**V. CAMPUS CALENDAR COMMITTEE
1979-80 CALENDAR AMENDMENT
(3 minutes)**

MOTION:

That March 28, 1980, be designated a University holiday.

COMMENT:

In May 1979 the state legislature authorized a tenth holiday for state employees. The University Civil Service Committee, which met in June to determine a suitable date, asked the Calendar Committee to designate March 28 as the tenth holiday for Civil Service employees. The fact that there is only one holiday (Presidents' Day, February 18) between the first of the year and Memorial Day (May 26) persuaded the two committees that a late March holiday was desirable. The fact that the approved 1979-80 calendar has been published made the selection of a noninstructional day falling on the Friday before spring quarter classes begin an attractive option.

that request. As can be seen from the data, the primary additional finding was that persons with 12-month appointments favored more strongly the quarter system than did those with 9-month appointments. The teaching faculty did not differ significantly from the non-teaching faculty.

VIII. CAMPUS COMMITTEE ON CONVOCATIONS AND THE ARTS 1978-79 ANNUAL REPORT

The Campus Committee on Convocations and the Arts met five times during the 1978-79 academic year. The Committee allocated \$7,094 for 21 events and spent \$400 on clerical expenses, etc. The program included lectures, performances, workshops, exhibits, publications, and films. The Committee co-sponsored events with the Departments of Studio Arts, Physical Education, German, English, Classics, Philosophy, Music and Theatre Arts. In addition, monies were allocated to the Coffman Union Program Council, the University Film Society, University Galleries, the CLA Alumni Program Committee, and three student organizations. Although numbers of students participating in events is not one of our main criteria, this year the Committee attempted an accountability form to see if students are being reached by our financial help. Even though it is not as yet an enforced accountability check, the Committee was surprised to learn of the great numbers of students who attended the 21 events we co-sponsored. A copy of the particulars on each approved proposal is on file in the Office of the Clerk of the Senate. The Committee would like to thank Professor Ross D. Smith of Concerts and Lectures for serving as ex-officio, and to affirm his expertise and assistance in the work of the Committee.

IX. OLD BUSINESS AD HOC INVESTIGATING COMMITTEE REPORT

REPORT OF THE AD HOC COMMITTEE CONSTITUTED IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE ACTION TAKEN AT THE TWIN CITIES CAMPUS ASSEMBLY MEETING OF THURSDAY, NOVEMBER 1, 1979.

MOTION 1:

That a trial committee consisting of three (3) faculty members, three (3) students, and a faculty member chair be appointed to try the cases of Stephen Carlson and Richard Cooke and report its findings and recommendations.

MOTION 2:

That Stephen Carlson and Richard Cooke be, and hereby are, cited to appear before the said trial committee at its first formal meeting to show cause why they should not be censured, suspended, or expelled on the following charge and specifications:

Charge: Conduct unworthy of a member of the Assembly

Specification 1: In this, that Richard Cooke and Stephen Carlson have allegedly failed to fulfill their responsibilities as officers in the TCSA in handling budgetary items, clearing their actions with appropriate elements of the TCSA, and carrying out properly such other duties as are delegated to them by the Student Assembly.

Specification 2: In this, that Stephen Carlson's actions have allegedly followed a pattern of conduct that has been disruptive of University Senate and committee meetings, that has impeded the work of groups of which he is a member, and has lost for him the confidence of his colleagues.

ABSTRACT OF DISCUSSION

The Twin Cities Campus Assembly meeting of November 29 was called to order by the vice chairman, Richard Kottke, student, at 3:20 p.m. in 25 Law Building. April and May minutes, this year's officers, and committee memberships were approved.

Calendar Amendment — John Printz, assistant director, CLA student personnel and chairman of the Calendar Committee, proposed that March 28, 1980, be a designated University holiday. A civil service employee asked him why the University should be closed down instead of trying to keep it open. Mr. Printz said that the date, which falls between quarters, was set to comply with the state law that governs the number of holidays for civil service employees. His motion was then approved.

Special Nominating Committee — Membership of a committee to name persons to run for election to open seats on next year's Steering Committee was approved.

(At this point, the president assumed the chair.)

Ad hoc Investigating Committee Report — James Connolly, professor of rhetoric and parliamentarian, gave an interpretation of the motions that would be introduced by the chairperson of the ad hoc committee investigating whether a trial should be held in the cases of students Dick Cooke and Steve Carlson. The question for debate was whether a new committee, a trial committee, should be formed, he said. The second motion outlined the charges and called for the two students to appear before that committee. Thomas Pearsall, professor of rhetoric and chairperson of the ad hoc committee, said there had been a lengthy hearing when the two students were heard after which the committee arrived at the two motions. Asked whether the chairperson of the new committee would have a vote, Mr. Pearsall said the parliamentarian should decide. Steve Carlson opposed the first motion on the grounds that the Assembly would not be carrying out the intent it expressed at its last meeting when it asked for a trial committee. He labeled the formation by the Assembly of a trial committee an attack on the Twin Cities Student Assembly. Dick Cooke accused the parliamentarian of arranging for the new committee, a charge that Mr. Connolly heatedly denied, saying that his responsibility was to advise the chairman of the Assembly. Mr. Cooke said he had asked Mr. Pearsall for a statement of the specific penalties that would be imposed, but was told that was not the committee's responsibility. (Robert's Rules of Order indicates expulsion until a case is disposed of.) Peggy House, associate professor of curriculum and instruction and member of the Pearsall committee, said the charge clearly stated that the committee was to be an investigative body only. Its function, she said, was similar to that of a grand jury, hearing charges and responses from the accused. In conclusion, she noted that it was not in the students' best interests that they be tried by the same body that held the investigation. Mr. Carlson said the whole procedure was wrong, and with that the Assembly approved the first motion. As to the second motion, which outlined the charges of misconduct, Mr. Carlson said the Assembly did not have the authority to revise the bylaws of another body (Twin Cities Student Assembly) and that

there were no grounds for voting for the motion. The motion was then approved.

The Assembly adjourned at 3:50 p.m., and proceeded to the University Senate agenda.
