The question of eugenics and the effect of heredity on individual development is one that has a vital relation to education. The more of the known facts about heredity that one knows the better one may understand its practical social applications. Professor Minnich, of the Department of Animal Biology, has demonstrated his ability to present such facts to Summer Session audiences, and on Tuesday will give a lecture on "Some Aspects of Human Heredity" that should attract wide attention among teachers. The lecture is in the Little Theater and is open to the public.

The Library Ticket Booth will be open on Tuesday and Wednesday from 10 to 4, and students will have exclusive privilege until noon Wednesday, at 25 cents. The public may purchase after that time, or at the door if tickets remain unsold, at 75 cents. Students are advised to purchase early and avoid disappointment at the door.

LECTURES ON THE CONSTITUTION

A series of lectures on the Constitution of the United States has been arranged by the Law School, for the benefit of the Summer Session, which should be of interest to teachers in particular, but to others generally. They will be given by Justices of the State Supreme Court, on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday afternoons, at 3 o'clock, in the Little Theater.

The first of the series will be by Judge Edward Lees, on "The Beginnings of the Constitution;" the second will be by Judge Royal A. Stone, on "The Framework of the Constitution," that is, its basic provisions; the third, by Chief Justice Sam B. Wilson, on "Majority Rule in the Appellate Court," will deal with practical aspects of administration. The lectures will be open to the public.
