and season. Last week in the Gophers loss to Iowa, Dungy broke 3 more, all career marks. He is now holder of the total offense mark (4203 yds.), pass completions (231) and passing yards (3082).

Besides his records at Minnesota, Dungy was named the first team all-Big 10 academic quarterback last season and is up for that award as well as regular all-Big 10 this season. He is truly a tribute to Minnesota.

GOPHERS HOST 3RD ANNUAL PILLSBURY CLASSIC DEC. 30-31

Minneapolis--When the great Bicentennial Year comes to a close our own Minnesota basketball Gophers will be in action hosting the third annual Pillsbury Classic Tournament at the Met Center December 30-31.

What a way to spend your New Year's. . . viewing the only major college basketball tournament action in the great upper midwest.

This year Minnesota will go after its third consecutive Pillsbury Classic title, but must ward off strong challenges expected from Boston College, Cornell University and the University of Montana.

Teams play at 7 and 9 p.m. Thursday, December 30, with the losers and winners meeting at the same times New Year's Eve.

The Pillsbury Company, Golden Gopher Backcourt Club and U. of M. Athletic Department are again co-sponsors of this exciting event. Also, as usual, all net proceeds from the Classic are donated to the Williams Fund at the U. of M.

Last December 6-foot-10 Gopher center Mike "Bells" Thompson won the top award as UM whipped Penn State 86-70 and scuttled an upset attempt by Creighton 80-74 in the championship match.

Olberding was the lone Gopher star to make the all-tournament team the first year, but three men wearing maroon and gold made the honor squad at the last Classic.

And all three of the latter return this time around. . . Thompson, senior guard and co-captain Phil "Flip" Saunders and junior guard Osborne "Goose" Lockhart.

Besides this trio add in the magic talents of "Sugar" Ray Williams, senior guard and co-captain, plus 6-foot-10 junior forward Dave Winey to the Gopher lineup and you can see what excitement abounds in 1976.

Another feature of college basketball this winter is the return of the dunk rule. When Williams, only 6-foot-2, takes off from the free throw line and drills and two-hand slam through the hoop, there is no way you can remain rivited to your seat.

In addition to the men mentioned, add in a pair of local names who will be making their second appearance at the Met Center.

Last summer at the Met Center 6-foot-11 center Kevin McHale of Hibbing and 6-foot-8 forward Steve Lingenfelter of Bloomington Jefferson teamed up on the North squad to destroy the South team in the first annual Lion's All-Star high school game.

This talented freshmen pair are now Gopher squad members and already tabbed as stars of the future. However, they may not wait that long as both are expected to make their marks in 1976-77.

Excitement? You've got it. What a way to end the year. Get your gang together and make party plans for the Met Center December 30-31. You won't be disappointed.

"When "Sugar", "Goose", "Flip" and "Bells" take the court followed by rookie standouts McHale and Lingenfelter, you can bet the Met will rock. . . rock with the yells of Gopher backers. Be one of them!

Kickoff is slated for 1:00 p.m. CST. After suffering two consecutive conference defeats to Iowa (12-22) and number one ranked Michigan (0-45), the Gopher record stands at 5-3 for the season and 3-2 in the Big Ten. Northwestern has yet to taste victory in 1976 and stands 0-8 on the season, 0-5 in conference play. Saturday marks the 58th resumption of the series which began in 1892 when Minnesota won 18-12. Gopher teams lead in wins 33-20 with four ties marking this highly competitive series. Through the years Minnesota and Northwestern have played some gigantic struggles. The most memorable came in 1936 when the Wildcats won 6-0 and stopped Minnesota's longest win streak at 21. However, UM went on to win its third straight national championship that season.

STOLL ON "From this point on it's not a mental factor that I'm concerned about, NW & MICH just the physical," Says Gopher head coach Cal Stoll. "I have no doubt our men will get themselves psyched up for the last three games against Northwestern, Ohio State and Wisconsin. My main concern is the health of our men. We Went to Michigan in pretty bad shape and didn't get any healthier. But I still believe if our men can heal and get back near full strength we can do it. It would be great to go out a winner, but it will be far from easy. I hope it happens. young men deserve all that's good. They have worked awfully hard to get this far and do not want to let anything get away. It goes without saying that Northwestern is better than 0-8. Just last week they had a chance to win at Iowa, and before that could have beaten Wisconsin. You can rest assured they will be ready for us. As for Michigan, well, even if we had been at full strength it would not have made much difference. Michigan IS awesome, just like I said. I can't see any team defeating them. But what worries me the most is that almost all their players return next year. As an entire team they are the best I have ever seen. They have no apparent weaknesse Their offensive line is easily the best in college football, maybe one of the best ever. We were never able to get anything going, start a sustained drive. They take so much away from you both ways. But our men have bounced back before and I hope they can do it again. I believe they can, too."

