January 31, 1974

The second regular meeting of the Twin Cities Campus Assembly was convened in the auditorium of Nicholson Hall on Thursday, January 31, 1974. #### V. CAMPUS COMMITTEE ON BUSINESS AND RULES

##### **Reported for Action (15 minutes)**

The Committee on Business and Rules recommends Amendment of the Constitution, Article VI, Section 1. The section would then read:

Amendments to this Constitution shall be approved either by a two-thirds majority of all voting members of the Twin Cities Assembly at a regular or special meeting, or by a majority of all voting members of the Assembly at each of two meetings, the second of which shall be the next regular meeting, and provided the proposed amendment has been distributed, in writing, to the persons and in the manner provided in Article II, Section 5, for distribution of the Twin Cities Assembly agenda, at least 10 days prior to the date of the vote on the approval of the proposed amendment. Such amendments after adoption shall then be submitted to the University Senate and Regents for approval.

This parallels the procedure which has been approved for the University Senate.

The amendment was defeated, receiving 84 votes, which was less than the required two-thirds (117).

#### VI. REPORT OF THE ASSEMBLY COMMITTEE ON INTERCOLLEGIATE ATHLETICS

##### **Reported for Information (30 minutes)**

Item 1.

At the April 26, 1973 meeting, I was instructed by the Assembly to prepare answers to three questions concerning complimentary tickets. I did provide answers to the questions, but I was not able to attend the meeting because of a special class conflict. Unfortunately, Athletic Director Paul Giel was not able to attend either. Messages sent to the chair explaining our absence were delayed or not delivered.

Please accept the committee's apology for not having a representative present to answer questions.

The new questions submitted by Peter Hames overlap with the previous questions and answers. I will err this time on the side of complete detail.

**1. a. What is the policy which governs the use of complimentary tickets?**

The members of the Intercollegiate Conference abide by a series of rules and regulations mutually derived and agreed to by the ten institutions. Since the rules specify the line between legal and illegal activity, institutions are free to adopt individual institution rules more strict than conference rules but they may not adopt more lenient rules. The relevant rules for complimentary tickets are repeated (in part) below.

**Agreement V. Game Administration, Ticket Policies and Financial Settlements for All Sports**

**B. Ticket Policies**

**1. Price of Admissions**

a. The Conference institution shall establish the price of admissions for all sports or athletic events held under its supervision.

**3. Complimentary Tickets**

A complimentary ticket is defined as a free or service charge ticket issued by a Conference institution as a complimentary admission for a particular event.

**a. Football**

(1) A maximum of two complimentary tickets for football games may be given by the host institution to participating officials or to retired football officials with twenty or more years' service in the Conference.

(2) Complimentary tickets for home and away-from-home football games may be issued to varsity squad members and shall not exceed two tickets for any game to those in their first year on the varsity squad and four tickets for any game to others.

(3) Complimentary tickets issued to traveling varsity squad members for away-from-home games shall be only for the actual use of their immediate families, and shall be distributed under administration of the Director of Athletics or his designate.

(4) No more than two complimentary tickets shall be issued to freshman squad members for events in which their squads are competing.

(5) Each institution may issue additional complimentary tickets to other persons or groups. However, the institution shall adhere to the policy stated in V-C-1-d below relative to financial settlements for these complimentary tickets.

**b. Basketball, Hockey, and Other Sports**

(1) A maximum of 36 complimentary tickets shall be allotted at no charge to a visiting team for the specifically scheduled game in basketball, and 30 in hockey, but no complimentary tickets shall be allotted to visiting teams in other sports unless otherwise mutually agreed upon.

(2) A maximum of two complimentary tickets for any contest may be given by the host institution to participating officials or to officials in that sport who have retired with twenty or more years' service in the Conference.

(3) Complimentary tickets for home contests may be issued to varsity squad members in that sport, and shall not exceed two tickets for any game to those in their first year on the varsity squad or four tickets for any game to others.

(4) No more than two complimentary tickets shall be issued to freshman squad members for events in which their squads are competing.

(5) Each institution may issue additional complimentary tickets and this policy shall be governed by each institution.

**C. Financial Settlements**

**1. Football**

d. Admissions corresponding to the greater of 1600 or four percent (4%) of the total admissions issued by the host institution shall be considered as an allowance for complimentary admission. However, if less than the allowable amount is issued, then only the actual number issued shall be deducted by the host institution.

**1. b. Who is responsible for the administration of that policy?**

The Athletic Director.

**1. c. Who evaluates the administration of the policy?**

The Assembly Committee on Intercollegiate Athletics.

**2. What is the service charge for a complimentary season ticket?**

\$4 for football, \$4 for basketball, \$4 for hockey. Admission to other regularly scheduled athletic events is included with the football complimentary ticket.

**3. a. Who decides what people qualify as being "in a position to contribute to the success of the University Athletic program"?**

Primarily the Athletic Director, but he would be advised by head coaches, athletic administration staff, the President's office, and the Assembly Committee.

