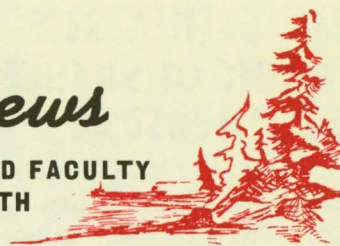

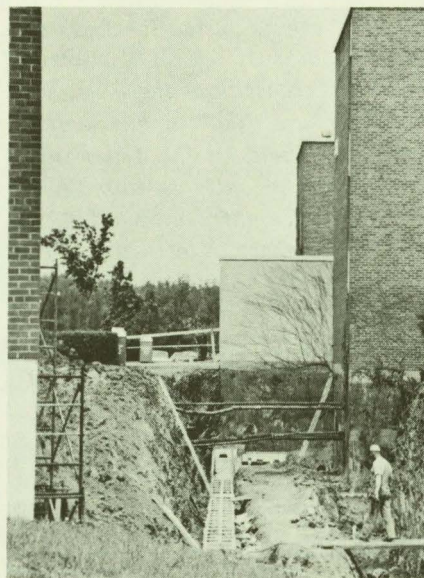
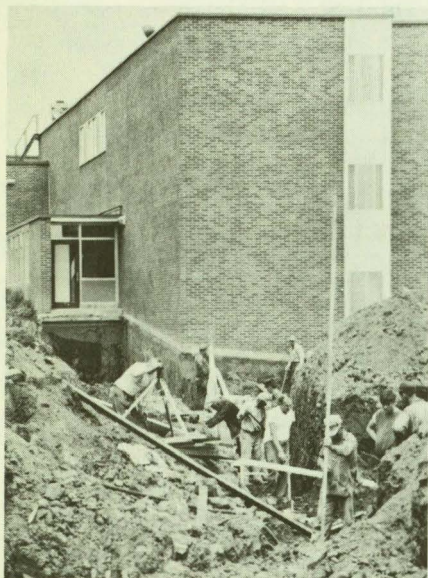

GUTHRIE'S CALL SPEAKS WEDNESDAY



Ground was broken this past week on two more construction projects on the UMD campus—the 200 student addition to Griggs Hall (\$900,000), left, and the concourse between the Humanities and Physical Education buildings (\$80,000). Previously started were the third phase of the Library (\$466,000) and the Marshall W. Alworth Planetarium (\$190,000). Construction also will be started this summer on the new Life-Science building (\$1,280,000) and the study hall-lunch room complex over the bookstore.

Snyder Joins UMD ROTC

Major Richard E. Snyder has been named an assistant professor of aerospace studies at UMD.

He will serve on the six-man, full-time Air Force staff which directs the activities of the 420th ROTC detachment.

Major Snyder received the B.S. degree at Shippensburg State Teachers College, Pa.,

and attended the University of Minnesota and Sacramento State College.

Major Snyder's last assignment was assistant chief of plans and programs, 6441st Tactical Fighter Wing at Yokota, Japan.

He previously served as a navigator, instructor, air operations and administrative officer in Okinawa, the Philippines, Thailand, Vietnam, Iceland, Scotland and several Pacific Islands.

As a member of the repertory company, Call directed Bertold Brecht's "The Caucasian Chalk Garden" during the 1965 season and this season is director of the production of Shakespeare's "As You Like It."

Call handled experimental plays for two seasons before receiving his present appointment in 1964.

He almost didn't make it to the Guthrie, which he calls the most important theater in the country.

Call was working in the Circle in the square in New York when he heard of the plans to start a professional repertory company in the Twin Cities. He almost turned down a job to go elsewhere. "I wake up in a cold sweat when I think about it," he said.

He has been pursuing professional theater for the last ten of his 36 years. His exposure to professional theater started when he graduated from the University of Maryland with a degree in speech and drama.

Call landed a job directing "Candida" at the Avondale Playhouse

Solomon and Mina Yakim bring the Pantomime Theatre of New York to Kirby Student Center ballroom at 7:30 p.m. Thursday, June 30.

Their show, "The Magic of Silence," is being presented under the auspices of the UMD Convocations Committee.

The Yakims, both 25 years of age, are the only husband and wife mime act performing today.

Solomon and Mina came to America following numerous European triumphs. After a successful American debut at Carnegie Hall, they began touring the country.

The Yakims have the training of Marcel Marceau and other great Europeans and the technique, skill and precision of the master artists.

Prior to his years of study with the mime teachers of Paris, Solomon Yakim's famous Reim musical comedy troupe had toured his native land of Israel.

Their UMD performance will follow the Outdoor Picnic from 5-6:30 p.m. on Kirby Terrace.

OHIO STATE TUITION UP TO \$450 A YEAR

Tuition at Ohio State University, Columbus, was recently raised \$25 per quarter for resident students and \$21 for non-resident students.

The increases bring resident fees per year (three quarters) to \$450 and most non-resident tuition per year to \$1,008.

The new residential rate is lower than at many other Ohio campuses: Bowling Green, \$540; Central State, \$500; Kent State, \$510; Miami, \$520; Ohio University, \$500; and Cleveland State, \$495.

Graduating Seniors

All students who plan to complete degree requirements by the end of the first term are asked to check with the Office of Records, 130 Kirby Student Center, no later than Friday, June 24. An application for degree must be filed if not done previously so that a preview of requirements can be made.

Subsequent Quarter Admission

Students in attendance at UMD for the first time during the current Summer Session who wish to be considered for admission to a subsequent term must file required credentials, including transcripts of previous college work, early in the summer.