BROOKS ON "I'm pleased to gain three points the first weekend," says Gopher ice UND-MICH. boss Herb Brooks. "Minnesota-Duluth skated very hard and played some SERIES solid hookey. But our men showed improvement in several areas, particularly team defense. We held UND to an average of less than 30 shots per game and Saturday twice killed off two men short situations. So we are making strides. We are still a long way from showing a consistent style of play in all areas, but I do see progress. #### HOLMES' BIGGEST RIVAL IS INJURY

Each year in college football the best winning record comes not from a team, but from the biggest nemesis around, the injury. Some players are sidelined for a year, many for careers, and then there are those unfortunate few who are bothered by injury all their careers. Not series enough to end careers, but destructive enough to force them to miss parts or play hurt.

Enter Bubby Holmes.

The senior from Monessen, Pennsylvania, came to Minnesota on the highest of credentials, a high school all-American and three time all-stater. Holmes was compared to Tony Dorsett of Pittsburgh, NCAA rushing \*\*ecord holder, both possessing the same potential prior to their freshmen years.

Holmes started out his career with a bang. The first game he played in for Minnesota was against Purdue and he scored a touchdown. That was about the extent of it though, as an ankle injury and a recurring back injury allowed him to carry the ball just five more times that inaugural season.

The following season, Holmes was hit with the same nuisance injuries, but they hit at a most inopportune time, the prefall. Bubby didn't play at all his sophomore season in 1974.

Following a spring practice in which he was healthy and impressive, it looked like Holmes could have his year in 1975. He did, leading the Gophers in rushing with 573 yards and recording the longest run from scrimmage last year, a 42 yard romp.

What could have been "look out Big Ten" in 1976 has turned in to "you know what." In the opening game of this season, Holmes carried the ball on the first Gopher play from scrimmage and gained eight yards. His carrying the ball to open the season showed that the coaches still had confidence in him and more importantly, he had confidence in himself.

Two plays later, he carried the ball for 13 yards and a first down. About six minutes into the game, it happened. A pass to Holmes was knocked incomplete by an Indiana defender and Holmes went down, dislocating his elbow. Holmes has played in one game since then, not including last week's game with Michigan, and has carried the ball eight times for 23 yards.

The injury, sometimes the biggest winner in football, has struck again.

GREAT SPORTS Talk about sports events: There is something for everyone at WEEK ON UM Minnesota this weekend highlighted by the Gopher-Ohio State football clash Saturday at 1 p.m. CST in Memorial Stadium. The Gophers will be out to derail the Buckeye express which is undefeated (6-0) in Big Ten play. Minnesota is 4-2 and 6-3 overall. Other events begin Friday evening at 7:30 p.m. when Minnesota hosts Michigan State in WCHA hockey at Williams Arena. The same teams face off here Saturday evening, also. Then on Tuesday, November 15, Minnesota opens its basketball campaign against Athletes in Action with an 3 p.m. tipoff set for Williams Arena. About 50,000 are expected to view the grid battle and more than 7,000 each hockey contest. All seats in basketball are general admission. This contest is NOT included in the season ticket package.

After an uneven start which saw Ohio State suffer a tie with powerful OSU AGAIN ON RAMPAGE UCLA and a loss to up and down Missouri, the Buckeyes have come on as usual in the Big Ten race destroying six straight foes. A mid season injury that sidelined starting quarterback Rod Gerald could have slowed the express. But Jim Pacenta stepped in am nothing has changed. Pacenta holds a hot passing arm which gives OSU a new dimension on offense. No longer do the Buckeyes depend solely on the powerful off tackle slants of giant fullback Pete Johnson, who leads the nation in career touchdowns with 57. Johnson stands 6-foot-1 and weighs 247 pounds. Add to that the usual stingy Buckeye defense and nothing but problems face the gritty Gophers. It wasn't enough that Minnesota went to Northwestern in rough physical UM OVERCOMES FLU, INJURIES condition with several starters ailing or completely out of action. TO BEAT NW On Friday evening half the travel squad came down with a flu virus. A good share of the men who played in the 38-10 Gopher victory were sick to their stomachs and throwing up even during the game on the sidelines. That the squad held together and managed the important victory is a tribute to the squad.

