LECTURES ON ADULT EDUCATION

Series to Be Given by Dr. Albert Mansbridge,
English Authority

The attention of both students and faculty is called to the lectures to be given on Thursday and Friday, August 7 and 8, on "The Romance and Adventure of Adult Education," by Dr. Albert Mansbridge. The subject is one that interests many who are not directly engaged in teaching, but who have appreciated the effect of extension teaching since the days when Huxley and other great British scientists turned their attention to the popular audience.

Dr. Mansbridge is a leader in adult education in England, being the founder and chairman of several of the leading organizations, a member of numerous committees and commissions entrusted with administration, a governor of Selwyn College, Cambridge, and of St. Hilda's College, Oxford, an author and publicist of international fame. He has come to this country especially to participate in a symposium on Popular Education at Chatauqua Institution, Chatauqua, N. Y., and thru the agencies of that institution is appearing at a few of the larger universities conducting summer sessions. He is in the country only three weeks, and Minnesota is fortunate in securing these two days.

LIBRARY NOTICES