**3. b. Who are the persons in these positions?**

When I wrote the phrase "in a position to contribute," I was thinking of members of the media and some prominent people in public life, such as the Minneapolis Chief of Police, the Fire Chief, etc. It is obvious to me that the athletic program benefits by good public relations. One method of insuring some public acceptance is by having selected representatives of the media and public present at the games.

**3. c. What is the rationale for giving tickets to persons in status groups number one (Athletic Department staff) and two (Regents, Central Administration, ACIA)?**

Head coaches get 8 tickets to events in their sport; 4 tickets to other sports. Assistant coaches get 4 tickets to events in their sport; 2 tickets to other sports.

Other staff get from 4 to 2 tickets depending on position and seniority.

I think the reason for giving complimentary tickets to this group is obvious. Athletic department staff members are required to work unusual hours when events are scheduled. The opportunity to take their families to events seems small compensation for the inconveniences to them. This practice is also consistent with opportunities available to faculty and students associated with other activities such as concerts, dances, etc.

Regents devote many hours to University affairs at considerable expense to themselves. The opportunity to view athletic events with family and friends at preferential cost does not seem unreasonable. ACIA members

are expected to determine appropriate conditions for athletic affairs. It would be foolish for them to attempt such regulation without viewing as many of the events as possible. One need only recall the Ohio State incident two years ago to see why several members should be attending every event. As chairperson of this Committee, I spend from two to ten (occasionally more) hours per week on Athletic Department affairs with no released time from my other University commitments. Committee members will spend from two to ten (or more) hours per month on Committee activities. Two of the vice presidents are *ex officio* members of ACIA and are directly involved in Athletic Department affairs. In addition, the President and the Vice President for Student Affairs occasionally become involved in Athletic Department affairs.

**4. a. How many tickets are given to athletes?**

As I stated in the first report, the number depends on the years of competition in the athlete's particular sport: 2 for one or two years, 3 for three years, 4 for four or five years.

**b. What is the associated loss of revenue?**

I can only offer a wild guess. I have no idea how many athletes would buy a student ticket if they were not members of a team. If most athletes bought football and basketball tickets, revenue might increase by \$7,000 to \$10,000.

**5. What does it mean to say that "many people would not order as many tickets if they were not complimentary"?**

When I wrote that statement, I assumed that there were other people like me buying four complimentary tickets to football, basketball, and hockey at a cost of \$48 plus a donation to the Williams Fund. If the tickets cost considerably more, I probably would not buy four to all three sports. My usual use for the tickets is for myself, my wife, and a faculty or staff member (and his guest) who has educational contact with one of the athletes. University faculty and staff members are usually quite interested in seeing students perform. Occasionally, I will invite someone from outside the University community or take two of my children. As I indicated, if complimentary tickets were not available, I would be unable to invite guests, which would eliminate a very successful low cost public relations activity. I believe many other complimentary ticket holders do about the same as I do.

**Item 2.** At the request of Women's Intercollegiate Athletics, the ACIA reviewed its charge last spring and decided that, since the Assembly constitution and bylaws did not restrict the ACIA to men's athletics, women's athletics were properly our responsibility. We have invited Ms. Belmar Gunderson, Director of Women's Athletics, to attend our meetings, and we are presently considering the questions of eligibility, awards, scheduling, etc., for both men's and women's athletics.

**VII. SPECIAL NOMINATING COMMITTEE**

## Appendix

### ABSTRACT OF DISCUSSION

The meeting was called to order at 3:30 p.m. in Nicholson Hall auditorium by Vice Chairman Jack Navins. The appointment of Marilee Ward as acting clerk due to the illness of Donald Beatty was approved. John Darley, professor and chairman of psychology, distributed the report of the Commission of Inquiry of the May 1972 campus unrest.

*Assembly and Campus Committees, 1973-74*—Committee memberships presented by committee chairman Betty Robinett, professor and director of linguistics, were approved.

*Committee on Committees*—Mrs. Robinett presented a proposal to include the coordinator of intercollegiate athletics for women as an ex officio member of the Committee on Intercollegiate Athletics, which was approved. She noted that the women's program as developed recently fell within the interest and responsibility of that committee.

*Business and Rules Committee*—Russell Hobbie, professor of physics and chairman of the committee, presented an amendment to the Constitution calling for simple majority approval of any Constitutional amendment by all voting members at two successive meetings. He explained that this was a proposal parallel to one approved in November by the Senate. The motion garnered 84 affirmative votes, none negative, which was not sufficient to meet the current two-thirds requirement.

*Intercollegiate Athletics Committee*—David Giese, professor in General College and chairman of the committee, presented for information a series of responses to questions directed to his committee last April concerning the policy governing the use of complimentary tickets to athletic events. There were no further questions from the floor. He also reported that the committee has invited the director of women's athletics to its meetings. The report concluded with a schedule of women's and men's sports events for the current year.

*Special Nominating Committees*—Membership of a committee to nominate candidates to fill 1974-77 faculty vacancies on the Committee on Committees was approved by the Faculty Assembly.

In other action six nominees were presented, from which three would be elected, to fill 3-year terms on the Steering Committee starting July 1. The slate was approved by the faculty Assembly.

The meeting was adjourned at 4:15 p.m.