PERKINS SETS Three short touchdown blasts by Minnesota's version of Pete Johnson-NEW UM "designated scorer" Jim Perkins-led the latter to a new single season record at Minnesota. Perkins has now crossed enemy goal lines 13 times this season erasing the old mark of 12 set by John King in 1972. The senior fullback from Red Wing, Minnesota has also tied the school mark for TD's in a Big Ten game only with nine. What makes it more amazing is that "Perk" has only carried the ball 53 times this season. He is averaging a TD every four carries. However, that average may be harder to keep up against the rugged Buckeye defense.

UM CLOSES
GRID YEAR
AT MADISON

After a chilling 9-3 loss in its home finale against Ohio State
Saturday, the Minnesota Gophers head for the last game of 1976 by taking

on the Wisconsin Badgers at Madison this Saturday at 1 p.m. CST. A win there would close the seeson log at 7-4. Regardless of the outcome, coach Cal Stoll has already assured UM fans of their first back-to-back winning seasons since 1967-66. Last season Minnesota ended 6-5. What's also at stake Saturday, however, is a third place finish in the Big Ten race. Both the Gophers and Purdue are 4-3. Purdue plays host to Indiana this week. A win at Wisconsin would clinch at least a share of third place matching the 1973 Gopher finish. But whatever the result, UM fans will long remember the day that "almost was" against the mighty Buckeyes. Minnesota played heavily favored OSU to a near standstill, but in the end it was a great Buckeye defense that spelled the difference. However, the Gopher defense distinguished itself, too, holding OSU to just 42 yards total offense in the second half. Freshman Paul Rogind's 49-yard field goal was UM's only score coming in the second quarter.

LONGEST GRID Minnesota and Wisconsin have played the longest, uninterupted collegiate series in the nation. Starting in 1890, the schools have battled each season, except for 1905 when a moratorium among the more heated rivalries was called for by the President of the U. S., Teddy Roosevelt. In 85 matches Minnesota leads this series with 48 wins to 29 for Badger teams. There have been eight ties. Last year Minnesota won at home 24-3.

DUNGY IN FINAL WITH Senior captain Tony Dungy will don the maroon and gold for OTHER SENIORS Minnesota the last time at Wisconsin Saturday. He and 14 other seniors were introduced before the OSU game last Saturday, their final home contest. Dungy, by accounting for 211 yards total offense, raised his school-record mark to 4,591 yards, 4th best in Big Ten history for all games played. His career passing yardage (3,427) and pass completions (265) are both 8th best marks in the conference. The senior quarterback has accounted for 1,503 yards total offense this season, just 313 short of his 1975 output. His favorite target, senior wide receiver Ron Kullas, caught six of Dungy's completions against Ohio State and needs just seven more Saturday to tie the UM record of 34 career catches set by Ken Last in 1964-65-66.

CAGERS IN PRE-SEASON ASSIGNMENT Coach Jim Dutcher will unveil his 1976-77 U of M basketball squad Tuesday night at Williams Arena in an 8 p.m. pre-season assignment against the touring Athletes in Action.

"It will be a good test for us," Dutcher says, "and the timing couldn't be better. It will give us an early indication of our strengths and weaknesses and provide us with an opportunity to take advantage of what we learned before our regular season opener November 27 against North Dakota State."

Dutcher has indicated that he will open with his five returning starters from a year ago. That will put Phil Saunders and Osborne Lockhart at the guards, Ray Williams and Dave Winey at the forwards and Mike Thompson at center.

"Ricky Wallace is still recovering from knee surgery and will not play," Dutcher pointed out, "and Tommy Lewis also remains doubtful because of a knee injury. But we hope to get everybody else into the game including Kevin McHale, Steve Lingenfelter and David Carroll."

The invading Athletes in Action contingent pose a severe challenge for the Gophers.

"It could be the biggest team we will face all year," Dutcher maintains, "and they will present a problem of experience in two ways ... their club is made up of former college players, and they will be in their eighth game of the season. They have a 4-3 record after losing only by four points to Marquette in Milwaukee over the weekend."

#### ONE CLOSES, TWO CONTINUE. ONE STARTS ANEW

Minneapolis --- University of Minnesota sports shift gears beginning this week signaling the end of football for 1976, the continuation of hockey and wrestling, and the opening of the basketball season. The grid team ended its campaign 6-5 giving Minnesota its first back to back winning seasons (UM was 6-5 in 1975, too) since 1967 and 1968 as the Gophers dropped a 26-17 decision to Wisconsin at Madison.

Continuing on is the Gopher hockey club which travels to Colorado Springs, Col. to meet the Tigers Friday and Saturday. Both games will be broadcast live in the Twin Cities by WLOL radio (8:55 p.m. Minn. time). Minnesota is 4-3-1 for nine points and fourth place in the WCHA after splitting with North Dakota at home (3-4, 3-2). Also continuing on is the Gopher wrestling team with a meet against the Air Force Academy at Colorado Springs Saturday.

The club starting all over is the Gopher basketball squad which opens its 1976-77 slate at Williams Arena Saturday hosting North Dakota State University. is set for 8:05 p.m. CST.

"It wasn't the way we had hoped to end 1976," says coach Cal Stoll STOLL ON '76 FOOTBALL about the 26-17 loss to Wisconsin, "but they played with enthusiasm and we didn't. We wanted badly to end the season 7-4, but a 6-5 final and a third place finish in the Big Ten isn't all that bad. Not all was lost in that one game. You've got to hand it to Wisconsin. They played awfully well and did the things they had to do to win.

"Our season was disappointing only in that we didn't reach some of the goals we had set for ourselves. But a lot of good happened, too. We were all most appreciative of the way Minnesota fans supported our team. I guess it's the first time in several years that we had three 50,000 plus crowds in Memorial Stadium. made a lot of strides in the last few years, but now it's back to work to begin preparations for next season. We will only be able to recruit about 18 men for next year under the new NCAA rules limiting all schools to just 95 men on aid. We were a very young team this fall and have plenty of returning players. We'll be better next year, too."

**DUNGY ENDS** RECORD(S) CAREER

Senior captain and quarterback Tony Dungy ended an impressive four-year span in a Gopher uniform last week, a career that saw him rewrite much of the Minnesota football record book. Dungy set new career records this fall for most plays, 999, and most yards, 4,742, total offense: most pass (MORE)

attempts, 586, most completions, 274, most yards passing, 3,577, and most touchdown passes, 25. In addition he scored 16 touchdowns (96 points) rushing and passed for five two-point conversions making him responsible for 41 touchdowns and 256 career points. Most of those Minnesota records are expected to stand for many years. In addition, his career marks make Dungy the fourth highest yardage producer in Big Ten history for all games played. He only trails the career totals set by Mike Phipps of Purdue (5,8.3), Archie Griffin of Ohio State (5,589), and Bob Griese of Purdue (4,329). Dungy's career passing totals are the sixth highest in completions and 3th highest in yards in Big Ten history. To say he has been a dominant factor in Gopher football is a fact. To say he will be missed, both as a QB and leader, is a gross understatement.

GRID CROWD "We have just completed our best home season attendance-wise since 1969, UP says Minnesota ticket manager Ken Buell. "A total of 262,327 were at Memorial Stadium for six games which averages out to 43,721. In 1969 the figure was 272,365 for six games. The average attendance figure for this fall was the best since the 45,094 mark in 1970. Another important item is that crowds above the 50,000 mark were reached three times, something we haven't seen here since 1968. So, yes, I would have to say football is coming back strong at Minnesota."

Gopher coach Jim Dutcher is beginning his second year at Minnesota following last year's 16-10 mark, 8-10 in the Big Ten. His career record stands at 142 wins against 60 losses in seven years.

LAST YEAR'S Dutcher said Monday he will open with his five returning starters from TOP "FIVE" 1975-76. That means senior co-captain Ray Williams (3-2) and junior Dave Winey (6-10) at forward, junior Mike Thompson (6-10 at center, with senior co-captain Phil "Flip" Saunders (5-11) and junior Osborne Lockhart (6-2) at guard. Thompson and Williams led the Gophers last season with scoring averages of 25.9 and 19.9, respectively. Thompson set a new single season UM scoring record with 647 points. He was second in Big Ten scoring, Williams fourth, and Thompson also led the conference in rebounding Lockhart also hit in double figures last season, 12.3, while Saunders averaged 9.4 and Winey, a late season starter, hit 6.2 per game.

"Injuries have alowed us a bit in camp and made it difficult for us to DUTCHER ON CAMP AND put in asmuch as planned," says Dutcher. "We have only covered the OPENER basics on offense and defense thus far. But our healthy players are nearing top Aside from not receiving expected help from freshman Tommy Lewis and Ricky Wallace, both out with leg injuries, we have already gained a lot of hlep from freshmen Kevin McHale and Steve Lingenfelter plus sophomore David Carroll. These three men are our top reserves right now and all will play Saturday. North Dakota State will give us all we want for our opener. They return four starters from last year's team which tied for third conference championship. They are picked to win it They have already defeated the University of Manitoba, defending Canadian national champs, 64-62. Cliff Bell (4-11), Bob Nagle (6-9) and U.S. Davidson (6-3) are returning all-conference players for NDSU which gives them plenty of experienced, skilled players.

"We got off to a good start in defeating Athletes In Action 36-82 last week. We defeated a very, very good ball club. I was most pleased in the way our men handled heavy pressure situations late in the game and retained their poise. Our reserves also played well and that was another big plus. I think we are ready to open the season. We'll find out soon enough."

SWIMMERS OPEN SEASON WITH MARKED IMPROVEMENT

In the Big Ten Relays held November 20 in Iowa City, the Gopher swimming team showed just how much the year-around program initiated last season by Coach Bud Ericksen is working.

Wisconsin easily won the meet with 234 points, Iowa finished second with 150, Iowa State and Illinois third with 144, Minnesota fifth with 126, and Eau Claire, Northwestern and Northern Iowa finishing sixth, seventh and eighth respectively. The Gophers compete in dual action Thursday at Arizona State, and then go at it with 20 teams in a giant meet at Arizona University at Tucson Friday and Saturday. Most University of Minnesota athletic coaches welcome this week and next EXAM BREAK GIVES REST week as an opportunity for their squad members to gain some rest and get healthy. The University is in term ending exams and most teams are out of action until late next week. The only Gopher squad seeing competition this week is the wrestling team in a tournament at Mankato State Saturday. Hockey, which needs the most mending time of all, travels to Lake Superior State December 17; basketball is at home December 18 to Vermont; gymnastics travels to Iowa State December 18; while swimming goes all the way to Hawaii for dual and tournament competition January 31. CAGERS 4-0 -- After surviving a scare at Nebraska Wednesday (12/6), the Gopher basketball team with win at Nebraska captured its 4th win in as many tries turning back the stubborn Cornhuskers 66-56. Center Mike Thompson topped all with 33 points, 10 rebounds and eight blocked shots. He scored 11 of UM's last 13 points. total was his highest of the season. The Gophers had to overcome lethargic play on their own part plus a Nebraska slow-down. "We had it when needed and that's the main thing," says coach Jim Dutcher. "Actually, I'm more than pleased the way our club has developed. They have come together faster than I expected. In order for us to just survive we must find total togetherness on the court. These men have done that. 

Now we have to keep our tempo up and not let down like we did much of the Nebraska game. If we do powers like Marquette and Kansas State will make things mighty tough on us. But we are on schedule and getting ready for both those teams plus the Pillsbury Classic (Dec. 29-30) and the Big Ten season. All I can say now is that we'll be ready. Our game at Detroit where we won 104-30 was the best a team has played for me since I've been at Minnesota. Everybody shot better and jumped higher. We'll need that kind of effort the rest of the way as we face a rugged road in 1976-77."

After losing a home series to Wisconsin 3-4 in overtime and 2-7, some ICERS FALL IN WCHA, BUT were ready to write the Minnesota hockey team off. Not coach FAR FROM OUT Herb Brooks. "Look, we went into that series crippled on defense and lost two more players to injury," Brooks said this week, "but several men came off the bench and turned in very strong performances. Sure we lost twice, but to a damn good We had more than our share of chances to win that overtime game but just couldn't pull the trigger. We simply ran out of gas the next night in the third period. But don't count this club out for one minute. This exam period came at exactly the right time. We are backing off practices so our men can both heal up and concentrate fully on their exams. When we go back to work next week we'll be in the best shape of the season. We have two non-conference affairs before the Notre Dame series at the St. Paul Civic Center (12/29-30) which have to help men coming off injuries. I'm certain we'll be ready for Notre Dame. We had better be because they have their best team in about the last four years." The Gophers are now 7-6-2 on the season and 4-6-2 for 10 points and in 7th place in the WCHA.

INJURED Senior captain Joe Micheletti and junior Reed Larson, both defensemen, PLAYERS plus junior Ken Yackel and freshman Don Micheletti, both left wings, BACK returned to practice this week and all should be ready for the next Gopher outing. Joe Micheletti missed the Wisconsin series with a knee injury while Larson has been out six games (knee) and Don Micheletti eight games (ankle). Yackel went out in Friday's contest against Wisconsin with a facial injury and missed Saturday's game. That leaves only sophomore defenseman Bill Baker (collarbone) on the shelf. Baker has been out since November 12 and missed UM's last seven encounters. He is not expected back in action until after January 1. --UII--

CAGERS IN Exams are over in the classroom. Now more exams are on the basketball 3 TOUGHIES court for the Minnesota Gophers. Three games in six days will give coach Jim Dutcher a pretty fair country look at just where the Gophers stand. Saturday (December 13) Minnesota hosts a big, rugged Vermont club, travels to number two ranked Marquette Tuesday (December 21), and returns home to meet Big Eight power Kansas State next Thursday (December 23). After being off since December 8 when UM won at Nebraska, 66-58 the Gophers could be rusty having practiced at odd times durin the exam break.

ABOUT Vermont comes in with a 2-3 record but have won their last two beating OPPONENTS

St. Michael's 65-61 and Norwich 102-79. Losses came from Fordham (77-80), at LaSalle (66-75) and at Holy Cross (35-96). Coach Peter Salzberg is in his fifth year at Vermont. The Catamounts are led this year by 6-3 guard Warren Prehmus with a 19.6 scoring average and 6-4 guard Sam Copeland averaging 11.2 points and 6.2 rebounds. Part-time starter at center is 6-11 Kevin Kelly, tallest man on the Vermont squad.

Marquette, under coach Al McGuire in his 13th year at the Milwaukee, Wisconsin school, will be out for revenge. One of only two losses suffered by the Warriors last season was a 77-73 overtime upset at the hands of Minnesota in Williams Arena. But at home Karquette is almost invincible. McGuire's record at Minnesota stands at 274-73 with most of those victories at home. Now in his 20th year of coaching overall, Al said before this season, "If I was a New York cop I would retire at 4/5ths pay and think about a real job." But undefeated at 4-0 going into a tough contest against Louisville at home Saturday, it doesn't appear Al is about to hang it up with the 2nd ranked Warriors. Leading Marquette to wins against St. Leo (30-39), Western Michigan (73-53), Florida (64-61) and Penn State (79-49) are guard Butch Lee (18.8) and forward Bo Ellis (15.8) Ellis, who goes 6-9, is also averaging nine rebounds per outing. Others scoring in double figures and Gary Rosenberger (12.0) and 6-10 center Jerome Whitehead (10.3). Marquette's margin of victory this season has been 25 points per outing with only the Florida game on the road.

Kansas State went into this weekend 5-1 against Central Missouri at hom Saturday, and a road contest at Arkansas Monday. The Wildcats, Big Eight Conference favorites, have been in post season play five of the last six years under coach Jack Hartman now in his 7th campaign at K-State. His record to date is 117-55. (MORE)

Balanced scoring is the key to this club with four starters in double figures. Included are 6-5 forward Curtis Redding (16.5), 6-1 guard Mike Evans (16.2), 6-5 forward Larry Dassie (14.3) and 6-5 center Darryl Winston (12.7). Dassie is averaging 10 rebounds and Winston 7.5. The other starter is 6-2 guard Keith Frazier (8.5), who is the younger brother of pro star Walt Frazier of the New York Knicks. The five Kansas State wins came over Vanderbilt (39-66), Arkansas St. (33-61), Cal. Poly. (37-68), at SMU (103-85), and Northern Illinois (79-58). The lone setback was at North Texas State (63-67).

After setting new school records and being named All-Big Ten first team THOMPSON last season, but being shunted in pre season picks this winter, junior GAINES MORE PRAISE center Mike Thompson has earned just about the same accolade from every coach Minnesota has played against this season. . . "awesome." To date Mike is averaging 22.8 points and 9.8 rebounds and has scoring highs of 31 points against Detroit and 33 against Nebraska. Both those games were on the road and saw Minnesota win 104-80 and 66-53, respectively. Home wins were against N. Dakota St. (101-63) and Northern Michigan (96-50). Said Nebraska coach Joe Cipriano about Thompson, "He is one of the finest players I have ever coached against. He's definitely All-America calibre." Cipriano's assistant coach, Lonnie Porter, added after scouting Thompson earlier, "He's probably the finest player NU will face this season. see anybody keeping him off the first All-America team. He's a first-round NBA draft pick."

Glenn Brown of Northern Michigan chipped in with, "He's awesome, with both size and speed," after seeing Mike Score 16 points and grab 11 rebounds. The previous week Thompson scored 31 points (hitting 15 of 17 field goal attempts) while playing half the game against Detroit. That performance prompted Titan coach Dick Vitale to comment, "He's undoubtedly the most awesome center I've seen in my three years here. I agree with Marquette coach Al McGuire. . . Thompson is the best offensive center in the country."

That's not the entire reason, but certainly a good reason why the Gophers are 4-0 and this week ranked 10th by UPI in the national polls. At 6-foot-10 and 225-pounds, Thompson doesn't give away a whole lot to opposing centers. next three outings, plus Minnesota's attempt to win its third straight Pillsbury Holiday Basketball Classic at the Met Center December 30-31, could tell a lot about how Mike will stand up when the Big Ten season opens at home January 8 against Iowa. #### HUGE HOLIDAY WEEK

Minneapolis--A full week of holiday action continues starting Wednesday and continuing through Sunday for University of Minnesota athletic teams.

Wednesday and Thursday finds the Gopher hockey team playing visitor at the St. Paul Civic Center in a WCHA series against host school Notre Dame. This series was originally scheduled for South Bend, Indiana. Game times are 8 p.m. in the spacious Civic Center.

Thursday and Friday Minnesota's nationally ranked basketball team returns to the Met Center in Bloomington, Minnesota to defend its two Pillsbury Holiday Classic titles. The Gophers take on Cornell in the second game Thursday at 9:05 p.m. following the tourney opener at 7:05 p.m. between Boston College and the University of Montana.

Then Sunday evening Minnesota plays its final exhibition hockey game of the year at the Met Center against the Russian Spartaks, last year's U.S.S.R. national champion. Game time is 7 p.m. Minnesota played the Spartaks during its European tour in the summer of 1975 losing a 5-3 decision.

Gopher teams on the road include coach Wally Johnson's wrestling team at Evanston, Illinois in the rugged Midlands Tournament Wednesday and Thursday, and coach Bud Ericksen's swimming team in both dual and tournament competition in Hawaii.

ICERS WIN Junior wing Dan Bonk provided most of the offensive heroics Monday as OT GAME Minnesota's hockey team took a key intersectional game from Harvard 4-3 MON. in overtime at Williams Arena. The third largest home crowd of the year, 7,388, saw Bonk score two Gopher goals, his second with 2:01 left in overtime providing Minnesota with its 7th win of the year. Bonk scored in the first period to give UM a brief 2-1 lead after teammate Jim Boo tied the game at 1-1. After a scoreless second period Tom Vannelli gave Minnesota a 3-2 lead that lasted just 32 seconds. Then Bonk ended the evening in overtime. Providing the defensive heroics was goalie Steve Janaszak who stopped 31 Harvard tries in spectacular fashion. It was Janaszak's third win of the season. Following its WCHA series against Notre Dame and the Spartak game, UM returns to league action next week at Madison January 7-8 against WCHA leader Two Minnesota players, defenseman Reed Larson and wing Don Micheletti, saw their first action Monday in Williams Arena since November. Both had been sidelined with injuries.

CAGERS COULD TAKE THIRD PILLSBURY Unlike death and taxes, nothing else is certain. However, coach Jim Dutcher's Gopher basketball team is favored to capture its third straight Pillsbury Holiday Classic this week at the Met.

The strongest opposition appears now to be Montana. The Grizzlies come to the Twin Cities with a 7-1 record having recently scored a big win at Long Beach State. Their only loss was a narrow decision dropped at powerful Arizona State. Boston College and the University of Cornell, the latter UM's first round opponent Thursday, have found difficulty getting things in gear this season. However, when it comes to tournament time throw the book out the window. Anything can, and usually does, happen Gopher center Mike Thompson will also be out to defend something at the Pillsbury go. Last year he was named tournament MVP in a landslide vote. He also made the all-tourney team alongside UM guards Flip Saunders and Osborne Lockhart. The Gophers, now 7-0 and nationally ranked by both A.P. and UPI, are hoping to complete the non-conference portion of their 1976-77 schedule undefeated a second straight year under Dutcher. Last season UM entered the Big Ten 3-0 ending the season 16-10. The Gopher conference opener is January 3 at home against Iowa, also undefeated at this time.

WRESTLING AT Fifteen Gopher wrestlers will be competing in the Midlands Tourney MIDLANDS held in Evanston, Illinois on December 29-30. Included on the list are Mike McArthur (118), Gene Shaw (126), Pat Neu and Ken Saba (134), Steve Egesdal (142), Mark Obrycki and Bob Schandle (150), Jim Menne and Dan Zilverberg (158), Jim Lunde and Tom Press (167), Brian Ayers (177), Evan Johnson (190), and heavyweights Stan Werner and James Becker.

In the 1975 Midlands, three members of this year's entourage placed: McArthur was third (second in 1974), Lunde was fifth, and Johnson was sixth. McArthur, Gopher co-captain, currently stands at 15-0 and has four invitational championships to his credit. Egesdal is 12-1 with two individual championships, while Schandle is 10-2 with one championship.

- 4) Going into this series Herb Brooks' record at Minnesota stands at 103 wins, 60 losses and 14 ties, a winning mark of .621%. He is in his 5th year at UM. In WCHA games only Brooks is 72-49-11 (.537%).
- 5) Charles "Lefty" Smith is in his 9th year at Notre Dame and owns a record there of 141-132-14 for a winning mark of .516%. Prior to moving to South Bend Lefty coached in the Minnesota Junior B League (1952-57) and at South St. Paul high school (1958-68)
- 6) Beginning with the 1972-73 season Brooks and Smith have met head on eight times with Brooks-coached Minnesota teams winning six. The Irish won one and there was a tie in the last meeting (4-4) at South Bend last season. Minnesota has won all four meetings in Williams Arena and twice on the road. The lone  $N_{\bullet}D_{\bullet}$  win was the first meeting between these coaches, a 2-3 decision Nov. 24, 1972. The Gophers then took six straight series wins until the tie last winter.

#### About The Gophers:

- Last Monday Tom Vannelli scored 2 assists against Harvard giving him a career total of 90, second highest in UM history. The school record is 154 by John Mayasich (1951-55). Vannelli just passed Mike Polich (1971-75) who is now 3rd with 89 career assists.
- . . . In career goals scored Vannelli has 49 and needs 3 more to move into the top five in UM history. Gary Gambucci (1965-68) and Bill Klatt (1966-69) each scored 52. Mayasich has the record, 144.
- . . . In total career points Vannelli is now 4th at UM with 139. Mayasich is again the leader here with 298. Third is Ken Yackel, Sr. (1951-56) with 148.
- . . . Reed Larson returned to action Monday against Harvard after missing 7 games dating back to November 13 against Michigan State when he received a knee injury. Don Micheletti had been out 8 games with an ankle hurt before playing at Lake Superior State. Bill Baker, still out with a shoulder injury, has missed the last 9 UN games.
- . . . Among Gopher scorers this season Bruce Lind is on the hottest streak having scored at least 1 point in each of the last 11 games, and in 14 of the last 15.
- . . . Vannelli, since returning to duty Nov. 26 at C.C. following the eye injury that kept him out of five games, has scored in all six games he has played after getting back in the lineup.
- . . Other Gophers on streaks include Robin Larson (5 of last 6), Dan Bonk (last 3) and Tom Gorence (3 of last 5).
- . . . Goalie Steve Janaszak, who won against Harvard Monday, was in his first start that night since Nov. 27 at Golorado College.
- . . In 11 home games this season Minnesota is averaging 7,763 at Williams Arena (cap. seating 7,775), well above the school record average of 7,256 attracted to 21 home games last season. Minnesota's attendance average is second national only to Wisconsin.
- . . . The series record between these schools reads 10-5-1 in Minnesota's favor.
- . . . In key goals scored this season Vannelli has scored 9 (5 PP, 3 lst goals and 1 tying goal), Tom Gorence 12 (6 PP, 2 tying, 1 shorthand, 1 insurance and 2 first goals).
- . . Eric Strobel and Gorence each have a pair of 2-goal games this season while Gorence and Ken Yackel have the only hat tricks.
- . . . The Russian Spartak hockey team (UM's opponent at 7 p.m. Sunday at Met Center) arrives at 4:00 p.m. Saturday, Jan. 1 NW Flt. #535 and will stay at the Marriott Inn. The Russian team will practice 6-7:30 p.m. Saturday at the Met. The Gophers practice at the Met 1:30-2:30 Saturday.
- . . . Minnesota is dead even in OT games this season tying twice (3-3 UMD and 3-3 @ C.C.), losing 3-4 to Wisconsin, and beating Harvard 4-3.
